**A**n independent 501(c)(3) nonprofit organization founded in 2001, Peace Corps Commemorative Foundation exists to honor a powerful legacy: one shaped not by conflict, but by connection. We strive to honor, celebrate, and inspire.

Through the lived experience of the 240,000 Americans who have served abroad in the Peace Corps since its founding in 1961—Volunteers, staff, and host country partners—we illuminate the values of global partnership, mutual respect, and service rooted in peace.

At the heart of our work stands **Peace Corps Park**, a commemorative landscape rising in Washington, D.C. and accessible to the world through its digital companion app. Its purpose: to reflect the spirit of those who stepped forward to serve in distant communities, building understanding across cultures and time. The Foundation’s primary effort is to mobilize those touched by the Peace Corps—past Volunteers, families, friends, and allies—to bring this symbolic and meaningful space to life.

Located at the center of our nation’s capital, Peace Corps Park will serve as a quiet beacon. A place where Americans and international visitors alike can reflect on the role of service in building a more peaceful world. A digital experience that brings the story of the Peace Corps to visitors and classrooms around the world. And the Park is only the beginning, as the Foundation continues to support programs that reinforce the values of the Peace Corps and extend its legacy.

In a city filled with memorials to military sacrifice and presidential leadership, Peace Corps Park will stand apart—honoring a different kind of courage. It will permanently affirm America’s belief in the power of global partnership.

# A Message from the Board President



It is an honor to share with you the tremendous progress that 2024 represented for Peace Corps Park, with key donors making lead gifts to advance our fundraising campaign and diligent work

from our design team to secure final approval from the U.S. Commission of Fine Arts.

It was also a difficult year, with the death of our former president Roger K. Lewis, whose dedication and expertise fueled this project since he assumed leadership of the Foundation in 2008. I am honored to lead Peace Corps Park to the finish line, and am inspired every day by Roger's legacy and by the many donations that have been made in his memory.

2024 was our most successful year of fundraising so far, with just over \$3 million raised from 895 donors as well as pledges made supporting the vision of building a permanent symbol of our shared values in our nation's capital.

We secured two lead gifts, from philanthropist Jacqueline Mars and friend of the Peace Corps Ces Butner, each pledging \$500,000 to the campaign and inspiring a wave of donations to match their gifts and multiply their impact.

We saw grassroots groups around the country mobilize in support of the project with fundraising campaigns of their own and encourage their members to contribute generously to the project.

Our design team from Larry Kirkland's Studio and Michael Vergason Landscape Architects worked diligently to fine-tune the textures that will make up the world map at the center of Peace Corps Park, and to ensure that the site remains accessible to everyone, even the less mobile. They refined the landscaping plan and mapped out the lighting on every corner of the site, making sure that the Park will be a welcoming space, no matter when someone might want to visit it.

The National Park Service endorsed the improved design and presented it to the two commissions that hold approval authority for all projects that are subject to the Commemorative Works Act. Our design received final approval in October from the U.S. Commission of Fine Arts, and in December from the National Capital Planning Commission. Members of both commissions commended the work of the design team and recognized that Peace Corps Park expresses a compelling meaning and message.

With those milestones cleared, 2024 ended on an inspiring note with notable advocates – former members of Congress, a recent director of the Peace Corps, and an international diplomat – lending their voices to motivate others to join our coalition and help make the Park a reality.

We deeply appreciate the efforts of everyone in our community who supported Peace Corps Park in 2024 and look forward to an even more impactful 2025.

# From Advocacy to Approval

## Gaining Momentum to Groundbreaking

*In October 2024, Peace Corps Park reached a transformative milestone: **final design approval** from the U.S. Commission of Fine Arts, culminating a four-year design development process since conceptual design approval in September 2020. This moment closes a chapter more than two decades in the making and opens the door to construction planning.*

*It signals not only progress, but promise—the promise that a shared dream rooted in service, peace, and partnership will rise from vision to place.*

### 2001–2014: CONGRESSIONAL APPROVAL

*An idea planted in Capitol Hill soil, nurtured by voices that believe in peace as a national value.*

This journey began with a grassroots movement on Capitol Hill, driven by the belief that the Peace Corps deserved a permanent place in our national story. First introduced by Rep. Sam Farr in 2009, sustained advocacy and bipartisan leadership from Sen. Rob Portman and Rep. Joe Kennedy III helped push the bill through. The Act was signed by President Barack Obama on January 24, 2014—cementing legislative support for a space where service is honored.

### 2014–2018: SITE SELECTION & DESIGN CONCEPT

Partnering with the National Park Service, the Foundation reviewed 16 sites before selecting a half-acre triangle near the U.S. Capitol. Though a nationwide design competition drew 180 submissions, none fully reflected the Park's unique spirit. Instead, the Foundation entrusted artist Larry Kirkland to lead a bespoke creative process, where every line and layout would speak to peace and purpose.

### 2018–2024: DESIGN DEVELOPMENT & APPROVAL

*This Park will rise not from ground and granite alone, but from the ideals it holds within.*

Peace Corps Park was envisioned as a contemplative space—where visitors pause to reflect on service, community, and global kinship. Over several years, the design evolved through engagement with partners like the U.S. Commission of Fine Arts, National Park Service, and National Capital Planning Commission. Every adjustment balanced inspiration with inclusion, ensuring accessibility and long-term care. Final approval came in October 2024, marking the moment where vision became blueprint.

# Final Design Details

## A Vision Accessible to All

*Throughout 2024, working closely with federal partners—including the U.S. Commission of Fine Arts, the National Park Service, and the National Capital Planning Commission—artist Larry Kirkland and his design team thoughtfully refined key artistic elements to honor the park’s ideals while meeting the technical and regulatory expectations of a nationally significant commemorative space. Their efforts ensured that the park remains accessible to all visitors, harmonizes with the character of the National Mall, and reflects the enduring values of global service.*

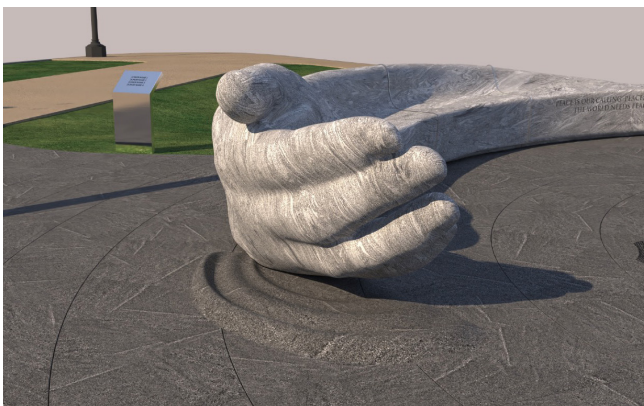
### Inscription Refinement

The three granite benches now feature interior-facing inscriptions optimized for visibility and meaning. A fourth inscription, etched along the back of the bench facing the main entrance, honors John F. Kennedy’s iconic call to service: “Ask not what your country can do for you...” World-renowned stone carver Nick Benson was commissioned to design a custom font and to ensure every hand-carved letter reflects the highest standard of craftsmanship.

### Designed for All the Senses

To address ADA guidelines, CFA tasked the Design Team with alerting visually impaired visitors to the projecting granite bench hands. Instead of raised curbs, they introduced textured ripples radiating from where the benches meet the surface—a solution both functional and symbolic of Peace Corps service rippling across global cultures.

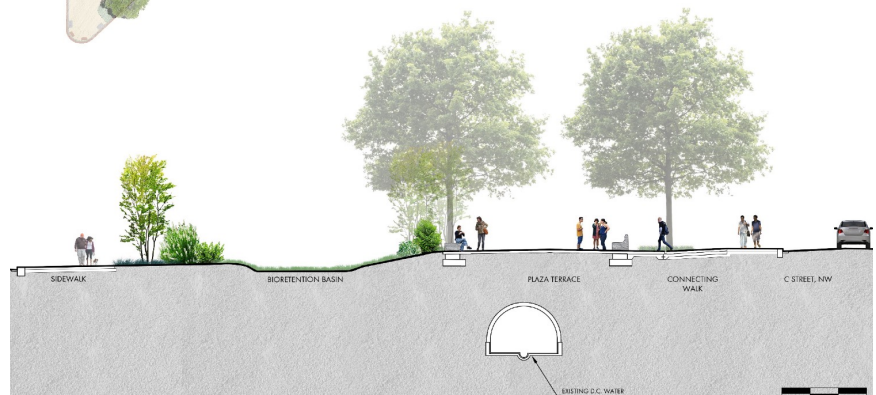


## Textured World Map Pavers

The map design—depicting Earth’s landforms and oceans without borders—was brought to life with textured pavers. These were carefully tested to discourage skateboarding while remaining welcoming to visitors using wheelchairs or wearing dress shoes, preserving both practicality and poetic integrity.

## Native Landscape Design

Led by Michael Vergason Landscape Architects, the plant palette was revised to meet regulatory requirements while embracing ecological stewardship. Local native species were prioritized for resilience and sustainability, and trees were selected to minimize seasonal maintenance—ensuring year-round harmony with the Park’s environment.

# Lead Donor Spotlight

## Generously Honoring Service

Peace Corps Park’s capital campaign took a big leap forward in 2024 in securing the largest gifts of our fundraising so far. Both philanthropist Jacqueline Badger Mars and entrepreneur Ces Butner made contributions of \$500,000 to the project and inspired a surge of donations, greatly multiplying the impact of their generosity.



**JACQUELINE BADGER MARS**—philanthropist and steward of American heritage—has quietly shaped the cultural and environmental landscape through decades of thoughtful giving. Her generosity reflects a quiet reverence for legacy—from preserving landscapes to uplifting the arts. Her support of Peace Corps Park is a natural continuation of that spirit: a symbol grounded in service, empathy, and global connection.

**CES BUTNER**, Oakland-based entrepreneur and philanthropist, honors his siblings’ Peace Corps service—brother Keith and sister Jolitta—through a generous gift from the CesTRA Butner Family Foundation. Their legacy of global partnership and civic dedication inspired a lifelong commitment to service, reflected in Ces’s support of community, educational and cultural initiatives. Peace Corps Park stands as a tribute to the values that guide his enduring legacy: inspiring future generations to serve.

# Engaging Our Community Mobilizing Nationwide

*Another standout element of our 2024 fundraising campaign was the engagement of organized groups of Returned Peace Corps Volunteers (RPCVs), who came together to raise funds and contribute to carving our legacy in stone—right in the heart of Washington, D.C. With the addition of Outreach Officer Arianna Richard to our team, we’ve been rallying our community, extending our footprint, and mobilizing RPCVs nationwide in support of Peace Corps Park.*

Both **NORCAL PCA AND FRIENDS OF MALAYSIA** launched formal partner fundraising campaigns rallying support for Peace Corps Park. They were joined by 10 other regional and country groups—including cohorts within those communities—who stepped up with inspiring commitment. **Their efforts underscored what we know to be true—**

# 2024 Financial Overview

*The Peace Corps Commemorative Foundation's 2024 financial position reflects the strategic nature of our capital campaign to create Peace Corps Park—a transformative project that will honor the legacy of Peace Corps volunteers and inspire future generations of global citizens.*

## 2024 REVENUE AND ACTIVITY

With total revenue of \$2,745,707 in 2024, we are grateful for the overwhelming support from individual donors who contributed 93 percent of our funding. Foundation grants,

affinity group contributions, and gifts-in-kind rounded out our diverse funding base, creating a solid foundation for our campaign goal of \$12+ million.

## STRATEGIC FUND MANAGEMENT

Our 2024 activity demonstrates responsible stewardship during this capital campaign phase. With 80 percent of all contributions (\$2.2 million) flowing directly into construction reserves held in high interest earning accounts, donors can see their investments growing while being positioned for immediate deployment when construction begins in 2025.

The \$98,270 in design phase completion expenses completed the critical design and engineering phase, providing the detailed roadmap necessary for efficient construction. Our campaign operations, representing 17 percent of funds raised, reflect the intensive effort required to reach our ambitious \$12+ million goal.

## TRANSITION TO CONSTRUCTION

As we enter 2025, this financial profile will shift dramatically. The \$2.2 million in reserves, combined with ongoing fundraising, will begin flowing toward direct construction costs and the physical realization of Peace Corps Park. Our current accumulation of funds

represents not idle resources, but strategic preparation to transform donor investments into a lasting tribute to Peace Corps service that will educate and inspire for generations to come.

*Roger's passion for the values of peace, generosity and friendship have left an indelible mark on us, on Peace Corps Park, and on the countless visitors who will experience the meaning and message of the Park once it is built.*

Last year, our entire community lost a leader and a champion with the death of Peace Corps Commemorative Foundation President and Chairman Roger K. Lewis, who was Peace Corps Park's driving force since 2008.

Roger was instrumental in persuading Congress to authorize the project under the Commemorative Works Act in 2014 and worked in close partnership with the National Park Service, which will maintain Peace Corps Park in perpetuity.

He led the Peace Corps Park design selection and development process with the design team he cultivated, led by internationally renowned public artist Larry Kirkland and landscape architect Michael Vergason. His dedication to this project remained his most passionate commitment until the day of his death.

We are fortunate to have benefited from his wisdom and guidance and are honored by the many donations that have been made in his honor, and thank our community of supporters for the memories they have shared with us since his passing.

# Legacy Story

## Ripples of Service

*Peace Corps Park will honor the “domestic dividend” of service—how volunteers like John Hoffman bring home new skills, perspectives, and a deep commitment to community. It will complete America’s story on the National Mall, standing alongside monuments to war with a tribute to peace.*

### *John Hoffman—From Colombia to Kansas City*



In 1963, **John Hoffman** chose service over ambition. After graduating with a degree in Latin American Studies, he joined the Peace Corps and spent two life-changing years in Colombia. That experience sparked a lifelong commitment to community—first in D.C., then back home in Kansas City.

After serving in the Army and building a successful career with Morgan Stanley, John retired and launched Urban Coeur Development. His projects—like 40 Penn Row and Battery Lofts—revitalized neighborhoods. But his impact went far beyond buildings.

John became a cultural force: founding Arts Alive, leading the Historic Kansas City Foundation, and serving on boards from the American Jazz Museum to Boys and Girls Clubs. Alongside his wife Sharon, he helped shape Kansas City’s soul through the arts.

Now 84, John is helping lead the campaign for Peace Corps Park—a national tribute to the 240,000 Americans who’ve served abroad and returned home transformed.
