The Tsuut'ina Nation Police Service would like to notify residents of recent car prowlings that occurred in Redwood Meadows at approximately 3:00am on September 21, followed by additional prowlings on September 22.

At this time, we are asking citizens to check home surveillance systems and to report anything they deemed suspicious between the hours of 2:00-3:00am on September 22, 2022.

We recommend everyone to create an evening routine for themselves. The routine should include:

- * Making sure all valuables are removed from vehicles
- * Ensuring vehicles are locked, windows are closed and, if possible, parked in a garage
- * Closing and securing garage doors and windows
- * Locking all doors, including those inside the garage that lead into the house
- * Turning on your exterior light

We encourage anyone who is a victim of a car prowling, break-and-enter or other crime to come forward and report the details.



A MESSAGE FROM REDWOOD MEADOWS MAYOR & COUNCIL



Hello Redwood!

Thank you to the many people who have reached out and asked if there is anything they can do to help with our drinking water and wastewater systems. With fall just around the corner, we ask residents to please be mindful of areas that may accumulate leaves or other debris near culverts and storm water drainage on your property. When water can't get to the system of ditches designed to take water out of Redwood, it may add to the stress on our sewer system. We all need to help prevent sewer overflows. We are discussing the potential of a community clean-up that would focus on drainage ditches and culverts. Please let us know if you are interested in participating.

Another way you can help is to ensure your sump pumps are draining outside. Our sewers were never designed to accept water from sump pumps and they also add to the stress on our lift station. This is why Townsite Bylaws require all sump pumps to drain outside. Please check your sump pump and if it's connected to the drain in your house, please call a plumber to correct it.

In one of our recent operational meetings, the topic of volunteerism was discussed. We recognize that volunteers have always played a big role in Redwood Meadows and are crucial to the community's success. If you are interested in volunteering in the future at community events, help on committees or have suggestions, please contact Townsite or RMCA.

We also want to remind community members that it's essential to keep dogs on leash, pick up after your pets, and please only put garbage out on garbage day. This reminder comes after an incident on August 28th in which a provincial fish and wildlife officer euthanized a mother bear and orphaned three cubs after repeated encounters with Bragg Creek residents. Garbage left out by residents had attracted the bears, said an official with Alberta Environment and Parks.

Redwood Meadows has offered to support Bragg Creek by sharing the rules and bylaws we have created to reduce wildlife-human interactions. In our continuing efforts to eliminate wildlife conflicts, we are working to reduce organics in our garbage. More to come on this topic.





Keeping residents informed about Townsite projects is important to us. Here is a quick update on some of the work in progress:

- **Lift station** Clean-up continues and we are getting quotes for required work. Our goal is to restore the station to minimum operating standards and prevent future spills.
- Electrical thermal inspection A safety inspection of the electrical systems at the water treatment plant identified nine areas that are overheating and pose a potential fire risk. Corrective work is being expedited.
- **UV** sterilizers An inexpensive change to this system will enable us to improve reliability and reduce water treatment plant operating costs.
- **Water meters** We have successfully negotiated partial warranty coverage on the 250+ residential water meters that must be repaired. More to follow.
- **Water leaks** After completing the first major dig and repair, we are reviewing costs to help guide future spending. The next dig will proceed soon.

We must act to ensure the integrity of our drinking water and to safely dispose of waste. We can no longer defer maintenance. As stewards of this land, we must minimize the impact on the surrounding river and lands. Current spending on improving our water systems and services is necessary. Once these systems are restored to minimal operating levels, the creation of a maintenance regimen will be key in preventing future problems.

We can solve these issues if we focus on working together on solutions. Using creativity, we can address immediate concerns and continue to work towards funding for replacement and/or rehabilitation. With a solid and supportive community, your volunteer Council and committee members will work with Townsite staff to implement solutions. Now is the time to unite as a community and rally behind protecting our most valuable resource—our water.



BLEEDER VALVES

Some homes in Redwood Meadows have bleeder valves installed to prevent water lines from freezing in extreme cold temperatures. Townsite is asking residents who have bleeder valves, to please let Townsite know and check that they are turned off at this time.

SCHOOL BUS SAFETY

According to the Public Spaces Protection Order 2020 (page 4), you can't fly without express prior consent. This means that you must have permission from the landowner or occupier before flying a drone in their area.

REDWOOD MEADOWS EMERGENCY SERVICES



Getting to know the Redwood Meadows Emergency Services team better!

Summer is always a busy time in the greater Bragg Creek area and this year was no different. We thought we would take an opportunity to answer "commonly asked questions" we receive when we're out and about.

Who is in the big red trucks we see around town or going to emergencies?

RMES is staffed by approximately 30 volunteer firefighters that live in the community or neighbouring communities such as Calgary and Cochrane.

How many calls do you do annually?

In a typical year, we respond to almost 400 calls. At time of writing, we have responded to over 270 calls for assistance in 2022—that's more than one call a day! About 50% of our calls are medical, in partnership with AHS EMS; about 25% are rescue (motor vehicle collisions, recreational accidents, etc.); and less than 20% are fires.

How do you choose who works at RMES?

We have a Recruitment Strategy that we follow to ensure we have a suitable number of members to respond to calls in a certain amount of time and properly staff the trucks responding. It's important that our department reflects the diverse community we serve, so we actively recruit to strengthen our team with members with different life/professional experience, culture, gender and orientations. Applicants must submit a detailed application and are invited to audit two of our training nights to get to know the team and the kind of work we do. From there, they may be asked to participate in an interview with our Recruitment Team and may be offered a place on the team.

What kind of hours do the volunteer staff at RMES put in?

In 2021, RMES members invested over 14,000 volunteer hours in the community. They're on track to invest even more hours in 2022! We operate 24 hours a day, 7 days a week, 365 days a year. Each member is asked to attend a minimum of two Tuesday training nights each month (7:30pm – 10:30pm) plus additional external training opportunities, two weekend duty shifts a month (8am – 8pm), attend as many calls as possible, as well as community events (Canada Day parade, Bragg Creek Days parade and pancake breakfast, Burn Camp, Halloween haunted house, school visits, FireSmart Assessments, safety patrols etc.). Some members contribute additional volunteer hours to do administration work, newsletter submissions, vehicle maintenance, recruitment, radio programming/maintenance, etc.

Do RMES members get paid?

RMES members receive a small honorarium annually based on hours of service (number of calls attended, number of hours spent in training/attending community events). The greatest gift our members receive is the community's thanks for a job well done.

REDWOOD MEADOWS COMMUNITY GARDEN

Garlic in the Redwood Meadows Community Garden

Let's talk about our favorite plants. They grow well despite our short seasons, they seem to stay alive and perky through the weeks of extreme summer heat, but they also are not fazed by a late spring visit from Jack Frost. Best of all, the insatiable deer turn their nose up at them! There are only a small handful of plants that make my list, and garlic sits right at the top.



I hadn't a clue that you could grow garlic in Alberta, never mind Redwood Meadows, until I met a wonderful gardening friend from Bragg Creek. She was growing beautiful, glorious garlic in her raised beds and offered me a crumpled paper bag with a few bulbs to try out.

I planted those garlic cloves in the late fall in my backyard under a generous and cozy blanket of mushroom and leaf compost. And I did as all gardeners do, went about my winter and forgot all about them. The following spring, the cloves awoke, and the keen shoots pushed their way above the soil. That year, I harvested at least 40 large, spicy, pungent red Russian garlic bulbs from my backyard garden in Redwood Meadows.

Last fall we devoted a full 8x4 bed at the community garden to growing garlic. We mainly planted seed garlic, which is garlic grown especially for planting.

All of the seed garlic sprouted and turned into excellent sized bulbs. We also experimented with our own backyard garlic, which performed well. Lastly, we dedicated two square feet to testing grocery store bought garlic. We tested generic garlic from China and organic garlic from Ontario. All of the organic garlic sprouted and grew into decent sized bulbs, but only one of the generic cloves sprouted, and then died shortly afterwards from frost.


The reason the generic garlic did not sprout or grow is due to chemical sprout inhibitors that are sprayed on the garlic to keep it from sprouting after you've purchased it. This garlic is for cooking, not for planting! It has also been grown in China, which is a very different climate to our own.

I prefer to buy large seed garlic from a local supplier to get the best chance of a good harvest, but go ahead and experiment. Replant your own harvested garlic for free but be sure to pick your biggest bulbs or purchase organic garlic from the grocery store. This year, I purchased incredible garlic from a Hutterite Colony at the Calgary Farmer's Market that would be exciting to test out.

If you are interested in learning more, please join us October 16th from 9:30-10:30am at the community garden, where we are offering a free workshop on growing garlic. Seed garlic will be available for purchase.



"Is Kyle up yet?" Jake asked his mom as he poured his morning cereal. He was eager to fill him in on this year's best candy spots.


"He left early this morning," she replied. "He's got those midterm exams coming up and wanted to get in a full day studying. I'm sorry, Jakey," she added.

FITNESS WITH ANN: YOU'RE NEVER TOO LATE TO TRY "SPEED FITNESS"

A reader wrote in to describe her fitness strategy, which involved parking her car as far as possible from the entrance to work. When someone asked her why she did that, since she was always running late, she replied, "Some people get up early so they can run. I get up late so I have to."

Consciously or not, I've been living by those words ever since. I've sprinted through airport terminals, leapt onto ferries, bolted down bike paths with a jogging stroller and a desperate expression, and arrived at many a work site sweaty and breathless. You could call this method of inadvertent exercise "speed fitness." (Punctual people might just call it "foolish.")

My favourite example of speed fitness was a hike I did with a friend years ago. As we meandered along, it slowly dawned on us that we had grossly underestimated the length of the loop. My children were at school all day, but my friend's daughter finished at noon. She'd be waiting at the school door with a sad face—and a sadder teacher.

A trail sign confirmed our suspicions, so we made the decision to backtrack. In the process of rushing to make it back for noon, we cut our return time by almost 20 minutes. 


PICAPIX PUZZLE

A picture will evolve as you complete the puzzle. Start with the largest numbers or combination of, colour in squares and proceed to work back and forth between columns and rows.

The three basic rules are:

- 1. Numbers represent how many squares you colour in to form a group or block.
- 2. Leave at least one square between these blocks.
- 3. The sequential order of the numbers is the order of the blocks, i.e., top number for a column is the top, block, and left-most number for a row is the left-most block.


The "logic count method" shown below is very useful: The clue at the left of the row is 6, so count 6 squares from the left to right and then count 6 squares from right to left. Confidently shade in the overlapping squares.



This same method can be applied even when there is more than one number, remembering to allow one empty square between groups or blocks. Use a second colour for elimination of background squares.

BRAGG CREEK WILD: ALL CHANGE!

In this part of the world, fall seems to come upon us suddenly. The colours change swiftly, temperatures start to dip, and the leaves can disappear from the trees within a weekend—or at least it feels like they do!

This is a time of year when we all shift focus: kiddos go back to school, we put away our summer gear and look forward to things like Halloween, and the whole holiday season. Swap our sunhats for toques.

Fawns are losing their spots, birds are starting to migrate, and around now, bears are in the midst of their hyperphagia phase. That's when they stuff in as many calories as they possibly can in order to survive their winter sleep. This year the buffaloberry harvest hasn't been good, so bears are on the lookout for *any* source of calories they can find. This is a time of year when it's essential for us to be vigilant about not leaving them any easy pickings—we don't want them to become habituated. We can help by making sure they don't have access to waste or compost, bird feeders, pet food and so forth.

Of course, while we're out and about on the trails, too, we're more likely to surprise distracted bears who are paying more attention to finding food than to looking out for us. So, it's important to keep dogs on leash, and

We're soon coming up to the season when the deer are mating, too, and that means they are also distracted. Road safety is a specific concern at this time. Rocky View County have once again promised to supply road signs to remind us of the rutting season. MORTGAGE MATTERS: SWITCHING LENDERS IF NECESSARY

There is potential for security and/or savings for those who are proactive in managing their mortgage. You may think renewing or transferring your mortgage is reserved for the end of your term—at your maturity date or term-end is a great time—but you can do it anytime.

Furthermore, most borrowers often look to change their mortgage during times of financial struggles. However, it is actually when you're in a good place that is the ideal time to consider renewing or switching your mortgage.

In times of increasing rates and/or financial uncertainly, consider taking charge now!

Fixed rates are predicted to keep increasing. If you have a maturity date in the next 120 days you can lock-in now for the term end. If your maturity date exceeds 120 days (but not long enough to ride-out the possible increases over the next few years), switching soon and locking in a new 5-yr may provide protection against further increases.

Option 1. You can leave your mortgage at your term end/maturity date. Your mortgage contract has ended and you're free to stay, switch to a new lender, or even pay it off if you have the means.

Option 2. You can renew or switch your mortgage while you are still within your contract. If you are breaking your mortgage within term you may be charged a prepayment penalty by your current lender. That penalty (*up to \$3000) may be rolled into the new mortgage. A prepayment penalty is a fee that your lender may charge if you break your mortgage contract.


The way your prepayment penalty is calculated varies from lender to lender. The prepayment penalty will usually be the higher of:

- an amount equal to 3 months' interest on what you still owe
- the interest rate differential (IRD). The interest rate differential is the difference between the interest rate on your current mortgage term and today's interest rate for a term that is the same length as the remaining time left on your current term

Depending on the rate you're leaving, the new rate today, and/or the potential new rate imposed upon maturity, incurring the penalty now may still save you money in the long run. Or, if you wait until your mortgage term ends, everything can be redone and you can easily transfer your mortgage to any lender which saves you paying any penalty. *A new lender under a "switch" program will also pay your legal costs to switch, so there is no cost to you.

Application requirements differ from lender to lender but you will need a copy of your latest mortgage statement, proof of homeowners insurance, plus standard income verification and credit worthiness. OAC.

* Lenders allow up to \$3000 under a "switch" program whereby they pick up all transaction costs (admin, legal, etc.); a "refinance" program allows any penalty amount to be included without limit, but lenders may not pick up the transaction costs. OAC.
