Sometimes the swine get the pearls

A lot of people are not going to approve of your homily this week. Just know this ahead of time and brace yourself. Matthew is not interested in making you popular in the pulpit apart from a few nice Christmas stories anyway. But with the story of the Canaanite woman, you're bound to be an equal-opportunity offender.

How do you approach a story in which Jesus is, by some standards, a stickler if not a bit of a stinker when it comes to the rules? This is not the Jesus we are used to, not the one willing to break a commandment to heal someone who's been sick a lifetime and could certainly wait another day to be cured under those circumstances. The Jesus we like best is the one who is so anxious to heal the suffering and feed the hungry and rescue the endangered that all the rules of physics and possibility and reason are suspended if they get in the way. The Jesus born of a virgin and risen from the dead doesn't normally get dainty around the idea of limits. And while the Jesus we are used to is perfectly willing to call the original religious sticklers "snakes and broods of vipers," it is hard to imagine him referring to a helpless woman with a sick child as a dog.

So here's your rock and your hard place. Either you defend the original position of Jesus as the redeemer of the "lost sheep of the house of Israel," which makes you sound just as rigid around the rules as he does—or you say Jesus was wrong and the woman was right, and even Jesus came to see it that way. This will make certain of your low-Christology parishioners very happy, and your high-Christology crowd mad as hornets. Good luck with that.

Send her away

This dilemma leads many of us at the ambo this weekend wanting to say, as the disciples did: Send her away! This woman is trouble, no doubt about it. But then we remember that, two weeks ago, the disciples also looked at a crowd of hungry people at the end of a long day of healing and came up with the same answer: Send them away! When folks come to Jesus with their needs, the disciples always see a problem they can't solve and don't want to deal with.

"Send them away" is the age-old response of the well fed at the unwelcome sight of the beggar. Dogs may well get the scraps from their table, but Lazarus always remains miserable at their gates.

Jesus, however, does not send this woman away. Nor does he offer her a word of welcome, no "Courage, daughter," or anything like that. We sense the tension. On the one hand, she's in need, and that automatically arouses the compassion of Jesus. Also, she's called him "Lord" and "Son of David," two titles of reverent faith that he rarely hears in Israel coming from a foreigner. Jesus has got to be both moved and impressed. But he's also impeded by the very instructions he gave to his disciples not long ago: "Do not go into pagan territory or enter a Samaritan town." He said that. What to do, however, when the pagans come out to you?

What else did Jesus say in those instructions before the mission of the apostles? Cure the sick, drive out demons. Give without cost. Look for the worthy person, the one who will receive you and listen to your words. Jesus did say those things, too. And here was a worthy woman, one who had heard of his words and took them to heart, one with a daughter with a demon in need of being driven out. No wonder Jesus didn't answer right away. Nor could he, obviously, send her away.

Matthew's dilemma

The second generation of the church, circa the 80s, was in the midst of a full-blown identity crisis. The community gathered around the writer of Matthew in Syrian Antioch was mostly Jewish. They were Christian Jews, to be sure. But according to the new rulings coming out of the synagogues, there was no such thing as a Christian Jew. Either you were one or the other. Those who chose Christ would be anathema to the Jewish assembly, cast out of their midst. "Send them away" was the official pronouncement.

It was a very confusing time for those who were convinced that to be a follower of Jesus was to be devoutly and quintessentially Jewish. It was equally distressing to those Christian Jews who were fearful that admitting Gentiles to the faith would dilute the Jewishness of this message beyond recognition.

In writing his gospel Matthew recreates the theatre of his generation's great argument within the story of the generation of Jesus. On one side, you have the great acceptance of the Gentile world: Magi bearing gifts, the faith-filled centurion, this feckless mother. Even the Gadarene demoniacs were right as rain about Jesus, despite being crazy as loons. The final post -Resurrection commissioning of the disciples is adamantly pro-Gentile in its scope.

But weighted as ballast against this "universalist" vision is the "particularist" understanding of the mission of the apostles. These instructions are so glaringly opposite everything else in Matthew that they must be grounded in history. Yet the position is so at odds with the way Jesus regularly behaves that the particularist position must be reiterated here in the story of the Canaanite woman.

Here stands a woman, strong, unhesitant, and persistent in her faith. Contrast her with Peter's weak, fearful, and wavering stance on the water last week and see why Jesus found her so appealing. In his ultimate response to her, Jesus demonstrates what Matthew hopes his community will imitate: that obedience to instruction must always give way in light of great faith. You just can't argue the rulebook in the face of compelling discipleship.

Reconciling the poles

I've gotten several letters just this week from folks worried that unworthy people are receiving the Eucharist. Shouldn't "known homosexuals, liberals, and divorced people" be barred from the sacraments, and isn't the priest committing a "sacrilege" to admit them? Particularists and universalists are rarely going to sit down together to share a meal—unless of course it's the Eucharist. And this was Matthew's point, and should be ours. Some folks will remain convinced that the church is not in the business of feeding dogs.
