Dark Sky Friendly Village Initiative – Something for Village News Area in 2026?

We had a fantastic talk given in Sheriff Hutton on 3rd December by Richard Darn on **Dark Skies – Why they Matter**. Richard is an astronomer and a Dark Skies Advisor. He has worked with Northumberland, Yorkshire Dales and North York Moors to get them International Dark Sky Status which is no mean achievement.

Why are Dark Skies important?

- **Dark Skies have a positive impact on human health/sleep and well-being and reinforce a sense of tranquillity.**
- **Targeting lighting reduces cost of electricity and greenhouse gas emissions.**
- **Approximately one third of UK wildlife is nocturnal – light pollution is a serious threat to nature.**
- **A chance to enjoy star watching and looking for the Northern Lights locally.**
- **Light pollution is brightening the sky by 10% a year**

We don't expect a completely dark sky around where we live for practical reasons and we are affected by artificial light in York. But we could be involved in looking at becoming a **Dark Sky Friendly Village**. Bulmer and Terrington have achieved this, and we were advised that Easingwold are looking into it also and possibly one of our villages within the Village News Area. Wouldn't it be great to put the Sheriff Hutton area on the map also as a forward-thinking village/s environmentally.

What are we looking at?

We are looking at how our existing lighting in the village can be improved. It is not about getting rid of lights but trying to use lights correctly by shielding light down to where it is required and looking at where and when the light is actually needed. It is also not about being negative about current lights but providing advice on possible improvements. There are now a range of alternative dark sky friendly lights on the market.

It would be great to come together as a community to be involved in this.

How do we do this? There are various steps we would have to take including looking at lighting within the village/s involved, then undertaking a significant light improvement project e.g. for a particular building. We are awaiting feedback from Howardian Hills National Landscape and NYCC re Highways as to whether they could provide some support if we proceeded with this project.

Cost? There would be a cost involved but should that put us off or should we be looking at ways of endeavouring to cover this?

The most important step is to demonstrate that there is community support.

Turning cast offs into cash

Sheriff Hutton History Group

Our final meeting for 2025 saw us welcome a visit from Paul Bennett, a volunteer with the Commonwealth War Graves Commission. Paul gave us an insight into the organisation and work of the CWGC with a short introductory video followed by an in-depth look at details of sites and with anecdotes of some of those commemorated.

The CWGC was set up in 1917 to record the resting places of casualties in WW1 and its remit was then extended to cover the fatalities of WW2 but no later conflicts. Worldwide there are some 23,000 locations where graves, memorials and associated buildings are maintained by them and in Northern England alone some 41,000 individuals are commemorated at more than 2000 sites. Those commemorated were all members of the armed or civilian services and include the three grave markers which are in our own churchyard.

Paul showed us numerous illustrations of sites and memorials, pointing out the variations in standard grave markers and showing some of the personal messages that relatives can have cut on the lower part of gravestones. As well as talking about some specific individuals he told us that when previously undiscovered or unknown remains are identified, new inscriptions or grave markers will be made.

Maintenance of existing memorials and cemeteries is a big part of the CWGCs remit and to date they have already replaced some 25 thousand damaged or worn memorials. They also maintain a comprehensive research facility and library which can be visited by members of the public as well as accessible online facilities.

This was a particularly interesting talk and we are most grateful for the time and information Paul gave us.

Bingo!

At the end of 2025 on December 5th we ran our widely-renowned *Grand Christmas Prize Bingo* in Sheriff Hutton Village Hall. It was a great evening and raised £720.00 for the church. We give our thanks to everyone who contributed prizes for the event, the band of people who 'made it happen' and, of course all the people who paid to a fun and prize-laden evening.

Restoring the Bells of St Leonard's

During the autumn of 2024 the Parochial Church Council recognised that restoring the church bells at St Leonard's could not be delayed much longer - both in the important interest of protecting two bells of historical significance and ensuring the safety on visitors to the church. We knew what the work would involve and had an indicative price for the project. All we had to do was obtain formal approval from the Diocese, engage with contractors and raise about £22,000 – yes, that's all !! Remarkably, and to our great delight, all those challenges have been met – we have the formal approval, we have formal estimates and we have contractors 'ready to go.' And, very importantly we have the necessary funds in the bank or promised as staged payments as the work progresses. As a result, the scaffolding is being erected on January 6th, the bells will be taken down and go to a specialist factory in Oxfordshire and the stone bell turret repaired. The target for completing the project is the end of March – Farlington's bells could be ringing on Easter Day.

We have been fortunate to be awarded some significant grants for funding the project. But, at the same time we have been overwhelmed by the support from individuals who have come to our fundraising activities or given personal donations – collectively, your generosity is contributing a magnificent 25% of the total cost. **Our thanks to you all.**

While the work is progressing, we may have to restrict access to the church but we will endeavour to keep it open as much as possible.

Latest outreach sessions

Preschool activity

We recently had our first preschool session for the Hedgehog Project after a request from Badger Hill Preschool, York. We had a great time in a Forest School morning, talking about hedgehogs particularly about sleeping over winter. We read a story about **Ned the Hedgehog looking for a home** with audience participation and we looked for some toy hedgehogs who were hiding. Fun for the children and the staff and their parents got a handout about what they had been up to.

25th Anniversary North and East Yorkshire Ecological Data Centre (NEYEDC) Meeting

At the time of this going to press we are preparing a display about the project for the NEYEDC day conference in York on December 7th. Our data is held by the NEYEDC for use by researchers and planners and so it is great to be able to talk about our project over the lunchtime break with fellow nature enthusiasts at their first ever meeting.

Outreach in 2026

We'll be planning more outreach sessions in 2026 about hedgehogs and the project. We have prepared sessions for preschool, primary school and adult groups so if you know of a school or group who may be interested locally, we would love to hear from you.

Hedgehog Sightings

We will be providing the updated map of local hedgehog sightings for the whole of 2025 early next year to members. We will start collecting new 2026 sightings in earnest in the Spring but if you see a hedgehog in the meantime do let us know via the project. Hedgehogs can be out for spells during the winter. So, it is great to keep water and dried kitten biscuits or approved hedgehog food available when you can.
