Working hard or hardly working?

An acquaintance confided in me that she rolls down her car window when she sees folks hanging out at the corner. "Get a job and a haircut!" she yells, and speeds off. It's a cowardly way to express her annoyance, I admit. She says the part about the job because she can't stand to see people idling away their time. The part about the haircut she throws in because she's a neat freak.

Frankly, I know there's a lazy person inside of me aching to be let out. I can't think of anything more appealing than an afternoon on the couch with a bag of potato chips. But our culture has stepped up the pace with our phones making us more available than ever for the rising demands of our work. At the same time, our smart gadgets and online lifestyles make us more efficient and adaptable, so we can do a whole lot more and faster.

Globalization brings the world into our living rooms, and we can't escape the barrage of information and expectation anymore. And if you are married and have children, multiply that times the members of your family and let the primal screaming begin.

Idle hands are the devil's workshop.

One of the Hebrew images that used to initiate a round of screaming for me is the "worthy wife" of Proverbs. If you read the entire passage in Chapter 31, you'll understand why. This woman is deemed more valuable than pearls. I'd say this woman is worth a whole corporation! She is in charge of purchasing for the household, makes her own clothes and bedding, buys a field, plants a vineyard, sells her wares in the marketplace, cares for the poor, distributes advice. . . . The writer tells us she begins her workday while it's still dark. I suspect she'd have to. Her children and husband also praise her. I wonder if they ever see her.

What redeemed the worthy wife image for me was when I discovered that it's not intended to be a job description for married women. This industrious, clever, and essential person is a stand-in for the character in wisdom tradition known as Lady Wisdom. Often contrasted with Dame Folly, who lounges in doorways and invites men to idle away the hours with her, Lady Wisdom is marvelously productive and worth partnering up with. It's clear that the precursor to the Protestant work ethic lies in Hebrew scripture.

Don't stop know

"Let us not sleep like the rest," Paul warns the Thessalonians. Uh, oh. If you were hoping for respite in Paul's corner, you may be disappointed. The early church had its idlers: some who took the *parousia* (the second coming of Jesus) too literally and lost interest in worldly concerns, and others (no doubt) who just liked to party.

Paul refused to support a lazy interpretation of Christian hope. Knowing that this world is imminently "toast" only provides *more* incentive to put our shoulders to the wheel, evangelizing, giving instruction and counsel, and most of all offering a picture-perfect example of the new creation in which we place all our hopes.

And our faith teaches us that the day of that arrival *is* at hand, though the timing is secret—not because we have a stealth Messiah, but simply because the future belongs to God alone. We mortals have trouble just living down the past and trying to stay organized in the present. We may be in the dark about the exact hour of *the* hour, but as Paul says, we aren't living in the dark in our awareness of the truth. We don't have to guess who's coming to dinner. We know.

Wailing in the dark

Those who refuse to work with this truth and for the sake of it will live to regret that decision. If we choose to live in the dark we should not be surprised when we die into it as well. So we hear in the parable of the talents. The one who takes his master's wealth and buries it like a corpse is startled to hear later that he has sown the death of his own opportunities. He is not rewarded for his caution but punished for his cowardice and sloth. He will grind his teeth against the bitter taste of his forfeited hopes.

It's not mere laziness at fault, but also gutlessness. Jesus our storyteller, after all, is from the community that coined the term *chutzpah*. Taking a risk is as biblical as Noah, Abraham, Moses, and Mary of Nazareth. Though Christianity has historically looked down its nose at gambling, the whole of salvation history has been a divine roll of the dice—or the Urim and Thummim, if you will. In every episode, God has a plan but needs some human agent to lay his or her money down and share in the stakes. Will it be you this time, or I?

A piece of the action

The moral of the story is not to endorse workaholism, a serious illness affecting our culture. That sort of activity is, spiritually speaking, a waste of time—which is shorter than we think and not a commodity to squander. Likewise, we do need to be still and know God, who is productive in a way we can't measure or imagine. But wisdom recommends that we steer our lives around to the kind of productivity that bears fruit in the only harvest worth planting. What we have in our hands—our time, love, and free choice—is ready to be invested. God is looking for a partner in an amazing deal. Are we in or are we out?
