#### **GETTING THE LAW RIGHT**

In Torah commentaries rabbis always point out the unequal proportions of the Decalogue. The first four Commandments (concerning our obligations to God) take up 10 extended verses, while the ensuing six (about mortal relationships) occupy a half dozen clipped lines. It should be noted that in Jewish tradition the Commandments are numbered differently. Because the two forbidden "covetings" at the end are combined as one prohibition, the first four Commandments are counted as follows: 1. God alone is the God of Israel (vs. 2-3); 2. Idols and images are forbidden (vs. 4-6); 3. False oaths using God's name are forbidden (vs. 7); 4. The sabbath must be kept holy (vs. 8-11).

God's singularity, as well as the holiness of the divine name and the day of rest, are clearly weighted with more significance than the obligations we have toward one another: parents, neighbors, and fellow citizens. In Hebrew, in fact, the weightiest Commandment is the one regarding the sabbath day, if sheer word power is the measure. To get the sabbath right paved the way to getting everything right.

That is why the use Jesus made of the sabbath was the most shocking part of his ministry. He used the sabbath for the sake of his neighbors and fellow citizens - even strangers and outsiders!

He used God's day for the welfare of people. It turned the traditional understanding of the Law inside out and on its head.

If we listen to the responsorial psalm of the day, we hear a refrain that echoes through the Psalms, not to mention the books of law, prophecy, and wisdom. God's law is perfect. You can trust it. You can bet your life on its clarity and purity. Many righteous people resonate with that idea. Submitting yourself to the dictates of law—whether the laws of the land or God's laws or interior convictions—is a most uncomplicated way to live. It removes ambiguity and indecision from the picture because, in a sense, you don't have to decide at all. You just have to obey.

The icon of that submission, of course, was the Jerusalem Temple. There, lawgivers rendered their judgments on individual cases. There, sacrifices on behalf of the nation were judiciously performed. There, offerings were made and taxes were collected to serve as ballast against sin. When Jesus made his assault against the Temple, which he did tout de suite in John's gospel, he challenged the traditional understanding of Law altogether. And when his motives were questioned, Jesus declared that he was replacing the great institution of the Temple with himself. Of course no one understood him, nor would they have believed him. An incarnate law changes everything.

## THE GOOD NEWS ABOUT THIRST

AN INTERESTING CONTRAST presents itself in our two big Bible stories this week. On the one hand we've got the grumbling nation behind Moses: reasonably thirsty, yet decidedly unpleasant about it. These are the same folks who've been recently delivered from a generation of slavery, miraculously led across a divided sea, and granted the unlikely gifts of quail and manna from heaven, right there in the Sinai wilderness. You'd expect a little show of faith from these people, an air of courtesy mixed into their request for water. But all we see is an ugly, snarling mob of ingrates.

On the other hand we meet the woman from Samaria, obviously thirsty, too, or she wouldn't be visiting the well at this difficult, sun-drenched midday hour. She also has reasons to be unpleasant: It's hot, there's a strange man hovering over her destination, and what's worse he's a traditional enemy to her community. Yet this woman chooses to keep the dialogue civil, calling the stranger "sir" and demonstrating, once more, a delightful spunk that is the signature characteristic of a biblical hero. Whereas the nasty mob around Moses repels us—we don't want to be in the midst of these people more than necessary and are grateful they remain an anonymous sea of hostility—we find ourselves befriending the woman of Samaria. We want to know her name.

We'd like to follow her home and find out what happens to her after her privileged encounter with Jesus. We know in general terms that the fates of the participants in these two stories couldn't be more distinct. The nation behind Moses, ever wielding a blade of mistrust that could wind up in their leader's back, gets their spring of water and miraculous rescue once more. But does it change anything? Won't they be just as angry, aggrieved, and thirsty again tomorrow? The rock at Horeb provides them with water for a day, or a week. Still the place remains defined by the spirit of the people: Massah and Meribah, quarreling and testing. In the deepest and most real sense, the community remains parched and unsatisfied.

By contrast watch what happens to our heroine of Samaria. She leaves her bucket unfilled by the well, no longer in need of the kind of water that lasts a day. She leaves her grievances by the well, too, running back to the community that has judged her behavior in the past with news too good to withhold. Living water has changed her, turning a notorious woman into a reliable witness. Once defined by a wearyingly eminent marriageability, she's redefined in a sterling new relationship as the first apostle to the Samaritans. Thirst is not a bad thing, we realize. It can lead straight to our heart's desire.

- 3. I extend my heartfelt gratitude for your ongoing support in the journey of strengthening our parish community. Recently, we invested over \$140,000 in replacing the broken air-conditioning units in our church, ensuring a more comfortable worship environment.

As our beloved church and surrounding buildings reach respectively 14 and more years mark, we anticipate additional maintenance needs. We've identified crucial areas, such as leaking Air-Conditioning unit in our Office building, a faltering Sound system, and impending necessity of the new roof for the church (not the tile part but the flat parts of the roof) These challenges remind us of the importance of collective support.

In light of these upcoming expenses, I kindly ask for your generosity towards the second collection that each month is dedicated to our building fund. Your contributions will not only address immediate needs but also fortify the foundation of our spiritual home for years to come.

We are going to change the name of our Building Maintenance to Building Preservation. This will cover such things as replacing the air conditioners, fixing the roofs, fixing the damages done from water damage, etc. Please continue to use the blue envelope marked Building Maintenance until the envelopes are changed for next year.


