RESPECT FOR THE PRECIOUS BODY AND BLOOD OF CHRIST

Many Catholics may not fully realize—or may have lost sight of—the profound truth that the Eucharist is not just a symbol, but the true presence of Jesus Christ: Body, Blood, Soul, and Divinity. In every Mass, we encounter the living Christ, humbling Himself to be with us in the form of bread and wine. As St. John Vianney once said, "If we really understood the Mass, we would die of joy."

As we gather for the Holy Sacrifice of the Mass, let us

approach the Precious Body and Blood of Christ with <u>deep reverence and love</u>. Out of respect for the Eucharist, please refrain from chewing gum, using or chewing on toothpicks



or other items during Mass, eating or drinking before Mass (in accordance with the Eucharistic fast), or engaging in casual conversation while in the sanctuary. Be mindful of turning off cell phones and maintaining a quiet, prayerful presence during sacred moments, especially during the Consecration. We encourage all to dress modestly, maintain a spirit of prayer, and prepare yourselves to receive Christ. After receiving Communion, please sit or kneel in silent thanksgiving, allowing the grace of this sacred encounter to settle in your heart. Let us remember: Christ now dwells within us—we should be in awe!




POPE FRANCIS BIOGRAPHY

Pope Francis, born Jorge Mario Bergoglio on December 17, 1936, in Buenos Aires, Argentina, was the first pope from the Americas and the first Jesuit to lead the Catholic Church.

Before his election as pope on March 13, 2013, he served as Archbishop of Buenos Aires, where he was known for his humility, simple lifestyle, and dedication to the poor.

Raised in a family of Italian immigrants, he studied chemistry before entering the seminary and joining the Jesuits. Ordained a priest in 1969, he later became the Provincial of the



Jesuits in Argentina and played a key role in guiding the Church during a period of economic and social crises in the country. When he was appointed bishop in 1992 and archbishop in 1998, he prioritized evangelization, social justice, and pastoral outreach.

As pope, Francis emphasized mercy, care for the marginalized, and environmental stewardship. His papacy was marked by a call for a "poor Church for the poor," interfaith dialogue, and reform within the Vatican. His teachings focused on compassion, the dignity of every person, and the need for a missionary Church.

On April 21, 2025, Pope Francis passed away, leaving behind a legacy of love, humility, and service.

DEACON JOHN'S CATECHESIS CORNER

INSTRUCTION

ON CERTAIN QUESTIONS REGARDING THE COLLABORATION OF THE NON-ORDAINED FAITHFUL IN THE SACRED MINISTRY OF PRIEST 1997

Article 6 Liturgical Celebrations

§ 1. Liturgical actions must always clearly manifest the unity of the People of God as a structured communion. (89) Thus there exists a close link between the ordered exercise of liturgical action and the reflection in the liturgy of the Church's structured nature.

This happens when all participants, with faith and devotion, discharge those roles proper to them.

§ 2. To promote the proper identity (of various roles) in this area, those abuses which are contrary to the provisions of Canon 907 are to be eradicated. In eucharistic celebrations deacons and non-ordained members of the faithful may not pronounce prayers — e.g. especially the eucharistic prayer, with its concluding doxology — or any other parts of the liturgy reserved to the celebrant priest. Neither may deacons or non-ordained members of the faithful use gestures or actions which are proper to the same priest celebrant. It is a grave abuse for any member of the non-ordained faithful to "quasi preside" at the Mass while leaving only that minimal participation to the priest which is necessary to secure validity.

Can. 907 In the celebration of the Eucharist, deacons and lay persons are not permitted to say the prayers, especially the eucharistic prayer, nor to perform the actions which are proper to the celebrating priest.

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WORSHIP & Meditation

John 20:19-31

It's common for Catholics to hear the question, "Why do I have to go to a priest to have my sins forgiven?" I've never liked that question because not only is it clunky (confession is the ordinary way for the pardoning of serious sins, not lesser ones). But it misses the larger context: the wonderful origins of the sacrament itself. And this context is deeply Jewish.

Ancient Jews associated forgiveness of sins with priests offering sacrifices in the Jerusalem temple. It was a solemn, public, and tangible way to access God's mercy. So when the risen Jesus breathes on the Apostles and says, "Whose sins you forgive are forgiven them, and whose sins you retain are retained" (John 20:23), the upshot is remarkable: he is the new temple and his Apostles are the new priests. Jerusalem is no longer the place to find forgiveness from sin. Jesus' body, the Church, is.

So why should we go to the Sacrament of Confession? For the same reason ancient Jews went to the temple in Jerusalem: to experience the intimacy, joy, and life-giving power of God's eternal forgiveness.

The World Is Watching

If you're a parent, you know this to be true: the world is watching. All it takes is one slip-up — one bad word, one self-ish action, one uncharitable commentary, and that's the thing your child seems to notice.

When he or she calls you on it, the only thing you can do is come clean. "Yep, I did that," you have to say. "I'm a work in progress, but luckily, God never stops working."

I think it's fair to say that we don't think enough about the wounds of Christ. It's a little understandable, of course. Our human bodies flinch at the sight of such pain and mortification. It's a lot to handle, the physical trauma of a crucifixion. It carries an R rating in a PG world.

But the wounds of Christ are the only thing that could make Thomas believe. Literally nothing else was so powerful, not even the testimony of his most trusted friends. Only by looking at and feeling the torn flesh — by beholding that messy reality — did this Apostle, this actual companion of Christ, come to believe in the Resurrection.

"Christ has no body now but yours," goes the famous quote attributed to St. Teresa of Avila. What she's saying is that we have become the means through which God chooses to accomplish His will in the world. Us, the broken. Us, the weary. Us, the imperfect. Yes, miraculous events and apparitions still occur from time to time, but by and large, if a person is going to come to believe in Jesus Christ in this day and age, it will be because of something we Christians do or say.

Christ has no wounds now but ours. Our brokenness, our weariness, our imperfection — our reality. It all belongs to him, and the world is watching.

INSTRUCCIÓN

SOBRE ALGUNAS CUESTIONES ACERCA DE LA COLABORACIÓN DE LOS FIELES NO ORDENADOS EN EL MINISTERIO SAGRADO DEL SACERDOTE 1997

Artículo 6 Celebraciones Litúrgicas

§ 1. Las acciones litúrgicas deben manifestar siempre claramente la unidad del Pueblo de Dios como una comunión estructurada. (89) Por tanto, existe un vínculo estrecho entre el ejercicio ordenado de la acción litúrgica y la manifestación en la liturgia de la naturaleza estructurada de la Iglesia.

Esto se da cuando todos los participantes, con fe y devoción, desempeñan aquellos roles que les son propios.

§ 2. Para promover la identidad propia (de los diversos roles) en este ámbito, deben erradicarse aquellos abusos que son contrarios a lo dispuesto en el canon 907. En las celebraciones eucarísticas, los diáconos y los fieles no ordenados no pueden pronunciar oraciones — por ejemplo, especialmente la oración eucarística, con su doxología conclusiva— ni ninguna otra parte de la liturgia reservada al sacerdote celebrante. Tampoco pueden los diáconos o los fieles no ordenados usar gestos o acciones que son propios del mismo sacerdote celebrante. Es un abuso grave que cualquier miembro de los fieles no ordenados "casi presida" la Misa, dejando al sacerdote solamente aquella participación mínima necesaria para garantizar la validez.

Can. 907 En la celebración de la Eucaristía, no se permite a los diáconos ni a los laicos pronunciar las oraciones, especialmente la oración eucarística, ni realizar las acciones que son propias del sacerdote celebrante.
