The question od authority

For most of us, the moment comes when we are barely into our teens. Suddenly the grown-ups—who, up to now, have been omnipotent—are revealed to be what they are: mere mortals like the man behind the curtain in *The* Wizard of Oz. I remember when the realization dawned on me. My father was furious with my older sister, caught in the act of smoking and swearing. In the midst of his tirade, it occurred to me that my dad both smoked and swore. The cloud of authority around my father dissipated, and I saw for the first time that he was simply a man.

Hypocrisy is one of the easiest ways to unmask human authority. Another is abuse, when authority that is unjustly wielded has lost the moral high ground. We can add others to the list: cheating, public scandal, or the claim to power that has not come honestly. Those who accept the mantel of authority, however attractive, are soon burdened by its demands.

Follow the Leader

Along with authority comes the role of leadership, and the matter of where those leaders are leading us. World governments play games of arrogance while people starve. Generals sow fields of landmines for generations of children to stumble across at play. Major corporations disdain the law, and thousands lose economic security as a result. One CEO boasted, "Money is the only way to keep score." If money is the score card, then ordinary citizens are losing the game being played by those with deeper pockets.

Authority may also be misused at the local level. At the assisted living facility down the street, the treasurer cooks the books, cheating those with tightly fixed incomes of the beauty of a few flowers. A parent berates her 8-year-old all the way to dance practice, until the child wants only to disappear from view. Spouses withhold the tender word that is longed for, or take out their disappointments on the one person whose happiness is tied to their own.

God's authority has a face

Perhaps the worst abuse of leadership occurs when the person in authority presumes to speak for God. Malachi came down hard on the corrupt priests of Israel after the exile. The long-cherished homeland had been recovered, only to be endangered again. Blind and sick animals were being accepted for sacrifice, a deal with the devil for both the layman who got a useless animal off his hands and the priest who quietly pocketed his bribe. It was a disastrous arrangement of quid pro quo.

The sins of later scribes and Pharisees warranted an equally strong denunciation. These leaders burdened others with a law they themselves did not observe.

These leaders burdened others with a law they themselves did not observe. Oh, they were happy enough to wear religious finery and to enjoy places of honor. Titles like teacher and master scratched the itch of their vanity. If the priests in the time of Malachi jeopardized the welfare of their followers, these fellows weren't even looking back to see if they had followers.

Mortals tempted by the trappings of leadership—or hiding behind them—forget the one element crucial to those who would lead: humility. It is especially dire when a religious leader makes that mistake, since he or she knows what the secular leader may not: that a leader is also first and foremost a follower. The divine source of all authority is out in front, guiding human history itself toward its fulfillment. For a religious leader not to know and trust in this is one of those sins that rates the name unpardonable.

Humility and dirty hands

Saint Paul got it right—oddly enough, for a man given to boasting not only about his moral perfection but also his weaknesses. When it came to moral authority, he claimed his share against the Jerusalem leaders and detractors in the mission field alike. Nor was Paul shy about claiming the title of apostle. But he understood that, when it came to the divine authority of Christ, he was insignificant. All in heaven and on Earth bowed to that name (Phil. 2:10). The name of Paul, by comparison, was worthless. He insisted his followers not take his name as a badge of identity, or Apollos or Peter (1 Cor. 3:21-22.)

Paul knew the rules by which wisdom teachers of the ancient world operated. He knew the rights of an apostle: to eat and drink, to enjoy the company of a wife, and to earn his keep by his teaching (1 Cor. 9). But Paul declares he "would rather die" than exercise these rights, for the gospel came freely and undeservedly to him. So he worked at a trade to refrain from burdening the fledgling churches, and did not demand any privilege while in their midst.

Authority and the Church

Some scholars suggest that Matthew's gospel was written as a handbook for church leaders. If this is so, then the many passages excoriating religious leaders must have hit their intended audience like a pie in the face. Even Peter, the keeper of the keys, does not get off the hook, so no one is exempt from the warning. All of us who represent religious authority—and here we mean parents to their children and teachers to their students, as well as pastors to their assemblies and any who claim the names Catholic and Christian in public—are responsible for how we present the face of God to others. If we are phonies, selfrighteous, unforgiving, or out-and-out creeps when we don our religious hats before others, then we have identified God with those traits. How should we prepare for Holy Communion? Is fasting still necessary?

Liturgical practices have changed in the last generation. It's fair to wonder what's going on with communion these days. In parishes around the country, I see everything from the reconstruction of altar railings to people falling on their knees at the front of the communion line. Folks cup their hands in the throne-like gesture taught in communion prep classes



these days, or perform casual host grabs that seem almost unconsidered.

So here's the present teaching. Yes, the communion fast is still in force. Details are important here: 1) Water never breaks the fast, so don't dehydrate to prove your devotion. 2) The fast from food and drink besides water is one hour before reception of the Eucharist. 3) Sick and elderly people only need fast for fifteen minutes before communion. Caregivers accompanying such people may follow the same guidelines. 4) Sick persons may take medicine and non-alcoholic liquids unrestrictedly.

In Canon Law, seven regulations apply to proper reception of communion. The fast as outlined above is one. Anyone who's received First Eucharist is obliged to receive at least once annually, preferably during the Easter Season—the so-called "Easter duty." Receiving in the context of Mass is "most strongly recommended"—again, with exceptions for the sick and homebound, or communities with no access to a priest.

A fourth regulation concerns those conscious of having committed grave sin. Such a person should seek the Sacrament of Reconciliation before receiving communion. If this isn't possible, making an act of perfect contrition suffices so long as the person resolves to go to confession as soon as it is possible.

Frequency of reception is a concern for many older Catholics. Current rules are that as long as you receive during Mass, you can go to communion more than once daily. The only exception is in the instance of *viaticum* (literally, "on the way with you"). Someone in danger of death should receive communion outside the context of Mass even if they've already gone to Mass and received earlier that day.

The seventh regulation is the least well known. A Catholic may receive Eucharist from a non-Catholic minister in whose congregation Eucharist is valid when it's "physically or morally impossible" to do otherwise. Such occasions include danger of death or other "serious need"; persons who are "unable to approach their own minister"; "persons in prison or under persecution"; "persons who live at some distance from their own communion." The canon ends with the significant words: "this is not an exhaustive indication of such cases."




