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A MESSAGE FROM REDWOOD MEADOWS MAYOR & COUNCIL



Hello Redwood!

We hope you enjoyed a wonderful summer. As we head into the fall, I would like to tell you about all the work completed on our water systems over this summer.

As outlined in previous communications, the condition of Redwood Meadows water systems is beyond being a mere nuisance. To help understand the gravity of this situation, we have produced a series of videos that can be viewed at: https://www.redwoodmeadows.ab.ca/videos

Many Residents have been asking about the state of our water systems and if it is worth fixing after years of band-aid solutions. They are wondering if it would be better to just replace the water treatment plant and leaking pipes. The short answer is that we need to do both.

Water treatment is vital to the health of our community. With our current systems under extreme stress, we must and are acting now to ensure we continue providing clean drinking water and safe waste disposal.

Our immediate plan includes:

- Improving Townsite Expertise: By hiring an Operations Manager that is certified in water systems, we are quickly identifying and fixing issues that relieve pressure on our systems and reduce their operating costs
- Leak Mapping: By using isolation techniques and engaging an acoustic leak detection company, we are mapping the locations and approximate size of all water leaks in Redwood Meadows.
- **Repairing Leaks**: The critical step of mapping leaks is enabling us to prioritize our limited budget for digs and focus on the biggest leaks.
- Urgent Repairs & Maintenance: Evaluation of our infrastructure has identified critical safety and reliability concerns like ineffective filter media, suspected electrical overheating, and a broken furnace that must be addressed quickly.
- Optimizations and Cost Control: By evaluating the operations of our water systems, we are identifying opportunities to reduce ongoing costs like chemical purchasing and after-hours callouts.

The time for band-aid solutions has come and gone. We must act to reduce the more than one million litres of water we are paying to treat and that leaks into the ground every day. We must address the urgent maintenance issues that have led to Boil Water Orders and sewage spills. We are taking action now.

Townsite's new Operations Manager, Mike Papuc, has already begun repairing leaks, evaluating our systems, and getting things done. After just nine days in his new role, Mike identified the first major leak. Within a week, the water line had been dug up and repaired. This one fix is saving the equivalent of 345,000 bottles of water a day and is starting to relieve pressure on our water systems. Mike has also identified another area with high water loss and at the time of writing was planning a second dig along Redwood Meadows Drive. You may have noticed that water pressure in Redwood Meadows has improved. Mike intends to continue increasing it as he makes progress with leaks and overdue maintenance. When you see Mike and Joey out working on our essential systems, please take a minute to thank them for their efforts.

While the Operations team continues to work hard at fixing leaks and easing the pressure on the aging water treatment plant, Council is working on funding a five-year, multi-million dollar plan to rebuild it. To this end,

we continue to move ahead with the following to improve, impart and influence:

- **Government Lobbying:** Though Redwood Meadows enjoys support from some government bodies, others choose not to support us. We are working hard to increase the departments that recognize our existing "Townsite" status and provide funding and access to grants (Societies typically cannot access some grants).
- Targeted Communications Campaign: There have been website improvements by adding historical reports, informative videos, and community resources related to our water systems and how we are addressing this major issue.
- Improved Community Outreach: To ensure all residents are kept informed and to address the lack of a current and up-to-date list of community members, we will implement a membership system.

Many have asked how they can help. Our immediate request is that each homeowner ensures their sump pumps are draining outside. Please check your sump pump and if you find that it is connected to the drain in your house, please call a plumber to correct it. Our sewers were never designed to accept sump pump runoff. Our bylaws require all sump pumps to drain outside. This simple task will help reduce the burden on our lift station and help prevent sewer overflows.

Simple tasks of support and constructive feedback will help us move forward. We must not seek to lay blame but rather work together to solve problems creatively. With a strong and supportive community, your volunteer committee members and Council can work with Townsite staff to develop creative solutions. We must now unite as a community and rally behind protecting our most valuable resource: our water. Not just for safe drinking but the culture of our community. For our rink, our oval, our fire protections, and our property values.

SOCIETY MEMBER REGISTRATION

We need each household to provide the names, addresses, and eligible dates of membership for all members in their household. Eligible dates would be the date of residency

or the date a resident turned 18 years of age after becoming a resident. Please contact the Townsite office as soon as possible to update your household's information.

REMINDERS

Motorized vehicles are strictly prohibited on the berm and pathways.

Dogs are required to be on leash at all times off their property and under the control of the owner with the following exception only: Berm certified dogs may be off leash only on the designated river berm area as long as they are displaying identification and are under the control of the owner and not posing a threat to any other person or animal.



Your ability to get out of your home during a fire depends on advance warning from smoke alarms and advance planning. Pull together everyone to make a plan:

- Draw a map of your home. Show all doors and windows.
- Visit each room. Find two ways out.
- All windows and doors should open easily. You should be able to use them to get outside.
- If any of your second exits are through an upstairs window, make sure you have an escape ladder in that room.
- Make sure your home has smoke and carbon monoxide alarms. Push the test button to make sure each alarm is working.
- Pick a meeting place outside. It should be in front of your home.
- Everyone will meet at the meeting place. Make sure your house or building number can be seen from the street (day or night).
- Once everyone is outside, make sure no one goes back inside for any reason.
- Talk about your plan with everyone in your home (especially babysitters and visitors).
- Make sure everyone in your home knows how to dial 911.
- Practice your home fire drill. Modern homes burn very quickly so you have a very short time to get out!
- Draw your Home Fire Escape Plan and post in on the fridge.

FROM THE OFFICE OF MLA MIRANDA ROSIN: QEII JUBILEE MEDAL

/ am seeking nominations for individuals from our community who you believe to be recognized for their public service at the highest level – from the Crown.

If you know me, you will know that I admire Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II. So much so, that my mother and I recently flew to London, England to participate in the Platinum Jubilee celebrations. At 96 years old, Her Majesty has served as a mechanic in the war, trained and raced her own fleet of horses, personally driven around the Saudi King at a time when it was still a punishable offence for women to drive in his home country, and participated in high level tactical and political conversations with some of the most iconic leaders of our lifetime. She has held over 50 ranks in the British military, given assent to over 4000 acts of parliament, and served as a beacon of stability on the world stage. In 2022, much of this may seem ordinary, but when put in the context being a woman thrust into public service at just age 27 in the mid-1900s, it is all quite extraordinary.

That is why our government, and every other provincial government across the country, will be honouring Her Majesty's Jubilee through Platinum Jubilee Medals. These medals will be given to outstanding individuals who have, as she has done, dedicated their lives to family, community, and country. This is where I need your help: I am seeking nominations for the medals. If you know someone in our constituency who has led a life of service, please nominate them. We will need their:

- Full name
- Age, or your closest estimate
- Field of endeavour
- Home address
- Phone number and email, and
- 300 word maximum justification for nomination.

My office will then choose those most deserving candidates and submit them to the Jubilee Medal Office for validation. The medals will subsequently be awarded at a ceremony full of fanfare in true Crown style.

As Her Majesty is celebrating 70 years on the throne, making her the longest serving British Monarch in history, a total of 7,000 medals will be awarded to deserving Albertans.

To nominate someone, please email my office at Banff.Kananaskis@assembly.ab.ca. The deadline to submit nominations will be November 30, 2022.

Queen Elizabeth performed her first public engagement at age 16, and at age 21 recited her ever-famous quote that her whole life, whether it be long or short, shall be devoted to our service. In honour of her Platinum Jubilee, we are searching for other individuals in our community that have embodied that same mantra. I look forward to receiving your submissions, and eventually meeting the incredible individuals behind your nominations.

Year 1 in the Redwood Meadows Community Garden

"A garden is always a series of losses set against a few triumphs, like life itself" – May Sarton

This is my favorite gardening quote and I can't think of a better way to sum up our first season at our community garden.

We begun the season with 10 beds, and thanks to our friends from the Bragg Creek and Redwood Meadows Wellness Network, we were able to add five more through a special grant they applied for on our behalf. The beds were quickly allocated to keen gardeners and the season begun! Well... the season stalled. We had a late season frost that killed about 20 tomato plants and a dozen peppers, not to mention many tender annual flowers. Then came monsoon June, which the lettuce, peas and cool season veggies loved, but our heat lovers stalled. We noticed our kale and our second planting of radishes begin to wilt, and when they were pulled, they had been devoured by root maggots. Flea beetles quickly located our brassica and moved in for the season, covering cauliflowers, arugula, broccoli and cabbage with tiny holes.

We were feeling a little down in the dumps by the end of June. But then, like magic, summer arrived! The garlic was thriving, the lettuce tasted of butter and everything finally began to show some growth. The August heat has brought us tomatoes, beans galore and a thriving bed of carrots and beets. A glorious pollinator garden, planted by our friend, Sharon Pegg, brings colour and an abundance of beneficial insects.

When I visit the garden, the minutes slip away—weeding a bed, pulling a carrot for my small garden helper, harvesting the magic purple beans, smelling the curry plant in the sensory garden... Our community has put so much work into this space but the garden has paid us back tenfold, perhaps not with perfect bountiful produce, but a peaceful productive space that we get to share with our community of friends.

Many hands have helped build this space, and we thank everyone who has been a part of it. We have a lot of ideas and plans for next year and we can't wait to share them with you!

ORIGIN STORIES: A FAIR TRADE—A BRIEF HISTORY OF COFFEE (PART III)

Cooler weather and shorter days can only mean one thing: autumn is coming. It's the beginning of cozy season. The time of year when we stop drinking our coffee iced, and start drinking it pumpkin spiced.

But about a decade before Starbucks popularized that now-ubiquitous holiday drink, the coffee industry was starting off the new millennium in a hard way. While Y2K didn't result in computers exploding and planes falling out of the sky, it did see a crash in the global price of coffee — the second in less than a decade. The introduction of Vietnam to the coffee scene saw a spike in market supply.

Between 1990 and 2000, Vietnam would increase production from 1.3 million bags to almost 15 million, as they began to capitalize on a nearby emerging coffee market with an expanding population of about 1.25 billion people: the People's Republic of China.

With the market oversaturated, coffee farmers around the world were struggling. And while today's coffee landscape is far from perfect, two simultaneous circumstances beginning just before the turn of the millennium helped revive the global coffee industry: certifications and specialty coffee.

You may be familiar with certain certifications found on your coffee packaging; the Rain Forest Alliance frog and the Fair Trade icons are two of the most recognizable. These certifications gained popularity in the early 90s, as consumers became more aware of the global supply chain. Fair Trade coffee, for example, must be purchased at the set price of \$1.40(USD)/pound, a livable wage for coffee farmers.

These certifications, though, aren't without flaws. For example, coffee farmers must pay to acquire them, and even those who can afford to do so may not be able to find buyers. Most major coffee companies will purchase some Fair Trade coffee, but this generally makes up only a small percent. For example, Starbucks' Fair Trade coffee purchases peaked in 2014 at only 8.6% of their beans.



Other certifications like the Rain Forest Alliance require growers to adhere to strict environmental production systems, but do not include a guaranteed minimum price for the beans. Additionally, coffee companies can include the frog logo on their packaging with as little as 30% of the beans actually coming from certified Alliance farmers.


On top of that, major coffee producers Starbucks and Nespresso have opted to create their own certification bodies that oversee their supply chain. While Starbuck's C.A.F.E. (Coffee and Farmer Equity) Practices and Nespresso's AAA Sustainable Quality Program do have high levels of transparency and an undeniable positive impact, as recently as 2020 both coffee brands were connected to a child-labour investigation in Guatemala where children as young as 13 were working 40-hour weeks in grueling conditions, for meager wages.

Of course, Starbucks is an easy target for criticizing the operations of multinational corporations, but they also played a key role in revitalizing and revolutionizing the industry through the rise of specialty coffee. Originally founded to sell high-quality, roasted beans, Starbucks would experience colossal growth in the 90s by popularizing espresso based drinks, such as the cafe latte.

For the first time in over a century, coffee was once again becoming a luxury, with customers more willing to pay premium prices for better quality beans. And while the rise of specialty coffee may not help the small farmer who can't afford to grow the specialty beans in the first place, it has helped curb the 'race-to-the-bottom' trend in coffee production.

So what can you do to help the global coffee market? Why not learn a little about where your coffee comes from? In most supermarkets the coffee aisle offers an array of options for you to explore. Check for certifications, compare prices, and try something new. You might just find a new favorite brew to start your morning.

BAKING WITH ANN: TRY THIS EASY SWEET TREAT FOR THE FAMILY

A few weeks ago, I had the urge to bake at 9:30 at night. I started going through recipes that I'd been meaning to try, looking for something quick and tasty. The first recipe – buckwheat cardamom chocolate cookies – looked good but called for browned butter. And not only did you have to brown the butter, you also had let it cool for 20 minutes. Next.

Tahini cookies – vegan and gluten-free. Well, I didn't have enough tahini, and who would eat them anyway, besides me? Fig bars? The dough needed to chill. Gingersnaps? Same.

And so it was time to whip up the old crowd-pleasing standby: chocolate chip bars. I may already have shared this recipe, but it's so simple, I'm going to do it again.

These treats were a family favourite, and likely a favourite of my mom's too since she baked most sweets from scratch for our family of six. I can see why they appealed to her (easy!) and to us as kids (sweet!) (Scotch teas were also in regular rotation, but never my first choice since they somehow managed to be both buttery and dry at the same time. Ugh.)

Anyway, the recipe calls for butter, brown sugar, vanilla, flour, salt and chocolate chips. Unless you truly don't ever bake, you likely have all the ingredients on hand. Actually, it also calls for nuts, but my mother would never have defiled this recipe by adding them. While she may have liked nuts, she knew her audience. We kids would never have tolerated such an abomination. So, no nuts. Unless of course you like them. I also like nuts in baking these days, but strangely, I've never tried them in these bars. I just add more chocolate chips. (I never said these were healthy!)

P.S. In case you need an even easier sweet recipe, Google wacky cake. Easy, chocolatey, delicious and vegan.

Chocolate Chip Bars

1 cup butter

1 cup brown sugar, packed

1 tsp. vanilla

1/8 tsp. salt

2 cups flour

1 6-oz package chocolate chips

1 cup chopped nuts (optional)

Beat butter with sugar till mixture is light and fluffy. Beat in vanilla. Blend salt with flour and stir into beaten mixture, mixing well. Fold in chocolate chips and nuts. Press into an ungreased 15½" x 10½" x 1" jelly roll pan. Bake at 350F for about 16 minutes. Cut in bars while still warm. Cool in pan.


PICAPIX PUZZLE

A picture will evolve as you complete the puzzle. Start with the largest numbers or combination of, colour in squares and proceed to work back and forth between columns and rows.

The three basic rules are:


- 1. Numbers represent how many squares you colour in to form a group or block.
- 2. Leave at least one square between these blocks.
- 3. The sequential order of the numbers is the order of the blocks, i.e., top number for a column is the top, block, and left-most number for a row is the left-most block.

The "logic count method" shown below is very useful: The clue at the left of the row is 6, so count 6 squares from the left to right and then count 6 squares from right to left. Confidently shade in the overlapping squares.



This same method can be applied even when there is more than one number, remembering to allow one empty square between groups or blocks. Use a second colour for elimination of background squares.

"Fans" are those who follow and support the work of the Society and on occasion may volunteer on projects or attend events. Both levels of membership can include individuals, organizations, or businesses, and we welcome new members in both categories.



CMHC HOUSING MARKET OUTLOOK SPRING 2022

The traditional approach to obtaining a mortgage, whether it be purchasing, switching or refinancing your home, is to go to a bank. But did you know there are several other options available to you? "A" lenders

Because of this defined focus, they offer more variety of products and routinely lower interest rates.

"B" or "Alternative" lenders

B lenders are lending institutions that provide options for clientele that do not fit the A mold. These institutions offer modified criteria to qualify for their products. Some B lenders have rates very similar to A lenders; some not as they offset additional risk with higher interest rates (+ fees). B lenders accommodate applicants who may not qualify for an "A" mortgage for any number of reasons.

Private Lenders


Private or unregulated lenders is anything from individual lenders like the seller of a property, a friend, or most often a business that specializes in providing private mortgages. These lenders are not subject to the same federal regulations that A lenders are. Their lack of regulation mean that they can close a file quickly and with

very little qualification standards being met. Private lenders aren't overly interested in debt servicing ratios, your credit score or verifiable income, and they are not required to stress test mortgage applicants. Your property value & equity is most important with them, but you pay the highest interest costs & fees. Getting approved for a mortgage with a private lender is much easier than getting approved at an A or B lender.

Always Reach Out To A Mortgage Broker

The best way to find mortgage options that may provide lower interest rates and a wider variety of mortgage products is to reach out to a mortgage broker. A knowledgeable mortgage broker will know the market and the financial solutions available to you. 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
