Consumption Based Emissions Inventory

- Consumption-based GHG Emission Inventories (CBEI) for Northeastern States
 - Wesley Ingwerson, the lead EPA Researcher on that report, will be relaunching and improving the open-source CBEI tools in partnership with ERG and Cornerstone.
 - The model they used for the CBEI study of Northeastern States is an Extended Input-Output Model, and that tool and other open source tools are on the <u>Cornerstone Sustainability Data Initiative</u>.
- Run comparison scenarios of your town's solid waste reports in <u>WARM</u>, which has <u>guides</u> to modeling reuse and repair.
