## 1 3730 N. Oakley Ave.



### Bell School Pollinator Garden

The Bell Pollinator habit was planted in the fall of 2019. It has all native plants and first flowers in April with blooms continuing until November. Plants are selected for soil types and availability. This garden won the 2022 Excellence in Gardening Award for schools!

## 2 3614 N. Leavitt St.



### Parkway Paradise

An elevated parkway and front yard garden filled with colorful annuals.

## 3 3630 N. Leavitt St.



### Air Bee-N-Bee

A backyard destination designed for pollinators, birds, and other beneficial wildlife. Beneath the shade of two towering mulberry trees, local and migratory birds stop by to enjoy a seasonal feast, while solitary native bees check into our custom insect hotel for safe nesting accommodations. Stroll through garden beds and flowering patches filled with milkweed, bee balm, buddleia, and other pollinator-friendly plants that provide nectar, pollen, and habitat throughout the growing season. Whether you're a bee, butterfly, bird, or garden visitor, the Air Bee-N-Bee offers a welcoming place to rest, refuel, and enjoy the sights.

## 4 3636 N. Leavitt St.



### Cornucopia

Come down to the southern end of the Garden Walk! See our front parkway and yard filled with primarily perennials, then stroll through our back garden where vegetables are growing and perennial, annual and ceramic flowers are blooming.

### Erica's Oasis

I have a large parkway box with an extensive fairy garden and gnome garden. It's a mix of perennials and annuals. I grow a lot of zinnias from seed and dahlias from tubers. I also have a backyard garden with a fountain and a garage roof deck garden with tomatoes and lots of boxes and raised beds with flowers.

### Birdie's Backyard

A welcoming urban backyard where hydrangeas and a stately birch tree frame spaces for gathering, dining, and play. Designed for family, friends, and long summer evenings outdoors.

Mature overflowing cottage type garden including shrubs, perennials, natives, bulbs, vines and even favorite annuals and veggies. By serendipity and plan, lots of vignettes of intense color and leaves coming and going throughout growing season even under the parkway difficult maple tree. Blue flowers are a favorite.

## 9 1931 W. Bradley Pl.



### Shady Haven

A towering mulberry at the front draws you in, opening onto a cool, shady retreat rooted by a magnificent honey locust. Japanese maples add bright touches of color to a lush green canopy, while an herbaceous border wraps around a stone patio and playful garden space. Overlooking it all is an outdoor living room, filled with succulents lovingly grown in the on-site greenhouse.

## 10 1936 W. Bradley Pl.



### Lorri's Haven

Parkway has a mature maple tree and a variety of perennials, with annuals for color. Lovely tri-colored beech highlights the front porch area. Backyard has four trees: maple, red-bud, apple and Japanese Maple and is bordered by a variety of shade perennials surrounding a lush lawn. Many potted annuals add color.

## 11 2011 W. Bradley Pl.



### Don & Juli's Garden

Our garden is a great outdoor living space, with three patios, a garden shed, and a variety of plantings. A large river birch is the centerpiece, surrounded by hostas and hardy geraniums. The front, west and south sections of the garden receive both sun and shade, while the east section is a shade garden. There are many varieties of hydrangea, including three climbers. We have lilacs and bridal veil for early blooms, as well as some flowering trees--serviceberry, redbud and a pink-blooming locust. A black sorgum attracts cardinals and provides great fall color.

### Hobert Dog Garden

The backyard has a new patio, highlighting the fireplace and a place to hang out with the dogs. Favorite trees are the Kousa dogwoods. I had to replace some dying arborvitae, so in the process of rebuilding.

Parkway Corner Gardens were established to support pollinators and reduce flooding.

### Urban Oasis

Trees have grown so much that this has become a shade garden over the last ten years. Aspens, a large Tri Color Beech, and a limited color palette of pinks, blues and whites highlight this garden.

### Furlong Frolic

In partnership with our neighbors to the west, we have a beautiful bed of flowering bushes, including peonies, rose mallow hibiscus, hollyhocks, a smoke bush and a butterfly bush. The flower beds are an ongoing experiment of annuals and perennials; seeds, bulbs and volunteers. You're all welcome to come see how it's turning out!

## 14 2026 W. Bradley Pl.



### Sit, Sip and Listen

A good spot to conclude your tour with music, drinks, and salsa tasting. Two neighbors combine (2024 and 2026) to create a large, open, sunny garden. No fence allows hollyhocks, a smoke bush, and peonies to shine. A very "hot" garage garden supports Asiatic lilies, sedum, menarda (bee balm) and assorted annuals. The salsa garden along the alley is filled with all the "fixings". Hostas are scattered throughout the front and gangway garden. \*\*St. Jams Band will be playing in the backyard 3-5 PM.

### Julie and David's Garden

The backyard features several 35 year old foundational trees and shrubs mixed with more recent perennials. People also seem to like our big green egg.

### Decker Family Garden

After years of talking about re-landscaping our backyard, we finally did it in 2019 - and are so happy with the results! Like most gardens, it continues to evolve. A few of the evergreens did not survive and we've added a tomato garden in the NW corner of the yard. Our favorite tree is the Royal Frost birch and we love the zebra sculpture I inherited from my parent's garden in Michigan.

This parkway has been lovingly tended to by our very own Merc Prause for over 15 years!

### Mercedes Magic Garden

How do you turn a standard 25-foot lot into a backyard sanctuary? For Mercedes and Joe, the answer is nearly five decades of passion, experimentation, and love. Step through the gates of their Hamilton Avenue home and into a living storybook. This award winning garden is a master class in texture and layer, featuring dramatic window boxes, large container gardens, and massive, expertly overwintered elephant ears. As you wander beneath the canopy of rare Tri-color and Dawyck Purple Columnar Beeches, you'll discover giant, magical hostas, exploding hydrangeas, and airy cosmos in vibrant pops of pink and purple. It is a peaceful, cozy ecosystem where all wildlife from birds and bees to a wandering kitty and the occasional rabbit - is warmly welcomed. Don't miss our brand-new front garden and textured patio, designed specifically for relaxing and catching up with neighbors.

### Leavitt Street Apartment Gardens

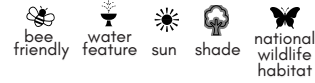


### Newly Empty Nesting

### Tiny Native Prairie

This fully native garden is proudly recognized by the Forest Preserves of Cook County for its environmentally friendly practices, including water and soil conservation and protection of native wildlife. It is also certified as a Monarch Waystation by Monarch Watch, supporting migrating monarchs and other pollinators. Despite limited sunlight, this garden, now in its third full year after replanting, is beginning to flourish with a rich variety of Illinois native plants.

## 32 1841 W. Cuyler Ave.



### Hortus in Urbe

Year 6 for this city garden. We have strived to create art from nature with an abundance of color from Spirea, Hosta, painted ferns, and lilies. Shade and sun plants framed by large colorful stones fill the front yard with yellow, green, and purple hues. Plantings have spilled over to the parkway, overflowing with coneflower, poppies, and a faux pond. Shade and Sun plants framed by large colorful stones fill the front and back yards of a notable city victorian. Hostas, and Ferns fill the shade areas with Lillys, and Spirea in the sun. Numerous types of ground cover are used throughout the rock and rain gardens creating a mixed use space.

## 34 4055 N. Wolcott Ave.



### Cheaper Than Therapy (Not Really)

This garden features a handful of white container gardens that trail along the treelined Wolcott Avenue, then, finish your journey at the corner of Belle Plaine Avenue with more color-filled wooden barrels. Enjoy the bird bath and bird feeders, as well as a combination of native and pollinator plants.

### Belle Blooms

My garden is designed in the spirit of an English garden, where something is always in bloom and every season brings new color, texture, and interest. I love combining different varieties of plants – from the soft movement of Japanese Forest Grass and Feather Reed Grass to the bold structure of hydrangeas, Baptisia australis, and Allium ‘Summer Beauty’ – while incorporating pieces of glass art throughout the garden for unexpected sparkle and personality.

### Belle Plaine Grotto

Front yard is a combo of sun & shade with dwarf cherry and pear trees. Lentin roses and black eyes susans fill behind the active bird bath.

### Pruitt Paradise

After almost 30 years of planting, growing and shifting, our oasis is the highlight of our Chicago summer. We started with only one tree, still standing in the parkway, a few scraggly bushes and chain link fence with nothing else but grass. The large deck was here, but all the plants and other trees were imported, mostly donations from family with beautiful perennial gardens. All the trees were brought in by shovel or wheelbarrow and this sandy soil so close to the water table has made everything taller than expected, with changes in shade/sun patterns always evolving. The gardens are created in layers, with untended native prairie plants behind perennials of varied sorts. Annuals in front and in pots on the deck provide a boost of color -- planting them a Mother's Day tradition. It is hard to pick a favorite flower, but the explosion of Menarda in July is a highlight of the summer.

## 39 2140 W. Montrose Ave.



### The Lucky Fern

Front yard is a mix of hosta and hydrangeas, accented with impatiens. The flowers flow down the side-yard and spill into the backyard. The backyard features a cherry tree, rose bushes, a veggie/flower garden, hibiscus, and an iris garden (not in bloom for the walk).

## 40 2156 W. Cullom Ave.



### Webb Front Garden

We removed the lawn on our parkway several years ago and put in a lovely variety of hostas and ground cover. The garden just next to the house continues to evolve every year as we try out new plants that will thrive there. In particular we are interested in native plants and other perennials. Some years ago we suddenly started seeing milkweed plants out there--likely a gift from some birds depositing seeds for us. It's amazing to see how many milkweeds pop up every year! Otherwise our goal is to have something blooming continually from early spring through the fall.

### A Work in Progress

Front yard space with a considered mix of plants that add blooms and color across the seasons. Installed in 2022, here's hoping the garden continues to thrive! Ground cover (ajuga), grasses (japanese forest grass), perennials (coral heuchera, hostas, virginia bluebells, hillside black beauty), shrubs (hydrangea, fothergilla, astilbes) and trees (japanese maple and serviceberry) all growing nicely in year 4! The unintentional mossy growth (from many hours of shade) adds an organic element to a largely informal garden, which is maintained by Amy Beltemacchi, landscape architect and owner of Generative Land Limited. The Japanese Maple is a favorite, and the Serviceberry tree is a native tree.

### Sabana Grande

Our corner of the world! Flowers, peach trees, annuals, perennials, vegetables, places to sit and contemplate, places to share, sun and fun - that's our Sabana Grande - our back yard!

### Jim's Garden of Joy

Small and simple grassy front yard surrounded by colorful perennials.

## 44 2501 W. Pensacola Ave.



### Prairie on Pensacola

Our garden features many native, drought tolerant perennials including echinacea, bee balm, coneflowers and milkweed. We are also growing tomatoes, pepper and basil on the south side of the house. Take a moment to relax at the table under our ironwood and redbud trees. You may catch a glimpse of our cat Felix who does his part to keep rabbits out of the garden.

### City Sanctuary

Set alongside the Chicago River, across from Horner Park, we have strived to continually turn the land over to native species. Since 2018 we have planted over 40 different species - some thriving better than others. Always a work in progress!

### Riverbank Neighbors Natural Area

4.5 blocks on the east bank of the Chicago River south of Montrose. Extensive trails through restored woodlands, savanna and prairie

## 47 2546 W. Berteau Ave.



### Veggies and Flowers

Decorative gardens in the front and back with a concentrated vegetable garden with a living fence and multiple vertical growing spaces.

## 48 4115 N. Maplewood Ave.



### Maplewood Medley

An always changing medley of plants provide a colorful and tranquil spot. The front is mostly shade. The back is mostly sun with the exception of a shady Hosta corner. A huge Trumpet Vine climbs the garage which is hard to control but brings beautiful flowers. Other favorites include Daylillies, Garden phlox, Easter Lillies and Showy Stonecrop. Veggies and herbs rotate seasonally and include four different types of tomatoes.

## 49 4105 N. Maplewood Ave.



### Maplewood Meadow

Our front yard and parkway feature an assortment fo native, pollinator-friendly plants. We have several raised beds in the backyard for growing our favorite fruits and veggies, and try to add something new each year! The backyard is under the watchful eyes of our 5 chickens (Tina, Drummer, Mary, Orla, and Betty) who provide us fresh eggs and help with weeding and composting. We've also incorporated barrels to recapture rainfall to help reduce our eco impact.

## TROLLEY STOPS

The trolley makes a continuous loop and the stops are indicated on the map. The neighborhood is divided into 3 sections so you can choose to spend your whole day in just one section or hop on the trolley to go explore another section.

The first trolley of the day will leave Bell School at 1:00 PM, and the last trolley of the day will return there at 4:00 PM. Each loop takes approximately 50 minutes so plan accordingly. Due to traffic and narrow streets we are unable to provide specific trolley times.
