


Hello Redwooders and Neighbours,

The recreation team is busy preparing for upcoming summer weddings, reunions etc. Office hours have now returned to our normal five-day schedule.

We await the return of the wildlife in our community and the observation of the ice formations as the river breaks. Please keep your dogs on leash during the birthing of fawns and other wildlife and keep your dogs from going in the river. There have been instances in the past where dogs have been swept under the ice in a fast-moving current.

The Redwood Meadows Council has scheduled a Townhall meeting on Wednesday, April 5 at Redwood House to share our current financial position, debrief on the events of the past six months, and give a preview of potential Society bylaw changes. 

REDWOOD MEADOWS EMERGENCY SERVICES

Spring is here (we think!) and outdoor sports season starts soon. Help keep your young family members safe with some tips:



- **Protect your lid!** Helmets need to fit properly and be replaced whenever they have physical signs of wear OR have been worn in a physical impact situation.
- **Get checked!** Before playing organized sports, make sure young athletes receive a pre-participation physical exam by a doctor. This can help rule out any potential medical conditions that may place kids at risk.
- **Hydrate!** Bring a water bottle to practice and games. Encourage children to stay well hydrated by drinking plenty of water before, during and after play.
- **Stretch!** Stretching before practice and games can make a big difference by releasing muscle tension and helping prevent sports-related injuries, such as muscle tears or sprains. Make sure there is time set aside before every practice and game for athletes to warm up properly.
- **Take a break!** The off-season is important, too. It's recommended that kids get 10 consecutive weeks of rest from any one sport every year. Playing different sports throughout the year is okay!
- Get certified! Coaches should be certified in first aid and CPR, learn the signs and symptoms of a concussion, and help avoid overuse injury by resting players during practices and games.

CITY NATURE CHALLENGE: APRIL 28 - MAY 1, 2023

The fifth annual Calgary City Nature Challenge is back to celebrate the biodiversity living within our urban ecosystem! Show the world the amazing nature that can be found in Calgary by sharing your photos of flora and fauna to the iNaturalist app. 500 cities from across the globe will compete to see which can make the most nature observations, document the most species, and engage the most people. 41 cities in Canada will take part in 2023.

Help put Calgary's urban biodiversity on the map April 28-May 1! Explore anywhere in Calgary, Airdrie, Cochrane, Okotoks, Rocky View County, or Foothills County. Take photos of any birds, plants, insects, mammals, fungi, and even microorganisms you encounter and upload them to the iNaturalist app before May 7. The global and Canadian results will be announced on May 8. Your observations not only help Calgary and the surrounding areas to be recognized for nature but also lend to conservation research.




PICAPIX PUZZLE

A picture will evolve as you complete the puzzle. Start with the largest numbers or combination of, colour in squares and proceed to work back and forth between columns and rows.

The three basic rules are:

- 1. Numbers represent how many squares you colour in to form a group or block.
- 2. Leave at least one square between these blocks.
- 3. The sequential order of the numbers is the order of the blocks, i.e., top number for a column is the top, block, and left-most number for a row is the left-most block.


The "logic count method" shown below is very useful: The clue at the left of the row is 6, so count 6 squares from the left to right and then count 6 squares from right to left. Confidently shade in the overlapping squares.



This same method can be applied even when there is more than one number, remembering to allow one empty square between groups or blocks. Use a second colour for elimination of background squares.

BRAGG CREEK WILD: BE A WILD GARDENER: WORKING WITH WHAT BELONGS HERE

I'm not originally from "around here," as you probably noticed if you've read this column before! As a gardener from a very different climate, I've had some notable failures trying to cultivate some old favourites here. But I've also had some "aha" moments. One of them was when I came to the conclusion that there was no need for me to try and beautify what's already beautiful. Where we live, we're surrounded by majestic trees, gorgeous vistas, the sights, sounds and smells of this land. So now when I plant something, it's usually because I want to eat it.

There are obviously things to consider when planting veggies and herbs and so on here. Where I'm originally from, snails and slugs are the enemy, and I'm forever grateful that they aren't a major opponent here. On the other hand, I don't want my deer neighbours eating what is destined for my kitchen. With that in mind we can think about fencing off veggie gardens so that they can't munch their way through our precious shoots and leaves. It's clearly important to consider wildlife corridors as we do this, and keeping enclosures small can help. We can also watch where and how the animals tend to move through the space. At our place we have clear trails around the house and the surrounding land, so it makes sense to avoid placing beds and enclosures where those routes will be blocked.

The other thing we can do is work with the ecosystem, rather than against it. We can plant native species that are adapted to the way the seasons work here, and that don't need a lot of water. Native plants won't need to be fed, fertilized and protected with pesticides in the way introduced species might. They've evolved to survive with what the local ecosystem presents.

This is especially something to consider when it comes to lawns, which are often extremely hard work to maintain, and which are a much less rich habitat for butterflies, bees and other pollinators. Did you know that the types of grass usually used for lawns are non-native? A native alternative grass can be less work, more





drought tolerant and still beautiful.


Native wildflowers are a great addition. They will encourage and nourish pollinators, supporting larger species as well. Please don't use just any wildflowers, though. Check what is locally native. A general mix such as you might buy in some garden centres could contain species that would not survive here, or worse, there may be some invasive species included. And don't be tempted to take them from where they're already established and growing. Leave those for everyone to enjoy in their natural setting.

There are some very interesting projects and resources locally, nationally, and around the world where people are 'rewilding' or reintroducing native species to the patch of land they live on. For further reading and inspiration you could check out the links below—and why not try it this coming season?

- ALCLA-Native Plants Nursery: an excellent source of native plants to Southern Alberta grass, herbs, flowers and shrubs. They are located in the Bearspaw area. Please call beforehand to make sure they will have time to answer your questions and help you select the plants that are best suited for your surroundings. www.alclanativeplants.com
- <u>www.wildaboutflowers.ca</u> is an Okotoks/Black Diamond nursery that specializes in native flowers and plants. They offer seeds, plants, and advice on planting them.

GO GREEN WITH YOUR SPRING CLEANING

I love the longer days of spring. That beautiful sunshine streaming through the kitchen windows brightens up everything it touches. Unfortunately, it also glaringly illuminates every window streak, dust mote, coffee stain, handprint and toast crumb lurking in the kitchen. And it makes me think, "When WAS the last time I washed this floor? Christmas?" That's when I know it's time for spring cleaning.

Let me just say that knowing it's time for spring cleaning and actually doing the spring cleaning are two very different things. If you wait long enough, summer eventually arrives and all thoughts of a deep clean waft away until, well, they just waft away. But if you're serious about cleaning, and you feel the urge to refresh your house this season, by all means, jump right in.

Before you start, consider how clean you really need things to be. Everyone wants to kill germs and get rid of mold, but do you really need to attack all surfaces with harsh chemicals? There's a reason for the skull and crossbones labelling on some cleaners, and it's not a reason that's good for you and your family or the environment. Here are some gentler cleaners that are safe and easier on the water and land around us.

Baking Soda: Who doesn't love baking soda for its myriad applications as a cleaner? Use it to unclog a sink, scrub floors and countertops without scratching them, remove carpet odours, freshen laundry, etc., etc. Google "cleaning with baking soda" for more ideas. There are many! One of the best things about baking soda is the price. It's ridiculously cheap, even more so if you buy it in bulk.

Vinegar: Mix vinegar and water in equal amounts in a spray bottle and you are set to clean just about anything in the house. You can add some peppermint or tea tree oil to mask the smell, but I find the oils are more effective at clogging the sprayer than hiding any smell. Just think how much easier a noseful of vinegar is on your system than a whiff of harsh cleaners. Another hint: Heinz vinegar is easier on the nose than other brands.

Baking soda and vinegar: Also known as the ingredients in science project volcanos (at least until Diet Coke and Mentos came along), this combination just might convince your children to help with the cleaning. Sprinkle a good amount of baking soda into the toilet bowl, pour on some vinegar, and hand your loved one a toilet brush. Voilà.

Microfibre cloths: Who needs window cleaner with these little miracles of cleaning? Use a damp cloth for cleaning and a dry one to get rid of streaks on windows and stainless steel appliances. Instead of putting dirty cloths in the washing machine, boil them for 10 minutes in a pot on the stove.


Fresh air: One of my favourite ways to "spring-ify" the house is to air it out. When the weather is nice, throw open some windows and let the fresh air in.




