## Sacrament of Baptism

The Sacrament of Baptism is celebrated on the second Sunday of the month at 11:30 AM. Parents seeking baptism for their child are asked to please call the rectory. Pre-Jordan is required for parents with a first-born child or parents with additional children who have not attended within a two-year period. Pre-registration is required for Pre-Jordan and Baptism. Please contact Mrs. Lynda Batten at the Rectory Office for more information.

## Sacrament of Matrimony

Couples planning a wedding are asked to call Father Oswald at the Rectory Office at least six months in advance of the wedding date. Couples are required to attend the Archdiocesan Marriage and Family Life Preparation Program.

## Sick or Homebound

In case of serious illness or advanced age, please call the Rectory Office. Arrangements will be made for the Sacrament of the Sick and for Holy Communion. If you are going into the hospital and you would like to receive the Sacrament of the Sick, please call the Rectory. Also, when you are hospitalized, please contact the hospital Chaplain and the Rectory Office.

## Tree of Life Memorial

If you would like to have a leaf (\$150) or a boulder (\$600) permanently inscribed in memory of a loved one on the Tree of Life, which is located in the vestibule at the main entrance of the church, please contact the Rectory Office at 610-237-1633.

## Vigil Candles

Vigil Candles, which are located in front of the Blessed Mother and St. Joseph statues in the front of the church, are available for your intentions. Small candles are $\$ 2$ and will burn for two days. These can be purchased by placing your donation in an envelope and dropping it in the slot provided by the candles. Large candles are $\$ 125$ and will burn for an entire year. Large candles can be purchased by contacting the Rectory Office at 610-237-1633. A gold label with your loved ones name will be placed on the candle and it will remain there throughout the year.

## Godparents

Only one godparent is required for Baptism. If two are chosen, one must be male and one must be female. A godparent must be a fully initiated Roman Catholic (Baptized, Confirmed and receiving the Eucharist), at least 16 years of age, if married, must be married in the Church, and in good standing with the Church.

## R.C.I.A.

If you or someone you know is interested in learning more about the Catholic faith, or if you were baptized Catholic but did not complete your sacraments, please contact Sr. Lorraine Muglie, SSJ at the Rectory Office at 610-237-1633 for RCIA details.

## Mass Cards and Memorial Intentions

## Scripture Reflection, Pavish and Racal

## Reflection by Rev. Leonard N. Peterson

The normal routine of most high school days includes the morning announcements. Usually one member of the administrative team does the task. It always involved the basic needs for clarity and accuracy, lest a whole community fall into disarray.

I know from personal experience that delegating a student for the job is risky at best. When I once had the assignment of moderating the students in the TV studio from which the announcements were broadcast at a certain high school, they were for the most part good kids. But one day immaturity punctured the soul of one such student, and he made a pre-planned prank that angered the administration and me. I wore the red face of embarrassment for a while. Clarity and accuracy were replaced by nonsense. The students may have gotten their "jollies" over the incident. I did not.
Raising our minds to the gospel level, we note that the word "annunciation" means an announcement. When we spell that word a capital letter, in religious circles it defines this marvelous meeting of heaven and earth, when an archangel named Gabriel, called such because of the import of his message, visited a beautiful young Jewish girl to tell her something earth shattering. The incident has been described as an "announcement" simply because the presumption of a positive answer from Mary proved to be a guarantee.

Mary, we must remember, was perfectly free to say "No." That would be understandable when one considers a pregnancy brought on by the Holy Spirit. Add to that the fact of the Baby's divine nature as God's Son. Nor can we forget the sudden change to the romance with her beloved Joseph. There was certainly clarity present and the highest of accuracy as well. This really became the most important announcement ever made.

In all truth, our very salvation as the human race hung in the balance with the virgin Mary's answer. Would any negative reply from Mary provoke God's wrath? There is no need for such speculation. The pivotal moment came and went, and we as a race remain ever grateful for it. World history would see God's plan unfold. Christianity would be its lasting effect, although other faiths would remain, each with its own goodness, but incomplete and imperfect.

The formula for the best relationship between God and man was clearly spelled out for those who could accept it. All because a beautiful Jewish teen-aged girl said "Yes" to God!

In these final hours of Advent, as Christmas preparation goes into high gear, such thoughts, I believe, provide a spiritual antidote to any commercial invasion of the facts.

## How Does the Church Pray? Meeting God

In sacramental celebrations, like the Mass of any of the sacraments, we humans meet God the Creator we experience Lord, Revealed in Christ, and we given the Spirit of Love to live in our hearts forever. Through our actions and words, something inexpressible is finally said: Repent and believe. The Kingdom is at hand. The Liturgy of the Word is integral to our sacramental celebrations and every sacrament has this element. The signs with which this Word is proclaimed should be clear and evident: the book the Word itself, how we venerate that Word, where we proclaim it, audible and understandable reading, the homily and the response of the faithful. Music is an essential part of liturgy as well, combining sacred music and words to inspire and uplift our hearts. Music can really move us! It should, therefore, be beautiful, should allow for all to sing together, and should be solemn and prayerful. Because it is so important to us, and because it touches us so deeply, the words of the music must be carefully chosen to accurately reflect our faith, be drawn from Scripture, and be completely singable! Likewise, the use of sacred images and art should be of restraint and beauty rather than sumptuous display. Sacred art such as statues, paintings, and sculpture, help us express the same Gospel message that Scripture communicates by words. Image and word illuminate each other. Every work of art or sacred image should lead us to Christ, who is Divine Love Revealed. Love Incarnate. Even images of many of the saints should always lead us to Christ.

Exercise: Make a chart showing the principal high points of your own personal year. Include things like birthdays, anniversaries, memorials, civic holidays and church holy days.

## Celebrating Christmas

Christmas is one of the most important days of the Church year, second only to Easter itself. Celebrating the birth of the Lord Jesus Christ, it is the culmination of the mystery of the incarnation, the feast of God becoming flesh (the Latin "in carne" means "enfleshment"). It is a uniquely Christian teaching, the Divine choosing to become one of us. Because of this belief, God is not only Transcendent, but also wholly Immanent, Emmanuel (God-with-us). While remaining Transcendent (meaning we must rise above our present condition to reach Him), He is at the same time Immanent (meaning He is with us as we rise toward Him). Every Eucharist is like Christmas where the bread and wine are transformed into His flesh, His Body and Blood, and, in a sense, He is born anew on the altar. The liturgical season of Christmas begins with the vigil Masses on Christmas Eve and concludes on the Feast of the Baptism of the Lord. During this season, we celebrate the birth of Christ into our world and into our hearts and reflect on the gift of salvation that is born with him, including the fact that he was born to die for us. The Christmas tree and the Nativity scene are popular symbols of the season and a tradition in many Christian homes. It is also traditional to exchange Christmas gifts with family and friends to honor God the Father's gift of his only son to the world. Having received the gift of Christ, we naturally want to pass that gift along to our loved ones. ~Enjoy this holy and blessed season!
