STATIONS OF THE CROSS

Fridays of Lent SFOA - 6:00 PM OLSS - 6:30 PM



Even the fact of our Christianity may seem like a passive situation. Before we could speak a word, chances are water was poured over us and the pact sealed. Writing "Catholic" into the block marked "Religion" on most forms can be as impersonal as writing the color of our hair and eyes or the letter that describes the type of our blood. What, if anything, does that have to do with our essential nature, with us?

Yet faith is not an incidental trait or a random accident of birth. Faith is a gift from God, one of three theological virtues that cannot be acquired by personal effort. It's not a gift you can put in the back of the closet after registering perfunctory thanks, much less re-gift to someone who can make better use of it. God chooses to reveal the divine presence in our midst; our response to this invitation to relationship is faith.

Appreciating faith not as a holy medal to wear but a response to make helps us to identify our role in the action. God invites, and we respond. That's faith.

Faith is not a supernatural event but a quintessentially human act. When two people marry, they trust that the word and intention of the other is true. Why? Not because they have sifted through the checkbook, diary, and phone log to see what evidence can prove the other's veracity. No, what they do is believe in and put their confidence in that person. They give their assent to a shared life and love, an interior communion that relies on what can't be seen or touched or dragged into court. "Faith is the assurance of things hoped for, the conviction of things not seen," as the writer of Hebrews says (11:1).

While faith cannot be fingerprinted and verified, it can be certain. "Ten thousand difficulties do not make one doubt," Cardinal John Henry Newman wrote. Saint Augustine employed his faith as a lamp of enlightenment: "I believe, in order to understand; and I understand, the better to believe." As our gospel points out this week, the light came into the world for just this purpose, to rescue us from the darkness of ignorance and misunderstanding. All that's required of us in the presence of this great gift is to respond with faith. A single act of faith can move mountains.

QUESTION OF THE WEEK

WHAT IS THE ANOINTING OF THE SICK?

A sacrament for the recovery and salvation of a critically ill or injured person formerly called Extreme Unction ("last anointing"). No longer reserved for those near death, one may be anointed before surgery, in extreme age or illness, after losing consciousness, or when no longer coherent.

One of the seven sacraments of the church, Anointing of the Sick recalls the healing presence and power of Jesus when we touch our mortality most vulnerably. From ancient times oil was valued for its healing and beautifying properties and in preparing bodies for burial.

The ordinary minister of the sacrament is the priest. However, it's presumed that others share the event: family, friends, caregivers. Elements of the ritual include prayers, scripture, laying hands on the recipient, and anointing of the head and hands. A water sprinkling rite may be included, and affected areas of the sick person's body may also be anointed. When in danger of death, additional sacraments of Reconciliation and Communion (viaticum, or "on the way with you") are also administered.

WHY IT MATTERS?

The mercy of God extends to the body as well as soul of each person. Jesus ministered to the sick and suffering both physically and spiritually. The church continues this ministry in its care for the whole person.

From Rites of the Catholic Church as revised by Decree of the Second Vatican Ecumenical Council: The Church obeys Jesus' command to care for the sick by visiting those in poor health but also by raising them up through the **sacrament of Anointing** and by nourishing them with the Eucharist during their illness. The church offers prayers for the sick to commend them to God, especially in the last crisis of life.

- 2. Be in good standing which means you and your family regularly attend Mass and contribute to our offertory program. You must use your assigned envelope/giving number for these donations to be recorded properly. We understand that sometimes people are unable to give to the parish; however, placing your envelope even if its empty in the basket helps us determine that someone is in fact participating in the life of a parish.
- 3. If you have moved away and are not actively participating in our parish life, and if we have not seen you at mass for weeks and months, we may be unable to issue you with the above mentioned documents. Additionally, your standing within the parish may differ from those who consistently attend and share with our community their Time, Talent and Treasure.


