

Massachusetts: Who We Are



Small state in New England

- Population of around 7.1 million.
- Dense population to the east, more rural to the west.

351 cities and towns

 Commonwealth: a lot is driven at the local level.

Border five states:

- NH, VT, RI, NY, and CT
- Lots of colleges and universities, biotech, and research.

2030 Solid Waste Master Plan

Reduce disposal statewide by 30% (5.7 million tons to 4 million tons) by 2030.

Recycling Market Development

Waste Disposal Bans

- First ban in 1990 with the state's first Solid Waste Master Plan.
- Now over a dozen materials.



- Most recent bans:
 - 2014: Commercial food material (ton/week)
 - 2022: Lowered to half ton/week
 - 2022: Mattresses and textiles

Materials Currently Banned from Disposal or Transfer for Disposal in Massachusetts

- Asphalt pavement, brick and concrete
- Cathode ray tubes
- Clean gypsum wallboard
- Commercial food material (lower threshold effective November 1, 2022)
- Ferrous and non-ferrous metals
- Glass, metal, and plastic containers (bottles, cans, jars, jugs and tubs)
- Lead acid batteries
- Leaves and yard waste
- Mattresses (effective November 1, 2022)
- Recyclable paper, cardboard and paperboard
- Textiles (effective November 1, 2022)
- Treated and untreated wood and wood waste (banned from landfills only)
- White goods (large appliances)
- Whole tires (banned from landfills only; shredded tires acceptable)

Reduce & Reuse (R&R) Action Plan

- R&R Working Group established in 2020:
 - Series of 12 stakeholder meetings (2020-2021).
 - Over 400 participants.
 - Shaped framework/content of the action plan.

- Published R&R Action Plan (Dec. 2021).
- Guides our reuse work.





Business & Institutional Furniture, Fixtures and Equipment

Grant Programs

- Reduce, Reuse, Repair Micro-Grant
 - \$3K \$10K for reuse and repair projects.
 - Available to municipalities, for-profits, and nonprofits.
- Sustainable Materials Recovery Program
 - For cities and towns.
 - Recycling Dividends Program
 - Waste Reduction Project Grants \$20K \$100K.
- Recycling & Reuse Business Development Grant
 - For businesses and nonprofits.
 - \$25K \$400K for reuse, recycling, composting infrastructure (processing and collection).
- Waste Reduction Innovation Grant (NEW)
 - Award determination in process.











Boston Building Resources

Technical Assistance

RecyclingWorks in Massachusetts

- Free technical assistance to help businesses and institutions improve their reuse, recycling, and food recovery programs.
 - · Online guides and resources.
 - Direct technical assistance.
 - Searchable database for reuse and recycling outlets.

Municipal Assistance Coordinators (MACs)

- Support city/town waste reduction programs and services.
 - Advise on roll out of new programs.
 - Connect municipalities to grant opportunities.
 - Help with contracts and regulations.

Recycle Smart MA (general public)

- More than just recycling reuse/repair topics and tips too:
 - Social media posts, newsletter deep dives, webinars, videos and more!

RecyclingWorks in MA (businesses & institutions)

Building a Network

Reduce & Reuse Working Group

• 680 members spanning a wide variety of sectors (cities and towns, businesses, nonprofits, academic institutions, etc.).

Deconstruction Workgroup

- Focused on building material reuse and deconstruction.
- 700 members (general contractors, designers, building officials, historic preservationists, etc.).



Reusable Foodware (single-use packaging)


Best Management Practices for Reusable <u>Takeout Containers</u> (BMPs)

- Published November 2024
- Guidance for food establishments interested in replacing single-use takeout containers with reusable service ware.
 - Covers inspection, returning, washing, rinsing, sanitizing, tracking and storage.
 - Vetted by the MA Department of Public Health.



Textiles

- Nov. 2022, textiles added to waste disposal bans.
- Annual Textile Summit.
- Continuing to measure progress in textile recovery.
- Clothing and Textile Recovery website provides resources, including a model donation bin ordinance.



Building Materials

- Deconstruction Workgroup
- Seven webinars (2022-2025)
 - Topics from reuse markets for building materials to workforce development.
 - All recordings and presentations available on the <u>Reduce & Reuse (R&R) Working Group &</u> <u>Deconstruction Workgroup Archive</u>
- In-person Deconstruction Workshop
 - Facilitated by Sustainable Performance Institute.
 - Held on Oct 23, 2025, in Boston.
 - Report with recommendations in early 2026.


Using the state's underutilized square footage as a temporary storage space for bulky items and construction materials.




Regionalization
