CHRIST OUR LIFE.

Opinion polls have become the thermometers of our society. With them we take the temperature of the body politic and find out what is ailing us as a community. Like a thermometer, the polls are not a cure of any kind. They simply report a result, and only by taking the right action does this information have any usefulness.

Recent polls have registered, for example, that we are greatly worried and conflicted on many fronts. Altogether, the temperature of our community is high on alarm and low on hope. What can we as the Christian faithful prescribe for the fear, dread, and paranoia that are steadily growing factors in our civic life?

Jesus had a proposal 2,000 years ago that is still on the table. He offers himself as the bread of life. This living bread is given for the life of the world. Without it, there is only death. With it, there is nothing but life, now and forever. Do we accept this Christ-life, or will we, like many in the crowds of his day, turn away and look for another solution?

SLAVERY OR FREEDOM?

The love of liberty is one of the defining characteristics of a living thing. From the wasp buzzing frantically against the windowpane to the dog straining at the leash to the man seething in prison to the woman addicted to drugs to the child forced to work in a sweatshop, the desire to be free is self-evident. Freedom is beloved and celebrated by those who possess it, and prayed for and died for by those who don't.

Yet rarely is it noted that there are two kinds of freedom, the kind granted and protected from without and the more vital freedom that can only be chosen and lived from within. Of this second kind a person can never be robbed, although it is often surrendered or denied. The People of God learned about the two kinds of freedom during their long sojourn in the desert. God delivered them from their chains in Egypt, but only they themselves could choose to experience the freedom of the children of God. The slavery of the mind is much harder to relinquish. Too often, human beings are raised to think and act like slaves and so never learn how to live and choose like free beings.

The difference between slavery in Egypt and genuine freedom, the Israelites came to understand, is trust in God. So long as they expressed angst over food and water, comfort and security, fear of other nations and a selective and unhealthy nostalgia for the past, they would remain in bondage. Once they surrendered themselves in confidence to God, authentic freedom would lead them to the Promised Land. It was that simple, although hardly that easy. They had to die to the slave instinct—and lose an entire generation that had turned to salt looking backward—in order to enter into the future as free people.

That desert, scattered with the bodies of a whole generation of slaves bound to the way of death, is a staggering image we might keep in holy memory. If we seek our freedom, the cost will be high, as we must die to so many false ideas, prejudices, and placebos we've bet our lives on to date.

GOD STRENGHTENS THE BARS OF OUR GATES.

Psalm 147 has something to say to a security-obsessed culture. Military prowess won't lead us to peace, nor will bombs, walls, or soldiers keep us safe from all that could harm us. God alone grants peaceful borders and strengthens the gates. When we put our trust in God and not in our own strength and aggression, we learn the ways that lead to a more peaceful world. A just society that upholds the common good will not have to hold a neighbor or a stranger in fear and contempt. A nation built on worldly power and a show of strength will always live in the shadow of danger.

The just society, as Catholic social teaching has insisted, is predicated on the recognition of the value of life: born and unborn, guilty and innocent, rich and poor, us and them. As papal nuncio to the United Nations, Archbishop Celestino Migliore recently noted in a speech on Christianity and Islam, we can't afford to reduce the dignity of any human life: "Otherwise, we would keep the door open to loopholes, to exceptions which belittle our common belief and frustrate our efforts." The longer we examine the evidence, the more it becomes clear that the things we most hunger for—freedom, security, peace, a just and right society—are all elements available to those who honor the First Commandment. They can never be available to those who put their trust in worldly principalities and powers.

BACK TO THE BARGAINING TABLE

For too long, our altars have remained in the popular imagination as placid places contained in what we unwittingly have called sanctuaries. But the table of the Lord is a dynamic place where death and life meet and embrace, where common elements are possessed of sacred realities, where sins are forgiven and hope becomes possible.

The cup of blessing holds the Blood of Christ, and our participation in that cup is an acceptance that we will need to die to certain things in order to live for others—like those ancient Israelites who left their dead behind them on the desert floor. The bread we eat is a participation in the Body of Christ - first and fundamentally broken before it can be shared. We know what we receive in our Eucharist; what are we also willing to risk and to offer?

The life of the world is at stake. If we incorporate the Body and Blood of Christ, our body and blood are likewise incorporated into the saving activity of Christ, blessed and broken and shared for the sake of all. Will this sacrament remain a pleasant but empty metaphor, or will we allow it to be the consecration and transubstantiation of life that we say it is?



(Opusculum 57, in festo Corporis Christi, lect. 1-4)

O precious and wonderful banquet!

Since it was the will of God's only-begotten Son that men should share in his divinity, he assumed our nature in order that by becoming man he might make men gods. Moreover, when he took our flesh he dedicated the whole of its substance to our salvation. He offered his body to God the Father on the altar of the cross as a sacrifice for our reconciliation. He shed his blood for our ransom and purification, so that we might be redeemed from our wretched state of bondage and cleansed from all sin. But to ensure that the memory of so great a gift would abide with us for ever, he left his body as food and his blood as drink for the faithful to consume in the form of bread and wine.

O precious and wonderful banquet that brings us salvation and contains all sweetness! Could anything be of more intrinsic value? Under the old law it was the flesh of calves and goats that was offered, but here Christ himself, the true God, is set before us as our food. What could be more wonderful than this? No other sacrament has greater healing power; through it sins are purged away, virtues are increased, and the soul is enriched with an abundance of every spiritual gift. It is offered in the Church for the living and the dead, so that what was instituted for the salvation of all may be for the benefit of all. Yet, in the end, no one can fully express the sweetness of this sacrament, in which spiritual delight is tasted at its very source, and in which we renew the memory of that surpassing love for us which Christ revealed in his passion.

It was to impress the vastness of this love more firmly upon the hearts of the faithful that our Lord instituted this sacrament at the Last Supper. As he was on the point of leaving the world to go to the Father, after celebrating the Passover with his disciples, he left it as a perpetual memorial of his passion. It was the fulfillment of ancient figures and the greatest of all his miracles, while for those who were to experience the sorrow of his departure, it was destined to be a unique and abiding consolation.
