NORTHERN CALIFORNIA

Northern California is defined by dramatic coastlines, ancient forests, and landscapes that feel wild and untouched. This region offers some of the state's most unforgettable scenery. The destinations below highlight places that capture the scale, beauty, and sense of adventure that make Northern California so special.

Location: *Redwood National Park*

Highlights of the Region

Redwood National & State Parks

Walking among the tallest trees on Earth feels humbling, quiet, and almost prehistoric.

Avenue of the Giants (Humboldt Redwoods State Park)

A slow, awe-filled drive where massive redwoods rise straight from the roadside.

Point Reyes National Seashore

A wild stretch of coastline where fog, cliffs, beaches, and wildlife collide.

Marshall's Beach (San Francisco)

Intimate shoreline with postcard views of the Golden Gate.

Burney Falls

A powerful waterfall fed by underground springs, roaring with energy year-round.

Lassen Volcanic National Park

A surreal landscape of steaming vents, alpine lakes, and volcanic terrain.

Fern Canyon

Towering fern-covered walls create a mossy corridor that feels untouched by time.



The Crowd Favorite

Fern Canyon

Fern Canyon feels like stepping into another world. Towering walls covered in lush, dripping ferns surround a narrow stream, creating a landscape that feels almost prehistoric. For fans of the Jurassic Park series, *The Lost World: Jurassic Park* was filmed in this area!

Tip: Bring waterproof shoes for walking through streams or wet terrain. Summer is usually manageable, but in winter, there are no bridges or walkways.

CENTRAL COAST

California's Central Coast is where rugged cliffs, turquoise coves, and winding coastal highways create some of the most memorable scenery in the state. From dramatic Big Sur viewpoints to historic landmarks and hidden coastal pockets, every stretch of this region offers something unique to explore. The destinations below highlight the places that best capture the beauty and atmosphere that make the Central Coast unforgettable.

Highlights of the Region

Big Sur (Highway 1)

A dramatic coastline where mountains plunge straight into the Pacific Ocean.

McWay Falls (Julia Pfeiffer Burns State Park)

An iconic waterfall spilling onto a secluded beach.

Bixby Bridge

One of California's most recognizable landmarks, suspended above crashing waves.

Partington Cove

A hidden pocket of turquoise water in Big Sur.

Garrapata Bluff Coastal Trail

Open bluffs with nonstop ocean views and sweeping coastal drama.

Hearst Castle

A grand hilltop estate overlooking the Pacific, equal parts history and spectacle.

Point Lobos State Natural Reserve

A compact stretch of coastline packed with turquoise coves and sculpted cliffs.

The Crowd Favorite

Point Lobos State Natural Reserve

Point Lobos is a compact stretch of coastline packed with some of the most dramatic scenery in California. Turquoise coves, sculpted cliffs, and offshore rocks make it an incredible spot for watching migrating gray whales and other marine life as they pass close to shore.

Tip: Plan to arrive in the morning or park along Highway 1 and walk in if the lot is full. It is recommended to arrive at the park before 9 am for a better chance at parking.



SIERRA NEVADA

Highlights of the Region

Yosemite - Mist Trail

Towering granite, stunning waterfalls, and expansive views lead you through one of the most beautiful hikes on earth.

Tuolumne Meadows

Wide-open alpine scenery with rivers, domes, and views.

Mariposa Grove of Giant Sequoias

Walking among the largest trees on the planet feels both grounding and surreal.

Kings Canyon National Park

A deep, dramatic canyon carved by rivers and framed by towering granite walls.

Sequoia National Park

Massive trees, high elevations, and vast wilderness define this unforgettable landscape.

Moro Rock

A short climb that delivers sweeping views across the southern Sierra.

Mammoth Lakes Basin

A collection of alpine lakes surrounded by rugged peaks.

Convict Lake

A mirror-calm alpine lake reflecting jagged mountains.

The Crowd Favorite

Yosemite Valley

Yosemite Valley is the heart of the Sierra Nevada and one of the most iconic landscapes in the world. The best time to visit is late spring, when waterfalls are at their peak.

Tip: Use the park's shuttle service to travel between major stops so you don't have to worry about parking.

SOUTHERN CALIFORNIA

Southern California captures the state at its most diverse, where rugged coastlines, desert landscapes, mountain ranges, and vibrant cities collide in one endlessly varied region. From sun-drenched beaches and coastal cliffs to palm-lined valleys, desert canyons, and alpine escapes. The destinations below highlight places that reflect the scale, contrast, and character that define this iconic part of the state.



Idyllwild - A quiet mountain escape tucked among pine forests and granite peaks.



Heisler Park - Manicured coastal paths overlooking coves of bright water and rocky shoreline.



Carlsbad - A laid-back coastal town blending beaches, flower fields, and classic California charm.




Crowd Favorite - The Queen Mary is renowned for its rich history, oceanfront setting, and the ability to walk its halls.

DESSERTS & REMOTE CALIFORNIA

The destinations below highlight places that showcase the scale, solitude, and raw beauty found far from California's more traveled routes.

Red Rock Canyon State Park - Vibrant cliffs and layered rock formations rise from the Mojave Desert floor.



Joshua Tree National Park - A striking desert where twisted trees and massive boulders shape an otherworldly scene.



Crowd Favorite - Skull Rock is a crowd favorite thanks to its naturally sculpted, skull-shaped formation, making it one of Joshua Tree's most fun stops.

Best Times to Visit

- **Late Winter – Early Spring:**
 - Point Lobos, Big Sur, Central Coast (coastal wildflowers bloom, whale migrations peak)
 - Yosemite Valley, Sierra Nevada (waterfalls)
 - Joshua Tree.
- **Spring – Early Summer:**
 - Redwood National & State Parks, Fern Canyon (lush greenery, comfortable hiking weather)
 - Lassen Volcanic & Sierra Nevada (alpine meadows open, snow mostly melted)
- **Summer:**
 - Coastal towns like Carlsbad & Laguna
- **Fall:**
 - Sierra Nevada & Yosemite (fall colors in the high country, fewer crowds)
 - Central Coast & Big Sur.
- **Winter:**
 - Yosemite and other Sierra locations for winter wonderland vibes.
