A Message from Our Executive Director



This has been a building year for the College of Adaptive Arts.

When I came in as Executive Director, I brought years of industry experience—but I also brought a deep knowledge and love for CAA. For more than 15 years, I served as a professor here. For more than 30 years, I have been a parent of a CAA student. This isn't just a job; it is the most important role of my career, and it is a privilege to help shape the future of this community.

In this building year, we've been deliberate about strengthening our foundation. We created a strong infrastructure for our online community: documenting best practices for teaching online classes, supporting our online learners, and ensuring no student feels left out. We also hired more professors so we could expand our offerings and open doors for more students.

Our West Valley College partners stepped up to give us more space, allowing us to hold additional classes on their campus to meet the needs of our growing on-site student body. This is a testament to something we know well—our students want to connect with each other, and the demand for this model of higher education for people with IDD is greater than ever.

We also established a Student Services Department, made possible through the \$2.2 million grant from Senator Dave Cortese. This new department is focused on first-year student success, while also supporting overall student health through better management of enrollment, registration, and attendance.

Our Workforce Development program continued to shine. This year, six apprentices graduated from the program, with three moving into regular staff roles at CAA—a powerful demonstration of how inclusion and opportunity lead to long-term growth and leadership.

As we reflect on this building year, it's clear that the bricks we've laid will support even greater expansion and impact in the years ahead. CAA is a model of inclusive learning for anyone who wants to pursue knowledge. It is a movement and a revolution to change how we think about who deserves an education. It is a promise that adults with disabilities deserve higher education too. None of this progress would be possible without our donors, whose generosity continues to lay the foundation for everything we build. Thank you for standing with us as we shape the future of inclusive education.

Our Mission and Why We Exist

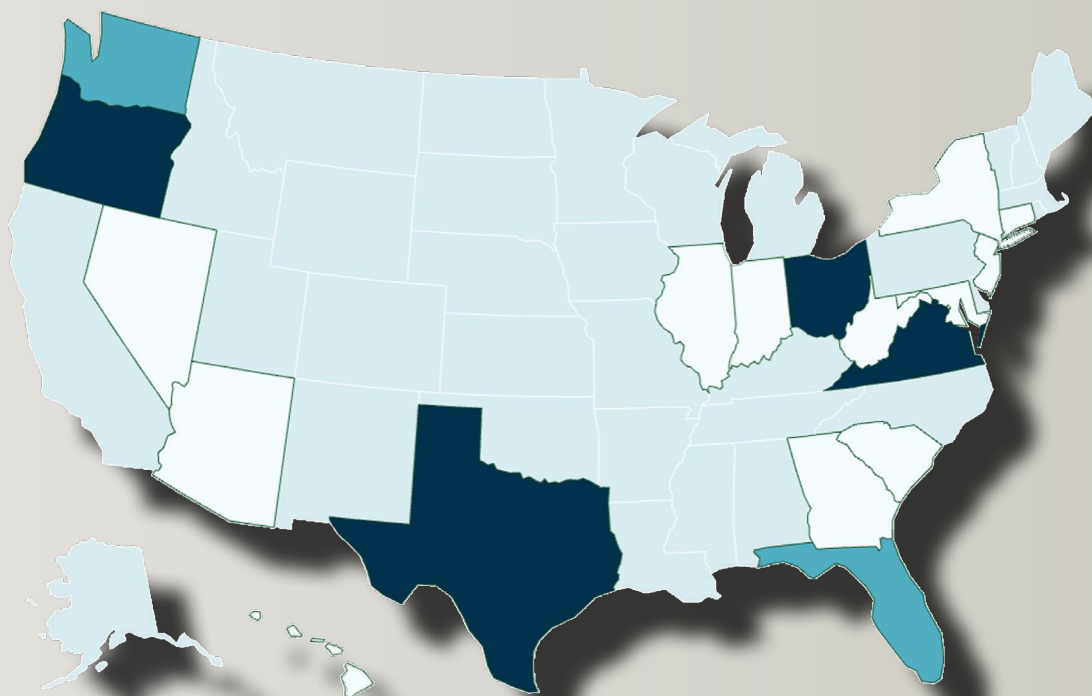

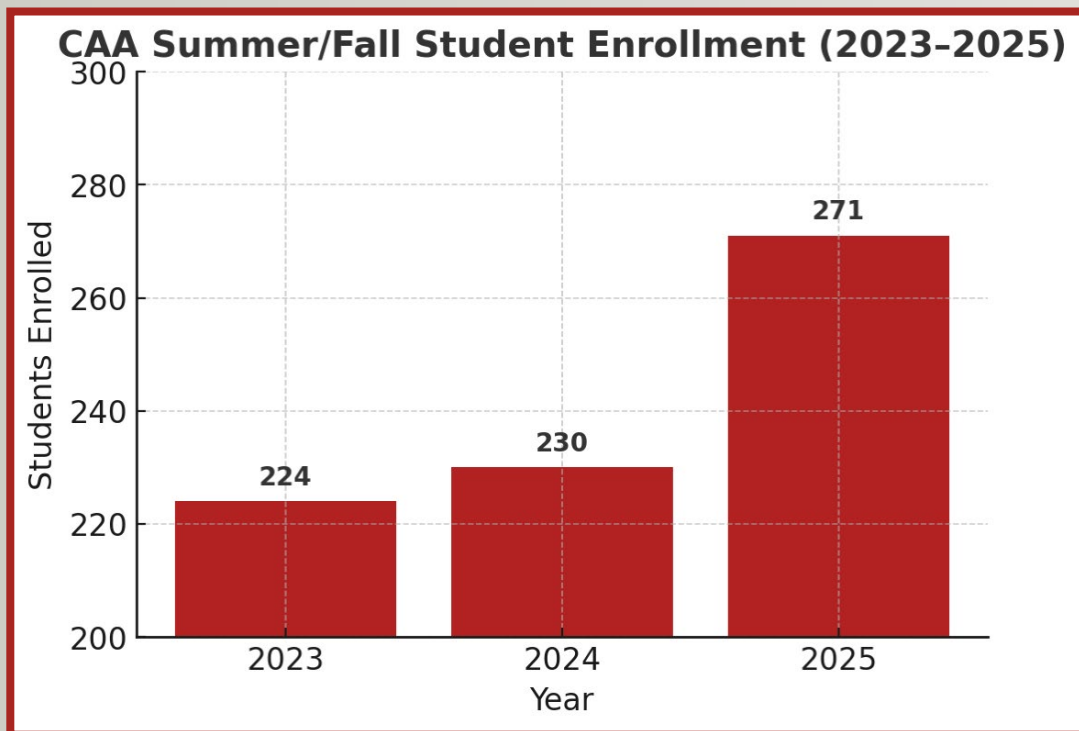
Attendance Rates

Student Enrollment

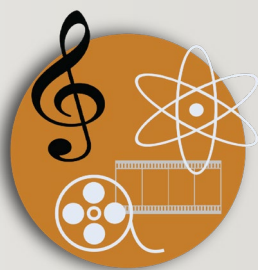


2.7% growth from 2023 to 2024

At CAA, we create lifelong learning opportunities for adults with intellectual and developmental disabilities through a collegiate model that is equitable, inclusive, and empowering.

Student Services Department – Thanks to a \$2.2M state grant, we've launched a new department focused on first-year success, registration, and ongoing student support.



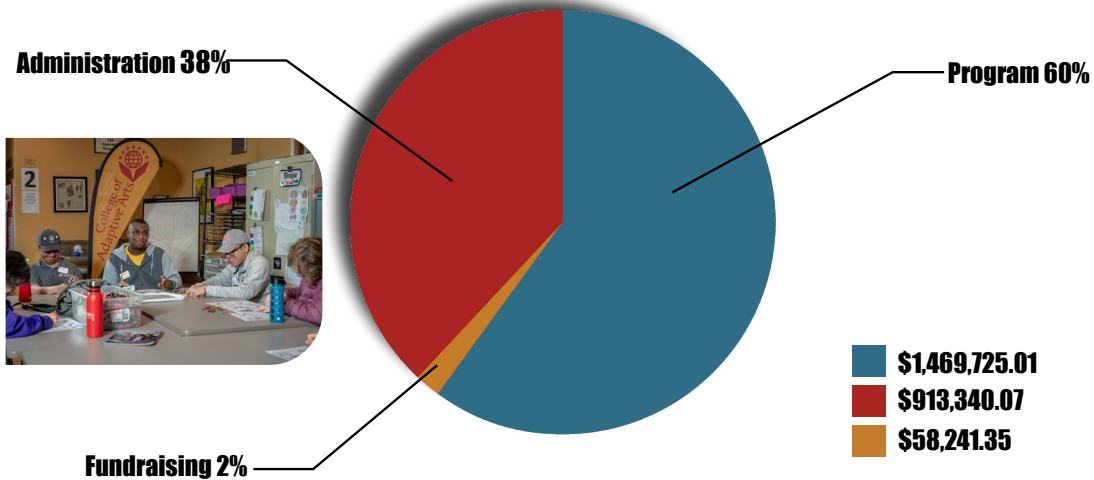
Workforce Development – That same \$2.2M grant is also fueling growth in our WFD program. Six apprentices graduated this year, with three moving into staff roles at CAA.



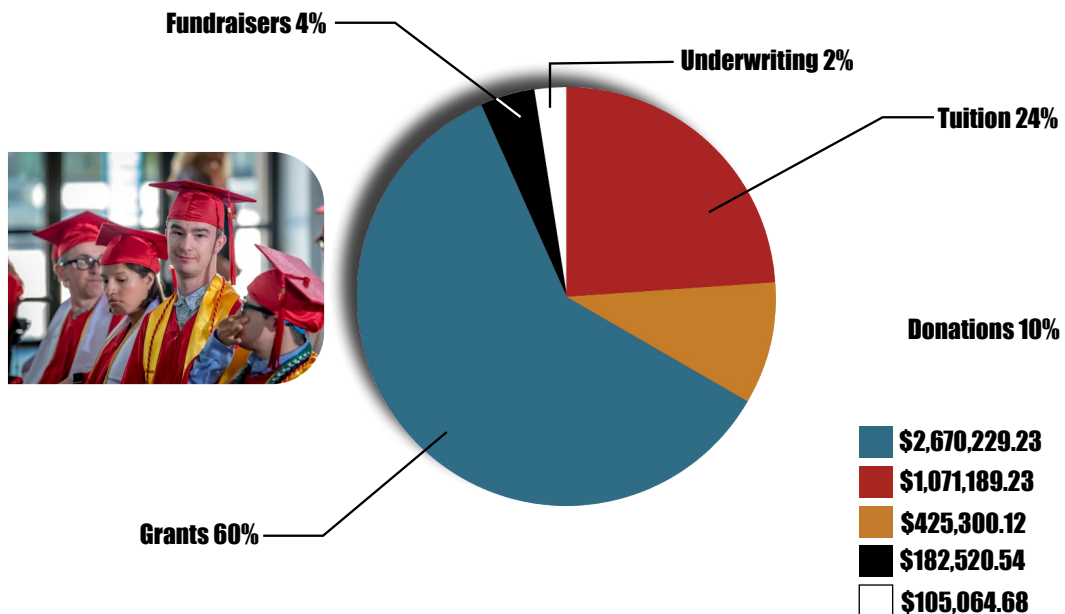
Community Partnerships – With West Valley College and others, we're expanding class offerings and creating more spaces for students to connect.
