

Dear Friends in Christ,

One of the most prevalent things we see in the news these days is mass shootings, natural disasters, war, and all sorts of strife. We can't help but be disturbed by all the things we see. Sometimes, we see so much negativity reported that we become complacent or numb to it all. By the same token, there are many things that cause us to pause and reflect.

This past week, one of the big news items was the shooting in a midtown New York high-rise building. In it, a police officer died leaving a pregnant wife and a couple of kids. At the same time, there was a woman who exited the elevator who was spared. The death of the police officer was quite tragic, and the lives of his family have been forever changed. The woman who exited the elevator was spared and surely was grateful to God for still being alive. I reflected on that a moment, realizing that a tragic situation could unfold practically anywhere.

The recent tragic floods are another reminder of how quickly things can change in our lives. One minute, everything is just fine. The next instant, our lives could drastically change without our ability to control it. Does that mean that we should live in fear everywhere we go? Definitely not. But it does cause us to realize that our lives are a gift, and what is most important is not the things we accumulate, but rather the relationships we have.

The scriptures this weekend present us with some very thought-provoking themes in this regard. The first reading from Ecclesiastes tells us of the vanity of all the things that we do. We toil and labor over things, but in the end, everything we work for must be left to others. That is not to say that we shouldn't work and provide for ourselves and our families. But it does color the approach we take to all the things that we own and work for. We can build a nice home, acquire nice things, and live reasonably comfortably, but there comes a point when all those things lose their luster. In the end, they become unimportant in the face of death. When we face our eventual mortality, we begin to see how unimportant things are.

I believe it was Cardinal Joseph Bernardine, late Archbishop of Chicago, who in his final years of life, asked himself what he would have done differently. He had been diagnosed with pancreatic cancer and eventually turned over the administration of the archdiocese to his vicar general. He decided to dedicate his last days ministering to cancer patients at Loyola University Hospital in Chicago. Reflecting on what he would have done differently, he said he would have focused less on the administrative tasks and more on listening and being present for people. For him, relationships were the key.

The parable in the gospel is about the rich fool. One of the first things we note about him is that he is only concerned about himself. In his inner dialogue, he refers to himself ten times. He is talking about all the projects that he was going to do for himself. His plan is all about his own comfort. He was going to store up his harvest. He was going to build

larger barns and store his grain. He was going to relax and enjoy his life. Nowhere does he speak of others or their needs. Our fulfillment consists of relationships and primarily our relationship with God. We are called to give of ourselves to others.

The next thing that is evident is that the things he speaks about are all ordered to this world. He doesn't seem to have any internal reflection on divine realities. This orientation on worldly things leaves him rather shallow and unfulfilled. In reality, he has no hope. True hope is oriented in what is to come - to heaven. What is in the soul and in the heart never passes away. Whereas, material possessions will be left behind.

Finally, the rich fool was always living in the future. He wasn't able to be attentive to today. How often have we forgotten to "stop and smell the roses"? How often have we failed to be present to our family and the ones we love? If there is anything we can learn from the tragic events that we see in the news so frequently, it is the importance of loving those whom we encounter every day and savoring their presence for we do not know when our time will come.

We don't need to neglect our daily duties, but we do need to not lose our focus on what is important. St. Paul aptly writes in the second reading today, "If you were raised with Christ, seek what is above, where Christ is seated at the right hand of God. Think of what is above, not of what is on earth." Let's take stock of what we do have. Let's contemplate the riches we have in our friends and our families. Let's also foster our relationship with God, for doing so stores up treasure in heaven. God bless.

Novena Of St. Pius X In Preparation For The Feast Of St. Pius X


We will pray the Novena to St. Pius X daily after the 8:15AM Masses from August 13th until August 21st. Please join us for this beautiful and thought-provoking novena.
