- Read about: Invasive Non-native Species (INNS) Biocontrol Trials in Wales NRW have been assisting Welsh Government (WG) in their efforts to support the Centre for Agriculture and Bioscience International's (CABI) work to trial biocontrol species for three widely spread invasive non-native species in Wales (Parrot's feather, Himalayan balsam and New Zealand Pigmyweed). WG have funded pre-trial investigations for a number of sites to look at their susceptibility to biocontrol with the aim of releasing them on Himalayan balsam and New Zealand Pigmyweed at several sites this year.

Tuesday 17th May – impacts on the freshwater environment

In person

- <u>Check Clean Dry</u>: If you go fishing, boating or paddling, remember to your boat and any clothing, footwear and equipment after leaving the water.
- Record: American mink can have a negative impact on our wildlife particularly native Water vole. Please record any sightings (with a photo if possible) through the <u>iRecord</u> app or online or the bilingual <u>LERC Wales App</u> both free to download on your phone.
- **Record:** Have you seen this crab! Chinese mitten crab live in burrows in riverbanks. We know that they are in the River Dee and have been seen in the Severn Estuary. Look out for their distinctive furry claws or 'mittens' and burrows. If you see them any when you are out and about please record





your sighting with a photo (if possible) onto the <u>iRecord</u> app or <u>online</u> or the bilingual <u>LERC</u> <u>Wales App</u> – both apps free to download on your phone.

- Read about: Invasive Non-Native Species and the Four Rivers for LIFE project Invasive Non-native Species and the Four Rivers for LIFE project – The Natural Resources Wales (NRW) Four Rivers for LIFE project aims to bring four Welsh rivers into good condition – the Teifi, Cleddau, Tywi and Usk. An estimated 500km of river will be improved and more than £9 million will be invested in this work. Part of the Four Rivers for LIFE project work will focus on invasive non-native species management (for example Japanese knotweed, Himalayan balsam, Giant hogweed and Skunk cabbage). The project aims to control or eradicate these species in and around the rivers. The project is keen to get a better understanding of the distribution of these species on the four rivers and would encourage people to report sightings of them on the <u>iRecord</u> app or <u>online</u> or the bilingual <u>LERC Wales</u> App. Four Rivers for LIFE will be run by NRW in partnership with the Brecon Beacons National Park Authority, River Restoration Trust, Coleg Sir Gâr and the Woodland Trust, with additional financial support from Dŵr Cymru/Welsh Water.
