## Stillington Surgery and Patient Participation Group (Stillington PPG)

It is a legal requirement for all Surgeries to have a Patient Participation Group. In early 2023, a group of volunteers came forward and formed Stillington Patient Participation Group (Stillington PPG).

Last year largely entailed PPG members getting to know their roles, meeting Surgery Practice Management and GPs, understanding a bit more about the additional support services available from the Surgery, and suggesting and agreeing some minor changes to Surgery ways of working, and sharing information. The PPG meets four times per year, with the main aim of working in partnership with the Surgery Practice team and GPs to improve services for Surgery patients. While this is recognised as a tough challenge given the already excellent service provided, the PPG will do their best to represent all patients and help make the service even better.

There are ten volunteers on Stillington PPG from the surrounding villages of Huby, Sheriff Hutton, Stillington and Sutton on the Forest. ## **Parish Council**

The Parish Council met on the 8<sup>th</sup> February, 2024. Councillors present at the meeting were Marcus Oxendale (Acting Chairman), Sally Wright, Dave Smith, Sam Warriner and Phillip Lazenby. Louise Pink, Clerk. Four members of the public (two for part of meeting only).

## The following new planning applications were received for consideration this month:

ZE24/00049/73A Spring Cottage, East End, Sheriff Hutton

Variation of condition 02 of planning approval 22/00504/HOUSE dated 17.07.2022 to allow variation from the approved drawings (retrospective application).

Decision - Sheriff Hutton Parish Council object to the above planning application, on the following grounds: the street scene view clearly shows a wall separate to the extension wall which is the original party wall separating the two properties. This has been removed in the actual build and the extension wall has become the dividing line. This is a clear breach of the original plan. The plans show no resemblance to the ones originally passed so it has not been built in accordance with the original planning application. As such, the window, instead of being shielded by the dividing party wall, has now a full view into the neighbour's property. The extension is not in keeping with the housing in the area, especially within a conservation area.

## ZE23/00437/FUL Land at Cornborough Road, Sheriff Hutton

Change of use of former agricultural building for use as (small breeds) dog breeding kennel and domestic storage, together with an extension to the building to provide toilets and external alterations, including the installation of insulated acoustic sheeting to the exterior of the building (part retrospective), and the change of use of agricultural land to dog exercise area.

Decision – Sheriff Hutton Parish Council object to the above planning application on the same grounds as those issued previously, plus additional concerns.

Planning permission for the dog breeding kennels expired on the 21<sup>st</sup> of January 2023, as no part of the planning permission has been started on site or any of the conditions adhered to, this planning application must be fully resubmitted. This is not a retrospective application.

Not all neighbours have been consulted on this application by North Yorkshire Council. On the planning application, it states there is no parking. However, a huge area of hard-core has already been put down covering approximately an acre of land which could easily park a large number of vehicles. Partly due to this new area that has been stoned over, there are drainage issues that has led to an increase of run-off to the fields below. The applicant states that the run-off goes into the gutter. However, this is above the site and therefore run-off cannot go into it. They also state that any run-off goes into a soak away, where is this soak away, when was it put in and did it follow any building regulations?

When the kennels were given permission, it was on the proviso that there was no residential element to the site. This is no longer true as the applicant has lived on site over a year. The planning application states that there are no employees on site. However, the whole family has been living on site for over a year now. The planning application states that the opening hours are irrelevant. However, one of the conditions when planning permission was granted was that there were stricter hours in particular for the dog walking area. There are no details given for the times of use. Is there any containment/fencing planned? There are no details given about how the dogs will be contained. Dogs are often roaming free into the nearby fields.

The application states that it cannot be seen from the road or public footpath. However, a public footpath runs right through the centre of the site. Therefore, the site can be fully seen by the public. Prior to planning permission, a noise survey was carried out. However, this has now been ruled invalid by the changes to the design of the barn, with a large new opening fitted with a roller door, which has no soundproofing whatsoever.

The site is not being used for dog breeding. All dogs on site are kept in wooden kennels outside. The shed only appears to be used for storage for the number of businesses running from the site. Planning permission for the barn was granted on the proviso that no new openings were made again. This has not been adhered too. How can this shed be made into a dog breeding centre when there is not a single window for natural light within the barn, are the dogs to live in darkness, their whole lives?

Why is there a need for four toilets? If this is simply to be used for anyone visiting the site surely this is excessive, at present a Portaloo is used on site, if this works now, why is there a need for a further extension?

The Parish Council query what the need is for a domestic storage when the site should have no domestic usage. Since the first application, there are thousands more dogs that require re homing. Therefore, the Parish Council query why there is even a requirement for a puppy farm. There are constant noise issues on site with dog's barking at all hours, with no effort made to stop them. NYC has been made aware of this but no action has been taken. Previous surveys have been used when the building is now materially different. An example being, the door that has been installed is not sound proofed and cannot be.

This application seems to be an effort to legitimise the illegal use of the site for domestic usage.

Erection of an agricultural building for the handling of cattle and attached feed store following demolition of existing building.

ZE23/06942/HOUSE Catesby House, 23a The Croft, Sheriff Hutton

Erection of entrance porch to the north elevation and single storey orangery to the rear following removal of existing conservatory.

APPROVED.

## Report on the Cropton Beaver Project Talk.

We had a brilliant evening for our first talk of 2024, when we welcomed Rachel Midgley of Forestry England, who spoke about the Cropton Beaver Project. It was really interesting to hear about the changes in the landscape and the environment over time due to beaver engineering, and about the increase in size of their family group. We were entertained by great photography and videos of the beavers at work and of local wildlife sharing their habitat.

#### Gardening tips

Once the days lengthen, the soil starts to warm up and plants begin their journey, especially the weeds. When conditions are dry enough, hoeing is the quickest and most efficient way of controlling the annual weeds, so get them now before they seed for less of them later. Some have a rapid reproduction cycle, a matter of survival for them and irritation for us.

Perennial weeds need to be removed, as any part left in the ground will regrow. As winter pruning and deciduous planting is out of the way by the end of March, remember that shrubs flowering from now until June, need their prune just after flowering. There will be more daylight hours available to be out and doing whatever you want to do in your patch.

## The First Step...

Dear Friends,

Words come more easily sometimes than others. There are those occasions when we seem to know exactly what to say or what we want to say, and we find ourselves able to articulate coherently and meaningfully. There are those other moments when we feel stuck, and we struggle to find any fluency or way forward. If this is true of our conversations, then perhaps you also experience something similar if and when you begin a crossword puzzle. There are times when I scan the clues and start saying to myself, "I can't do any of these." Equally, there are times when the first few solutions come so easily that my response is more along the lines of, "Well, this isn't going to take long."

The strange thing is that, when the first few answers come in no time, I often find myself getting stuck later, and really stuck, whereas, when I have more difficulty getting into the puzzle in the first place, I tend to get further and even sometimes finish without cheating. I do wonder whether this is a psychological trick I am playing on myself, or whether I am drawing an accurate conclusion here. It may not always be the case, but it certainly feels sometimes that the more challenging the first step feels, the more straightforward matters can become afterwards and the further the progress. We do talk about "breaking the back" of a task, after all.

Puzzles do not only come in the form of crosswords and sudokus, of course. Exam papers, application forms, questionnaires and other documents can often pose the same challenge. There are times when our minds go blank. There are times when the responses, the thoughts and the ideas flow, and then there are the issues we are confronting, the choices and decisions before us, which may have significant consequences for us and for others around us. Sometimes we feel confident about the way forward, but sometimes we become overwhelmed by the questions asked of us, even to the point of inertia.

The season of Lent depicts for us a time when the disciples around Jesus learned and discovered on the move. In their travelling together to Jerusalem, they find themselves puzzling their way through to new insights and deeper perceptions of what it means for them to be them, amid all that seems clear and all that appears enigmatic. In all of this perhaps, it is worth reminding ourselves of the wisdom of Rumi, the thirteenth century Persian poet: "The path only appears with the first step." David Bidnell (Methodist Minister)

The group is run by volunteers purely for the convenience, and to provide savings, for villagers. It was initially set up many years ago buying heating oil as a group for Sheriff Hutton and Lilling only. It now includes in addition; Whenby, Farlington and Stittenham.


The minimum quantity which can be ordered is 500 litres, but you can order any number of litres above that. Payment can be made to the driver or by phone within 7 days of the delivery.

## Why not explore the area we live in this Easter?

So much history, great countryside, and remember to take your wellies if it keeps raining! Lots of walks online, books can be found in the Post Office or join the Village Rambling Group.

Sheriff Hutton has two castles. The first is a Norman motte and bailey structure of which only the mounds remain. It was built by Ansketil de Bulmer on land given to him by William the Conqueror. Hutton stems from the Old English hoh (a projecting piece of land) and tun (a farmstead) while the Sheriff prefix stems from the association with the Bulmer family, Bertram de Bulmer being sheriff of York in 1115.

In 1331 the Neville family received overlordship of Sheriff Hutton and in 1382 John Neville started to build a second castle on a new site in the village. It was completed in 1398. The Neville's were largely responsible for the growth of the village that we see today. Richard Duke of Gloucester (the future Richard III) was placed in the household of Richard Neville. It is likely that Richard III visited Sheriff Hutton several times and in 1485 he created The Council of the North which used to meet in York or Sheriff Hutton. From 1547 the castle seems to have been occupied only spasmodically by the Council and declined since then.

South of the castle is Sheriff Hutton Park. The house was built by Sir Arthur Ingram in 1621, Sir Arthurs's main house being Temple Newsom near Leeds. In 1637 the hall went to his third son Sir Thomas who removed large quantities of stone from the castle to build stables and a brewhouse (the Rangers House). Thus began the final decline of the castle. In the reign of Charles II, the house was sold to the Thompson family. Originally the house was Jacobean in its architecture. This house still survives but about one foot inside the present Queen Anne exterior built in 1732.

The earliest clear reference to the existence of a church is a gift to St Mary's Abbey York by Sir Nigel Fossard, who died in 1120, of the Church of St Helen and the Holy Cross.

There is a small window above the west door that may pre-date 1100. The Norman building of magnesian limestone ashlar, thought to be re-used blocks from York's Roman walls, comprise the tower, nave and chancel, all later extended when the four chantry chapels were built in the C15th for the manor-holding families of the Nevilles, Gowers, Wythams and Dacres.

There are many references to the Plantagenet connections with Sheriff Hutton Castle including the Sun in Splendour of Edward IV and Neville and Dacre shields in the stained glass, much of it damaged at the Reformation. There is a tomb of Sir Edmund Thweng, who died at the Battle of Stirling in 1344 and the alabaster tomb of Edward, Prince of Wales, son of Richard III and Anne Neville.

There are furnishings from nine centuries including pews from Stuart, Georgian and Victorian periods. The churchyard is managed to allow the wealth of wild flowers to develop in the Spring and the interesting range of grave markers is a respectful place for families and visitors.



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
