



A MESSAGE FROM REDWOOD MEADOWS MAYOR & COUNCIL



By now you have heard the fantastic news that our Master Sublease is signed, which means the Redwood Meadows lease extension to 2095 is official! We can now begin the process of executing individual subleases. Leaseholders should have received Sublease Execution Process instructions (sent by email and physical mail). We encourage everyone to begin the process immediately to ensure you meet the June 30 deadline. Several information sessions are scheduled to address questions.

Regarding COVID, the Townsite office is open by appointment but staff continue to work from home where possible. Thankfully, spring is here and we can all get outside to enjoy the many great amenities our community has to offer.

Townsite is preparing for spring activities on the sports field and disc golf course. Plans are in place to repair Curtis Field to make it an elite sporting venue for all participants. Tennis court resurfacing will commence shortly with the addition of pickleball lines. Spring sports registration is open, and there are several exciting new events coming to Redwood, including in-line skating camp and a Community Market! If that is not enough, ice cream is now available at the concession, which will remain open on Saturdays and special events.

The installation of our new Townsite-owned fibre internet line is expected to be complete in the coming weeks. Installation of our new LED streetlights should be underway by end of April. TsuuT'ina is also performing a major improvement initiative on the golf course in 2021; the Nation will provide more information in the coming weeks which we will pass along to residents.

Townsite, working with the Nation, has received approval from Transport Canada to conduct an aerial BTK Spruce Budworm control program. The entomologist is monitoring our situation closely and will confirm the appropriate time for application to have maximum effect. Townsite will communicate the exact days and time for application, anticipated sometime late May or early June. Watch the weekly Updater for more information.

In summary, 2021 is shaping up to be a great year for Redwood with lots of exciting initiatives underway. Our AGM will take place May 18th. Formal notice and information packages will be sent out shortly. Given COVID restrictions it will likely be a virtual meeting again this year. We look forward to seeing you there!

NOTICE: 2021 TAX NOTICES MAILED

Notice is hereby given, pursuant to Section 333(1) of the Municipal Government Act RSA 2000, Chapter M-26, that 2021 Notices of Taxation for the Townsite of Redwood Meadows were **mailed April 30, 2021**. All Redwood Meadows property owners are advised that taxes are due June 30, 2021. As per the <u>imposition of the Tax Penalties policy</u>, overdue taxes incur a **5% penalty after June 30** on any current unpaid balance, unless the resident is enrolled in the <u>Tax Installment Payment Plan (TIPP)</u>. An additional **5% penalty will be applied quarterly** on the total outstanding amount of any overdue taxes. Please contact Townsite Office if you have any questions or concerns at 403-949-3563.

Townsite has obtained a permit from Transport Canada for an aerial application of Btk. The application is anticipated for May or June and will occur over two days (with a possible 7-10 day gap in between), from 5am-8:30am. Closer to the date, a communication campaign will be delivered so all residents are aware and can plan accordingly.

Use your head; wear a helmet!

Each year, more than 700,000 people in Canada suffer from bicycle-related injuries that require hospital emergency room treatment and hundreds of children die from bicycle-related injuries. A helmet is the single most effective way to help reduce head injury and death from bicycle crashes. Helmets have been shown to reduce the risk of head injury by



as much as 85% and the risk of brain injury by as much as 88%. Approximately 75% of bicycle-related fatalities could have been prevented by wearing a properly fitted helmet. Here's some helmet safety tips:

- 1. Helmets are for everyone. Adults should also should wear a helmet for every ride. Children learn from watching you so model proper behavior!
- 2. Adults and children should wear a helmet for all wheeled-sports activities.
- 3. When skateboarding or long boarding, your child should wear a skateboarding helmet.
- 4. When it is time to purchase a new helmet, let your children pick out their own; they will be more likely to wear them for every ride.
- 5. Helmets should sit comfortably on the head all the way around, sitting level and stable enough to stay in place during violent shakes or hard blows.
- 6. Rest the helmet level on the head, not tilted.
- 7. Make sure the straps of the helmet form a "V" under the ears when buckled.
- 8. Have the strap underneath the chin fit comfortably snug.
- 9. Secure the helmet to the point that twisting and tugging cannot remove it.
- 10. Always replace a helmet after a crash. Damages may not be visible, but the foam can lose its integrity.

RAMBLINGS FROM THE REDWOOD GARDEN—STARTING YOUR COOL SEASON GARDEN

Redwood is considered a northern, cold weather climate where we can't quite trust our temperatures to remain above zero until at least the end of May, making for a short growing season. In addition to the short season, we also experience cooler night temperatures, which make it difficult for heat-loving veggies to thrive, including tomatoes, peppers, eggplant, melons and pumpkins. The upside to our northern climate is that we can grow the most delectable cool season crops. These crops can all be sown in May and they are wonderful for beginner gardeners.

Many gardeners have certain dates in mind when direct sowing their spring gardens. Some say you must not plant before the long weekend, others sow based on the moon's cycle and some wait for the nighttime temperatures to reach a certain degree above zero. I, however, have a tradition of sowing my veggie beds on Mother's Day.

Here are some excellent veggies crops that can be put into the dirt this month:

- Lettuce
- Arugula
- Spinach
- Kale
- Chard

- Peas
- Carrots
- Beets
- Radishes
- Potatoes

Zucchini, beans (pole and dwarf) also do very well in our climate but they will do best planted in early June. I like to give these seeds a head start by pre-sprouting indoors in May. I haven't tried direct sowing broccoli, cabbage or cauliflower but I'd like to try it this season!

If you are interested in gardening but you don't have a raised bed or would rather start small, you can plant your seeds right into a container on your deck. This year I'm hoping to try zucchini, carrots, radish and kale in planters on my deck.

We'd love to hear what you are growing this season! When do you sow your garden? What is your favorite crop?

I consider May the official start to the gardening season. I hope you can all find some time to get your hands in the dirt this month!



HEALTH AND WELLBEING: GET OUTSIDE AND GET HAPPY

Years ago, the David Suzuki Foundation hosted the 30 x 30 Nature Challenge in May. The campaign encouraged people to get outside in nature for at least 30 minutes every day of the month. I loved the idea, so I jumped onboard, thinking it would be simple to spend only 30 minutes outside every day. The reality surprised me – the challenge proved harder than I expected. (This was before we had a dog who liked to walk, I should add.) In fact, I spent a few chilly nights on the deck trying to get my daily time in before midnight.

The experience was so eye-opening and inspiring that I eventually made it a daily, year-round habit. When I turned 50 a few years ago, I challenged myself to spend as many minutes a day as years in my life in the fresh air. It's been fun – not to mention a great excuse to get outside whatever the weather or time constraints. I'm a little concerned about how I'll last for an hour and half outside in January when I'm 90, but we'll cross that bridge – ideally not in a wheelchair – when we come to it.

Why get outside? Well, why not! More and more research is showing the benefits in terms of increased happiness, lower blood pressure, more vitamin D, less stress and improved mental health. In late 2020, doctors in B.C. recognized the health benefits of nature with a program called <u>PaRx</u> that allows doctors to prescribe two hours a week in nature.

Every day, it seems, I read new evidence about the virtues of something that, deep down, we already knew: fresh air is good for us. I haven't even mentioned the fact that with the pandemic still haunting us, outdoor socializing is sometimes the only safe way to see friends and extended family. What a great reason to get outside!

Why not create your own outdoor challenge this May? It doesn't have to be forest bathing or deep meditation in a secluded wilderness area (although those are excellent options). 
PICAPIX PUZZLE

A picture will evolve as you complete the puzzle. Start with the largest numbers or combination of, colour in squares and proceed to work back and forth between columns and rows.

The three basic rules are:


- 1. Numbers represent how many squares you colour in to form a group or block.
- 2. Leave at least one square between these blocks.
- 3. The sequential order of the numbers is the order of the blocks, i.e., top number for a column is the top, block, and left-most number for a row is the left-most block.

The "logic count method" shown below is very useful: The clue at the left of the row is 6, so count 6 squares from the left to right and then count 6 squares from right to left. Confidently shade in the overlapping squares.



This same method can be applied even when there is more than one number, remembering to allow one empty square between groups or blocks. Use a second colour for elimination of background squares.





GREEN GRIPE-COFFEE, COFFEE, KILL ME NOW

must tip my hat respectfully to my fresh-ground, organic, cherrywood-filtered, smooth-as-silk, happy cup of black coffee. And no judgement for those who like theirs artificially flavoured, sweetened or creamed.

I might, however, have a gripe or two about how we reuse it.

First of all, coffee is both an alkaloid and a flavonoid. And, I insist on stating, it is not an energy drink. Actually, it's an energy thief. Caffeine mimics your body's natural neurotransmitter (in this case, the amino acid called adenosine, which motivates your body to rest and sleep), blocking up the receptor for adenosine and telling your body to perk up, wake up, and make happy.

If you have the privilege of memories dating back to mid-20th century, you may recall Ricardo Montalban's suave persuasion for Maxwell House's "good to the last drop." Well good thing, because caffeine withdrawal will mimic flu symptoms if you attempt to quit cold turkey, though in its favour, it also may relieve a migraine.

That brings me to the headache in this story: that coffee grinds are promoted for garden health.

Coffee grinds are soil binders, rich in nitrogen, but NOT an actual nitrogen fertilizer. Check. Grinds themselves aren't all that acidic, and microorganisms seem to like them. Check. But according to The Guardian, coffee grinds in soil acts a lot like that "energy thief" adenosine blocker in your body. It actually suppresses the growth of seeds for plants around it. It may even have antibacterial effects, which is bad for gardening, and "stalls root growth in young plants, preventing their uptake of water and nutrients." Gosh. Uncheck everything. Check the pathogens in plain old garden manure instead.

So, here's the good news. Your cup of coffee is delicious. And the bad – it really won't energize you or your garden any more than a bad headache.

REDWOOD MEADOWS RECENT MORTGAGE QUESTIONS & ANSWERS

What an exciting time for Alberta real estate! Redwood Meadows is a top pick for many families making a move, which is wonderful news for this community.

I love a good debate as much as the next person...but there are a few topics I find myself constantly debating when speaking with potential buyers considering Redwood Meadows. I would like to clear up some confusion.

MORTGAGE QUALIFICATION

When a Borrower is applying for a mortgage in Redwood Meadows, good news is they are not paying a higher interest rate because of the lease, nor are they subject to additional down payments, or any other extra restrictions. Applying for a mortgage here is just like applying for a mortgage on any other property (with Redwood Meadows suitable lenders of course), except:

- 1. with the ongoing monthly lease payment, this factors into a Borrowers overall debt-servicing. It is important even if a person is pre-approved or approved, that this payment is factored in correctly. Although not a large amount, it may throw off a mortgage limit if ratios are tight.
- 2. some bank branches insist on CMHC insurance (Borrower paying the premium) regardless of your mortgage amount. Normally, CMHC is only needed if a down payment is less than 20%. But some bank branches are demanding CMHC be paid no matter the mortgage amount. If this happens and your down payment is greater than 20%, a Borrower should consider an alternative branch or lender.

A LEASEHOLD PROPERTY IS NOT THE SAME AS A FREEHOLD PROPERTY

In Alberta, there are 3 main types of residential real estate: freehold, leasehold and condo/ strata. Freehold and


Leasehold are relevant in this conversation.

Freehold: Someone who owns the freehold of a property owns the house and the land it stands on, for an unlimited period.

Leasehold: Unlike a freeholder, as a leaseholder you own the house BUT NOT the land on which it is built – that is owned by the freeholder.

It is awesome that the lease is renewed and all Redwood residents will now enjoy many years of security. Yay! However, this doesn't change the fact that this is a leasehold community; it has not become a freehold type community. The fact that "the lease is for longer than I will live" or "I'll be carried out in a pine box before the lease ends" or "the lease is renewed so a lender should not care" are fun things to debate about, but simply not how we qualify mortgages. The end result is that leasehold property mortgage products and lender options may be different than what a Borrower has had in the past.

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



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
