In addition, this person must attend at least 2 meetings within the past 12 months prior to the year he/she wishes to take out a petition to become a Board Member.





Greene County Agricultural Society Constitution and By-Laws

ARTICLE I- TITLE

This organization shall be known by the name: Greene County Agricultural Society.

ARTICLE II- OBJECTIVE

The objective of the Society shall be for the improvement of agriculture, horticulture, better livestock, improved home economics, art, and to promote and showcase agriculture, industrial, commercial, and educational interests of the county.

ARTICLE III- MEMBERSHIP

1. Any resident of Greene County of legal voting age may become a member of the Society by purchasing annually a Membership Ticket, which entitles the purchaser to one vote. (Membership fee to be fixed by the Board of Directors).

 All Membership Tickets shall be issued in the name of an individual. These certificates shall bear dates denoting the period of membership as for January I-December 31 of said year.

ARTICLE IV-VOTING

- 1. The annual election of the Board of Directors shall be held at the fairgrounds on the Wednesday of the fair week at a designated location between the hours of 4:00 p.m. and 8:00 p.m.
- 2. Members of the Society shall declare their candidacy for the Board of Directors by filing a petition signed by ten (10) or more members of the Society at least fifteen days (15 days) before the election of Directors is said to be held. Blank petitions shall be obtained from the Secretary of the Society.

 3. Said election shall be by ballot, Ballots must be marked opposite the name of each candidate voted for in such a
- opposite the name of each candidate voted for in such a manner that the intent of the voter is dear. All ties will be broken by a coin toss.
- 4. Members must show proper I.D. (Driver's License, picture I.D. or membership ticket) to cast a vote.
- 5. Only persons holding current Membership Tickets on the sale and hour of the election may vote.
- 6. No proxy votes will be permitted.
- 7. The president shall appoint three (3) judges and two (2) clerks to supervise the election and record results.

ARTICLE V-BOARD OF DIRECTORS

1. The Board of Directors shall consist of (I) member from each township and one from each city within the county. If there are no Candidates for the township or cities up for election, a candidate from any township or from any other

city from within the county may declare his/her candidacy for the position with no more than two (2) directors from each township or city. They shall be elected for three (3) year terms with one-third (1/3) of the Board being elected each year. The term of office of retiring Directors elect shall begin no later than September 1 in the year of the election. 2. Should a vacancy on the Board due to the death. resignation, or otherwise, the Board shall have the power to fill each vacancy by appointment until the next scheduled election, at which time Directors of the Society are elected. However, if suitable candidate cannot be found from the township or city whose position is being vacated, the Board may then appoint a candidate from any township or city from within the county. The appointee may then make him or herself available for election at the next scheduled election for the seat he or she was originally appointed to for the remainder of the unexpired term. The appointee may then continue to be eligible for election for the seat he or she was appointed to until defeated by a resident of the township or

ARTICLE VI-OFFICERS

- 1. The officers of this Society shall consist of a President, Vice President with the Board of Directors hiring the Secretary and Treasurer.
- It shall be the duty of the President to preside at all regular meetings of the Board and enforce the Constitution, Bylaws, and rules and call all such meetings as may be deemed necessary.
- 3. It shall be the duty of the Vice President to preside in the absence of the President.
- 4. It shall be the duty of the Treasurer to receive all monies; pay all orders drawn on him/her by the Secretary, report the full amount of receipts and expenditures at the first regular meeting of the Board after the fair; to provide a monthly report of the financial condition of the Society to the Board of Directors at each monthly meeting; and to pay all monies in his/her hands to his/her successor upon election or appointment of his/her successor.

This Board shall give bond to the satisfaction of the Society for the faithful discharge of his/her duties.

5. It shall be the duty of the Secretary to keep a record of the proceeding of all meetings; record all entries for premiums registered, the awards of committees; and make a full report annually to the awards of committees; and make a full report annually to the Director of Agriculture as prescribed bylaw.

- 6. The term, limits will be set at nine (9) years for President and would go into effect starting with the election of officers in 2009. ARTICLE VII-PRIVILEGES OF MEMBERS
- 1. The payment of an annual fee established by the Board of Directors constitutes any qualified person a member of the Society and entitles him to vote for the election of Directors and on any other matters on which a membership vote is required.
- 2. A Membership Ticket, properly presented at time of making entry, relieves the exhibitor of buying an Exhibitor's Ticket.
- 3. A Membership Ticket will admit member and children NINE years of age or under each day during the fair.
- 4. Membership Tickets for the following year may be purchased at the Secretary's office on the fairgrounds during the last three days of the fair and during the remainder of the year at a time and place to be announced in local newspapers and the fair catalog.

ARTICLE VIII-AMENDMENTS

- 1. The Constitution and Bylaws of the Society shall not be amended except by a majority of the membership voting in the annual election.
- 2. Amendments of Bylaws may be proposed by (A) a majority of the Board and Directors at a scheduled meeting voting in favor of placing an amendment on the ballot or (B) filing a petition with the Secretary of the Society at least two weeks prior to the annual election of the Board of Directors. Said petition must set forth the proposed amendment and be signed by not less than 25 members of the Society.

ARTICLE IX

The Board of Directors of the Greene County Agricultural Society may authorize the sale of the intoxicating beverages at the fairground events and receive revenue for the sales.

ARTICLE X


All board of director meetings will be held at 6:30 p.m. on the third Monday of each month.

ARTICLE XI

Anyone interested in becoming a Director of the Greene County Agricultural Society must be a member in good standing for at least 3 of the last 7 years: and/or being an active committee member of the Greene County Fair Auxiliary Committee. In addition, this person must attend at least 2 meetings within the past 12 months prior to the year he/she wishes to take out a petition to become a Board Member.

General Rules and Regulations

CAMPING RULES

- Each person camping must show proof of either: A
 weekly ticket in their name; A membership ticket in
 their name; or a current Greene County Agriculture
 Pass issued to 4-H/FFA, Advisors, species persons
 or any other form issued by the Greene County Fair
 Office Secretary; camping pass with camping
 number on it.
- No camping permits will be given out until passes are purchased.
- For security reasons, the Fair office must have written proof of those staying in the camper.
- 4. Sub-letting is prohibited. The person purchasing the camping space shall be the one occupying that space. The Fair Board has the authority to remove the camping vehicle from the camping spot and the vehicle parked in the reserved spot for parking with the camper without further explanation. No refund will be issued.
- Any person found in a camper under the age of 19 without adult supervision will be asked to leave.
- 6. No pets shall be allowed in the camping area. No skateboards; roller blades; ATV's; 4-wheelers; no livestock animals, bicycles, golf carts (other than those issued to the Directors of the Greene County Fair Board), upon finding any or all of the above, the Directors of the fair may remove them from the fairgrounds.
- All persons camping must display in the window of their camping vehicle the permit issued by the Fair Office. These permits will be checked during the week.
- All campers must park their vehicle in the correct reserved parking space assigned to their camper. If the vehicle is parked in the wrong space, it will be towed at the owner's expense. All parking spaces are numbered. Extra vehicles must park in the adjacent area by the pool.
- Campers shall maintain their own campsites free from trash and debris. NO OPEN CAMPFIRES. Any person leaving trash in their camping spot after the fair will be asked to return and clean up their lot or risk losing their camping for the following fair.
- Those wishing to have their campers pumped during the week must stop in the fair office the day before to set up an appointment.
- The Greene County Ag Society shall not be responsible for any loss or damage to either the camping vehicle, the vehicle pulling the camper or the property of those camping.
- Each camper is responsible for being respectful of other campers' property and each camper is expected to act with a mannerly attitude toward every camper.
- Alcohol is permitted on the fairgrounds only in the beer gardens. No open containers permitted on the fairgrounds at any time.
- 14. Campers in the back row by Livestock Barn 1 must be in place by dark on Wednesday; Middle row, by dark on Thursday; and front row must be in place by Friday prior to the fair. All campers must be backed in and must be within the lines of the camping space. Campers behind the Extension Office may begin bringing campers any time Wednesday through Friday prior to the fair.
- A "camping waiting list" is available in the Fair Office for those who wish to be placed on it for camping at future fairs.
- 16. The Greene County Fair Board shall not be held responsible for any camper that has been moved or altered in any way. In addition, the Fair Board will not be responsible for lost or stolen articles of campers. Any problems that arise during the time of camping should be reported to the Superintendent of the camping department.
- The Greene County Fair Board and the Chairperson of the Camping Committee will have the final say in any disputes between camping parties.

RESERVED PARKING

Any vehicle parked on the fairgrounds during all fair days must have a reserved parking permit displayed in the front window of the vehicle. These permits are available for purchase in the Fair office. Entering the fairgrounds without the proper permit is in violation of parking rules and the vehicle's owner will be charged for towing the vehicle from the illegal parking space. If you have a reserved parking permit, make sure you are parked in the right space or you may be towed from that space at your expense.

Those persons entering the fairgrounds on Sales Nights are required to either have a reserved parking permit or park in the adjacent lot next to the fairgrounds. No person should be allowed by those persons on the gate to enter the fairgrounds without a reserved permit in their window. Should you be given false information regarding parking on the fairgrounds without a permit, your vehicle will be towed at your expense. It is then your responsibility to contact those persons working on the gates for reimbursement for towing expense.

All gates have special permits with the number of the gate on the permit. Do not try to enter a gate with the wrong number permit.

BRINGING FEED ONTO FAIRGROUNDS

All persons needing to deliver feed to the livestock barns should enter the Omalee Street Gate ONLY and each person in the vehicle, without a pass, will be required to pay \$8.00 to get into the fairgrounds. If you leave within 15 minutes the monies will be refunded to you.

BEHAVIOR ON THE FAIRGROUNDS

All persons entering through the gates of the Greene County Fairgrounds are expected to act in a mannerly and respectful way to all persons. Any person causing disruption will be escorted off the fairgrounds by a Deputy Sheriff.

ADDITIONAL RULES

No signs may be posted on trees or buildings.

No roving vendor or solicitor shall be permitted on the fairgrounds.

No political candidate shall roam freely upon the fairgrounds distributing campaign literature or tokens but must be limited to a rented fair booth or no more than 4 feet from booth.

ADMISSION TO FAIRGROUNDS

There will be a "NO RE-ENTRY" policy during the fair. Purchasing a weekly ticket for \$30 or Seasonal Ticket for \$25 will not only save you money but also will allow you to re-enter the fair. Single day tickets purchased at the gate will allow you admission to the fair only once that day. If you leave at any time and return to the fair later in the day or evening, you must again purchase a single day ticket

Deputy Sheriff's and Board Personnel will be patrolling the fairgrounds regarding persons trying to enter the fairgrounds without paying. Those persons will be escorted to the nearest gate and if they refuse to pay the entrance fee, they will be escorted off the property by a Deputy Sheriff.

No unauthorized cars, trucks, bicycles, skateboard; rollerblades, unauthorized golf carts, 4-wheelers, ATV's, mowers, tractors, motorcycles, or any other vehicles are permitted on the fairground.

NO DOGS or any other animal except service dogs are allowed on fairgrounds at any time. In addition, no livestock animals, horses, or any other animals are allowed on the midway or campsites, or anywhere unless authorized by a Fair Board Member.

The Greene County Fair Board has taken every precaution to have this book and its contents in proper order. Rules in this book as of the date of printing were accurate. If any changes in rules occur after the date of printing, these rules will take precedence.

HORSEMEN PASSES

Each horseman, who pays stall rent here and is currently paid in full, will be issued one (1) Horsemen Pass per stall. Owners, grooms, etc. must pay daily gate admission fees or purchase a weekly pass.

Right reserved to reject any entry, to declare off or rearrange program as conditions require. The USTA Rules are to be used, with the right to use Rule No. 13, Sec. 2 (b) if necessary. We reserve the right to race any double dash event as a single dash. We reserve the right to race any single dash as a double dash by adding 50% to the purse. In the case of a split, in other than the OCRA races, we reserve the right to classify the divisions. The Signature Series is a late closer. In the event more than 9 entries are declared in to start in the Signature Series, the race shall be divided and raced in divisions and each division race for an equal share of the total purse. Each division will race only one heat.

 $\underline{\text{SOLICITATIONS}}$ No person shall be permitted to make solicitations of any nature on the fairgrounds except with a contracted concession or commercially rented booth space from a Director in charge at the Greene County Fair. Anyone renting a booth space must stay within the confines of their rented space and not interfere with the fair patrons either coming into or going out of the fair gates or on the fair property. No persons shall be permitted to post or display signs, distribute handbills or advertising material or sell or distribute free, any merchandise, except persons under contract with the Greene County Agriculture Society Board of Directors. Each person under contract for the Greene County Fair must operate under the rules and regulations of the Greene County Agricultural Society Board of Director's. No persons shall misrepresent themselves for any reason. Greene County Fair Board reserves the right to investigate and take appropriate actions of any accusations of improprieties they deem necessary.

PROTESTS

A protest must be made in writing, signed and sworn to, and notarized by party or parties making the protest, and filed with the Fair Secretary by noon of the day following infraction. This shall be accompanied by a protest fee of \$50.00 cash or certified check, which will be returned by the Greene County Agricultural Society if the protest is sustained. Any costs shall be paid by the accused if the accusation is sustained and the accuser shall pay costs if the accusations are not sustained.

The Executive Committee will hear protests with the Superintendent of the department involved as well as two other board members appointed by the president of the Board. All protests will be considered at a time set by the fair board and all parties interested will be notified.

This procedure does NOT apply to the Speed Department, Rough Trucks/Tough Trucks or Demo Derby.

RULE VIOLATION AND TESTING FOR DRUGS

The following rules pertain to breeding and market animals of the following species: beef, dairy, swine, sheep, goats, rabbits, and poultry. Horses are governed under their own regulations

Tampering and/or misrepresentation as to breeding, age, ownership and any other irregularity in showing will be considered fraud and deception. Any premiums, trophies, awards or sale money won by such exhibitor will be withheld pending the outcome of protest filed by an exhibitor or fair management.

Should the violation be discovered after the sale, all sale money shall be returned to the buyer and the animal or carcass shall be returned to the exhibitor. Any artificial means of removing or remedying the physical defects or confirmation such as cutting ties or lifting and filling under the skin will be considered fraud and deception. The use of an artificial tail head or altering the natural color of a beef animal shall be considered fraud and deception. Neutral coloring only may be used. All animals giving evidence of such treatment will be barred from competition at the Greene County Fair. Should fraud or deception be discovered after the animals have been shown and prior to the sale, such animal(s) shall not be permitted to sell.

The animals placing next in line at the show will move up.

In all livestock and poultry classes, these regulations will be in full force and effect.

The Greene County Agriculture Society shall have the right to require places I through 5 in each class of animals, or any other suspect animal, to be subject to examinations or tests as prescribed by the Society to determine if a substance has been administered to the animal to change the conformation or temperament of the animals.

When satisfactory evidence has been obtained by the Greene County Fair Management that any of the livestock rules have been violated, the exhibitor and/or exhibitor's family may be barred from showing in any future Greene County Fair. In case any premium shall have been awarded to animals shown in violation of this rule, the Greene County Fair Management may request the exhibitor to refund all premiums, trophies, ribbons and sales money under such violation. Unless fraud and/or deception are involved, all championship placings stand.

The Greene County Fair Board has taken every precaution to have this book and the contents in proper order. Rules in this book as of the date of printing were accurate. Any changes in rules occurring after the date of printing will take precedence

- 1. Competition open to all areas.
- Any exhibitor showing disrespect to the Superintendent of the department or to the judge shall be ruled out.
- 3. Entries must specify owner's name and age and sex of the animal entered. No animal to be entered in the name of any other than the bona fide owner. Should any be found to be otherwise entered, they will forfeit to the Society any premiums awarded by the judges
- 4. No animal known to be barren will be allowed to compete for a premium simply at "best" animal in class. They are understood to be exhibited as breeders.
- 5. Where purity of blood stock on exhibition is required in its class, the same must be established by pedigree to be left with the Member in charge of the Department. The Herd Books to be standard authority for the pedigree to be left with the Member in charge of the Department The Herd Books to be standard authority for the pedigree of cattle, the American Stud Book for horses, and for sheep, swine, and poultry, the respective standard registers.

 6. All farm products, fruits, and vegetables must have been raised by the exhibitor.
- 7. For times entry animals must be on the grounds, see department rules. Notice also rules of Department.
- 8. No animals or articles, machinery or other exhibits shall be removed before the close of the exhibition without the permission of the President or Superintendent of the Department shows. See Department rules.

NOTE: Livestock authorized to show at the State Fair or an overlapping fair can leave the grounds early. Penalty for Breaking This Regulation: Owner Will Forfeit Premium

9. The Board will take every special precaution in its power for the preservation of stock and articles on exhibition after arrival and arrangement upon the ground but will not be responsible for any loss or damage that may occur. Exhibitors are required to give their attention to their removal. The board will not be responsible for stolen autos or other vehicles 10. Stalls and pens are numbered and will be assigned in regular rotation by the Superintendents in charge of the different departments, and persons occupying stalls require no right thereto, but may be removed at any time by order of the Superintendent of the Department. Straw/Bedding: Each exhibitor must furnish his own straw bedding. 11. Parking: All exhibitors must park in designed area.

12. ALL LIVESTOCK MUST ENTER THE GROUNDS FROM OMALEE DRIVE (off U.S. Route 68 N.) *There will be a 15 min drop-off area for feed, off the Omalee gate area inside the fairgrounds All persons in the vehicle must pay \$6.00 gate admission. A ticket will be issued if all people leave in 15 minutes - gate admission will be refunded with return of ticket. Must park in designated area only or risk being towed at owner's expense.

INSTRUCTIONS TO COMMITTEE

- 1. When any entry or livestock are not deemed worthy of premium, the judge shall not make any award. The committee shall have authority of the final decision.
- 2. Awarding committees will not consider the merit of any animal or article unit unless an entry card is exhibited corresponding in number with the entry on the Committee books.
- 3. The committee has the right to refrain from awarding the premium if winner does not have an Exhibitor Ticket or Membership Ticket, or be affiliated with FFA or 4-H.
- 4. No awarding committee shall award discretionary premiums nor attach premium cards to articles for which no premiums are offered. Awards in all instances will be in accord with judge's
- 5. No person shall be allowed to interfere with the judges during their adjudication, and any person who attempts, by letter or otherwise, an interference with judges, will be excluded from the competition.
- 6. If any exhibitor shall refuse the award of the committee, he shall forfeit the premium so awarded.
- 7. If there are not sufficient funds to pay all the premiums in full after expenses are paid, the premiums will be paid pro rata.

A complete list of livestock rules/tampering/ regulations is on file in the fair office.

NOTICE

- 1. Management aims to provide prompt and $\overline{\text{efficient}}$ removal of manure, garbage; rubbish, flies, and mosquitoes. Full cooperation of exhibitors and concessionaires will make it possible. 2. Exhibitors must place manure outside of building in area provided for loading. Manure must not be left on ramp or platform.
- 3. All exhibitors must use approved parking areas or risk being towed at the exhibitor's expense. 4. All livestock trailers and trucks must be moved to a designated area located adjacent to Fairgrounds at Greene Co. Parks and Rec. after unloading.
- 5. Any animal deemed to have a contagious or infectious disease by the fair veterinarian will be sent home. Any wart vaccine must have been administered 21 days prior to the fair.

The Firefighter Training Show plays off every child's curiosity to one day be a "Firefighter – Hero."

The show allows volunteers from the audience, kids & adults, to become our firefighter trainees (audience participation show). Fitted in Fire jacket & helmet, new trainees are introduced to the audience as the next generation of heroes. They are divided into two teams.

When the alarm tones sound it's all trainees on deck. Each firefighter trainee/team gets to complete the basic tasks at our simulated fire scene: laying out fire hose, attaching it to the fire truck and putting on a nozzle. They'll use a real fire extinguisher to squirt water at simulated flames in our smoke rescue building in hopes they can knock the flames out of the window. After putting out the fire they enter the smoke filled building to make a heroic style rescue, demonstrating how to crawl low under smoke. We use an odorless, non-toxic, white smoke which dissipates in about 1 to 3 minutes.

The dialog between our fire chief the audience and the new trainees is riddled with humor and educational information such as, in case of fire "Get Outside and Stay Outside" only firefighters attempt rescues. In between fire alarms, the fire chief also introduces important fire safety lessons "Don't Hide, Get Outside" and "Crawl Low, Under Smoke."

Nobody is left out of our show. After tower ones surprising water cannon shot the audience is invited to stay and all the kids can practice "crawl low, under smoke" through our smoke-rescue facility, touch and feel real firefighting equipment or have a photo taken dressed as a firefighter, looking just like the firefighters in the show. All post show activities are free except for the photo of the kids dressed as a firefighter taken with our camera and kids size fire helmets or other firefighter related toys we may offer for sale.

We have uniforms for age 2 through adult so anyone could become our next firefighter trainee.

FREE Junior Firefighters Play Station for the younger kids under 5.

 (H) "Director" means the Ohio director of agriculture appointed pursuant to
- section 121.03 of the Revised Code.
 (I) "Drenching" means the act of using an instrument, including a bottle, placed in an animal's mouth to orally administer a liquid, food, or any other
- (J) "Drug" means drug as defined in division (C) of section 4729.02 of the
- Revised Code and its metabolites.

 (K) "Drug use notification form" means the document completed in
- accordance with rule 901-19-06 of the Administrative Code.

 (Q) "Grand champion" means the highest placing livestock entry of a show.

- 901-19-02 Types of shows; slaughter. This is a mandatory rule. (A) The sponsor of an exhibition shall designate each of the shows held at the exhibition as one of the following types: terminal show, partial terminal show, or non-terminal show.
- (B) All of the following Junior livestock shows or classes at a fair must be terminal shows or partial terminal shows unless at least thirty days prior to the opening of the show, the sponsor has submitted a written request to exempt a show from this provision, and the director has provided written authorization granting this request prior to the start of the fair:

- (2) If the livestock carcass cannot be trimmed or reconditioned, it shall be condemned in accordance with the meat inspection requirement (L) Livestock entered in or eligible for a carcass contest prior to or during a terminal, partial terminal or non-terminal show must be exhibition drug residue legal at the time of show and eligible for immediate slaughter.

901-19-03 Auction sales at terminal or partial terminal shows.

- This is a mandatory rule. (A) A sponsor may hold an auction sale of livestock exhibited at a terminal or partial terminal show.
- (B) An exhibitor who exhibits livestock at a terminal show or partial terminal show consents to participating in the subsequent auction sale. (C) All bidders at an auction sale following a terminal show or partial terminal show consent to the slaughter of the livestock or delivery to a licensed livestock facility.
- (D) Title to livestock sold at an auction sale and subsequently presented for slaughter or sale at a licensed livestock facility shall remain vested in the exhibitor. If the exhibitor is not the owner, the title to the livestock shall remain vested in the owner until the livestock has been passed by inspection and released in accordance with paragraphs (K)(1) and (K)(2) of rule 901-19-02 of the Administrative Code and passes all testing performed by or at the
- direction of the department or the sponsor.
 (E) At the discretion of the sponsor, the sponsor may collect the sale proceeds from the successful bidder and retain the proceeds until the carcass of the livestock has been released, or may allow the successful bidder to withhold payment of the proceeds until the carcass is released. In the event the carcass is not released, the sponsor shall return the sale proceeds to the successful bidder.

 (F) Prior to the auction, the sponsor shall announce the identification of the
- exhibition livestock which have been administered drugs for which the withdrawal time has not elapsed.

No person shall:

(A) Administer or cause or permit to be administered a prescription drug to livestock either immediately before an exhibition or during an exhibition

- unless the prescription drug is administered:
 (1) By or under the supervision and direction of a veterinarian;
- (2) Only in accordance with label directions:
- (3) In conjunction with a valid veterinarian-client-patient relationship; (4) For a valid medical purpose; and,
- (5) A drug use notification form is completed and filed in accordance with the applicable requirements of rule 901-19-06 of the Administrative Code.
- (b) Administer or cause or permit to be administered an over the counter drug to livestock either immediately before an exhibition or during an

- drug to livestock either immediately before an exhibition or during an exhibition unless the over the counter drug is administered:

 (1) By or under the supervision or direction of the exhibitor, the exhibitor's designee, the owner of the livestock or a veterinarian;

- (1) By or under the supervision and direction of a veterinarian; (2) Only in accordance with the extra label directions provided by the

- (4) For a valid medical purpose;
- (5) A drug use notification form is completed and filed in accordance with the applicable requirements of rule 901-19-06 of the Administrative Code; and, (6) An extended withdrawal time is assigned to the drug by the veterinarian as part of the extra label directions and reported on the drug use notification
- (D) Show, sell, or offer for sale any livestock which contains an unlawful substance or has been subjected to unacceptable practices as outlined in rule 901-19-03 of the Administrative Code.
- (E) Show any livestock which contains a drug in an amount which exceeds the tolerance level if established or safe level; or, a drug for which the withdrawal period has not elapsed unless administered in accordance with
- paragraph (A), (B) or (C) of this rule. (F) Sell or offer for sale in an auction at a terminal or partial terminal show ar animal that contains a drug in an amount which exceeds the tolerance level if established or safe level; or, a drug for which the withdrawal period has not elapsed unless administered in accordance with paragraph (A), (B) or (C) of
- (G) Exhibit an animal which has been tranquilized.
- H) Make a false statement on a drug use notification form. I) Fail to file or update a drug use notification form as required by 901-19-06 of the Administrative Code.

- (L) Violate a mandatory rule (M) Violate any optional rule from which a sponsor or exhibition did not

901-19-06 Drug use notification.

This is a mandatory rule.

(A) The exhibitor and the owner of an animal are jointly and severally responsible for completing and filing out the drug use notification form in the manner required by this rule.

(B) The drug use notification form shall be signed by either the exhibitor or the owner. If the person signing the form is a minor child, the form shall be cosigned by a parent or guardian of the minor child.

(C) A drug use notification form shall be completed for every animal from which a test sample is collected at every terminal and partial terminal or nonterminal show, and for every animal that is administered a drug either immediately before or during an exhibition. (D) The director shall require a drug use notification form to be completed for the following livestock exhibited in a junior livestock show:

(1) Market steer;

(2) Market hog; (3) Market lamb;

(4) Veal calf:

(5) Market dairy steer; (6) Market goats; (7) Market poultry; (8) Lactating dairy cattle; and

(9) Lactating goats.
(E) The drug use notification form shall be filed with the records official prior

(F) The drig use individual or in This laid be flied with the records official prior to the show in which the animal is entered.

(F) The director may require a drug use notification form to be completed for livestock exhibited at any type of show including a non-terminal show.

(G) If the information on the form regarding drug use changes or if a drug is subsequently administered at any time after the drug use notification form is filed, an updated drug use notification form shall immediately be filed with the records official.

(H) No person shall submit an incomplete, illegible or unsigned drug use

(I) When a drug use notification form submitted to a records official for livestock is incomplete, illegible, or unsigned neither the exhibitor nor the owner shall, until the defect is corrected:

Owner stail, utilities to recurse. (1) Receive any prizes or awards from shows in which the livestock was exhibited prior to the time the drug use notification form was to be filed. (2) Participate in any shows or sales held subsequent to the time the drug use notification form was to be filed.

901-19-07 Quality assurance. This is a mandatory rule.

(A) Except as stated in paragraph (B) of this rule, sponsors shall require exhibitors at fairs sponsored by county or independent agricultural societies or the Ohio exposition commission to annually attend or complete a quality assurance program sponsored and conducted cooperatively by the exhibition sponsor, Ohio state university extension, Ohio agricultural education, or agricultural commodity organizations.

(B) At the discretion of Ohio state university extension, or Ohio agricultural

education, an exhibitor may pass a test based on the appropriate skill level for their age (twelve to fourteen or fifteen to eighteen) under the supervision for their age (twelve to rourteen or mitteen to eighteen) under the supervision of Ohio state university extension or Ohio agricultural education before exhibiting terminal or partial terminal market livestock, including market poultry, lactating dairy cattle and lactating goats in a junior livestock show. Youth who pass the test will be exempt from annual quality assurance recertification until they move to the next age bracket or they are no longer a junior exhibitor (nineteen years of age or older on January first of their last year). Minimum standards for youth food animal quality assurance are as set forth in appendix A to this rule.

(C) Exhibitors who fail to attend or complete a quality assurance program or fail to pass the exam as outlined in paragraph (B) of this rule may be subject to the disciplinary actions listed in rule 901-19-21 of the Administrative Code.

901-19-09 Drug residues in non-terminal show animals

This is a mandatory rule.

(A) A person may, notwithstanding paragraph (E) of rule 901-19-04 of the Administrative Code, show at a non-terminal show an animal which has been administered a drug provided they are in compliance with all of the

(1) The drug is a prescription drug or an extra label use of a drug and the drug is prescribed by a veterinarian pursuant to a valid veterinarian-client-patient relationship;

(2) The drug is administered or used only in accordance with label directions or the prescription;
(3) The drug is administered or used only for medical purposes; and,

(a) The original statistical control to the original purposes, and (4) A drug use notification form is completed and filed in accordance with the applicable requirements of rule 901-19-06 of the Administrative Code.

(B) Milk or other food obtained from livestock which has been administered or treated with a drug and permitted to exhibit pursuant to paragraph (A) of this rule, shall not be used for human consumption.

901-19-10 Testing requirements and test results.

This is a mandatory rule.

(A) Urine, blood, tissue and other test samples shall be collected in accordance with the department's protocol for the collection of livestock test samples at exhibitions. Test samples may be collected before, during, or immediately after a show. Deviation from the protocol shall be noted. (B) The director may at his discretion, collect any urine, blood, tissue, or other test samples from exhibition animals at the time of slaughter.

901-19-11 Humane treatment of livestock.

This is a mandatory rule.

(A) A person shall treat livestock in a humane manner and in accordance with acceptable commercial practices so as to protect the health, safety, and

welfare of the livestock.
(B) All exhibitors shall comply with and abide by the policy statement and "code of practices" of the Ohio livestock coalition.

901-19-12 Acceptable practices.

This is a mandatory rule. The following practices are deemed acceptable to protect and promote the health, safety, and welfare of livestock: (A) Adding caffeine free soda pop, gelatin, or other sweeteners to drinking

water in nominal amounts to encourage water consumption;

(B) Hoof trimming;

(C) Cosmetic dehorning in market class livestock:

(D) Using collodion as a teat sealant, but for no longer than eighteen hours;
(E) Adding molasses or other sweeteners to feed to encourage consumption;
(F) Properly administered and approved growth implants;

H) Beak trimming:

(1) Beak diffilling; (1) Dehorning; (J) Tattooing; (K) Hot or freeze branding; (L) Humane ringing;

(M) Tail docking:

(N) Ear notching; (O) Ear tagging;

(P) Shearing; (Q) Drenching of livestock for a medical condition at an exhibition when

diagnosed by a licensed veterinarian; (R) Acceptable surgery, including clamps, bands and chemical castration; and (S) Application of ice, ice packs, cold packs, or cold compresses prescribed to relieve heat stress or a medical condition diagnosed by a licensed veterinarian at an exhibition.

901-19-13 Unacceptable practices.

This is a mandatory rule.
The following practices are detrimental to the health, safety, and welfare of livestock and are prohibited:

(A) Applying any electrical, mechanical, or other appliance to livestock repeatedly or for a prolonged time period in violation of 9 C.F.R.313.2(1979); (B) Hitting, striking, beating, or otherwise impacting livestock that induces swelling or enhances, transforms or changes the true conformation,

configuration, or appearance of the livestock; (C) Applying any electrical, mechanical, or other appliance that enhances, transforms, or changes the true conformation, configuration, or appearance

of the livestock, unless prescribed by the exhibition veterinarian;
(D) Plugging of teats;
(E) Sealing of teats using unapproved substances or for longer than eighteen hours using approved substances;

(F) Injecting material into udders or teats for non-medical purposes or otherwise artificially modifying the appearance or conformation of the udder

(G) Using ice, ice packs, cold packs, or cold compresses internally or externally other than in accordance with paragraph (S) of rule 901-19-12 of

the Administrative Code; (H) Using a stomach tube or pump for any purpose other than for the relief

of tympany or gas on the day of exhibiting; (I) Drenching of livestock at an exhibition is prohibited except as permitted under paragraph (Q) of rule 901-19-12 of the Administrative Code.

901-19-19 Absolute liability.

This is a mandatory rule.

(A) Both the exhibitor and the owner of livestock are absolutely liable to discipline under rule 901-19-21 of the Administrative Code for the presence of an unlawful substance in livestock and unacceptable practices done to

(B) If the exhibitor or the owner was a minor child at the time the unlawful substance or unacceptable practice was detected, the parent or guardian of the person shall also be absolutely liable to discipline under rule 901-19-21 of

901-19-21 Disciplinary action. This is a mandatory rule.

(A) Any person who violates a provision of sections 901.70 to 901.76 of the Revised Code or any provision of this chapter is subject to any of the

following disciplinary actions: (1) Disqualification from any exhibition;

Disqualification of the exhibition livestock from any exhibition:

Written letter of reprimand:

Forfeiture or return of awards, prizes, premiums, or proceeds; or Pre-exhibition drug testing.

(B) Disqualification may include any or all shows and classes and may be for

(C) Anyone who violates rule 901-19-07 of the Administrative Code may be given a letter of reprimand for the first offense

901-19-31 Responsibilities of and assistance to junior fair exhibitors. This is an optional rule.

(A) A junior livestock show exhibitor shall be responsible for the continuous care, grooming, and preparation of the livestock entered in the junior livestock show

(B) An exhibitor may receive assistance in the care, grooming, and preparation of the livestock entered in the junior livestock show, provided that the assistance shall be limited to explanation or demonstration provided by the following:

(1) Family members; (2) Household members;

(3) Advisors or adult volunteers of 4-H or FFA in the exhibitor's club or

Vocational agriculture instructors:

(5) County extension agents; (6) Department representatives;

(7) Veterinarians

(8) Members of the exhibitor's 4-H club, FFA chapter, or other youth

(s) Merinders of the exhibitor's 4-rhoud, FrA driapter, or other youth organizations; and (9) Guest speakers of the 4-H, FFA, or other youth organizations. (C) Any person not specified in paragraph (B) of this rule who provides assistance to a junior livestock show exhibitor shall register in writing with the sponsor. The responsibility to register rests with the exhibitor. An assistant may register for more than one exhibitor. Failure to register constitutes grounds for disciplinary action against the exhibitor. Assistance shall be limited to explanation and minimal demonstration.

901-19-32 Breed shows or classes. This is an optional rule.

Unless otherwise modified by a mandatory rule, the rules of the breed association shall be accepted grooming practices for that particular breed's show or class

901-19-33 Prohibited grooming practices.

This is a mandatory rule

The following grooming practices are prohibited in junior market livestock shows unless those grooming practices are permitted under rule 901-19-32 of the Administrative Code:

(A) Using any substance to enhance or change the color of the livestock,

including the livestock's hide or hooves; (B) Adding any substance externally to build up, change or alter the shape or conformation of the livestock, including by way of example but not limited to rope, false hair, graphite, hemp, and powders; (C) Pigmented grooming aides or materials; and

(D) Slick clipping or body shaving of market hogs except on the ears and tails.

901-19-34 Outstanding market project competition. This is an optional rule.

An exhibition may provide for an outstanding market project competition in one or more classes. The competition may include an evaluation of the livestock, demonstration of the exhibitor's showmanship abilities, or a investors, definition and in the exhibitor's showman sinip abilities, or a skillathon or interview judging. The skillathon or interview judging may include demonstration of the exhibitor's knowledge of quality assurance principles, as set forth in an industry publication or in a publication such as the "caring for animals" handout or by viewing the "caring for animals video" available from a county extension office.

901-19-35 Recognition of disciplinary actions.
This is an optional rule.
(A) Disciplinary action by a sponsor against a person for a violation of sections 901.70 to 901.76 of the Revised Code or Chapter 901-19 of the Administrative Code shall be given full faith and credit and shall be honored

at all exhibitions.

(B) A person who has been convicted of violating sections 901.70 to 901.76 of the Revised Code shall be prohibited from participating in any exhibition for a minimum period of three years.

901-19-38 False, deceptive or unacceptable practices. This is an mandatory rule.

The following are unacceptable practices:

(A) Castration of livestock for purposes of this rule which exceed the following criteria:

(1) Cattle over eight months of age;

(2) Swine over seventy-five pounds; or

(3) Sheep over seventy-five pounds.

(B) Showing any market livestock which has been treated in accordance with paragraph (A), (B) or (C) of rule 901-19-04 of the Administrative Code when a side effect of the drug conceals, enhances, transforms, or changes the true conformation or condition of the livestock.

(C) Any natural occurrence or surgical process which results in testicular tissue remaining in the body of exhibition livestock except rabbits and

901-19-39 Ownership requirements.

(A) No exhibitor shall register, enter, or exhibit in a junior livestock exhibition any of the livestock listed in paragraph (R) of rule 901-19-01 of this rule unless the household, as defined in paragraph (R) of rule 901-19-01 of the Administrative Code, at which the exhibitor is registered at has owned the livestock for not less than the length of time listed:

(1) Market steers - one hundred fifty days;
(2) Market dairy steers - one hundred fifty days;

(2) Market Dairy steets - One managed may days;

(5) Market goats - sixty days;
(6) Veal calves - sixty days; and

(B) No exhibitor shall register, enter, or exhibit livestock in a junior breeding livestock exhibition unless the household, as defined in paragraph (R) of rule 901-19-01 of the Administrative Code, at which the exhibitor is registered at has owned the livestock or has had the livestock registered under the

exhibitor's name for at least sixty days.

(C) For any exhibition other than those listed in paragraphs (A)(1) to (A)(7) and paragraph (B) of this rule, the length of time a person shall own livestock before the person may register, enter, or exhibit the livestock at an exhibition may be set by either the sponsor of the exhibition or a breed association.

901-19-40 Meetings of the advisory committee on livestock exhibitions.

(A) Board meetings
A regular meeting of the committee shall be held at least once annually after the fifteenth day of October and before the first day of December. The committee may meet at other times as the chairperson or a majority of the committee members considers appropriate, provided the chairperson gives members written notice of any meeting at least seven days prior to the meeting.

(B) Notice of meetings

(3) Emergency meetings: Notice of date, time, location and purpose of all emergency meetings: Notice of date, time, location and purpose of all emergency meetings shall be given to all news media who requested prior notification, and on the department's website www.agri.ohio.gov.

(C) Any person may obtain prior notice of the date, time, and location of any regularly scheduled, special, emergency, or any of the aforementioned meetings when a particular type of business is to be discussed by requesting prior notification in writing from the "Ohio Department of Agriculture, Office of Animal Health, 8995 East Main Street, Reynoldsburg, Ohio 43068"; or by calling the animal health division at (614) 728-6220.

2023 Ohio Health Exhibition Rules

Chapter 901:1-18 Exhibition of Animals

901:1-18-01 Chapter's application.
(A) Animals listed in this chapter when moved or imported into Ohio for exhibition purposes only shall comply with the requirements of this chapter and when in compliance with the provisions of this chapter shall, with the exception of rules governing movement and importation of quarantined animals, be exempt from any other rules governing movement within or importation into Ohio.

(B) Animals moved within or imported into Ohio for any purpose in addition to exhibition shall meet all movement and import requirements of Chapter 901:1-17 of the Administrative Code.

901:1-18-02 Definitions.

90.1:1-18-02 Definitions.

As used in this chapter:

(A) "Exhibition" means any public show of animals which is sponsored by or under the control of an Ohio county or independent agricultural society organized under Chapter 1711. of the Revised Code; or the Ohio state fair; or which is assembled for a period which exceeds thirty-six hours or contains animals of origins other than Ohio.

(B) "Certificate of veterinary inspection" means a form from the state of origin which has been issued and completed by a licensed and accredited veterinarian attesting to the health status and identification of an animal listed thereon

listed thereon

listed thereon.

(C) "Approved veterinarian" means any licensed and accredited veterinarian approved by the Ohio department of agriculture, or an employee of the Ohio department of agriculture or the United States department of agriculture, animal plant health inspection service, veterinary services.

(D) "Licensed and accredited veterinarian" means a person who is licensed by the state of Ohio to practice veterinary medicine and who is certified by the United States department of agriculture, animal plant health inspection service, veterinary services, to be an accredited veterinarian.

(E) "Residue" means any poisonous or deleterious pesticide governed by 40 C.F.R. 180, any poisonous or deleterious substance governed by 21 C.F.R. 109.6, or any other substance governed by 21 C.F.R. 556.

(F) "Contagious or infectious disease" means any disease, including any foreign animal disease, or vector, capable of transmission by any means from a carrier animal to a human or to another animal and includes

from a carrier animal to a human or to another animal and includes dangerously contagious or infectious diseases.

(G) "Tuberculosis accredited free herd" is one that has passed at least two

consecutive annual negative official tests for tuberculosis in accordance with the "Uniform Methods and Rules - Bovine Tuberculosis Eradication", and has no other evidence of bovine tuberculosis.

901:1-18-03 Exhibitions: sanitation, inspection and records.

(A) Each entity sponsoring an exhibition shall have in attendance an approved veterinarian for the duration of the exhibit.

(B) Each entity sponsoring an exhibition shall:

(1) Immediately, prior to an exhibition and under the direction of the approved veterinarian, the oxhibition and disinfect each building, pen, stall, ring or other enclosure in which animals are to be quartered for

exhibition;
(2) Have the approved veterinarian:
(a) Examine the certificate of veterinary inspection when required for an animal brought to the exhibition;
(b) Inspect within a reasonable time of arrival each animal brought to the

exhibit for symptoms of any infectious or contagious diseases; (c) Daily inspect each animal present at the exhibition for symptoms of

(c) Daily inspect each animal present at the exhibition for symptoms of infectious or contagious disease.

(3) Maintain a record for one year from the date of the exhibition of each animal present at the exhibit. The record shall contain the name and address of the owner of each animal and the species and breed of the animal.

(4) May order the immediate removal of any animal which in the opinion of the approved veterinarian places other animals at unacceptable risk of

disease.

(C) An exemption from the requirements of paragraph (B)(1) of this rule may be requested from the department and will be granted when, in the judgment of the department, cleaning and disinfection will serve no purpose. By way of example only, cleaning and disinfection will generally serve no purpose in a newly constructed building that has never been

901:1-18-04 Exhibitors.

(A) No person shall present for exhibition or exhibit an animal which he knows or has reason to suspect is affected with or has been exposed to a dangerously contagious or infectious disease or residue.

(B) The owner or bailee of an animal with symptoms of an infectious or contagious disease shall, when directed by an exhibition official, the approved veterinarian, or an employee of the Ohio department of particulture, instead table, repeated the apiral from the exhibition premiser. agriculture, immediately remove the animal from the exhibition premises.

901:1-18-05 Poultry and fowl. (A) All turkeys, chickens and gamebirds moved within or imported into Ohio exhibition must:

(1) Originate directly from a flock or hatchery which is a participant in the national poultry improvement plan for the eradication of disease and be accompanied by documentary evidence that they meet the requirement of

(2) Originate directly from a flock which has had a negative test for

(2) Originate directly from a flock which has had a negative test for pullorum/frowl typhoid disease within twelve months preceding the opening date of exhibition and be accompanied by documentary evidence that they meet the requirement of this paragraph; or (3) Have had a negative test for pullorum/fowl typhoid disease, within ninety days, preceding the opening date of the exhibition and be accompanied by documentary evidence that they meet the requirement of this paragraph; or (4) Be tested for pullorum/fowl typhoid disease upon arrival at the exhibition by a tester approved by the Ohio department of agriculture and found negative.

(1) Must be accompanied by a certificate of veterinary inspection issued within thirty days preceding the opening date of the exhibition and be identified with official individual identification.

The Greene County Agricultural Society (Fair Board) has decided not to opt out of any Ohio Department of Agriculture grooming requirements for the 2022 fair season. What this means is that all swine planning to be shown and/or sold through the Greene County Junior Fair will need to have at least one-half inch of hair over all of the animal's body; the only exceptions are hog's ears and tail. The hogs will be carded by an outside professional again this year; and if the hog is determined not to meet the requirements, it will be exempted from showing and selling through the Greene County Junior Fair. The exhibitor will be asked to remove the animal from the fairgrounds by 8:00 p.m. on Saturday after weigh-in. Clipping will be permitted on the fairgrounds prior to the start of the exhibitors meeting help prior to weigh in. After that time, clipping on the fairgrounds will be prohibited. Failure to follow this policy will necessitate the animal and exhibitor being dismissed from the Greene County Junior Fair Swine Show.

All livestock must enter the fairgrounds from Omalee Drive Gate (Off Rt. 68). After unloading, all trailers must be taken to the trailer parking at the Greene County Parks and Recreation Parking. No trailers may remain in the reserve parking areas on the fairgrounds.

On the nights of the livestock auctions, all vehicles without the proper parking pass issued must park outside the fairgrounds. 4-H Fair Identification and Premiums

Identification badges and fair coins (if eligible) will be available during Pre-Fair Judging on Wednesday June 28th and Thursday June 29th. After pre fair judging passes/coins will be available in the fair office during regular office hours thru Sunday, July 30th. If badges are not picked up before fair, you must purchase a gate ticket for \$8.00 without reimbursement.

Each year the Greene County Agricultural Society awards premium coins to 4-H members who meet the qualifications as described in the 4-H rules.

Conditions for receiving identification and fair coins are that 4-H members MUST HAVE projects pre-judged and displayed at the 2023 Greene County Fair. After judging, a paper will be issued and signed for verification that the project is at the fair and completed. If no paper is presented the 4-H member will not receive identification and/or fair coins.

Any member taking non livestock projects will be eligible to receive \$10.00 in fair coins. Breeding animals qualify as non-livestock projects. 10 fair coins is the maximum amount each member will receive this year. If a member is in 4-H & FFA they will still only receive \$10.00 total in fair coins. No coins are given to Market Projects or Cloverbuds. Coins may be earned as incentives throughout the Fair.

Coins must be surrendered to the vendor upon purchase of items at the fair. Please do not ask for them back. If fair identifications/fair coins are misplaced or lost, they will not be replaced.

Any Identification lost will not be replaced for free; there will be a \$25.00 charge assessed.

MAIN PROJECTS

FFA Livestock: All FFA members' livestock projects must be on record with an agriculture teacher by March 1st of the current year. Livestock entries and exhibitors are subject to Junior Fair Eligibility and species committee rules. Any Animal to be considered "in state" must be within the borders of Ohio for four (4) consecutive months.

FFA Field Crops: Field crops must be grown by the member or as part of the member's family farm operation. Brand name, variety, and date planted are requested for corn and soybean stalk exhibits. A sweepstakes plaque will be awarded to the student with the highest number of points. Each A=5; B=3, C=1 point. A tiebreaker of overall quality may be used at the judges' discretion. Project examples include: Shelled Corn; Soybean' Wheat; Barley; Corn Stalks; Soybean Plants; and multiple Hay varieties.

FFA Horticulture: Garden crops or container plants must be grown by the member or as part of the member's family garden. All exhibits should be placed on plates in groups of three or in a potted container. A sweepstakes plaque will be awarded to the student with the highest number of points. Each A=5; B=3; C=1 point. A tiebreaker of overall quality may be used at the judge's discretion. Project examples include: Sweet Corn; Potatoes; Onions; Carrots; Peppers; Beets; Beans; Cabbage; Squash; Melons; Lettuce; Tomatoes; Zucchini; Grapes; Berries; Broccoli; Petunia; Geraniums; Marigolds; Begonia; or Inpatients.

FFA Shop: Shop projects exhibits may be constructed by members in the school, shop, or at home. Group or class projects may be entered, but are not eligible for awards. Exhibits will be judged using the following criteria; suitability or materials used in construction; quality of construction; and adaptation for agriculture use. Unworthy entries and entries of poor construction will not be placed on display. A sweepstakes plaque will be awarded to the student with the highest number of points. Each A=5; B=3; C=1 point. A tiebreaker of overall quality may be used at the judge's discretion. Projects will be placed in one of the following categories''' Welding and Metal; Ornamental Iron; Farm and Household; Lawn and Garden; Overhaul; Lawn and Garden reconditioning; Farm Equipment Overhaul: Fram Equipment Reconditioning; Tractor Overhaul: Tractor Reconditioning; and Wooden Equipment. Categories' may also be split into sub-categories of small, medium, and large based upon number of entries.

OTHER PROJECTS

FFA Photography: Several pictures mounted on poster board depicting FFA activities or appropriate picture of FFA member's projects. Judged on mounting, labeling, characterization, clarity, action, composition, accuracy, and neatness.

PREMIUMS

FFA members will receive an identification badge to get into the Greene County Fair (if eligible). To be eligible FFA members must be taking a livestock and/or non-livestock project.

Conditions for receiving identification and fair coins are that FFA members must have completed their project and bring that project to the fair for display. After bringing their project to the Assembly Building, each FFA student should contact their teacher for a verification paper stating their project is on display at the Assembly Building. If no paper is presented, the FFA student will not receive identification/and or fair coins.

Non livestock projects will be eligible to receive \$10.00 fair coins. Breeding animals qualify as non-livestock projects. If an FFA member is in 4-H as well they will still only receive a total of 10 fair coins. Coins must be surrendered to the vendor upon purchase of items at the fair. Please do not ask for them back. If fair identifications/fair coins are misplaced or lost, they will not be re-issued.

Identifications for FFA may be picked up at the fair office NOT BEFORE Wednesday, July 26th through Saturday, July 29th, 2023. If you fail to pick up your identification before the beginning of the fair, you must pay to get into the fair to pick up your pass and no reimbursement will be given.

GENERAL FAIR PARTICIPATION RULES

- 4-H is a youth program conducted in cooperation with the U.S. Department of Agriculture, The Ohio State University, and the Greene County Commissioners. The 4-H Program is supervised locally by the OSU Extension staff in Greene County. Local clubs are guided by volunteer 4-H adult leaders. The program is available to all clientele without regard to race, color, age, gender identity or expression, disability, religion, sexual orientation, national origin, or veteran status. Each person exhibiting or participating in the 4-H Club Departments must be enrolled as a member of an organized 4-H club in the project(s) which he or she is exhibiting.
- All ages are as of January 1 of the current year. 4-H exhibits are to be made for 4-H only. Any project done at school or during school hours or any project made for school or any other organization is ineligible.
- To be eligible to exhibit at the Greene County Fair, a 4-H member must have 3. selected their projects and be a member of an organized club by the county deadline. Youth must enroll projects online prior to the posted deadline.
- 4-H members are to assume the major responsibility of management, project care and construction of the project. Volunteers and parents should supervise and teach "how" but not do the actual work on the project.
- All projects and posters must be new each year. Violation of this rule will be cause for the project to be considered incomplete and, therefore, ineligible for
- 6. . Any misrepresentation or substitution of projects (i.e., age, ownership, class or exhibitor) will be cause for forfeiture of premium.
- All 4-H members are urged to exhibit their project at the fair. Ribbons, 7. fairbucks, and fair passes can be given only if the project is exhibited. Projects
- will be labeled with identification.

 An individual banned from participating in the Ohio State Fair or any other 8. Ohio county fair by an Ohio State Fair or County Fair Ruling, may not exhibit at the Greene County Fair while under suspension from that fair.
- The Junior Fairboard will oversee billing, collection, selection of trophies with 9 major responsibility for soliciting new and additional trophies.

 The Greene County Extension Office shall not be responsible for adult or child
- 10. on the Fairgrounds or in any barn at any time and will not issue any overnight passes or provide overnight supervision in the barns or anywhere else on the fairgrounds.
- All exhibitors will be expected to wear clean, neat, proper attire during all judging and fair activities. No halter tops, mid-drifts, spaghetti straps, tube tops, sleeveless undershirts, T-shirts, short shorts, sweatpants, or hats with writing. SPECIAL INTEREST RULES

After being judged, all projects are to stay for display in the Youth Building. Youth must Check-in their projects after judging. Release Time: Exhibits will be released on Saturday, August 5, 2023 6 p.m.-8 p.m. and on Sunday from 9-12 p.m. Projects must be picked up by 12:00 p.m. on Sunday, August 6, 2023. PLEASE NOTE: Any projects after this time will be available for pickup in the Extension Office starting on Monday at 10:00 a.m. Any projects left after August 11, 2023 will be discarded. Ohio State Fair participants will be selected by the pre-fair judge and posted before the registration deadline. For youth needing to pick up project displays for fair before the Greene County Fair starts, the building will be open July 27-28, 2023 for this pickup.

VOLUNTEER STANDARDS OF BEHAVIOR

These Standards of Behavior are accepted by volunteers who commit to an Ohio State University Extension ("OSUE" or "Extension") program as a condition of their volunteer status. GENERAL LIVESTOCK RULES

- 1. All 4-H members are to exhibit their own livestock projects unless they have two animals in the same class, a doctor's excuse, or are participating in another 4-H or FFA activity which is taking place at the same time. If an exhibitor feels they have an unusual situation which prohibits them from exhibiting their own animals, they should clear their situation with the respective department chairs prior to the show. In this event, another Greene County 4-H member may exhibit the animals, except horses and llamas.
- Exhibitors are expected to keep both their pens and aisles clean and orderly during the fair and are expected to clean their pens at the conclusion of the fair, according to Greene County Fair board policies. However, this should not be done while the sale is being conducted.
- Livestock entered at the Ohio State Fair will be released early from the Greene County Fair ONLY if there is a direct conflict between normal Greene County Fair release dates and Ohio State Fair arrival dates and times. A copy of a state fair entry form will constitute an early release if needed.
- 4. It is recommended that club volunteers and parents should use their own discretion as to the member size, maturity, and ability to carry out any livestock projects.
- All fans are to be installed according to the Greene County Fair board approved policies.
- When any rule listed in the Greene County 4-H Project Guide is violated, the exhibitor/or family/guardian and club volunteer will be verbally warned, the species committee has the right to disqualify the exhibit from the show or sale and no premium awarded.
- The same animals cannot be shown in Market and Breeding Class except rabbits and goats.
- 8. All animals are the responsibility of and are to be cared for by the member at the fair until they are released by the committee. Livestock exhibits not properly cared (as determined by the Species Committee) will first receive a verbal warning. After warning, exhibits not properly cared for may be disqualified from the show and/or sale and no premium awarded. Both exhibitor and club volunteer will receive notification if necessary.
- 9. All market animals will be shown by weight regardless of breed
- All breeding classes will be based on the age classification of their respective breed associations.
- 11. 4-H and FFA animals will be shown in the same class.
- None of the species committees are responsible for lost or stolen 4-H or FFA projects while at the fair.
- 13. Types of bedding permitted will be stated in the species-specific rules.
- All items displayed (i.e., signs, decorations, etc.) at the fair are at the discretion of the species committee.



- Each entry must be accompanied by a separate entry form and must be filled out prior to bringing items to the fair.
- Troops/group entries are one item worked on by more than one person.
- Individual items are items worked on by only one girl.
- Every effort is made to protect entries; however, neither the Greene County Fair nor the Girl Scouts of Western Ohio will be responsible for loss or injury to exhibits.
- Minimum size of each entry is 3"X5". Entries MUST be mounted to be at least that size or put in a box.
- Poster maximum size is 11"x14".
- -Clothing or sewn items, please provide a hanger.
- -All pictures, posters, paintings, and sketches must have a hook or cord attached for hanging.
- -**Food projects should have a picture of the girl with the food item as well as the recipes. No need to bring the actual food item as most will not last all week. Judging

- Judging will be done prior to the opening of fair. Judging is based on knowledge and experience gained. Originality, creativity, workmanship, and attractive appearance of item are points which are considered.

- Each item will be judged according to the category it is entered into. For example, a carpentry project will be judged on the amount of carpentry each group or individual put forth, rather than the way it is painted -Age and ability are considered in judging. Adult help should be kept to a supervision level only.
- Any item not meeting the above rules will be disqualified.

- There is no entry fee required.
- 1st, 2nd, and 3rd place ribbons in each class. Exhibitors will receive participation ribbons.

- Exhibits are open to residents of all Ohio counties.
- Exhibitors may enter in as many categories as they choose, but only one item may be displayed in each category from the same exhibitor.
- All entries/items entered MUST be the work of the exhibitor (Excluding Antiques).
- A fee is required for exhibiting at the fair:
 - Ages 9 and under: \$10 entry fee. (This does not include a ticket because children 9 and under get in free with a paying adult). Exhibitor may exhibit up to 15 items.
 - Ages 10-17: Three Options
 - i. 4-H/FFA members who wish to enter may do so for \$10 (their Fair ID badge is their admittance). Allows child to exhibit 15 items at no
 - ii. Pay \$15 and receive a Mini Exhibitor Pass which allows entrance to the fair for 2 days (No Re-Entry with this pass) and allows child to exhibit 10 items.
 - iii. Purchase a Seasonal Pass for \$30 and exhibit 25 items. There will be \$1 charge for each item over 25.
 - Adults 18 and up: Three Options
 - Purchase a Seasonal Pass for \$30 which admits one person into the fair for all 7 days and allows 25 items to be exhibited. There will be \$1 charge for each item over 25.
 - ii. Purchase a Membership Pass for \$25 (with this pass you must live in Greene County and be 18 years of age and older) the Membership Pass allows daily entry to the fair and allows pass holder to vote for Senior Fair Board members during the fair. Allows 25 items to be exhibited, there will be a \$1 charge for every item over 25.
 - iii. Pay \$15 and receive a Mini Exhibitor Pass which allows entrance to the fair for 2 days (No Re-Entry with this pass). 10 items may be

1. Potted plants must have been in the possession of the exhibitor for at least three months, must be in a water tight container or have a saucer beneath and labeled with named variety. Pot shall not exceed 18" in diameter. Any larger will be disqualified by chairmen in charge.

- 3. Containers will be furnished by the exhibitor and should have the exhibitor's name and address on.
- 4. Bases, mats, figurines and accessories may not be used in all classes unless specified. No artificial foliage, flowers, fruits, etc. may be used.
 5. Painted or artificially colored fresh plant material is never permitted.

6. In all classes, evidence of dirt, dust or spray residue should be washed off, all dead leaves and bugs removed and plants or flowers well-groomed before they are brought in for exhibit. No oiling or polishing permitted on foliage.

7. In order to ensure an adequate number of entries in each class, the committee reserves the right to combine, add, withdraw or subdivide a class as needed. Additional classes will be set up if entries warrant.

> Items may be brought in between 9:00 a.m. and 12 noon on Saturday July 29th, 2023. Late entries not accepted. Judge's decisions are final. Ribbons given to all.


