What is happening over Christmas

We have lots of lovely events and services over the Christmas period – something for everyone.

Saturday, 29th November – Victorian Christmas Market 11am-3pm. This is always a fabulous event with lots of stalls with a brilliant choice of Christmas presents, Bonnie and Fiona's pre-loved jewellery stall and of course Sally of Bluebell Café fame. Not to be missed!

Monday, 22nd December – our Village Christmas Celebration with folk Christmas carols, traditional carols and poems with the ever-popular Drummers and SHOC (Sheriff Hutton Occasional Choir). There will be a cash bar and complimentary mice pies, sausage rolls and other nibbles. The bar opens at 5.45pm and the singing starts at 6.30pm. This is always a really popular evening, and we look forward to seeing you there.

Christmas Eve – Carols in the Churchyard – we usually end up singing in the church entrance as it has been too cold and/or wet to be outside. One year it even snowed! Join us for carol singing – you choose what to sing and Andy will be accompanying us on the keyboard. There'll be complimentary mulled wine and mince pies and we start at 11am. Children and dogs welcome. The children's area and dressing up box are always there, and we have Christmas outfits too, to help entertain smaller children.

Christmas Day – this is a family Holy Communion family service. You choose the carols too! Children welcome with as many Christmas presents as they want to bring. It's a friendly and relaxed atmosphere and please don't worry about children making a noise or moving around. The service starts at 10.00am.

In other news - it was lovely to welcome Amelia and Oliver Thornton-Berry back to St. Helen's for the christening of their daughter, Clementine Charlotte Grace. Amelia and Oliver were married in the church three years ago, so it was very special to have Clementine baptised there. Her parents, grandparents, godparents, close family and friends promised to support her as she grows up and in the future. The church looked lovely with candles and beautiful flower arrangements complete with little orange clementines.

Festival Church status

We had a really good meeting about how the church could be used more by the community with a group of village people co-ordinating various events. Ideas that came up were a Christmas Tree festival (sadly too late for this year), a flower festival, a toys (through the ages) festival, music events, beer festival, a murder mystery evening, another wedding dress display with christening gowns too, a remembrance concert, bake-off, a wedding fayre, pop up meals, history talks, arts in the pews with traditional crafts too, a treasure hunt to name but a few. The idea is that we will meet in the new year and plan a programme for the next 2/3 years so watch this space. It would be brilliant to have the church used more often and different people involved with the various events.

It was also felt that such events would be a good way of further bringing village groups together and working in a co-ordinated way around the events.

The pews were discussed with some people saying that weren't helpful as they segregate people and also prevented flexibility when it came to staging events. Others felt they added to the charm of the church. It was agreed that we needed to explore what was possible with the pews given that the church is a Grade 1 listed building i.e. a feasibility study. Parking was also discussed, and it was recognised that this was an issue, perhaps limiting attendance at events to local people.

Festival church status isn't about money because even if there was no income coming in, there is enough money to cover the next 7 to 10 years. We have reserves which are put aside for the building. What we are short of is people. Festival church status means we would have to have a minimum of 6 services each year with an emphasis on festivals e.g. Christmas, Easter, harvest, Remembrance and so on. Our plan would mean more than that. The church would still be available for weddings, baptisms and funerals. The idea is that it would free up time and space to concentrate on community things.

One of the next steps is to explore what a Community Trust, which would be part of the Festival Church model, would look like and what its responsibilities were. We do know that it would focus far more on the community and how the church can be used .

It felt a very positive meeting and huge thanks to everyone who came and to those who volunteered to be on the co-ordinating group. We will start pulling things together in the new year and planning next steps. We will keep you updated.

Sheriff Hutton History group

Our speaker last month was Glennis Whyte who told us all about “The House built on Love & Chocolate”. This was the story of “Goddards” – the Terry family home – and of the Terrys who built it and their family. The origin of the Terry’s Chocolate business was a firm of confectioners founded in 1767 which eventually became “Terrys” and by 1867 was managed by Joseph Terry, who died in 1898.

Joseph had married twice which became a cause of internecine strife in the later years of the family with difficulties for the children of his first wife. His son Thomas, father of Noel, died young and his grandson Noel fell in love with, but was forbidden to marry, Kathleen the daughter of another Terry’s manager. After a long period of separation and the exchange of a massive archive of letters he did eventually marry her in 1915, and it was with her in 1927 that they had Goddards built and furnished.

The house (which is in Dringhouses down the Tadcaster Road) is now in the care of the National Trust and is a fine example of Arts and Crafts architecture designed by Walter Brierley. The furnishings – an amazing Georgian period collection – were left separately to the York Civic Trust and are now in Fairfax House in York.

Altogether this was a most interesting talk, copiously illustrated with images of the house and garden and a strong incentive to go and visit the gardens when they are open next year.

The Wonder of the Ordinary: Luke's Christmas Story

The account of Jesus's birth in Luke's gospel is grounded in the lives of ordinary people. At its centre is the idea that God reaches into the busyness and simplicity of everyday existence, inviting the unremarkable into a remarkable and transformative story. This is not a tale of the mighty or the powerful, but of ordinary people joining in God's extraordinary plan.

Consider Mary, a young woman from Nazareth, an unremarkable, insignificant, farming village in the north. Probably in her teens, she was not famous, wealthy, or influential. Yet, when the angel Gabriel arrives with the extraordinary message that she will bear God's son, she says 'yes'.

Mary's 'yes' becomes the opening act of the most world-changing event in history.

Joseph, too, is no celebrity. He is a carpenter, a tradesman, quietly committed to doing his best for his family. It is through Joseph's courage and faith in saying 'yes' to God when it would have been so easy to say 'no', that Mary and Jesus are protected and cared for.

The shepherds, perhaps the most ordinary of all, also play a pivotal part. Their lives, spent on the margins and often ignored by society, are interrupted by an angelic announcement of great joy. They receive the good news before any king or priest, and their response is an immediate and wholehearted 'yes'. They leave their flocks, hurry to Bethlehem, eager to witness God's work, and then become the first to share the news, filled with simple, contagious joy.

Luke's gospel highlights that God does not require worldly greatness. Instead, God seems to delight in using the everyday, the humble, and the overlooked. The birth of Jesus takes place amid the ordinary sounds and smells of a stable, among animals, hay, and straw, with no grandeur or ceremony, only the willing presence of those who said 'yes' in their ordinary circumstances.

This message remains relevant today. Each of us, in our 'ordinariness', is invited into God's story. We may not feel special or gifted, but the gospel teaches that our availability, not our ability, is what matters. This Christmas, as we celebrate, let us remember that God's love reached into a stable, and it reaches into our lives still, inviting us to take our place in the story, just as we are. There is wonder in the ordinary, and in it, we find ourselves at the very heart of Christmas.

This year we had our most popular visit to date to Forest of Flowers at Huby, contrasted by our visit with limited numbers to Strensall Common to see and hear the shy Nightjar.

For talks we have featured from hedgehogs to remarkable Yorkshire trees, and from Farmland Birds to hearing a members talk about REGUA, a reserve for the conservation of the Atlantic Forest and its biodiversity in Brazil. We have plenty planned for next year.

Sheriff Hutton Hedgehog Project



Latest update on members and the project

We have now signed up 88 people to the hedgehog project including those locally and also some outside the area who have a particular interest.

Our project will continue next year; both collecting local sightings and also with more outreach and raising awareness on hedgehogs and linking up as a community. We may also be reaching out to groups further afield. We will keep you updated on this.

Hibernation time

Many hedgehogs are hibernating, but some are still around and would appreciate access to water and suitable food. Hedgehogs out at night and behaving normally are fine to be left to themselves. If you see a hedgehog out in the day it will need help. Please secure in a box with a blanket, water and a covered hot water bottle which it can move off if it gets too hot, take a photo to show size and condition and contact a hedgehog rescue. The British Hedgehog Preservation Society (BHPS) have a current list of local rescues with spaces on 01584 890801. Many are full currently.

Winter sightings

If you do spot a hedgehog this winter, please let us know! Your sightings help us keep our records up to date, especially if it's in a new location. Be careful when tidying your garden as hibernation nests can be hidden under leaves or vegetation.

Christmas presents

It's a great time to think of a hedgehog themed present to support hedgehog research and bring enjoyment. Peoples Trust for Endangered Species (PTES) and BHPS have examples, or you can buy a hedgehog house or feeding station.

Sightings

We are working on the latest sighting records sent in and preparing these to be sent to our local ecological data centre. So, we will be giving an update soon.

Village Ramble

There is no village ramble in December but we will kick start the new year with a refreshing walk on Thursday 29th January, details of which will be in the January newsletter. Merry Christmas and a Happy and Healthy New Year to all in 2026.

Sheriff Hutton Village Hall Decarbonisation Project

During the past few years, we have taken some major steps to improve the hall's energy efficiency by installing the large photovoltaic array, replacing single glazed windows and doors with high performance low-E double glazed windows and installing more efficient electric water heaters. The next, most effective step in this process is to replace the oil-fired boiler by installing two different types of Air Source Heat Pump, comprising a heating and cooling system for the main hall space and a second system that will be connected to the existing hot water and radiator network for the ancillary kitchen and meeting rooms. These systems will be supported by additional photovoltaic panels and battery electricity storage together with improved thermal insulation with the aim of eradicating all Co2 emissions. As a direct consequence of increasing the thermal insulation of the building, we will have to replace the existing acoustic wall and ceiling finishes, and we will also be changing the lighting throughout the building to LEDs in order to reduce energy consumption.

The project is ready to go, having benefited from an initial grant from Net Zero Hub which has enabled us to complete a feasibility study and a fully costed design report with detailed drawings and specifications. These have been used as the basis for invitations to tender being issued, with a subsequent short-list of contractors having been decided on by Trustees. We estimate the cost to be in the region of £324,000, the vast majority of which we will need to raise from grant funding or other external funding sources. Further details are below.

We had hoped to undertake these works in the summer of 2026, which would include replacing the old boiler as this has been on its last legs for some time. However, to date we have not been able to secure any significant funding, and the old boiler has also recently been condemned necessitating the purchase of a new boiler as an interim solution. We expect the hall to continue to be open on a "business as usual" basis until at least Autumn 2026.

BACKGROUND to this Decarbonisation Project

The Village Hall was built in 1980, to the energy standards at that time. Since then requirements have increased enormously, and the energy use of a building now is about one fifth of what it was in 1984. In addition, the cost of crude oil has gone up by 286% from 1984. Over recent years the Village Hall Trustees have been taking steps to improve the thermal efficiency of the building, and to lower its carbon emissions. They have; installed photovoltaic panels to generate electricity and income; replaced single glazed windows and doors with efficient double glazed ones; and they have installed more efficient electric water heaters. In 2023 the Village Hall was part in a project run by North Yorkshire Council to look into decarbonising Community buildings. This was followed up by a more detailed assessment of the Hall in 2024. Following that, Trustees secured a grant of £11,300 to fund environmental consultants D3 Associates, to work with them, to develop a detailed design to make the building carbon neutral. This is something that we can do to help to address global warming, and it will shield the Hall from rising fuel costs. The design was completed in January 2025, and competitive tenders were invited for carrying out the building work. The total anticipated cost is £324,000. The Trustees are now working to try and raise this money, mainly through grants. The Hall does have some reserves, but we need to raise as much as we can from within the Community. We are committed to implementing the project, to do our bit to tackle global warming and to create a more robust, sustainable building for the future. The proposed works involve; Increasing the building's thermal insulation where possible. Removing the oil fired boiler. The Hall will be heated by an air-source-heat-pump, with convector fans at high level. This will be able to both heat and cool the main hall.

The rest of the building will be heated by a second heat-pump, that will heat the existing radiators. Additional photovoltaic panels will be added over the Kitchen roof, and electricity storage batteries will be installed to allow us to use more of the power that we generate. As a result of increasing the

insulation in the Hall, the acoustic tiles to the walls will be replaced with the acoustic timber slats, and the ceiling tiles will be replaced with a perforated acoustic plasterboard. All lighting, including the Stage Lights, will be replaced with LED fittings, and hot water will be provided by instant electric water heaters. It is thought that the building work will require the Hall to close for up to 8 weeks, and it is impossible to predict how long it is going to take to raise the funding. But Trustees will keep the Community informed of progress and will give as much notice as possible as to when the works will take place.
