Everyday Life

Canadian Currency and Banking

It is your choice whether to open a bank account in Canada. If you do, most major banks offer great student accounts and services that can help you save on international transaction charges. A basic bank account costs approximately \$5/month and most include personalized cheques that can be used to pay for large amounts like rent and bill payments. Internet banking is also quite common and has become a widely accepted method for bill payments and other transactions.

To find out more about student account options or to open an account, visit any Canadian bank or go to your current bank and inquire about partnerships they may have with those in Canada.

Credit Cards

The majority of stores accept a variety of payment methods, including cash, debit cards and credit cards. Visa and MasterCard, the two main credit cards, are widely accepted by most major businesses, however American Express is not. Be sure to check with your bank before using your existing Visa or Mastercard in Canada and be aware of exchange rates and any other foreign transaction fees.

Health and Travel Insurance

In Canada, each province or territory is in charge of its own healthcare system covering Canadian citizens for hospital and physician care. Virtually all Canadian post-secondary institutions have medical insurance plans available for international students. Contact the Canadian educational institution you plan to attend for information about health insurance coverage for you.

Regardless of whether or not you plan to purchase coverage from a Canadian institution, it is highly recommended that you purchase travel health insurance. For more information on travel health insurance, contact your travel agent.

Climate

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
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Canada's climate is characterized by its diversity, both from region to region and from season to season. While extreme northern temperatures climb above only 0°C for a few months every year, most Canadians live within 300 kilometres of the country's southern border, where warm springs, hot summers and pleasantly crisp autumns prevail for at least 7 months. Canada has 4 very distinct seasons: spring (March-May); summer (June-August); fall (September-November); and winter (December-February).

Accommodation On or Off Campus Residence / Dormitory

Dormitories are the preferred accommodation for most students in Canada. They are usually located on or near the university or college campus and typically have shared kitchen, bathroom and laundry facilities. Some dorm accommodations offer optional cafeteria meal plans where students pay a set up-front fee for the term and receive 2 or 3 meal tickets per day.



Everyday Life

Dormitory is a great idea if:

- You're only going to be in Canada for a semester.
- You're new to Canada and would like to meet people quickly and easily.
- This is your 1st or 2nd year of study.
- You are living away from home for the first time.
- You want to be accessible to everything on campus without having to worry about transportation.

Private Accommodation

A listing of private accommodations (e.g., apartments, flats, room and board) close to campus is usually available through the housing office or student's union of most universities and colleges across Canada. Since schools don't regulate private housing, it is best to visit the location in person and make sure you ask any questions you might have before committing to a lease.

Electrical Appliances and Voltage


In Canada, appliances use 120 Volts with plug Type B. An electrical appliance plugged into an outlet supplying an incorrect voltage can cause an electrical fire, sparks and smoke. Some appliances come in multi-voltage models, meaning they can be adjusted to match the electric current in that region. If the voltage on an appliance cannot be changed, a device called a "transformer" can be purchased at any major electronics retailers to convert the appliance to the proper current.

Some things to consider before renting an apartment or flat:

- Prices, quality and availability vary greatly. Start apartment hunting early!
- Rental prices can range from C\$900 2,000 per month depending on the city or area you choose to live in.
- You will probably have to give one month's rent up-front as a damage deposit. This will be returned to you when you move if your place is left in good condition.
- You will be required to sign a lease, which is a legal document with your landlord that states your responsibilities as a tenant. Leases are typically binding for 1 year.
- Landlords are responsible for keeping the premises in good repair and must give you advance notice (generally 60 days in most Canadian provinces) if they want you to vacate the residence.
- It is illegal for a landlord to discriminate on the basis of race, religion, nationality, gender, age, sexual orientation or disability.
- Your university or college may provide free or reduced legal advice. Use these paralegal services to review the leases.

Canada: Updated Rules for PGWP-Eligible College Programmes and Student Transfers

Following a flurry of announcements affecting international students throughout past year, Immigration, Refugees and Citizenship Canada (IRCC) provided two important updates in the final weeks of December 2024.

The first expands the list of college programmes for which graduates will be eligible to receive a Post-Graduation Work Permit (PGWP). The second provides clarification on how some students will be eligible for a grace period with respect to new rules about transferring from one institution to another within Canada.

Expanding the list of eligible college programmes

In October 2024, IRCC announced a new "field of study" requirement for graduates of college programmes, including degree programmes, explaining to students that, "If you graduated from a college programme, you must graduate in an eligible field of study in order to be eligible for a post-graduation work permit."

The effective date for that new policy was 1 November 2024, meaning that students who had applied on or after that date would be bound by new rules, including the field of study requirement. Students who applied for or held a study permit prior to 1 November 2024 remained eligible for a PGWP under the previous rules.

IRCC also provided an initial listing of PGWP-eligible college programmes at the time. This amounted to 966 eligible academic programmes in five broad areas: agriculture and agri-food; healthcare; science, technology, engineering, and mathematics (STEM); skilled trade; and transportation.

The new development in this area occurred on 17 December 2024, at which point IRCC expanded the list of eligible programmes to include nearly 40 additional options in two new fields: early childhood education and developmental service workers.

A grace period for student transfers

On 15 November 2024, IRCC announced that, with immediate effect, students must apply for a new study permit when transferring to a new institution. There was some suggestion at the time, however, that students currently enrolled in Canada would benefit from a grace period before the new transfer rule would apply. In late-December, IRCC clarified the terms under which those cases would be handled.

The grace provisions apply to students who had previously been enrolled in Canada and had been accepted to continue their studies via transfer to a new institution for either the Winter (starting from 1 January 2025) or Spring (starting from 1 May 2025) semesters. IRCC otherwise requires that such students:

- Have already applied for a study permit extension;
- Have a student permit that doesn't have the DLI name printed on it;
- Otherwise be in compliance with all existing study permit conditions.

"If you meet these criteria" IRCC concludes, "You can attend the new DLI you wanted to transfer to while your study permit extension is being processed."



International Degree Graduates of Canadian Colleges No Longer Have to Meet "Field of Study" Requirements for Post-Study Work Permits

Immigration, Refugees, and Citizenship Canada (IRCC) has revised its requirements so that international students in degree programmes delivered by Canadian colleges will now no longer have to meet a field-of-study requirement to be eligible for a Post-Graduation Work Permit (PGWP). That requirement had been put in place in 2024 for Canadian colleges but not universities, and it was part of an effort by the Canadian government to apply heavier scrutiny to the international education sector.

"Graduates of college degree programs will no longer be required to meet the PGWP field of study requirement," said Canadian Bureau for International Education CEO Larissa Bezo, who was commenting on the rule change on LinkedIn.

Contributing to the field-of-study restriction was research showing that international students have been disproportionately represented in business programmes in Canada, particularly in colleges located in urban centres. By contrast, in the US, more than half of international students across degree levels are enrolled in STEM programmes.

Eligibility requirements based on study program

 If you graduated with a bachelor's degree, master's degree or doctoral degree

Language requirement:

You must prove your English or French language skills with a minimum level of Canadian Language Benchmarks (CLB) 7 in English or Niveaux de competence linguistique canadiens (NCLC) 7 in French in all 4 language areas.

Find out what your language level is based on your language test results.

► If you submitted your PGWP application before November 1, 2024

Field of study requirement:

There are no field of study requirements for graduates with a bachelor's degree, master's degree or doctoral degree.

- If you graduated from any other university program
- If you graduated from any other college, polytechnic or nonuniversity program
- If you graduated from a flight school

IRCC states that international students graduating from degree programmes delivered by colleges or universities are eligible for the PGWP.

Rupa Banerjee, an associate professor at Toronto Metropolitan University who holds the Canada Research Chair in the economic inclusion of immigrants, told CBC News in 2024: "Students are graduating from programs that are not particularly valuable in the labour market, that are not allowing them to get the jobs that will then allow them to transition and become productive Canadian permanent residents."

The new wording on the IRCC website clarifies that once again, students graduating from all Canadian bachelor's and master's degree programmes – whether from universities or colleges – are eligible for the PGWP if they meet language requirements.

1. Hello Cheryl! Thank you for taking the time to be in this interview. As an alumnus who has successfully built a remarkable professional journey overseas, we'd love to take a step back to where it all began. When you were formulating the plan for your post-secondary education, how did Canada come into the equation? Which factors most influenced your decision to study there?

I actually first discovered Canada when I came across the University of Waterloo at a study fair. What caught my attention was how strong their math program was, especially with the co-op option that lets you gain real work experience while studying. That idea really stood out to me because it felt practical and future-oriented. At that time, most people I knew were going to the U.S., so Canada felt like a fresh opportunity, somewhere I could learn, work, and really build a life while doing something I enjoy.

2. Canada is recognized as one of the Big Four study destinations globally, offering world-class education and valuable international experience. How has your Canadian education and background contributed to your career growth and professional opportunities?

When I studied math at the University of Waterloo, the co-op program really changed how I saw education and work. They basically make you find real jobs related to your major while still doing midterms and finals. It was super intense at first, but that pressure really built my work ethic. I remember juggling interviews in between classes and deadlines, but the school actually supports you a lot through it. They help with resumes, interviews, and even guide you in finding the right fit. Looking back, that experience prepared me not just for a career, but for how to handle challenges in any environment.

3. During your time studying and living in Canada, what practical lesson or experience, whether academic or cultural, that has helped you in your personal or professional life?

One big thing I learned living in Canada is how people really value balance. Everyone works hard, but they also make time to rest and enjoy life, whether that's spending time outdoors or just hanging out with friends. It taught me that you can be productive without burning out, and that taking care of yourself actually helps you do better work. That mindset has stayed with me both personally and professionally.

4. Canada is well-known for having different varieties of Work-Integrated Learning programs, including the largest Co-op in the world. What would be your best advice for international students who plan to pursue similar opportunities?

My advice would be to be proactive and don't lose hope. The first couple of years are definitely the hardest since you're competing with upper-year students who already have experience, but it really does get easier. Just keep applying, learn from every interview, and don't take rejections too personally. Also, try to get involved like joining clubs, talking to people, building connections. You never know which opportunity might come from a casual chat or a new friend.

5. Nowadays some students and parents were concerned about finding work opportunities during or after study? Any practical tips to share with them?

My main tip would be to stay organized and don't give up. Make a plan for when you'll focus on studying and when you'll focus on looking for jobs or networking.

6. Before we wrap up, could you share one nugget of wisdom for Indonesian students to keep in mind when preparing to study in Canada?

Honestly, be ready for the winters!! They're colder than most people expect! And when you're applying, don't be afraid to make mistakes or face setbacks, because every step is part of the learning process.

Private schools

- Independently funded.
- Co-educational, or boys-only, or girls-only.
- Smaller class sizes and lower teacher-student ratios.
- Full boarding or homestay programs are available for international students.
- The legal status of private schools varies across Canada as each province or territory is responsible for the regulatory environment of schools in its jurisdiction.
