





How to reduce the environmental impacts of wasted food





Boston Public Market

Boston, MA

- ✓ Partnerships with Spoonfuls, Food for Free, and The Greater Boston Food Bank
- ✓ First month donated 17,000 meals
- ✓ Composted 14 tons of food scraps



Shibuya Eatery

Washington D.C.

- ✓ Creative Repurposing
- ✓ Snout to tail butchery
- ✓ Reduced purchasing costs over 10%





Hope & Main's Makers Marketplace & Cafe

Providence, RI

- ✓ Diverts 5 tons of food scraps annually
- ✓ Customized waste signage and staff training
- ✓ Creative surplus repurposing
- ✓ Offers reusables for dine-in customers
 and compostables for take-out

Scaling Wasted Food Solutions

Since 2013:

- > 500,000 donated meals recovered annually
- > 10,000 tons of food waste diverted annually
- ➤ 315,000 lifetime tons of CO₂ emissions mitigated
