- **Real Belonging:** A strong social life helps members feel needed and accepted instead of isolated or invisible.
- **Practical Help:** Friends in the church show up with meals, rides, and prayers during hard times.

Serving and Growing Together

- **Practicing Kindness:** Social gatherings let people practice being kind and helpful in relaxed settings outside of formal services.
- **Breaking Down Barriers:** Sharing food and activities helps break up closed groups or cliques and welcomes new faces.
- **Shared Strength:** Working together on projects or events unites the group and keeps everyone ready to support their local neighborhood.

When our Lord established the Catholic Church on the cross [where the “bridegroom” (Christ) and the

“bride” (namely, US!)] were wedded together), the Church's understanding of this “marriage” is that God wished us to live and serve together as a “Body of Christ” – many members, one head, united by the Spirit. In this regard, St. Paul would admonish us that we are to work together for the good of our community (see 1 Cor 12 and Romans 12) we are supposed to live and act as if this day were our last. The

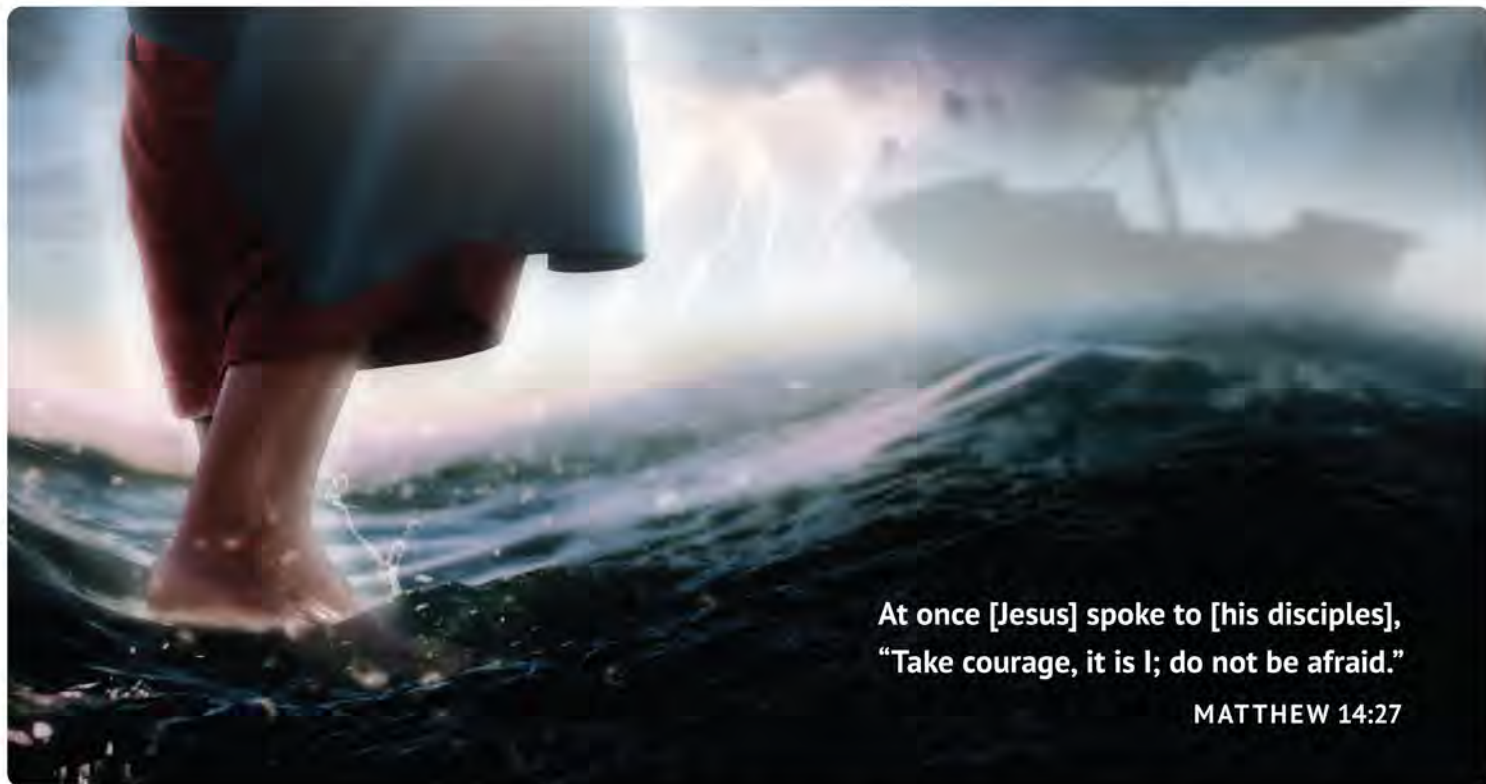
great philosophers of our age (Augustine, Confucius, Immanuel Kant, etc.) would implore, in their own way, a duty and obligation to the good of the self and society for us to live together, so that every person finds value and purpose in the collective good.

In this light, the older members of the community and supposed to nurture, form and guide those of the next generation to support the cause of the collective society and provide them a moral compass by which to live. As we learned from our scriptures this summer, those who do so are like good “wheat” sown in the field; those who do not are like “weeds” that, at the end of life, will be bundled together and burned (see Mt 13: 24-30).

For this reason are more, the social life of the community is so important to embrace – by doing so, we follow God's admonition to become “the Body of Christ” – too many people try to “go it alone” or become their own “gods” in a Church where Christ teaches us, “many are called, few are chosen” (Mt 22: 14) . As a result, turning away from God isolates a person from God and often society, where many feel alone, depressed and/or without hope.

Our mission as a Church is to reach out and give value to these “lost souls” as God has done for us. What we do in prayer on Sunday is not supposed to be an “eat and run” event in which less than 25% of our registered in our congregations throughout the world participate each week – the Mass is “the source and summit of our Christian life” (Catechism 1324) which is supposed to form and model us so that we can live this life together.

I implore you – stay positive! Support your local Churches. In a practical way, we have a “Birthday Baseball with Fr. Pete” event this Thursday and a Border Town Picnic on September 13. These are supposed to be community-building events; please consider joining us at one or both of these events so that we learn the lesson well about

One for All

In the first reading, Elijah is ready for anything—a whirlwind, an earthquake, a fire—because “the Lord will pass by” (1 Kings 19:11). But God comes tiptoeing, with a tiny whisper. Elijah, a giant of a prophet, covers his face like a child and wraps himself in the word of the Lord. Ordinarily, at this point, a homily would move on to the gospel. But in the second reading, from Romans, we are brought up short. Paul, a giant himself, would love a reassuring whisper from God. He is in utter agony, for the doubtful salvation of “my own brothers,” the Jews. Such is his distress that he wishes he could offer himself in exchange, even to the extent of being “accursed and separated from Christ” (literally, “anathema”) for “my kin.” (See Romans 9:3.) His anguish is heartbreaking, especially since it seems to be a prayer he has repeated over and over. Paul was no doubt thinking of Moses, who dramatically offered his own life to save the Israelites from God’s judgment after the golden calf: “[Lord,] if you would only forgive their sin! But if you will not, then blot me out of the book that you have written” (Exodus 32:32). Paul’s faith told him that Christ had opened the door of salvation to everyone, and even rejection by the chosen people could not close it. In fact, it confirmed its universal promise. A paradox perhaps, much like when Jesus walked on water, as we hear about in today’s gospel. ●

Reflect

Is there a situation that is causing you anguish? Do you believe God hears you?

Dear Padre,

I am in my third year of sobriety. Can I still become a eucharistic minister if I do not partake in Christ's blood?

Yes. Your personal sobriety practice has nothing to do with your eligibility for service as a minister of the Eucharist. Some would even argue that your commitment to sobriety is a powerful witness of your commitment to living a responsible and mature Catholic life. Instead of an obstacle to ministry, it is a shining example and witness of the power of God's grace at work in your life.

Practically, since ministers of the Cup are often required to consume any remaining Precious Blood after holy Communion is distributed, it might be a good personal practice to make sure there are enough ministers present to perform this necessary step in ablution. If everyone is informed in advance, it contributes to the shared sense of reverence and respect that is required of a eucharistic minister. ●

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AROUND THE PARISH & DIOCESE



ST. MAXIMILIAN MARIA KOLBE

(1894-1941) was a Franciscan priest and religious founder martyred by the Nazis for aiding Jewish refugees during World War II.

In 1906 young Kolbe had a vision of the Virgin Mary in which she offered him a white crown and a red crown and asked which he would accept. In 1912 he went to Rome, where he studied theology and philosophy at the Pontifical Gregorian University. In 1917 he founded the sodality (i.e., devotional association) of the Militia of Mary Immaculate, thus making a significant contribution to the international Marian movement. In 1918 he was ordained a priest. Returning to Poland, he established the popular Roman Catholic periodical "The Knight of Mary Immaculate." He later founded sister institutions in Japan and India.

Upon his return to Poland, Kolbe became superior of the City of Mary Immaculate and director of Poland's chief Catholic publishing complex. He was arrested by the Gestapo in 1939 for his anti-Nazism but was later released. He was again arrested in February 1941 on charges of aiding Jews and the Polish underground. He was imprisoned at Warsaw and then shipped to Auschwitz. There he continued his priestly ministry, including hearing confessions. Following a prisoner's escape, ten men were randomly selected to die as punishment, and Kolbe volunteered his life in the place of Franciszek Gajowniczek, who was married with young children. Kolbe and the other nine prisoners were starved for weeks until he and the few others who were still alive were finally injected with carbolic acid and cremated.

On October 17, 1971, Kolbe was beatified by Pope Paul VI, the first Nazi victim to be proclaimed blessed by the Roman Catholic Church. In 1982 Pope John Paul II canonized him, proclaiming also that he was to be venerated as a martyr. Gajowniczek survived Auschwitz and attended both the beatification and canonization ceremonies.

As I have preached at Sunday Mass, a few years ago I received a really angry phone call from one of my seniors, a woman who served as a housekeeper of a former parishioner who recently had died. This housekeeper named Patty let me have it over the phone because I did not respect the wishes of the senior parishioner that Patty served.

This senior parishioner that I will call "Jane" had asked me in 2011 to become the executor of her will at the parish. I had come to find out (because Jane would show me practically every time we met) that she was worth over \$2,500,000 plus stocks and that her intention was to donate what she could to the Church at the time of her death. Because Jane did not wish to put her estate in the hands of a lawyer, she asked if I would serve as her power of attorney.

After consulting with the diocese over her wish, I told Jane that I could not accommodate her because Church law and the direction of the bishops forbid me to do so. Jane was not happy with me and Patty certainly was not happy with me because Jane's wishes were not met and the vast majority of her estate went to in places that she did not wish it to go. I told Patty, and I tell you, that if you have an estate that you wish to be directed to the Church or family members or to whomever you wish to honor, it might be best to find someone you trust to honor your wishes or perhaps dispense your funds before the time of your death if you do not have trust of others during end of life issues.

TRADICIONES DE NUESTRA FE

Frecuentemente, los santos y santas son personas molestas que desafían tanto a los fieles como a los infieles. Tal es el caso del agustino Ezequiel Moreno Díaz (1848-1906), obispo de Pasto, Colombia.

Nació en La Rioja, España, en el seno de una familia pobre. En 1865 ingreso en la orden de los agustinos y fue enviado como misionero a Filipinas. Luego se ofreció como misionero en Colombia donde busco renovar la orden de los agustinos. En 1895 el Papa León XIII lo nombro obispo de Parma, lugar en el que le esperaba un martirio moral de calumnias, desprecios y humillaciones por parte de las autoridades civiles. Sus mensajes y desafíos pastorales llevaron a los fieles a un mayor fervor apostólico a tal grado, que incomodo al gobierno.

En 1898 busco renunciar a su puesto como obispo para no continuar como causa de polémicas y problemas para la Iglesia. El Papa no permitió su renuncia, más bien lo animo a seguir promoviendo el celo apostólico por el bien del pueblo. La polémica nunca debe desanimar a los fieles en Cristo cuando se trata de mejorar la vida moral de la sociedad en la que se encuentran.
