MASS INTENTIONS

Giving our testimony

Who are you? If you had to describe yourself to someone, how would you begin? Some of us would start with a physical description: I am so tall, with such color skin, hair, and eyes. . . . Others would begin with the relationships that define us: I am a parent; I am married or single; I live in community. We might define ourselves by our work: I am a student, a sales clerk, a lawyer, a busboy, or retired. If we are particularly brave or feel a need to declare ourselves, we may even find one word to testify to the deepest part of our experience: I am a Christian. I am a woman. I am gay. I am African American.

Testimony in reverse

When they put the question to John the Baptist, however, asking him, "Who are you?", he did not answer in any of these ways. Instead, he described himself by admitting who he was not: "I am not the Christ." John knew, of course, that *that* was the real question behind the inquiry being made of him. The leaders from Jerusalem didn't need to know his name or his occupation. They already knew he was John the baptizer and self-appointed scourge of God. What they really wanted to know was: Who did he *think* he was? What did he *think* he was doing? And most important of all, by whose authority was he doing these things?

"Are you Elijah?" they then asked. Did he consider himself the great prophet of Hebrew history, traditionally expected to return at the time of the messiah? "No," John said. So finally they grew exasperated with his denials and demanded that he give them an affirmative answer: "Then, what do you have to say for yourself?"

It was then that John described himself as a voice. He reduced his entire existence down to a single attribute: I speak. I speak for God.

How John arrived at this self-understanding is illuminating for those of us who may not be exactly clear on our own identity. We all know how to introduce ourselves to strangers; but which of us is sure of who we truly are at 3 in the morning when we can't sleep and don't know where our lives are headed? At those times, we may want to try introducing ourselves to *ourselves*. And John's self-introduction may help us.

Who we are not

So often we identify ourselves wrongly, because we have confused who we are with the roles we play. Sometimes parents cannot stop parenting, even when their children are full-grown. Or bosses run their families like corporations and wonder why it's not working. We make more fundamental mistakes when we define ourselves too narrowly or erroneously: as failures, or as bad sheep, or whatever image was affixed to us as children.

I knew a beautiful young woman who called herself "fat girl" because that was what her father had called her growing up. Though everyone else knew her as an accomplished person, intelligent, witty, kindhearted, she lived out of a very narrow identity and was prone to depression and defeatism as a result.

An essential part of living a Christian identity is to live in the truth. As it says in the gospel, the light is given to us, and we are to testify to it. There is no room in the life of a Christian for living in the dark. If lies have been told about us from an early age, we must not continue to tell them now as if they are true. We have to abandon them and step into the light. Poor self-esteem isn't just a sorry state of affairs. It is the territory of the prince of lies, and we are called out of it by our faith.

Called out of darkness

Stepping into the light may not be easy. It can require healing, and we have healing sacraments for that, like reconciliation and anointing. It may require counseling and 12-step programs to de-program ourselves from the lie and to embrace the truth. It can mean dramatic changes in the way we have been living, and it can mean ending relationships that were built to support what is untrue about us. For some rare few among us, it can simply mean making a decision to say no to the lie and yes to the truth.

We may want to review what John said first when they asked him who he was. He said he was not the Christ. We have to remember this about ourselves, too. We are not God. We are not self-sufficient, all-powerful, all together. We need others, we need help sometimes, we need support and encouragement and love. Being called out of the darkness and into the light can take time, and we shouldn't be too hard on ourselves. When you come out of a dark room, it takes time for your eyes to adjust to the light.

Naming who we are

Testifying to the truth about ourselves, as John demonstrated, comes in two stages. First is knowing who we are not and dispelling all the lies about ourselves we are tempted or socialized into telling. The second is in discovering who we truly are. John came to know himself as a voice, and so he spoke for God. And what are you: a voice, an ear, a heart, a hand? Each of us has been made uniquely suited to serve the God who loved us into being. And once we clear away the lies and step into the light, we will know quite precisely who we are.
