A MESSAGE FROM REDWOOD MEADOWS MAYOR & COUNCIL



Hello Redwood!

After meeting with teachers to discuss achievements in school, progress reports are top of mind. Perhaps it's time we provide an update for residents on Townsite's work and progress. With many areas requiring maintenance or repair, Townsite staff and Council have chosen to focus on fire protection, flood prevention, security, and finances. Please keep reading for brief updates on each sector.

Fire Protection

We have started replacing aged electrical components that were identified as fire risks in a recent thermal safety inspection inside the water treatment plant. Additionally, an evaluation of fire hydrants will proceed within the week. Two hydrants were found to be operating improperly when they were used during recent water leak repair efforts. Once these are repaired, we will implement a routine hydrant maintenance plan.

Flood Protection

We have completed a review of the sewer lift station and found it to be operating significantly below its designed capacity. We are currently arranging to replace a pump that is beyond its service life and valves that are inoperable. Replacing these components and repairing the alarm and reporting system will better prepare us for future high-water events.

According to an old report recently reviewed, problems with our overland storm water drainage was identified as threats to Redwood. Over the decades since the system of culverts and ditches was implemented, debris and falling trees have blocked sections and are leading to water pooling near houses. It is also causing water to be inappropriately diverted into our overworked sewer system. In addition to volunteer-led cleanups, Council is working with Parks and Environment to obtain grant funds for a larger project.



Security

Council is aware of recent vandalism, car propelling, and speeding events. Thank you to those who reached out with concerns. In addition to repairing the security system at the water treatment plant, we have approved funds to repair non-functional camera systems on Townsite buildings. This should help deter vandalism. To address concerns about speeding and theft, we are working to secure an evaluation of streetlight-mounted speed sensors and cameras.

Water Systems

We have so far prevented more than two litres per second of drinking water loss and we have increased water pressure for many homes. After inspections of the water treatment plant urgently shifted our focus, we replaced overheating electrical components and repaired the security panel. We are aiming to have working water meters for each residence to ensure we each pay our fair share. It will also help us identify problem areas and accurate actual usage. Replacing the ~75% of non-functioning meters will occur after more review and installation plans can occur.

Finances

In our October working session, Council unanimously agreed to make financial reporting and controls the top priority for our CAO. We have approved a purchasing policy to better control spending and authorized \$15,000 to improve financial reporting, fix processes, and explain irregularities in grant funds.

A big part of financial planning for Alberta communities includes accessing provincial grants. Council continues to work on gaining improved recognition with the province. Building on the work of past mayors, we plan to access larger grants for water systems.

REDWOOD MEADOWS EMERGENCY SERVICES

Getting to know your volunteer community emergency services

We're answering more "Frequently Asked Questions" we receive about Redwood Meadows Emergency Services when we're out and about in the community.



How are RMES members trained?

RMES members join the team as "probationary" members (big shout out to the folks that wear black helmets!). Probationary members are closely supervised on calls until they attain a certain number of skill sign offs which can take up to a year to complete. Once members demonstrate the slate of industry standard skills typical for firefighters, emergency medical responders, and rescue technicians, they receive a yellow helmet and are no longer under close supervision. Through call attendance, training, and additional education, our firefighters can move up the ranks from a Class 5 firefighter to Class 1 firefighter. Each promotion reflects increased skill proficiency and leadership demonstrated.

All of the team receives annual first aid and Basic Life Support training and attends monthly medical inservices. Most of the team have pursued additional medical training at their own expense to achieve medical certifications such as: Fire Medical Responder, Emergency Medical Response, Primary Care Paramedic or Advance Care Paramedic. We also have a nurse on staff. This high level of medical training across our membership often saves lives before an ambulance even arrives.

How do RMES members know when there's a call?

Even though you won't see cars parked at the hall all the time, RMES members are ready to always respond to emergency calls. RMES members carry radios that alert to emergencies in the response area, as well as apps on their cell phones. When an emergency call comes in, an alert is pushed to member radios and phones. Members signal their intention by radio and/or app to head to the hall to assemble a crew and head to the emergency. As soon as the trucks roll out of the bays, members let Dispatch know they're on route so our dedicated dispatchers can coordinate information with partners and keep track of the crew for safety purposes.

What happens on weekend duty shifts?

Every weekend duty shift begins with crews doing a Pre-Trip Inspection on the four big trucks, including air brake checks, fluid checks, light checks and tire checks. In addition to attending to calls that come in, duty crews are responsible for inventorying one of the big trucks every shift to ensure tools are in good working order (and where they belong), inventory is restocked, and breathing apparatus are working. Each duty shift also does a deep clean of a section of the Hall, ensures paperwork is completed, Fire Smart assessments are booked, community correspondence is responded to, and during leftover time, training may take place.


PICAPIX PUZZLE

A picture will evolve as you complete the puzzle. Start with the largest numbers or combination of, colour in squares and proceed to work back and forth between columns and rows.

The three basic rules are:

- 1. Numbers represent how many squares you colour in to form a group or block.
- 2. Leave at least one square between these blocks.
- 3. The sequential order of the numbers is the order of the blocks, i.e., top number for a column is the top, block, and left-most number for a row is the left-most block.


The "logic count method" shown below is very useful: The clue at the left of the row is 6, so count 6 squares from the left to right and then count 6 squares from right to left. Confidently shade in the overlapping squares.



This same method can be applied even when there is more than one number, remembering to allow one empty square between groups or blocks. Use a second colour for elimination of background squares.

BRAGG CREEK WILD: RUTTING SEASON

t's that time of year again


Fall is here, after a fantastically warm and beautiful few weeks, and around now the deer are getting busy working on the next generation! Have you seen some "Rutting Season" signs around recently? Yes, it's that time of year again, when the white-tail deer and then—a bit later—the mule deer go into rut. The shorter days trigger this "photo-period". The bucks now have muscular thick necks and fully developed antlers, ready to spar and fight for the opportunity to mate with a doe in oestrus. They'll lose their antlers later in the winter after the rut, when their testosterone levels drop significantly. Often we see a single doe along the road at this time, and that could mean that there are several bucks in pursuit. Bucks may chase off fawns, too, which means they could be confused without their mum.

For males it's a time when every ounce of focus is on successfully fighting for dominance and chasing potential mates. In fact, they often lose a lot of body weight as a result of this singular focus—fasting and fighting make them vulnerable. That means their attention isn't on the dangers of the roads running through their territory. For us around Bragg Creek and Redwood Meadows this means being alert on all local roads. Deer may be drawn to roadways by salt on roads and vegetation in ditches, or they may be in mid-chase, as they steer a doe to a secluded place to mate.

November is the most dangerous month in Alberta for wildlife-vehicle collisions (WVCs), with approximately 80% of those involving deer. On average, the number of WVCs is more than double that of any other month in the year, according to the AMA. Costs in insurance payouts can be huge for vehicle damage, and there are often personal injuries as well. The highest numbers occur around the time the clocks change (November 6th this year).

As always, play it safe when driving in deer country. Be particularly aware at dawn and dusk—the danger factor increases overwhelmingly at these times of day. Look out for movement in the shadows in daytime, too, and watch for spots of light (eyes) at night.

- Don't speed—especially on slick roads it's hard to slow down or stop quickly enough if a deer appears on the road ahead of you.
- Use high beams when possible, while still respecting other drivers.
- Keep your eyes on the roadside as well as the road ahead. Deer may be browsing in the ditch. They may also not be alone.
- If you encounter a deer on the road, brake gently. Don't swerve—you don't want a collision with oncoming traffic.
- If a deer is standing in the middle of the road, don't use your horn or lights. Instead, you could steer *very* slowly towards the animal's rear end and that may encourage it to continue in the direction it was headed. Or you could wait.

Let's keep ourselves and our neighbours (human and otherwise) safe this fall. If you see an injured deer (or other wildlife) you can report it to AIWC: 403 946 2361.

MORTGAGE MATTERS: FIXED OR VARIABLE?

With rates on the rise, which option is best for you? Should you stick with the stability of a fixed mortgage rate or roll the dice with a variable? It's one of the most difficult decisions faced by new homebuyers and homeowners who are renewing or refinancing. With fixed rates steadily increasing and the Bank of Canada indicating that they are not finished raising rates, the question is timelier than ever. Let's take a look at the options and weigh the pros and cons.

FIXED RATE

Many Canadian borrowers opt for the stability of a fixed rate. And in most cases, the 5-year fixed is the term of choice. This is because it locks your rate for the duration of the term, giving you the peace of mind that your monthly mortgage payments are going to remain the same. Thanks to the high demand of the 5-year term, lenders are generally able to offer competitive rates, making them great value from a risk-assessment perspective. Plus, you don't have to worry about your mortgage renewal for five years. The downside is that rate stability and peace of mind may come at a cost, at least in comparison to lower-priced variable rates*. Another big downside is the prepayment penalty on a fixed term mortgage. If your life plans change inside your 5-year term, you may pay a hefty penalty to break a fixed mortgage contract.

VARIABLE RATE

For those looking strictly for the lowest rates currently available, chances are that is going to be a variable rate*. A variable rate mortgage is one where the interest rate fluctuates with the prime rate, which is set by the Bank of Canada's key lending rate decisions eight times per year. Aside from competitive rates, variable mortgages are very attractive for those who think they may need to break their contract before the term is up, since variables charge a prepayment penalty of just three months interest. Variable rates do have a degree of risk however, since your interest rate can suddenly rise (or fall) depending on a host of economic, inflationary, and geopolitical factors. When the rate increases, so too will your monthly mortgage payment. If you're not crazy about the idea of your monthly payments potentially changing over the course of your term, there are

certain lenders that offer fixed-payment variable rates. In those cases, your monthly payment remains the same while the amount paying down your principal versus interest will fluctuate.


BUT THERE IS ANOTHER OPTION


Another option is the "multiple product" mortgage, which allows a fixed rate and a variable rate (and/or potentially a home equity line of credit as well). This provides you with the best of both worlds—the stability of a fixed rate, but also the potential rate savings of a lower variable rate. A multiple product mortgage is a great option for anyone having a hard time choosing between the two, and a great way to hedge your future rate expectation bets. While only 1-in-17 opt for a multi-mortgage, it's worth considering given today's uncertain rate outlook.


