Parish Council

The Parish Council met on the 13th July 2023. Councillors present at the meeting were Penny Bean (Chairman), Marcus Oxendale, Sally Wright and Sam Warriner. Four members of the public (part meeting only).

The following new planning applications were received for consideration this month:

ZE23/00673/HOUSE 2 Laurels Garth, Sheriff Hutton

Erection of detached double garage and formation of new vehicular access.

The Parish Council had no objections although concern was expressed regarding pedestrian access as there is no roadside footpath to serve this new access.

23/00288/FUL Land rear of Park View, Finkle Street, Sheriff Hutton – Revised Application

Erection of 2 no detached dwellings with detached double garages and associated parking, landscaping and formation of vehicular access.

The Parish Council had no objection regarding vehicular access for a single dwelling although concerns were expressed re proposed loss of hedging to the western boundary contrary to the conditions of the previous planning approval. Concern that the new Biodiversity report conflicts with the previous report. These together with re-siting of the properties will severely impact on adjacent single storey properties.

Sheriff Hutton History Group

The History Group's July meeting was the first to be held in the early afternoon and a large audience gathered to hear Karen Adams tell us about the history of The Forest of Galtres and the surrounding area.

There is evidence that there were hunting preserves here in the Saxon "kingdom" of Deira and that much of the land in the region covered by the Forest, was marshy with scrub woodland where guides were needed who know the paths through them.

The Norman Forest of Galtres was established in the reign of one of the early Norman Kings and its primary purpose was the protection of assets stolen by the Normans from the earlier inhabitants and sequestered to the invading rulers. Strict laws protected the animals hunted for sport by the conquerors such as deer, boar and wolves, but also small game such as rabbits and pigeons. Timber was also crown property and even brushwood could not be gathered by any of the local population without tight controls.

The original boundaries of the forest are uncertain, but probably extended from York to Stamford Bridge, then along the base of the Howardian Hills to somewhere to the south of Thirsk, meeting up with a tributary of the Ouse and then back along the Ouse to York again.

Karen told us about the political and civil administration of the Forest and application of Forest Law (which was entirely separate from Common Law) - and the consequences of breaking it – which were severe.

She took us through the changes to the Forest boundaries which had excluded Sheriff Hutton from the Forest by 1416 and noted that tithes from the Forest supported several Religious Houses in York. By the time of Elizabeth the First much of the original area was now outside the Forest boundaries and 1629 saw the final disafforestation and sale of the remaining areas to well-to-do land owners for the benefit of the Crown.

This was a most interesting talk about something we hear about daily, but most of us know little of its history.

We are pleased to say that the Village Information Board has now been put in place opposite the Highwayman and to extend our thanks to all involved and particularly to the relatives of the late Nancy Meggison and the Parish Council who helped to fund this project.

Our next meeting will be in September when Jon Kenny, Community Archaeologist will be talking about Moated Sites in the Vale of York, followed by the History Fair in October – full details will be published in the next edition of Village News.

Gardening Tips

Plants will fall over after quick growth following wet weather. Do we ever put in enough supports early enough or have the right size amongst the plethora of stakes collected over the years? We can grow our own to fit and the winter-coloured stems of dogwoods, cornus and willows can be cut hard back just when the herbaceous perennials are growing quickly in the spring. Another advantage to the coloured stem plants is they grow back quickly with a variety of fresh leaf hues. Hazel sticks are the traditional plant support material, but we don't all have enough room to grow them. Cutting back early flowering plants such as hardy geraniums and nepeta will produce fresh growth and perhaps a second flowering by the autumn. Not all roses repeat flower but for those that do, a tidy cut back and a feed will see a second flush. Always lots to do!

The Methodist Church

The phone rang, it was my senior steward from the Methodist Church, "Have you written your article for next month's village news, they are waiting for it?" I hadn't. I had completely forgotten. In all the busy-ness of daily business it had completely slipped my mind. Do you ever find that often you are so busy juggling the priorities of life, trying to manage the urgent things so that they don't crowd out the important, that sometimes the important gets forgotten? I know I do, and this is the latest example.

I have been considering how I might get a better grip on my diary and offer some thoughts on how this might be achieved. Of course, you will have to accept that this is written possibly more in hope than expectation of achieving this.

Before automatically saying yes to everything take a step back and consider if I have the time and capacity to do it. Am I the best person to do it? Does it even need doing? How often do we do things out of habit, because we have always done it or there is an expectation that we will do it? The word "no" does not need any qualification, we do not have to apologise for not taking everything on.

If you do take something on, remember to put it in your diary and set reminders. I was complaining to myself that the Village News team have stopped sending out their reminder emails, therefore, by a simple step of twisted logic, it is their fault I haven't sent in the article. Oh dear, whatever happened to taking responsibility for my own failings. I have just about every piece of modern technology going and yet I failed once again to remember to set a reminder.

Most importantly, learn to switch off the business at least once a week. This might appear to be counterintuitive; how can I take time off when I am so busy? However, what that does is create the space to rest and to take stock. Making time just to "be" rather than to be "doing" is a vital way to take back control. It is why God said we should have a day of rest each week. It was given the name Sabbath which carries all sorts of baggage. It is not about being gloomy and pious one day a week. It is about finding that place of calm for rest and recuperation. And, perhaps it creates a space in our lives where we catch a glimpse of God in the most unexpected ways because we have taken that time away from the busy-ness of business.

Will I take note of my own advice? Perhaps I need to listen to and act on some other words of Jesus, "Physician, heal thyself"!

Next order - early September.

Planned delivery late August/early September with order cut-off Friday 18th August 2023.

This is open to members of the Village Oil Buying Group and in addition anyone who wants to join in Sheriff Hutton, Lilling, Whenby, Farlington and Stittenham. There is no need to order each time.

If you have already given your details to the group, you will receive a reminder in advance of the deadlines asking for confirmation on whether you require an order and if so the details.

The group run by volunteers purely for the convenience and to provide savings to Villagers was set up many years ago buying heating oil as a group for Sheriff Hutton and Lilling. It now includes in addition Whenby, Farlington and Stittenham. This offers a potential saving on ordering individually of up to 10%.

If you would like to join please email us at sheriffhuttonoil@gmail.com with your name, email, back up phone number, address, location of oil tank and oil order or request to be added to the database.

The minimum quantity which can be ordered is 500 litres, but you can order any number of litres above that.

Please send your most accurate estimation as the use of the 'to fill' option would depend on the supplier used and the availability of spare oil in the tanker. We remain in a challenging environment for group orders due to the volatility of the market.

Please note to enable the group to work your details will be held on a database, and certain details e.g. name and order shared with the rest of the group and name, address and contact details will be provided to BATA or a future oil provider in connection with oil orders.
