Sheriff Hutton Nature Group

On 18 June we had the practical training session on Hedge Surveying led by Dr Barry Wright Principal Ecologist. Our group included members of the Nature and History Groups and also other interested parties. This focused mainly on one hedge which runs down from behind the Croft towards the Glebe. We learnt as a group how to complete two levels of survey using recording sheets to document indicator tree and plant species. This data will be analysed by Dr Wright as a tool for indicating the age and flora of ancient hedges. As you will imagine we are lucky to have a number of suitable hedges of antiquity in the area of our local villages. Our plan is to use what we have learnt from the practical session to apply to other hedges in the area. If you are interested in being involved in this going forward, please let us know via the contact details below.

International Bat Night 27th to 28th August and Bat Surveys

This month it is International Bat Night. Bats are the only true flying mammals. A pipistrelle bat can eat up to 3,000 insects a night. Bats are interesting creatures in their own right and monitoring of certain species is also used as an indicator of biodiversity and environmental quality. Bats are surprisingly more closely related to humans than they are to mice. To check for any local bat events contact <https://www.bats.org.uk/support-bats/international-bat-night>.

A positive report issued earlier this year indicated that at least 9 UK bat species are either stabilising or increasing. If you are interested, you can help the National Bat Monitoring Programme with local surveys. The introductory one, water surveys conducted in August does even not require a bat detector. Gardening tips

August is always a tricky month, as gardens seem to hit a lull unless you are madly harvesting vegetables. The flush of summer flowering is over with the days shortening. However there are still jobs to be done; box needs tidying along with hollies and other evergreens which might have been missed. Those with Leylandii hedges would be advised to trim now to enable regrowth. Shorten new growth on all but large trees of apples and pears to encourage fruiting buds to form. Frame pruning can be done in winter except for plums, cherries and any other stoned fruit which should be done now to allow healing and avoid winter disease. All the whippy growth on the wisteria can be cut back now to a few buds as growth slows. Daffodil bulbs are available now!

Open Gardens

12 of our villagers kindly opened their beautiful gardens on 11th and 12th June which proved to be so popular. The event coincided with Open Studios so the village provided its locals and visitors with a wonderful weekend of art and outdoor beauty.

St Helen's was the venue for the cafe and plant sale with the event, overall, raising £1896 which will be split equally between St Helen's Church, Yorkshire Air Ambulance and Friends of the Village Hall after costs have been deducted. A huge thank you to everyone who took part and raised funds and to Barry and Claire at the village shop for selling tickets. We've received so many wonderful compliments.

History Group

Last month the History Group enjoyed a fascinating visit and talk by Margaret Shaw and Janet Bates from the Malton Museum. Entitled "Every Object Tells a Story" we were treated to just that: after a brief history of the museum and its several relocations, both past and projected, Janet brought round 9 different objects from the museum's collection for us to handle and examine and Margaret told us the stories associated with them.

First were a pair of small carved chalk figurines, dated to the iron age by context and rare artefacts – only a very few have been found in Britain and their actual purpose is still unknown.

A replica patera – a saucepan-like equivalent of a WW2 soldier's mess tin – was passed around – an essential piece of kit for any Roman soldier – marked with his name and found in 1878 near the Malton Roman fort; this was followed by a touching reminder of the real people of history – a child's footprint in a fired clay brick from Langton.

Further Roman finds followed – first a beautifully carved jet figure of a bear found with a child's burial within the Roman fort – possibly a protective charm to guard the child in the afterlife. Next was part of a 3rd century dedication tablet found in the 1920s, also in the fort area.

Four more items were given to us to handle and hear about: a medieval bronze weight for a steelyard, in the shape of a bird and a leather tankard – a commonly used item in all the best alehouses!. Another common item from the 1800s was a clay pipe – pieces of clay pipe stems are often found in older gardens – and bringing the collection more or less up to date was a group of biscuit and other tins – all beautifully decorated and probably from around the 1930s.

This was a really excellent visit – the chance to handle historic items (or replicas thereof) and to be told about their provenance and how they were related to the history of Ryedale was a privilege and a strong encouragement to visit the museum and learn more about our past.

Early in July some members of the History Group joined the village Nature Group in a practical demonstration of how to properly record hedgerows in the area, led by hedge expert Dr Barry Wright. This has significant implications in our ongoing task of understanding the historical landscape around Sheriff Hutton since Dr Wright showed us ways of gauging the age of a hedgerow and its significance in the overall pattern of land usage. The Methodist Church

I wonder what you think when you hear the word “church”. What mental picture does it conjure up for you? Perhaps it makes you think of a specific building, one where you attended a funeral, a baptism or a wedding. Perhaps it makes you think of a certain person, a minister or a vicar you have met or maybe a person or a congregation you associate with the word church. It might be a word which makes you deeply uncomfortable and unwelcome or one which in its familiarity gives you a sense of belonging and welcome. For many “church” is about something that is done on a Sunday morning but church is much more than that.

Church is not about buildings. You don't need a building to be a church. In the Ukraine church has met in bombed out cellars, in underpasses and beneath bridges. Church is the people gathering together and Jesus gathering with them. That is it. Everything else is just decoration.

Wednesday morning is one of my favourite mornings of the week. That's when we have our coffee morning in the Miss Ward Room at the Methodist Church. There's something special about coffee morning. As we sit around the table drinking coffee or tea and eating biscuits, we draw closer together in the stories we tell; in the news of family and friends; in the sharing of memories of childhood, youth and adulthood; in the discussions of holiday plans or of holidays taken; and, in the laughter of the jokes and the banter we make together.

It may not feel like church and indeed it is not church in the sort of formal, religious service, sat in rows, singing hymns, listening to readings and sermons which we think constitutes church. It is church in a much wider and possibly deeper sense. It is a place where no one is turned away, all are welcome, old or young, people of all faiths and people of none. You don't even need money as there is no charge, there is a basket for donations by the door where no one monitors who gives what. No prayers, no hymns, just a simple hot drink and a biscuit and making time for each other.

In an age where companies, government and the NHS have pushed human contact well down the list of priorities, compounded by the way we have become used to isolation in the pandemic, our small gathering is, I hope, a place of genuine warmth and love where we can establish real relationships. A place of encounter where we can all be valued and know through this the love of Jesus.

The last verse of Marty Haugen's song 'Let us build a house where love can dwell' is what I think of when I hear the word “church”. We find it on a Wednesday morning as we share our coffee and biscuits:

Let us build a house where all are named, their songs and visions heard
And loved and treasured, taught and claimed, as words within the Word.
Built of tears and cries and laughter, prayers of faith and songs of grace,
Let this house proclaim from floor to rafter: all are welcome, all are welcome in this place

So, if you find yourself feeling in need of company or at a loose end or just fancy a drink and a biscuit on a Wednesday morning, come and join us between 10.00 and 11.15 at the Miss Ward Room in the Methodist Church. All are welcome in this place.

Collective Village Oil Buying Group - Is Now Active Again

Next Order Early September

The next oil order is planned for delivery:

Approximately from early September with Order cut-off Friday 12 August 2022.

Please note that due to the current volatility of the oil price BATA will currently only guarantee a price per litre if they can deliver within a week of the order. If not, the price will be confirmed up or down nearer delivery. Also current prices are unfortunately very much higher than previously currently around 90p per litre including VAT due to the economic situation. We will keep you in the loop on this after the order.

This is open to members of the Village Oil Buying Group and in addition anyone who wants to join in Sheriff Hutton, Lilling, Whenby, Farlington and Stittenham. There is no need to order each time.

If you have already given your details to the group, you will receive a reminder in advance of the deadlines asking for confirmation on whether you require an order and if so the details.

The group, run by volunteers purely for the convenience and to provide savings to Villagers, was set up many years ago buying heating oil as a group for Sheriff Hutton and Lilling. It now includes in addition Whenby, Farlington and Stittenham. This offers a saving on ordering individually of up to 10%.
