Introduction to Employment Skills

This course introduces students to essential employment skills for the workplace. Students will explore topics such as communication, teamwork, time management, workplace etiquette, and goal setting. Through interactive activities and real-world scenarios, students will begin building the confidence and foundational tools needed to pursue volunteer, internship, or employment opportunities. This course is designed to be retaken, with evolving content to match students' growth and readiness.

Digital Life Skills: Smart, Safe, and Social Online

In today's world, being online is part of everyday life. This course teaches real-world skills for using social media safely and responsibly. Learn how to protect your privacy, communicate respectfully, spot scams, and balance your online and offline time-all while building confidence in your digital life.

Marketing Around Us - How Companies Catch Our Attention

In this fun, online class, students explore how marketing shapes the world around them - from the logos they love to the ads they scroll past. Through short videos, real-world examples, and creative projects, they'll learn how companies use images, color, music, and emotion to sell products. Students will become smarter consumers and more confident creators.

Digital Publishing

Digital Publishing is an introduction business and media course that focuses on e-books, audiobooks, magazines, and multimedia storytelling. Students will learn the basics of digital publishing, online platforms, and applications for self-publishing. Social media and audience engagement strategies will be explored. At the end of the course, students will create a digital publishing product that can be available via the CAA store.

Comic Books Study

This class is intended to be a deeper dive into the world of Comic Books. This can include anything from the history of the medium, to specific authors and stories, the purpose behind certain tropes and genres, and much more!

Go Go Godzilla!

Who doesn't love the giant green lizard we all know as Godzilla? He's been around for over 70 years, starred in over 30 films, and has always been deeply rooted in Japanese History. So please come join us as we go over Godzilla's long and nuanced history and watch some giant monster fights along the way!

Poetry

Students will explore different forms of poetry and every 4 weeks shift to another unit. Students will also learn about the different branches of Poetry: Reading, Listening, and Writing. This is a collaborative class whereas in class we will be writing as a class.

Poetry & Writing Workshop*

This is an intermediate level class. Pre-requisites are required to enroll in this class or instructor approval. Students will explore creative writing through the lens of poetry and storytelling. This class supports growth as a writer and helps students build a personal portfolio. This semester, we'll reimagine traditional fairy tales — asking how these stories could be rewritten to reflect modern voices, values, and perspectives. Students will collaborate on a shared class story while developing their own individual pieces. Each week includes reading, writing, and group discussion. Students will be expected to write independently for at least 25 minutes per class and participate in guided reflection on the week's topic.

Class Structure:

- First 30 minutes Read and share poetry or short stories (original or published).
- Last 30 minutes Independent writing time focused on the theme of the day.

This course encourages creative risk-taking, collaboration, and a deeper understanding of how language shapes timeless tales.

Poetry: Exploring Reading & Writing*

This is an intermediate level class. Pre-requisites are required to enroll in this class or instructor approval. Students will learn about different American Poets and write a poem for themselves. Students will be able to read poetry aloud and hear the spoken word; all reading levels welcome. Haiku to Free Verse and Sonnets. Come join us!

Pop Culture

This class is a round table discussion. What constitutes Pop Culture? Who decides what makes the news? Why are some fandoms more important than others? Each week students will research a topic of pop culture and report to their fellow classmates. Teachers are there to facilitate respectful discussion and answer the question of what constitutes pop culture. Adaptations and their impact on a Fandom.

Pop Culture - Intermediate*

This is an intermediate level class. Pre-requisites are required to enroll in this class or instructor approval. Students will independently research and present weekly pop culture updates—covering movies, comics, video games, sports, and more—in a 3–5 minute segments. Through reading and discussion of *To Kill a Mockingbird*, students will uncover how a single story can ripple across time — transforming pop culture, inspiring new voices, and redefining what justice looks like in the stories we tell.

Reading Partners: Black Beauty (WS26)

Students will journey beyond Disney and explore the classic novel *Black Beauty*. They'll experience life through the eyes of a hardworking horse in the early 19th century and discover how quickly circumstances could change. Along the way, students will learn about a time before cars, when horses were essential for travel, work, and daily life.

Students are expected to read with support during each class as we explore this timeless story together.

Each class will be divided into three sections:

- Review and Comprehension Revisiting previous chapters and discussing key ideas.
- Guided Reading Progressing through the story with teacher and peer support.
- Lecture and Media Connection Watching short videos or engaging in mini-lectures that connect historical and literary themes to the text.

Reading Partners: Myths, Legends & Graphic Novels

Join us as we explore *Percy Jackson and the Olympians*! Students will read with support each class and discuss how myths and legends inspire modern stories. Together, we'll examine Percy's journey, the influence of Greek mythology, and how the Hero's Journey unfolds through this exciting graphic novel adaptation.

Each class will be divided into two parts:

- Reading Students are encouraged to volunteer to read aloud with support.
- Discussion A roundtable-style conversation where students share ideas, debate thoughtfully, and learn from one another's perspectives.

Reading & Writing Lab

Featured Text: X-Men and the Avengers – Gamma Quest

This semester, students will journey through *X-Men and the Avengers: Gamma Quest*, a novel that unites two unlikely teams. The Avengers fight for justice, while the X-Men strive for equality — and together they must overcome mistrust to face a shared threat.

The course will be divided into two main sections:

- Listening and Comprehension Students will follow along with the audiobook to experience the story through voice, pacing, and tone.
- Roundtable Discussion and Analysis Together we'll explore the novel's themes, literary devices, and character choices, discussing how this story connects to larger ideas within the human literary canon such as teamwork, identity, and moral responsibility.

This class invites students to think critically about heroes, collaboration, and what it means to stand up for others.

Reading Writing: Fairytales and Disney

Join us as we journey into the world of classic stories and compare them to their Disney adaptations! This semester, students will explore three iconic tales — *Cinderella, Jack and the Beanstalk, and The Twelve Labors of Hercules* — discovering how each story transforms when brought to life on the screen.

Through discussion, students will explore themes, characters, plot choices, cultural impact, and what happens when a corporation owns the rights to a character — including how those choices reshape the stories, messages, and themes from the original texts.

- Reading Students are expected to read aloud with support as we move through each story.
- Roundtable Discussion Students will engage in respectful, thoughtful conversation with peers as they compare the original tales to their Disney versions.

Spanish

Join us on a virtual trip to Italy! In this fun and interactive class, we'll explore the Italian language through its rich culture- music, art, traditions, and everyday life. Each week, students will learn simple Italian words and phrases while discovering the beauty of Italy through videos, songs, and virtual tours. No passport required, just enthusiasm for "La Dolce Vita!"

Speaking with Confidence

Want to feel more confident speaking in class, conversation, or even on stage? This class helps students build strong communication skills by practicing vocal variety, pacing, eye contact, and active listening. Whether you're preparing to be a professional speaker or just want to express yourself more clearly, this class is for you!

US History: Civil War and Reconstruction

In this semester, we will cover when the United States faced its greatest challenge as divisions over social and political issues became impossible to overcome peacefully. Using a variety of media, we will discuss how tensions in the USA reached a breaking point, how the most critical war in its history progressed, and how it tried to piece itself together after it ended.

World History: South Africa

This semester, we invite you to visit one of the southernmost countries on the planet, a hub of multilingualism, cultures from across the globe, and rich in history. We will cover its history from before the arrival of European settlers, through clashes of civilizations, bush wars, and the struggle for equality, in South Africa

SCHOOL OF DANCE

Ballet Performance Study Lab

In this class, we watch short videos of famous ballet performances and explore what we notice—costumes, music, emotion, and storytelling. Together we'll learn about the history of ballet, famous choreographers, and how ballet has evolved over time. Students will share their thoughts, observations, and favorite moments as we build appreciation for dance as both art and history. Encouraged for students taking ballet and dance classes: Watching professional dancers builds vital understanding of musicality, timing, and expression—skills that support any style of dance or performance!

Belly Dancing*

This is an intermediate level class. Pre-requisites are required to enroll in this class or instructor approval. Students will learn the basic techniques and joys of belly dancing. Dancers of all abilities are welcome to come and learn this unique genre of dance.

Contemporary and Cultural Dance

Students who love to dance, or who are fascinated by varying styles of dance from varied global cultures, will love this approach to contemporary dance training. Through working in many different cultural and contemporary styles, dancers build new muscle groups and grow their creative choreography skills. Join this exciting and vibrant course and expand your dancing horizons! Students will learn best practices for how to share a dance floor with other dancers and be part of a dance team. All levels are welcome to this Onsite only dance class at the West Valley campus.

Cultural Dance Styles Around the World*

This is an intermediate level class. Pre-requisites are required to enroll in this class or instructor approval. Come join Miss Nicole on a fun tour of dance styles from different cultures around the world. Techniques from various cultures will be learned as well as some of the history of dance. While there may be some choreography work, the emphasis of this class will be on enjoying and learning dance techniques and styles from various cultures.

Dance for Stability & Balance

This class focuses on improving balance and proprioceptive awareness through simple standing and seated exercises. We use props like chairs, walls, or balls for support and practice shifting

weight, finding center, and recovering from small wobbles safely. Exercises are repeated slowly so students can feel and understand how their body stays upright.

Dance for Strength and Conditioning

This class helps students build muscle strength and endurance using bodyweight, resistance bands, and mat floor exercises. We focus on upper and lower body exercises, core work, and gentle cardio that supports everyday movement. This class can be done seated or standing, with attention to safe posture and steady breathing. Open to all students; For dance students, this class helps improve: Core strength and whole-body muscle tone to improve coordination, control, and power for dance movements like lifting, reaching, and turning.

Mobility & Imagery Through Dance

This gentle class combines stretching, deep breathing, and imagination to help students relax and move more freely. We explore how to make movement smooth and comfortable, sometimes imagining textures like "floating on water" or "painting with air." All activities can be done seated or on the floor. For dance students, this class improves flexibility and mobility, keeps the body loose, prevents injury, and helps dancers move with fluidity and expression.

Dance to Disney

Come join the fun dancing to Disney music with a whole new spin on how to express your enjoyment of Disney music. New choreographies for unique and less well-known Disney songs will be taught. Songs that are best suited to dance will be used throughout the semester. Warmups and movement will be to Disney favorites and all Disney songs, again with an eye to which songs bring out the inner dancer.

Dance Revival*

This is an intermediate level class. Pre-requisites are required to enroll in this class or instructor approval. You've learned the steps to choreographies in other classes. Now learn how to make those dances shine by making them your own, adding your own style. Emphasis will be placed on moving past rote memorization of choreographies and bringing them alive. This class will also work on individual solo performances for an end of semester performance.

Joy of Broadway Jazz

Come explore the wonders of Broadway Dance. All students welcome, and adaptations are regularly discussed. The class will focus on favorite Broadway dance tunes and learning the

dances and moves that are used in Broadway shows. Students will learn best practices for how to dance within the limits of their zoom environment.

Just Dance

Based on the popular video game, this class has accessible follow along choreography and will warm dancers up, challenge movement patterns, and introduce new steps and styles for dancers of all movement experiences.

Happy Feet! Learn to Tap Dance

Step, shuffle, and tap along to the rhythm! This beginner-friendly class focuses on fun, easy-to-learn tap steps while building confidence and coordination. Move at your own pace, enjoy the music, and let the beat guide your feet! TapFit shoes will be provided.

Hip Hop Dance

Get ready to groove, move, and have fun! This beginner-friendly class is all about feeling the beat, learning basic hip-hop moves, and building confidence. We'll warm up, break down steps, and dance to awesome music in a fun, no-pressure environment. Bring your sneakers, energy, and best attitude—let's dance!

Animal Kingdom

In this fun class we will explore the wonderful world of animals! Big and small, land and ocean and even creepy, crawly insects. We will investigate their habitats, diets and predators. We will also learn about animals who are on the verge of extinction and what people are doing to save them. Come join us!

Daily Life Science

The objective of this course is to teach students to link daily life experience with basic scientific knowledge. The class will address interesting things that happen in our lives, such as why the traffic lights are red, yellow and green? How does soap and detergent clean your dirty clothes? Students can also bring their questions to class for discussion. Students will learn different branches of science while enjoying their daily lives. This is a Beginner level class.

Basic Science: Climate Change

The objective of this course is to teach students the basic principles in physics and chemistry that relate to climate change. The course will also expose students to the current status in climate changes that are caused by human activities, such as water shortage, wildfire, and how climate change impacts the environment. Students will be trained to become environmental advocates through communication with their families and friends. This is a Beginner level class.

Go Green Climate Action Team

Discover how climate change impacts your community-and what you can do to help. This class explores clean energy, food, waste, and transportation solutions through local programs and everyday actions. Join us to learn practical ways to build a more sustainable future.

Basic Computer Skills

In Basic Computer Skills, students will learn: a basic overview of Macintosh, iOS, and Windows desktop environments, how to use a web browser and navigate the Internet, how to compose, edit, send, and receive emails, a basic overview of Microsoft Office, and basic researching skills using the most popular search engines. Other topics will include up to date and relevant overviews of current and new computer technology. Students will complete a class project on a topic of their choosing utilizing the skills learned. All levels of computer proficiency are welcome.

Computer Gaming

Students will learn about the history of the videogame industry, as well as business practices, economics, design, marketing, and its impact on our culture all over the world. All sections of Computer Gaming include similar content.

Computer Coding

In Computer Coding we will have fun activities including games offering experience with and exposure to beginning-level software that teaches students to identify, create, and run their own coding programs. Students will also learn general computer operation and etiquette for independent work in our CAA media lab.

Practical Math

The course focuses on the skill of using calculators so that students will have confidence in shopping and other real-life applications using the math skills learned in class. SCHOOL OF THEATRE

Intro to Theatre

(Previously "Acting 102: Acting for Theatre") Students will enjoy learning foundational performance concepts through participation in games, exercises, and activities designed to expand emotional expression, facilitate working as part of an ensemble, explore character creation, and introduce students to working with scripted material. Students also learn about the history of theatre and are introduced to areas of technical theatre, allowing them to explore many parts of the theatre industry. This class is a prerequisite for all upper-level theatre courses.

Take Two: Acting for Auditions

Step into the spotlight! In this class, you'll build confidence in performing monologues, tackle cold readings, and learn what it takes to shine in an audition. Whether you're a beginner or a seasoned performer, this is your chance to own the stage!

Broadway Bound: Musical Theatre

Experience the magic of musical theatre! From exciting dance routines to expressive character work and group singing, this class encourages creativity, teamwork, and fun for all abilities.

Theatre Games

(Previously "Acting 101: Theatre Games") This playful class is for everyone! Using fun and exciting theatre games and exercises, students are introduced to performance concepts that can be applied in many areas of their life, including confidence building, working with others, imagination and improvisation, freedom of movement and exploration of physical space, and much more! Come play with us!

One Act Wonders*

(Previously "Acting 103: Stage Performance") This is an intermediate level class. Pre-requisites are required to enroll in this class or instructor approval. Students will further their storytelling abilities by brainstorming and writing an original short play to perform at the end of the semester. Students enhance acting techniques and strategies through exercises that emphasize emoting, physicality, articulation and projection, implementing instructor feedback, and working as an ensemble. Students must actively participate in the rehearsal process through to the completion of the performance, which will be held during the final class session of the semester.

Scene Study Showcase*

(Previously "Graduate Scene Study") This is an intermediate level class. Pre-requisites are required to enroll in this class or instructor approval. Students will take their acting study to the next level in this advanced class designed to impart deeper skills of script analysis and stage acting techniques by workshopping scenes from published scripts. Students will rehearse and perform at least one scene at the end of the semester. Students must actively participate in the rehearsal process through to the completion of the performance, which will be held during the final class session of the semester.

Cardinal Repertory Theatre **

(Previously "Graduate Theatre Troupe") This is an advanced level class. Pre-requisites are required to enroll in this class or instructor approval. Students apply skills and techniques learned in prerequisites by engaging with advanced acting material and pushing those skills farther. This material includes published monologues and abridged classic plays adapted into modern language. With a focus on Shakespeare, students learn the historical contexts of the material, and dive deeply into character and script analysis, as well as advanced performance techniques that will gently challenge our students to grow into even better storytellers.

This class is a year-long commitment, culminating in a live (in-person) performance at the end of the Winter/Spring 2026 semester, which will be held outside of the normally scheduled class time. Students must actively participate in the rehearsal process through to the completion of this performance. Because this class is a year-long commitment, students must register for and participate in this class for both the Summer/Fall 2025 and Winter/Spring 2026 semesters.

SCHOOL DIGITAL MEDIA STUDIES

Intro to Voiceover

(Previously "Voiceover 101") Any student interested in acting, speech development, or TV/film study will enjoy this class! In this participatory class, we discuss the voiceover industry, how voiceovers are used in multimedia, and voiceover performance. Using scripts from a wide variety of voiceover styles, students work one-on-one with the instructor to improve reading and comprehension skills, emotional expression, and diction. All levels of experience are welcome!

Film Studies: Science Fiction

Have you always wondered how movies are made? Or how a TV show can leave a lasting impact where people from future generations can appreciate them? In this class, students will gain an in-depth look into genres and styles of film, as well as the behind-the-scenes production process. The included topics may include: the use of practical and CGI special effects, character tropes, the impact of films on our culture, pop culture knowledge, the rise and sometimes fall of films over time, and other exciting snippets of the film industry.

Film Studies: Exploring Film Styles

This class will give students a glimpse into film use of characters with differing abilities and challenges to overcome, and how these character qualities are used to tell their story. We will view clips of classic and modern films while learning new things about character development and how the study of many different film styles makes going to the cinema even more fun!

Digital Arts

This course will cover creating fine art illustrations using the computer. Students will learn to use the creative process to create their own images. They will learn brainstorming, finding references, tracing, scanning, photo digitizing, color theory, typography, layout and composition, image file types, and basic art software skills. Digital Arts-Intermediate*

This is an intermediate level class. Pre-requisites are required to enroll in this class or instructor approval. This course will include intermediate steps of navigating the computer as an artistic tool for self-expression. Students will expand their learned abilities of sketching, researching and developing visual references, digitizing images, and generating a final version of a group project spotlighting their next-level digital arts skills.

SCHOOL OF VISUAL ARTS

Drawing Basics Step by Step

This class will go over the basics of drawing using simple shapes and lines which is the beginning of any good drawing. We will go over guided drawing, shading, drawing shadows, shapes, perspective, and texture. Bring a pencil, eraser, and white paper to the first day of class and get ready to draw!

Still Life Drawing and Painting

In the Still Life Drawing and Painting class, we create artwork from observing everyday objects as we explore how light, shadow, texture, and color play an important role in each composition. Students will focus on the process of choosing and arranging objects to be studied, drawing or painting the arrangements to portray a level of realism in their artwork. All levels are welcome to participate in this course exploring techniques for creating fun still life.

History of Animation 101

Join our class as we learn about all types of animation and its history. Travel with us through the pages and through tv screens to learn about our favorite animated characters, stories, and techniques. We will explore classic animation styles and modern. We will discuss the impact different types of animation have on the world around us.

Indie Animation (Hand Drawn Animation)

Exploring and creating hand drawn animations

Cartooning: Bringing Characters and Worlds to Life

All levels are welcome in this engaging Cartooning class at the School of Visual Arts! Students will explore how texture, light and shadow, and expressive detail bring cartoons to life. Through lessons in portraiture, expression, setting, and landscape, participants will practice creating characters and scenes that show depth and feeling. The class emphasizes techniques for drawing in three dimensions, observing details, and using line and value to enhance form and mood. This course offers a thoughtful introduction to the fundamentals of cartooning for artists at any stage of experience.

Clay Creations Intro to Ceramics

Welcome to the world of Ceramics! In this exciting and hands-on course, students will embark on a journey into the colorful and imaginative realm of ceramics. Students will discover the joy of working with clay through fun and interactive lessons as they learn to create their masterpieces.

Throughout the course, students will explore the basic techniques of ceramics, from shaping and hand molding clay to decorating and glazing their creations. This class is great for students who are okay with getting their hands dirty. (We will be touching wet clay.)

Students will learn how to build pinch pots, coil pots, slab dishes, and more using simple tools and easy-to-follow instructions. They'll also have the chance to try their hand at wheel throwing, experiencing the magic of spinning clay on a pottery wheel. Get ready to unleash your creativity and let your imagination take flight in this whimsical world of clay!

*Please bring an apron to the first day of class. Ceramic tools will be provided for your student.

Creative Digital Photography

Students will learn phone-based photography basics (composition, focus, and core techniques) and explore creative/artistic approaches with their own images. The class also includes guidance on constructive feedback, ethics and respectful practices, and staying safe while taking photographs. Each week, students bring 1–2 photos to discuss with the class. Student needs: A phone with a camera (or other digital camera), and the ability to share and upload photos.

Fiber Art

Exploring different ways that fabric and other textiles can be used to create art.

Introduction to Miniature Painting

This course will show students how to start painting on a 3D surface and using acrylic paints. students will understand the basic of tools of trade and technique about painting with acrylics, understanding color theory.
