

## February 26th First Sunday in Lent

#### WHO WE ARE AND WHOSE WE ARE

The Lenten season is a fresh invitation to explore again who God is, who we are, and what it means to be human. We begin by hearing the tragic story of the first humans in the book of Genesis. As Paul describes in Romans, our struggles started when our ancestors broke the bond of unity with God, sought self-sufficiency, and grew apart from their true purpose and identity. In Matthew's Gospel, we see how Jesus resists the lure of living outside of unity with God. Jesus rejects false promises of possessions, power, and status. Instead, he puts his life in his Father's hands. As our model for living as a fully human person, Jesus demonstrates that we are created to live in relationship with and trust in God, and in harmony with and for all of creation.

Strengthen us on our Lenten journey


and keep us focused on the cross and resurrection



## THE SACRAMENT OF PENANCE

## WHAT?

The way we embrace Christ's call to conversion.

The step we take to express true repentance for our offenses.

The confession of our sins.

The reception of God's pardon and peace.

The **restoration** of our relationship with God and with the Church.

After Jesus declared that
Peter would be the rock
upon which he would build
his Church, he said to Peter,
"I will give you the keys to the
kingdom of heaven.
Whatever you bind on earth
shall be bound in heaven;
and whatever you loose on earth
shall be loosed in heaven."
(Mt 16:13-20)



After his resurrection,
Jesus appeared to his disciples,
extended his peace,
breathed the holy Spirit on them,
and sent them out saying,
"Whose sins you forgive
are forgiven them,
and whose sins you retain
are retained."
(In 20:19-23)

## WHY?

We were born with the effects of **original sin**: disobedience toward God and a lack of trust in his goodness (Gen 3:1-11).

God the Father sent his Son, Jesus Christ, to save us from our sins (Jn 3:16).

Jesus accomplished his saving mission by establishing the **Kingdom of God** and by suffering, dying on the cross, rising from the dead, and ascending into heaven (Mt 5:17).

Jesus established the **Church** to continue his saving mission by the power of the Holy Spirit through the celebration of the sacraments (Mk 1:15, Jn 19:34, Acts 2: 1-4, 2 Cor 5:18).

Through faith in the Gospel and Baptism, we are first washed clean of all sin (Acts 2:38).

Through the **Sacrament of Penance**, we continue to experience the forgiveness of our sins (Mt 16:13-20, Jn 20:19-23).

## How?

### THE ORDER OF PENANCE

The Church celebrates the Sacrament of Penance using the Order of Penance.

The revised rites and formulas of the Order of Penance of the Second Vatican Council were promulgated in 1973. A new translation was provided in 2023.


Celebrating the Sacrament of Penance or "going to confession" is a liturgical action that consists of:

- 1. The Reception of the Penitent
- The Reading of the Word of God (Optional)
- The Confession of Sins and The Acceptance of Satisfaction
- The Prayer of the Penitent and The Absolution
- The Proclamation of Praise of God and The Dismissal of the Penitent

## THE ACTS OF THE PENITENT

- 1. Contrition (sorrow for sin)
- 2. Confession (inward examination, outward accusation)
- 3. Satisfaction (an act of penance)

"Penance requires ... the sinner to endure all things willingly, be contrite of heart, confess with the lips, and practice complete humility and fruitful satisfaction."





## Going to Confession in Twelve Easy Steps

- 1. Examine your conscience, call to mind your sins, and then enter the confessional.
- 2. The priest will welcome and receive you.
- 3. Make the sign of the cross and say: "In the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit. Amen."
- 4. The priest will invite you to trust in God. He may also read a text of Sacred Scripture.
- 5. Say these or similar words:
- "Bless me Father for I have sinned. It has been \_\_\_\_long since my last confession. These are my sins..."
- 6. Tell the priest your sins. Then say these or similar words: "For these and all of my sins, I am sorry."
- 7. Accept your work of penance (prayers, act of kindness, etc.) to help make satisfaction and amend your life.
- 8. Express your sorrow for your sins (Act of Contrition) in these or similar words:

"O my God, I am sorry and repent with all my heart for all the wrong I have done

and for the good I have failed to do, because by sinning I have offended you,

who are all good and worthy to be loved above all things.

I firmly resolve, with the help of your grace, to do penance, to sin no more,

and to avoid the occasions of sin. Through the merits of the Passion of our Savior Jesus Christ, Lord, have mercy."

- 9. Receive God's forgiveness as the priest prays the Prayer of Absolution.
- 10. At the end of the Prayer of Absolution, reply: "Amen."
- 11. Give praise to God. When the priest says: "Give thanks to the Lord, for he is good," conclude: "For his mercy endures forever."
- 12. Go in peace and remember to say or do your penance.
