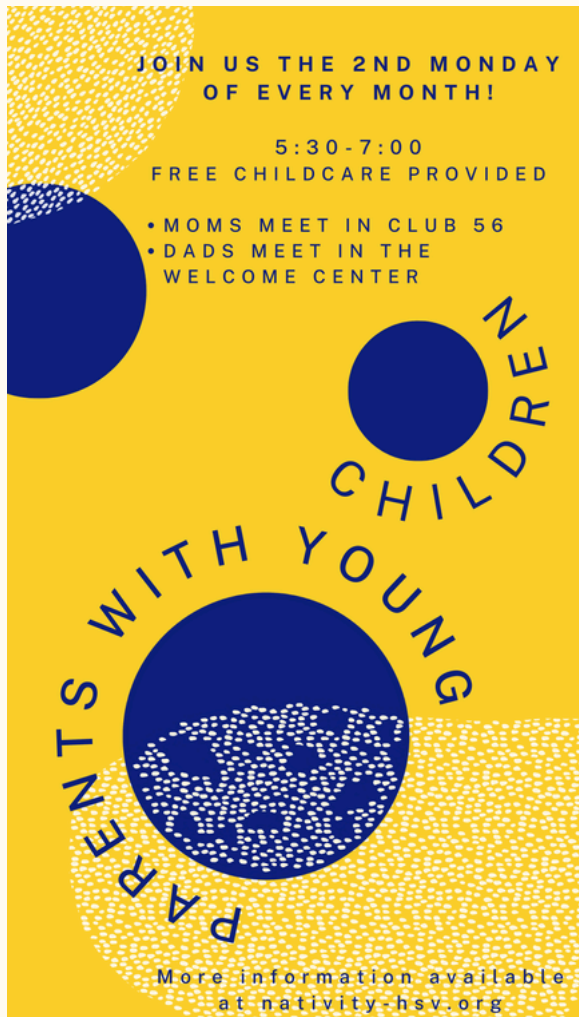

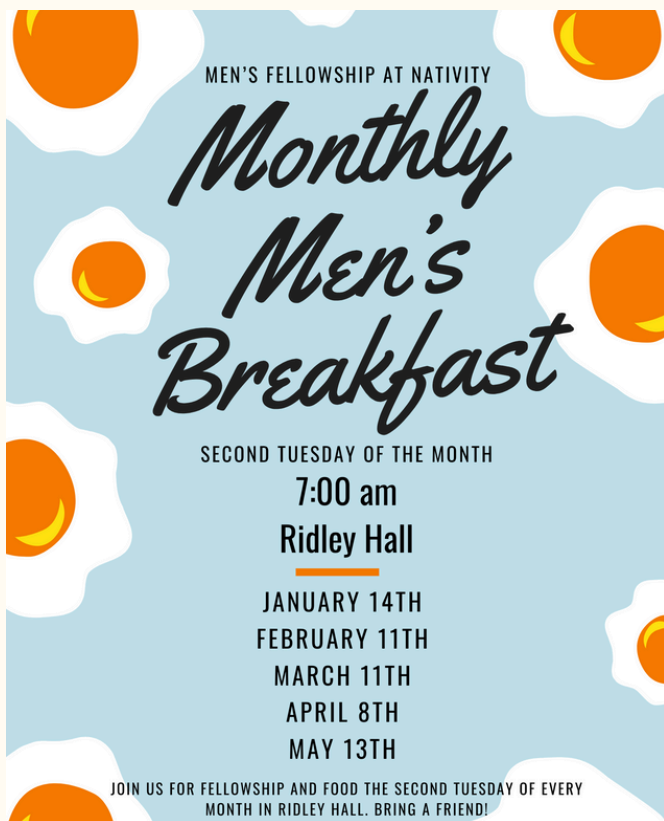

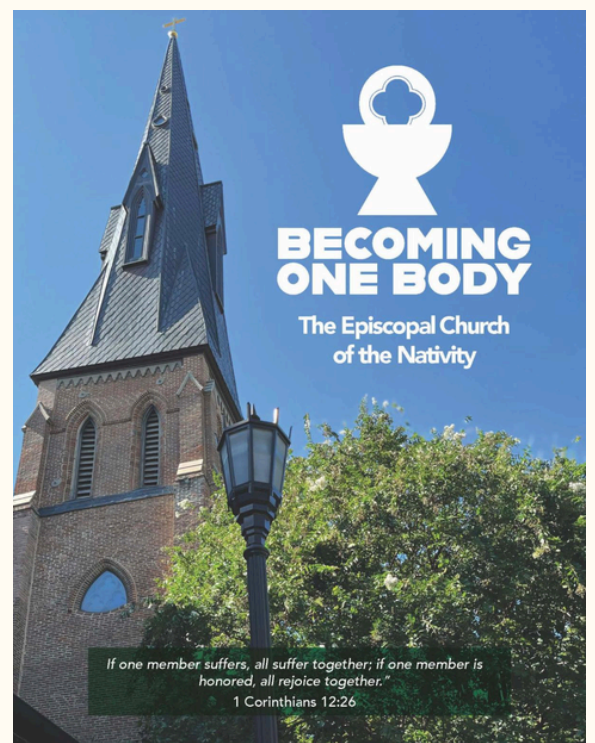

The Season of Lent

The Lenten season is a time when Christians emphasize prayer, fasting, and self-denial, usually in the form of giving something up or taking something on. Whatever one may choose to do, the underlying purpose is to be drawn into a deeper relationship with God. It is interesting to note that the Litany for Penitence on Ash Wednesday is very inwardly focused, praying for forgiveness for those acts that we, as individuals, have done; whereas, by the time we reach Good Friday near the end of Lent, the Solemn Collects of Good Friday have shifted our focus from ourselves to concerns for other people. It is our hope that over the course of the Lenten season, we will become less inwardly focused and, instead, be drawn more to the needs of others. "I invite you, therefore, in the name of the Church, to the observance of a holy Lent, by self-examination and repentance; by prayer, fasting, and self-denial; and by reading and meditating on God's holy Word" (BCP 265).

STEWARDSHIP OF CREATION

The Importance of Using Native Plants in Landscaping: A Call to Stewardship by Stacia Williams

As we prepare for spring and begin selecting plants for our yards and gardens, it is important to consider the role of native plants in our landscaping. By incorporating native species, we align ourselves with God's call to be good stewards of the earth. In Genesis 2:15, we read: The Lord God took the man and put him in the Garden of Eden to work it and take care of it. This passage reminds us that caring for the land is not just a responsibility but a sacred duty.

One simple yet impactful step we can take in this stewardship is incorporating native plants into our gardens. There are several reasons to choose native plants.

1. Restoring the Natural Ecosystem

Over time, urbanization and the expansion of non-native lawns have led to the decline of native plant species. This loss affects the entire ecosystem, from pollinators to birds and other wildlife. Native plants serve as a foundation for the food chain, providing essential habitat and sustenance for insects, which in turn feed birds and other animals.

2. Supporting Pollinators and Birds

Native plants attract and sustain local pollinators, such as bees, butterflies, and hummingbirds. These species play a crucial role in fertilizing plants, ensuring the production of fruits, vegetables, and flowers. Many bird species rely on insects that thrive in native plant environments. By eliminating native flora, we inadvertently contribute to declining bird populations.

3. Conservation of Natural Resources

Unlike exotic plants, native species are well-adapted to their environment. They require less water, fewer fertilizers, and minimal maintenance. In regions with hot summers, native plants are naturally resilient, reducing the need for irrigation and chemical treatments. This not only saves time and money but also protects water sources from harmful runoff caused by pesticides and fertilizers.

This may seem like a daunting task. However, making the shift toward native landscaping does not have to be overwhelming. There are small steps you can take to incorporate native plants into your landscape. You can start small by dedicating a section of your lawn to a butterfly or pollinator garden using native plants. This small change can significantly impact local biodiversity. Lawns require frequent watering, mowing, and chemical treatments. By replacing portions of your lawn with native plants, you decrease maintenance needs while benefiting the environment. Another step would be to eliminate using pesticides. Many pesticides kill beneficial insects, disrupting the ecosystem. Reducing or eliminating their use can help attract more birds and beneficial insects to your yard and reduce your monthly expenses.

Lastly, resources such as the [Land Trust of Alabama](#) and the Audubon Society provide valuable information on selecting the right native plants for your area. Additionally, The Botanical Gardens host a native plant sale each spring, making it easy to find suitable species for your landscape.

By choosing native plants, we answer God's call to be caretakers of His creation. This simple yet impactful step reflects our commitment to sustainability and respect for the environment. As we plan our spring gardens, let us remember that the choices we make in our yards reflect our stewardship of God's world.
