Finding common ground is about discovering shared values, opinions, or goals, even when individuals or groups have differing perspectives on other matters. It's a valuable skill for building relationships, resolving conflicts, and achieving collaborative outcomes.

Understand how multi-generations approach their work, what has shaped or influenced their behaviour and how to best work with them. After exploring the differences, how can we find common ground to foster better working relations with each other.

- Recognize the most common sources of misunderstanding or conflict that can arise between generational groups at work.
- Explore practical strategies to build inclusive, productive work relationships by focusing on common ground rather than differences.
