For Lutherans, worship stands at the center of our life of faith. Through God's word, water, bread and prayer we are nurtured in faith and sent out into the world.

Connected with and central to everything we do, worship unites us in celebration, engages us in thoughtful dialogue and helps us grow in faith. It grounds us in our Christian and Lutheran roots, while demonstrating practical relevance for today's world.

While some of the approaches to worship may differ from one ELCA congregation to another, we hold certain things in common. FIRST ENGLISH LUTHERAN CHURCH COUNCIL MEETING MINUTES MONDAY, AUGUST 18, 2025, 6:00 P.M.

Michael Klapperich led the opening devotions.

Reports:

Pastor's Report: Pastor Mary Zupansic provided a written pastor's report, which was sent to members and read by Cindy Hermel.

June Meeting Minutes: The June Council minutes were reviewed and approved via email.

Financial Reports: May and June Financial Reports were sent out via e-mail. Sherry Larson moved and Dina Santangelo seconded a motion to accept the financial reports. Motion passed.

Committee Reports:

- Parish Ed The first day of Sunday school will be September 7th. Pre-School, three- and fouryear-olds will meet twice a month on the second and fourth Sunday of the month. They will be taught by Gracin Dittmar (fourth week) and Mia Lodahl (second week). Primary fiveyear-old through fifth grade will be taught by Dilynn Koehler and Jenny Blaschka. Confirmation will be taught by Pastor. Mary, Amy Abitz and Nina Dittmar.
- Worship & Music Nothing to report.
- Stewardship The Committee met to work on the fall stewardship project. Pastor Mary shared some ideas for a theme that would be included in the service for four weeks. This would include a theme hymn, some connections in the sermon, and possible temple talks. They discussed possible changes to the stewardship materials and schedule. They will finalize their plans at the September 2 meeting. Materials would be mailed out at the end of September and members would be asked to

- return them by October 26, Reformation Sunday.
- Church & Society Nothing to report.
- **Property** Scott Kufahl provided an elevator cylinder replacement fund report outlining the total expenditure and balance due for the project. He reported that the elevator project went very well and we don't anticipate any cost overages. The elevator is fully operational and passed inspection by the state. Since the approved amount to repair the elevator exceeded the expense, the Property Committee will discuss appropriating fund for other repairs needed on the church property such as replacing the fans, gutter system, flooring in the classrooms and fixing the water issues in window wells. The Cedar Street doors were supposed to be installed today but there was a mistake on the frame, which will cause a threeweek delay. A Cedar Street Projects report was provided to Council outlining the total expenditure and balance due for the project.
- Youth Nothing to report.
- Wage & Policy Nothing to report.
- Fair Stand Initial fair stand numbers show we grossed about \$40,000. There are still expenses to be paid before we have a better understanding of final numbers. Fish fries went well and we are looking to expand in 2026. Will be discussing pricing and also training on portion sizes.
- Treasure Sale Nothing to report.

Old Business:

• Food Pantry Transition Task Force Update – We have discontinued our traditional food pantry and started bags of food for walk-ins. We have developed a relationship with The Neighbors' Place to support their food pantry. We will pursue a mini food pantry outside the building and support other food partners in the community with the youth projects. We issued our first \$200 check to The Neighbors' Place and will make monthly donations. Cindy Hermel will be checking with area high schools to see if any Tech Ed classes would be willing to construct a mini food pantry if we pay for the material, which also aligns with their community service goal.

- First English Tee Shirts Tabled until next month
- Retain Current & Attract New Members Goal
 Data Update The Committee got together to
 discuss a welcome gift for visitors attending our
 services. They created a small gift bag that
 would be meaningful to our service. There
 would be a notice in the bulletin to announce
 the process. Visitor cards would go to Pastor
 Mary for outreach.
- **Kids' Mission Update** –The program will be offered during the summer of 2026.

New Business:

- Third Quarter Financial Statements to Member – The Stewardship Committee felt it was wise at end of summer to send out financial statements to members and encourage catching up on their pledges. Michael Klapperich moved and Dina Santangelo seconded the motion for Council to recommend the Stewardship Committee proceed with requesting financial statements be sent to members. Motion passed.
- First English Tech Team The First English Tech Team was established to meet the growing technology needs of our congregation. The team members are Michael Klapperich, Cindy Hermel, Kalynn Pempek, Sharon Hunter and Pastor Mary Zupansic. Their goals is to centralize church membership to technology such as Zoom, QR codes and link social media accounts. The Tech Team would prioritize needs and pass on to the proper committee for action or approval.
- Narthex Photo/Information Display The Council previously discussed a narthex digital display using a TV with a computer connection. For the second and better option, Michael Klapperich received a service contract from Wisconsin Audio Video to provide and install two 49" LG commercial-grade displays in the Narthex, mounted above the windows to the sanctuary. Digital signage media players will be installed behind each display to deliver dynamic content for church announcements and communications. This system is designed to enhance internal messaging and provide an effective visual communication platform within the church. The user advantage would be that content is updated on a web-based portal that can be accessed by multiple users. First English would need to have an electrician install a power outlet at each of the display locations

- and provide a network data connection. The charge for installation and training would be \$3,275.40 and there would be a recurring monthly service charge of \$62.00 which includes ongoing tech support. Council would like feedback from the congregation within the next couple of months.
- Realm Conference Approval Realm is a church software program subscription that First English has, which is currently being underutilized because we don't know as much as we would like to about the program. On October 19-22, there is a Realm Conference in Nashville, which not only provides training but is a networking opportunity with other churches that already use Realm. Sharon Hunter and Cindy Hermel would like to attend and become our subject matter experts. Cindy estimates that the total cost for the conference, round-trip flights and hotel would be about \$2,000 each. Russ Michalski moved and Dina Santangelo seconded the motion to approve \$2,000 each for Sharon and Cindy to attend the Realm Conference. Motion passed. We currently have an assigned rep that will do digital meetings to answer questions and implementation tips. A potential launch of Realm could take place at the yearly congregational meeting.
- Organ Guild Event Dan Larson wanted to make the Council aware that an event with the Wisconsin River Valley Chapter, American Guild of Organists (AGO) will take place at First English on September 28 at 4:00 p.m. This event is also open to the public and will demonstrate the use of our Peterson recording unit on our pipe organ. Michael Vaningan move and Neil Juedes seconded the motion to allow this event.
- Misc. Neil Juedes suggested using the bottom of the communion cup holders instead of the plastic lined basket for returning cups. The plastic liners are cracked. Neil also suggested the purchase of two I-pads as visual assistance tools for worship services.

Next Meeting Date: Monday, September 15, 2025

A motion to adjourn was made by Mike Vaningan and seconded by Neil Juedes. Meeting adjourned.

Born into the family of a wealthy merchant, Francis gave up his inheritance to serve poor people. He formed the Order of Friars Minor (called Franciscans), who took on poverty and the task of preaching "using words if necessary." Francis had a spirit of gratitude for all of God's creation.

Theodor Fliedner, renewer of society, died 1864

Fliedner helped to bring about a revival of the ministry of deaconesses among Lutherans. He was influenced in this by Moravian deaconesses he had met. The motherhouse he founded in Kaiserswerth, Germany, inspired many around the world to take up this ministry.
