# Death and Grief

It never ceases to amaze me how quickly things change in life. Some of it is predictable; the harvest is in, there's a chill in the air, and soon the clocks will be changing as autumn takes hold. An extra hour in bed, dogs permitting.

Some changes are unforeseen, if ultimately inevitable. Who would have thought going into September that the Queen would die and we would have a King. I was surprised by the depth of emotion I experienced when the Queen's death was announced. Being a young lad of 61, I have known no other monarch in my lifetime and greatly admire the role she played in the United Kingdom, the Commonwealth and the world at large, and I feel that something very precious has been lost. However, I also feel reassured by the continuity of the monarchy. *The Queen is dead, long live the King*, can appear to be insensitive but it reminds us that some things are greater than the span of one human life. I know others will have a different view of the monarchy and I respect that.

There is another dimension to what has happened. Watching the pomp and ceremony surrounding the Lying in State and funeral, it was easy for us to forget that there is a family mourning for the loss of a mother, a grandmother and a great-grandmother. Amidst all the public appearances, the handshaking and chats with the crowds, there were times when grief was etched on the faces of those trying to keep a "stiff upper lip".

Death and grief are a normal part of life, but something in our modern age that we want to shy away from, something to be hidden away, unspoken. We are uncomfortable with grief. The lying in state and funeral rituals for the Queen hark back to an age where death and grief were not taboo and we need to reconnect with important elements of that in our own lives. The pandemic has brought home the fragility of human life and lockdowns left so many to grieve in isolation. Even Jesus publicly grieved for his friend Lazarus, giving us the shortest verse in the Bible, "Jesus wept".

If you are mourning a loss in your life, please take comfort in accepting that grief is a powerful but normal emotion. Accepting this does not diminish the pain but is part of the process of learning to live with grief. Do not feel ashamed about showing emotion and do not feel that you have to be given permission to speak about your loss and grief.

If you have a friend who is grieving do not shy away from them. "I'm sorry for your loss" may seem an inadequate response but is a huge help as it acknowledges that loss. Ask them to talk about their loved one and make it clear that you are there for them. I leave you with a poem by an unknown author.

There's an Elephant in the Room.

There's an elephant in the room.

It is large and squatting,

so it is hard to get around it.

Yet, we squeeze by with,

"how are you" and "I`m fine..."

and a thousand other forms of trivial chatter.

we talk about everything else

except the elephant in the room. We all know it's there.

#### **Luncheon Club Silver Jubilee**

25 years ago, a meeting was held at Alan Farnaby's to discuss the idea of having a pensioners' (over 60's) lunch once a week in the village hall. Present were Alan and Jean Farnaby, Brian Parkinson, Pauline Hull, Janet Fairclough and Janet Towse. Saundra Meads and Wendy Haste could not attend. It started on Tuesday 7<sup>th</sup> October 1997 with just soup and sandwiches or sausage rolls but it was quickly felt that a two-course meal would be better. The two pubs in the village, The Highwayman and The Castle, were approached and they agreed to provide a hot meal on alternate weeks throughout the winter for a set price. The helpers picked up the food in containers and took it to the Village Hall, they then served up, washed up and returned the containers. Over time, first The Highwayman and then The Castle had to give up. The volunteers then decided to cook the meals themselves buying in the occasional main course until that stopped. Now they do all the cooking.

Numbers have varied over the years, up to 32 sitting down and sometimes less than a dozen. We currently have about 16 – 20 people sitting down and two teams of 4 helpers, plus a driver and an extra volunteer. Pensioners and helpers have come and gone but two people have been with the Luncheon Club from the start, Janet Fairclough as a helper and then sitting down and myself serving and cooking.

I think everyone would agree that we have provided a 'Silver Service'.

#### Village Show 2022

The Village Show is a celebration of growing, preserving, baking and creative work; it reflects the skills and talents within the community. Judges commented on the high level of achievements and careful presentation of the exhibits.

This year the work of the children was a highlight, with a significant increase in families taking part in the show. The colourful Jubilee themed paintings, drawings and collage work was created by the children of Sheriff Hutton Primary School, whilst the delightful artwork on the theme of 'animals' was entered by Puddleducks Children's Nursery and Sheriff Hutton Playgroup.

There was some concern this year that the long spell of hot weather and lack of rainfall during the growing season would result in few exhibits for the Vegetables, Fruit, Flowers and Pot Plant sections of the Village Show. Although there were fewer adult exhibitors this year, and a reduction in entries for Vegetables and Fruit, there were a similar number of entries for Flowers and Pot Plants as the previous year. Tomatoes and courgettes were in plentiful supply, but all the peas had finished early in the season. A competitor from outside the area displayed some beautiful Flowers and Pot Plants and came first overall in this section. However, in line with the competition rules, the cup was awarded to the local 2<sup>nd</sup> place exhibitor. Some fine knitting and crocheting were seen in the Crafts section as well as a range of skilful paintings and beautifully made patchwork quilts, amongst other creative work. The best exhibit in this section was a much-admired painting of horses by a talented young person in the village and this exhibitor was awarded the Neville Plate. The new Village Show recipe for shortbread was a success in the Cookery and Preserves section and it can be found in the July edition of the Village News. There was also a wide range of tasty cakes and biscuits, and plenty of jars of jam, marmalade, jelly and chutney were entered into the show. This year there were fewer photographs on display although the quality of the entries was high.

#### **Gardening tips**

As the nights lengthen and the days cool, the garden and woodland colours intensify, reaching a crescendo in the first two weeks in November. A little clearing of plants not at their best improves the outlook and makes good compost which, when well-rotted, can cover bare ground to help to keep it moist in drought conditions and feed the soil. Lawns need to be kept cut when dry enough, to keep them tidy over the winter after the last cut. A raking will help loosen up the soil, clearing thatch whilst reducing compaction. Autumn feeds are available. Don't forget the edges - if you have any!

#### The Queue for the Lying in State of Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II

Neil and I had been up to London on the Thursday to take our flowers to Green Park and show our respects for the Queen in that way. But I became increasingly aware that I really wanted to go to the lying-in state of the Queen, for the history and tradition, my city and my family tradition. I couldn't work out how I would do it and if I finished in the middle of the night, I didn't fancy being alone in London. And then my friend sent me a WhatsApp to say she was going on Friday afternoon/evening. So, I thought, why not, just go for it! But I had no coat, jumper, scarf or food with me so I decided to come home as planned, sort myself out and come back the following morning thoroughly prepared!

Actually, we didn't know whether we'd be able to get in. On the way up to London on the train I read that queuing had been paused for 6 hours and that there were horrendous queuing times. I decided to continue, meet my friends as planned and then make our way to the Southwark Park and see what was happening. When we got there, the queue had been reopened and we were on our way!

We queued in the park for two hours, zig-zagging all the way and then as we left the park, there was a big electronic sign to say only 14 hours to go from this point! It wasn't actually, it was only ten hours to go! It didn't feel like ages, London in the late afternoon sunshine and at night was so lovely, lots of people to talk to so no time to be bored or tired. Turning a corner to see Tower Bridge opening, its stonework caught by the late afternoon sun was magical. The bridges and all the famous buildings, including HMS Belfast and Tower Bridge were lit up in purple, we think to honour the Queen.

The zigzag parts were the hardest as you just kept going backwards and forwards, and you could see where you were going but it was taking ages to get there. Sometimes it was a slow walk, other times we could move quite freely and sometimes we just stood and waited. The whole process was very carefully controlled, I think.

There were plenty of portaloos en-route, but it was better to nip into a bar or hotel! There were one or two sellers of somewhat dubious 'souvenirs' but they were very, very few people buying with most saying 'how tacky'.

We made friends in the queue, and you got to know your 'group'. Once we had our wrist bands at London Bridge, I think, you could leave the queue to pop to the loo or buy a coffee and then come back to the queue. We had to show our wristbands at various points and it was very clear you had to be wearing them to enter the Hall.

The marshals kept everyone on the straight and narrow, sometimes literally! They were cheerful and encouraging, 'only 1km to go, so only a couple or three hours'! They kept an eye on everything to check people weren't joining the queue without joining at the beginning.

It wasn't freezing but it was chilly, and I was glad of my two jumpers, scarf and winter coat. Comfy shoes were a must. I was sorry for the lady in flip-flops. We had various sandwiches, cakes and snacks. I ended up eating mine early to lessen the weight of my bag and it was a tricksy balance between carrying water, drinking it and loo stops!

The bars and hotels on the route didn't mind if you popped in to use the loo. The fire service people were handing out free bottles of water and local householders were providing tea and coffee. Everyone was just so welcoming.

Such an occasion with people chatting, fabulous scenes alongside the Thames on South Bank, then across Lambeth Bridge to Westminster and then another 2 hrs of zig-zag queuing before security. Security was very strict; it was like an airport with scanners for bags and people. You had to hand in all, and I mean all, liquids, no minimum amount. One lady lost her Chanel No 5 apparently.

We had spent 11 hours officially queuing, 13 hours if you include the time in the initial queue in the park. It was amazing, real camaraderie in the queue, and then after all this time on your feet you are suddenly at the top of the stairs of Westminster Hall, and you remember why you are there. Such a hushed, so respectful silence as we entered in awe.

We got in at 2.20am and you can see the scene that you've been watching on telly. Such silence, such rich vibrant colours of red and purple but this is real and you're there! The coffin taking everyone's attention as you slowly come down the steps, taking it all in, bowing of heads and then slowly walking out. Pausing at the exit to look back and then you hear the tap, tap and the changing of the guard takes place. So conscious of the history of Westminster Hall, the tradition, the occasion and the opportunity to say thank you and pay your respects to the Queen.

And then you leave, and it's over. Everyone just dispersed. Great the buses and trains were running. It was such a team effort with so many people involved.

We got back to KX for the first train out. The underground was running, the stations were open, a train was opened up as a hotel train where you could sleep or sit in the warm. It was amazing how busy London was at 3am, streets, buses and the underground! What an experience of a lifetime and I'm so glad I listened to the voice that told me to just go. It was so very special.

My grandfather saw Queen Victoria's coffin pass when he was eight and now, I've been able to see the Queen's. And I was able to represent family now, family gone, friends who asked me to take their good wishes, our Sheriff community and our church and to carry on with the family tradition of being a small part of national events.

A huge thank you to everyone involved in making such a wonderful and once in a lifetime experience.

PS I was very, very stiff the morning after, not used to being on my feet and walking for 14 hours non-stop!
