It's often been noted that the Gospel of John is the gospel where "nothing happens." Either the narrator is talking his way through mysteries of cosmic proportions, or else Jesus is. But in terms of plot, action, setting, and drama, we don't have a whole lot to go on much of the time. Nobody has yet made a movie of the fourth gospel, because it doesn't have the grand spectacle of healings, miracles, teachings, and sheer stage presence of your average synoptic gospel story.

Once you're past Cana, the temple cleansing, the man born blind, and Lazarus, the rest is conversation. In fact, the bulk of those stories is talk, too, the miraculous occupying a relatively minor place in the scheme of things. It must be said that all this Johannine talk is mighty engrossing, for those actively seeking the wisdom of Christ. But John wrote for the initiated and journeying disciple, and he wasn't going to waste words playing catch-up for the newcomer.

So during the long Easter season when John's testimony is featured, the real drama is supplied by the Acts of the Apostles. The activity of the Early Church is where things are happening. While John patiently unpacks the mystical vision, the first leaders of the church are out there unleashing the Holy Spirit on an unsuspecting world. The word of God seems to be coming at the assembly of the faithful from parallel universes: one doing, the other contemplating. We might even say that while the apostles are out there in motion, Jesus is supplying the commentary from a timeless or eternal perspective. The average contemporary churchgoer isn't used to being intellectually challenged in this way, having to draw together the active and contemplative into a common posture of faith. It's the preacher's job to give coherence and cohesion to these disparate parts.

Jesus is ascended into heaven. What do his disciples do now? Not too long ago we heard about their first reaction, which was to stop and stare upwards. We might forgive them this momentary lapse of initiative. If Jesus had been your constant companion for three years, minus a significant three days, it may never have occurred to you that his departure was in the offing. Jesus' presence was such an absolute fulfillment that his physical absence must have seemed like an unthinkable event, an unfillable void at first.

So their eyes followed him until he was completely out of view. Then the angels barked at them to stop staring at nothing and to get going. So they did. They got right to the heart of the task of discipleship, which was to get together in one place and to pray.

Does that sound disappointing? Does that seem rather anticlimactic? After the Passion and death and Resurrection of Jesus, followed by countless apparitions and weeks of deeper teaching, concluded with the grand exit of the Ascension, we might well ask: Is a session of prayer the best they could do? Why didn't they run into the streets and jumpstart Pentecost? Why didn't they turn the upper room into a war room of tactical planning for the church to come? Why not sit down and outline the first gospel at least? I can think of a dozen things that would seem more purposeful and productive than a prayer meeting. We've sat through so many of those, and whatever came out of them that we could hold in our hands or claim as an achievement?

Yet the disciples didn't feel the need for a mission statement or a fundraiser or a building committee or even the inkling of a doctrinal pronouncement. The one thing needful in that initial hour of being church was to devote themselves, as it says in Acts, to prayer. If you and I have never attacked prayer with single-hearted devotion, then we can't compare our experience of praying to theirs. We can't imagine that, in a book that describes the actions of apostles, how prayer can be a very active form of engagement.

During the last discourse in John's Book of Glory, Jesus moves seamlessly from instruction to prayer. In a book long on dialogue, his final words are saved for his Father. Truthfully, Jesus has said everything there is to say to his followers. He has already taught them far more than they are capable of understanding presently. So he lifts his eyes from those gathered around the table and directs his last words to the only One who knows what it means to say: "The hour has come."

At this special hour, Jesus prays for his disciples precisely because he is soon to leave them. His prayer for them becomes a vital connection between heaven and Earth, the present and the future, the church and the Spirit that will guide it. The last prayer of Jesus is a sort of Jacob's ladder upon which grace will travel relentlessly.

He prays it once at the last supper where the 12 apostles are gathered. He prays it continuously over every table at which his followers gather in each new generation. We who are in the world need this prayer of Jesus to keep us in unity with him and his Father. It also serves to remind us that prayer is first and last and at the center of what we do as church. Without prayer at the heart of us, we would truly become sheep without a shepherd.

When we share the mission of Christ, we have much to rejoice about. Even suffering becomes a cause for rejoicing, because all wounds in Christ are glorified and can no longer harm us. The letter of Peter reminds us that suffering is a given, and no one escapes it. So why not transform it, transfigure it, to give praise to God as one more prayer lifted in the name of Christ Jesus?

From a homily on the Song of Songs by Saint Gregory of Nyssa, bishop

The glory you gave to me, I have given to them

When love has entirely cast out fear, and fear has been transformed into love, then the unity brought us by our savior will be fully realized, for all men will be united with one another through their union with the one supreme Good. They will possess the perfection ascribed to the dove, according to our interpretation of the text: *One alone is my dove, my perfect one. She is the only child of her mother, her chosen one.* 

Our Lord's words in the gospel bring out the meaning of this text more clearly. After having conferred all power on his disciples by his blessing, he obtained many other gifts for them by his prayer to the Father. Among these was included the greatest gift of all, which was that they were no longer to be divided in their judgment of what was right and good, for they were all to be united to the one supreme Good. As the Apostle says, they were to be bound together with the bonds of peace in the unity that comes from the Holy Spirit. They were to be made one body and one spirit by the one hope to which they were all called. We shall do better, however, to quote the sacred words of the gospel itself. I pray, the Lord says, that they all may be one; that as you, Father, are in me and I am in you, so they also may be one in us.

Now the bond that creates this unity is glory. That the Holy Spirit is called glory no one can deny if he thinks carefully about the Lord's words: *The glory you gave to me, I have given to them*. In fact, he gave this glory to his disciples when he said to them: *Receive the Holy Spirit*. Although he had always possessed it, even before the world existed, he himself received this glory when he put on human nature. Then, when his human nature had been glorified by the Spirit, the glory of the Spirit was passed on to all his kin, beginning with his disciples. This is why he said: *The glory you gave to me, I have given to them, so that they may be one as we are one. With me in them and you in me, I want them to be perfectly one.* 

Whoever has grown from infancy to manhood and attained to spiritual maturity possesses the mastery over his passions and the purity that makes it possible for him to receive the glory of the Spirit. He is that perfect dove upon whom the eyes of the bridegroom rest when he says: *One alone is my dove, my perfect one.*.
