The enemy within

Who's your worst enemy? Not knowing a single thing about your life, I can make a pretty good guess. It's not your boss, your mate, your rival, or that fifth-grade teacher who always had it in for you. No, our own worst enemy is usually ourselves. Who knows better how to sabotage us, where our weak spots are, how to really make us pay for our mistakes?

We eat or drink too much: Whose fault is that? Can't blame the cook or the bartender. We gamble our money away, at the track or at the mall in senseless purchases. Are you going to bring a lawsuit against the casino or retailer? If you smoke, don't exercise, neglect your sleep, work too much, play too much, can't control your temper or your mouth, mess up your marriage or your relationship with your parents, kids, friends, or coworkers, is that somebody else's problem? Did God do that to you? Did the devil?

The media is always supplying us with a "Great Satan" to be worried about. Some foreign nation has it in for us. Some religious group—or the atheists!—are trying to nab our government or our children. Some corporation with the word *big* in front of it is going to wipe out our savings. Some special-interest group (environmentalists, pharmaceutical folk, scientists, the health care industry, the other political party, city hall) is trying to pull the wool over our eyes. Be careful, America: There are enemies everywhere.

But isn't it true, folks, that the one force in your life most likely to do you serious harm is you? Something as simple as not brushing your teeth regularly could cause you a world of hurt, sooner or later. Who's in charge of brushing your teeth these days? Are you still blaming Mom for that pain in your gums?

Cyrus, friend of Israel

Israel has plenty of enemies in recent times, but that's nothing new. Biblically speaking, Israel always had some big power to fear. There was Big Egypt, Big Assyria, Big Babylon, Big Persia, Big Rome. The "Great Satan" has many names and faces but generally one ambition: to exploit a good thing. Truthfully, Egypt just wanted the cheap labor of an enslaved population. But once Israel became a landed population, the bait was even more tempting. The Promised Land was actually a very promising piece of real estate. Somebody else always wanted those ports, that river, those fertile hills and plains flowing with milk and honey—and money.

Yet in two stories this weekend, separated by some five centuries, we hear that the Great Satan out there is not the problem, is not the enemy we should be afraid of. Isaiah tells us that Cyrus, the great ruler of the Persian Empire, was no enemy to Israel. Astonishingly enough, Isaiah claims that Cyrus is a friend of God no less. When Cyrus sweeps into Babylon with his armies and becomes the new owner of the formerly Babylonian franchise, Israel is in exile there, wondering what will become of their community.

And what becomes of them is freedom. Cyrus tells them, and all the exiles Babylon took, to go home if they want. They can return to their homeland, their God, and their religion, just as before. All they have to do is pay the usual tribute of vassals and not set up a rival government to Persia. Those are pretty good terms to get from your conqueror, who could just as easily make your life a lot harder than the last conqueror did if he so chose.

Yet many—most Israelites, in fact—don't take Cyrus up on his offer. If we take the phrase "faithful remnant" seriously, only a very small portion of the exiled population goes home. Before exile the nation of Judah boasted a community of 75,000 citizens, 25,000 in Jerusalem alone. But 1,500 people returned to Jerusalem when Cyrus opened the gates of Babylon, and only 4,500 would return in the next decade. Evidently freedom's just another word for something more to lose, in many people's minds. They'd have rather stuck with present conditions than risk that difficult and perilous journey back home.

Then came Cesar

Granted: Emperors do what's best for their empire, not what's best for the people they conquer. Persia was looking out for Persia's best interests in the freeing of exiles, pursuing the policy that people are easier to control when they are reasonably content. And being a religious bunch, Persians also believed that the gods are happier when being worshipped by their own people on their own soil. Cyrus wanted the Temple in Jerusalem up and running because it was good for Persia, not for Israel. And evidently this was a good policy: Persia remained in charge for a good two centuries.

The Greeks arrive later, and finally the Romans in 63 B.C.E. Hebrew prophecy claims that God unbarred the gates before Cyrus, just as with Assyria and Babylon before him. It's reasonable to presume that God held open the door for these other empires to make their way as well. Perhaps this is why Jesus never raises his voice in protest against Caesar, and in fact essentially advises people to pay their taxes to Rome without quibble. "The coin of the realm" is not what interests Jesus. External politics is not a "kingdom issue" for him. "The Kingdom within" is what matters to Jesus, and that authority reigns only by personal invitation. You and I, so to speak, must open the gates and let in the king of glory.

Then came Cesar

If we want to be our own best friend, we should make sure we are first the friends of God. Opening the gates of our will to the sovereignty of the Ruler of the Universe is one way to make "Kingdom come" on this little piece of real estate we call our lives. Once God's in charge, we don't have to worry about the next would-be conqueror coming down the road. But no one can open the gates of your will but you. Like most things, if you don't make the wise decision, you have no one else to blame.


