### **Supporting Children 2-14 years Joint Fundraiser**

Well, another year over!

Our aim was to spread the net and not only support the Samaritan's Christmas Shoe Box Appeal, but also charities closer to home that are involved with children aged 2-14 years old. IDAS came to us through a contact and ongoing support within our core group and the Village, for Malton and Norton Food Banks, seemed like a good fit and enabled us to align our efforts.

### So, what were the outcomes?

Firstly, Samaritans Shoe Boxes. We hit our target of 100 Shoe Boxes which is brilliant, and they have now been taken to the Upper Poppleton drop off point.

Secondly, IDAS, a Yorkshire based Charity offering Independent Domestic Abuse Services including refuges. Approximately 5 boxes of cuddly toys, toys and games, crafting material, colouring items, puzzle books, toothpaste, tooth brushes, knitwear and sweets, were donated. This is an increase on last year and they were absolutely delighted.

Thirdly, the money raised and donated. We started the year with a fundraiser, running the Village Market Café, and after other donations and costs deducted, we had enough money to donate the following:

- Samaritans Shoe Boxes to help with carriage and their costs, £330.
- IDAS, £160.50.
- Malton and Norton Food Banks, £160.50.

Saying thank you never seems enough, but please know that to all who contributed their time, donated items, money and craft skills knitting, your support has been amazing, and we could not have achieved what we have, without you. A truly heart felt thank you from us and all the children who will benefit from a little kindness at a time of need.

Special thanks also go to the Methodist Church Community who give us the space to collect, pick and pack all the contributions; and Puddleducks Nursery, who's children wrapped and packed their own Shoe Boxes to help other children.

The Knit and Natter Group continues to meet on Mondays at the Methodist Church 10-12noon, where some of us will start knitting hats and scarves all over again for next year. All are welcome though no matter what project you might be working on, or would like to get involved in.

### **Disturbing the Peace – A Traumatic Story**

It will not be unusual if this Advent you receive Christmas cards proclaiming "Peace" in words and images which evoke tranquillity, harmony, creativity and stillness. Yet the way in which Matthew gives us the story of Jesus' birth is shot through with trauma. Joseph struggles with the shame of his fiancee's pregnancy and sees this only as the end of their relationship, not the beginning. Herod is perturbed by the threat of an alternative monarch and perceives that the only way to ensure peace and control is through violence. Numerous parents have their young children ripped from them because a tyrannical king's intelligence techniques let him down. Those who manage to get away find themselves searching for asylum in frighteningly strange places. And all of this while travellers from some distance come and go, leaving their mark by unwittingly and unwisely alerting the current king to the birth of a possible rival, by offering extravagant and thought-provoking gifts, and then clearing off home safe and sound, untouched by the instability raging around Jerusalem and Bethlehem.

The first two chapters of Matthew's Gospel are, of course, a prologue, and as such they encapsulate for us the significant themes of the whole book. Chief among these is the tussle between the values of God's kingdom and the values of Herod's and Caesar's kingdom – the tussle between seeking peace and justice through non-violence and seeking peace through violent control and oppression. Violence and victims are not simply to be found in the story of the massacring of innocent young children, but occur on a number of other occasions too.

Perhaps the question that lies before us this Advent as we engage with Matthew's story is whether we wish to sail through the narrative in the way that the wise men do, coming and then going, bringing their gifts and then returning to the relative safety of their homeland, or whether we are prepared to take seriously the depth of the text in all its trauma, recognising that it poses for us the choice between God's values of trust, hope, vulnerability and community and Herod's values of fear, control, power and isolation.

You might like to take time over the next few weeks to see the story from alternative perspectives, perhaps not only those of the main characters, but also those that remain unmentioned or unnamed: Mary's parents, Joseph's best friend, a soldier ordered to kill a baby, a mother hiding her infant....

And then ask yourself how this may have deepened your understanding of contexts such as Gaza, Israel and Lebanon. David Bidnell (Methodist Minister)

### Sheriff Hutton Bridge CC

It was a sad end to the season that two finals containing "Bridge" boys were not played due to weather — The National MCC 16 Hub final featuring The North against London at Denby in Derbyshire; Sam Giannini was picked from the York Hub to represent the North. The York and District U9 final against Barnsley with SHB boy Nick Armitage down to play was again abandoned without a ball being bowled. However, it was good to see Will Bennison star in Yorkshire's U18 cup winning side, he is indeed an exciting player.

The MCCF Hub is a wonderful initiative with 126 Hubs around the UK; it is specifically set up by the foundation for girls and boys 11-16 age groups in state education with all the winter coaching and summer games free of charge. SHB had three boys involved in the York Hub at U16 last season with Sam progressing to the North team.

Applications for next year's Hub are open now for girls and boys in State School education.

It is probably time to reflect on the first season under "new management" and by most peoples' standards it has been very successful. On the playing front all the goals set have been met with the continued youth policy starting to pay dividends not only in the senior teams but in the juniors where the experience of playing with and against adults on Saturday gives much more confidence when playing in their own age group during the week; four trophies out of six contested bears testament together with two U13s topping bowling and batting stats. A new kit supplier with newly designed one day shirts and training gear has brought a feel-good factor throughout all the players including the juniors. We are very grateful to the sponsors who add their name to the shirts and advertise through boards around the ground. A seniors dedicated training night has allowed some of 3rds and 4ths to train with the more senior players, the more able juniors also have been involved which helps them learn and gain experience.

The clubhouse furniture being replaced may sound trivial, but it goes a long way to endorse a period of change and hopefully a more willingness for people to belong to a developing club and encourage others to come and join us. Everyone is welcome at "The Bridge" whether as a player or helper.

We have four early recruitments, the return of Ben Gill, wicketkeeper/batsman who has had a five year "sabbatical" at Malton and Scarborough. Ben was part of the success in winning the Yorkshire Bowl in 2019, the whole club is looking forward to having him back; his experience will be invaluable. *Continued overleaf* 

Tom Shorthouse a batting all-rounder, joins us with an RAF pedigree and looks to be a very exciting player, he is joined by Yorkshire 2<sup>nd</sup> XI player Clarke Doughney, a left arm orthodox spinning all-rounder who has had three years with the Yorkshire academy having recently played for Middlesborough in the NYSD league.

The fourth recruit is not really a new boy, Revaant Rakyan returns as our overseas player. He was a wonderful addition to the club last year not only as a player but was always first to put his hand up to help out as necessary, A great hit with the juniors who he was always willing to help. We are looking forward to seeing him again.

The success of the 75<sup>th</sup> birthday party also seemed to galvanise the membership. It was a great day bringing old and new members together. The 100 and 500 club was launched at the party to raise funds for the new nets which are now seen as a priority, anyone who feels they can help either through business or personally please contact Mark Fisher or any other senior member via the club website or directly. There is some news breaking on this front which hopefully we will be able to share in the next copy of The News.

There is to be an overhaul of the league system with The Vale League and Beckett leagues supposedly joining the existing clubs in what will become a huge operation to administrate. There will be some great match-ups as some clubs face each other for the first time; no doubt on field discipline will have to be tightly controlled. More on this as it unfolds. Another note for the diary – Golf day 24<sup>th</sup> November at Sandburn Hall.

The ground staff have more or less put the grounds "to bed". Now that the grass has stopped growing the cutting equipment will be ready for sharpening together with all the required maintenance.

#### Review of the year and looking forwards

This year, the Nature Group has enjoyed a rich and varied season of talks, many with a local focus.
