

In the weekday cycle of readings on which we are focusing at the time of this writing, we are studying passages from St. Paul's first letter to the Thessalonians. Most scripture scholars place the writing of this letter around 51 AD and theorize that this probably is the earliest written text from the New Testament.

At the time of his writing, the faithful in Thessalonica asked St. Paul when the Second Coming of the Lord would take place. In 1 Thessalonians 4: 13-20 (to paraphrase), St. Paul tells those of the faith that we do not know when the Lord will return but we are to act as if each day is our last. The introduction to this letter, as presented on the US Conference of Catholic Bishops' website, lays out this theme as follows:

The second part of the letter (1 Thes 4: 1–5: 25) is specifically hortatory or parenetic. The

superabundant love for which Paul has just prayed (1 Thes 3:12–13) is to be shown practically by living out the norms of conduct that he has communicated to them. Specific "imperatives" of Christian life, principles for acting morally, stem from the "indicative" of one's relationship to God through Christ by the sending of the Holy Spirit. Thus, moral conduct is the practical, personal expression of one's Christian faith, love, and hope.

To "live like Christ" is essential if we intend to enter the kingdom heaven. So many in the world... so many within our own community... wish to "poison" us by tearing others down, spreading what the church calls "calumny" (in the legal world, this often translates to "libel" and "slander," something for which many get sued in today's age). This was taking place during St. Paul's time; it certainly happens in today's age. St. Paul writes these letters (often to communities he previously visited) to instruct them, to mold them and often to chastise and correct them concerning grossly sinful behavior that would prohibit those who claim to "be like Christ" to enter the kingdom of heaven.

Edward P. Sri summarizes this theme from the *Catholic Resource Center*, where he tells the story about St. Philip Neri and his response to those who spread malicious gossip, libel and slander...

The story is often told of the most unusual penance St. Philip Neri assigned to a woman for her sin of spreading gossip. The sixteenth-century saint instructed her to take a feather pillow to the top of the church bell tower, rip it open, and let the wind blow all the feathers away. This probably was not the kind of penance this woman, or any of us, would have been used to!

But the penance did not end there. Philip Neri gave her a second and more difficult task. He told her to come down from the bell tower and collect all the feathers that had been scattered throughout the town. The poor lady, of course, could not do it—and that was the point Philip Neri was trying to make in order to underscore the destructive nature of gossip. When we detract from others in our speech, our malicious words are scattered abroad and cannot be gathered back. They continue to dishonor and divide many days, months, and years after we speak them as they linger in people's minds and pass from one talebearer to the next.

The problem for me preaching the message of scripture is that often it focuses on the evils of the world and what happens to those who choose to

engage in these type of evil practices rather than focus on Christian charity. Jesus' words were so harsh to those who lived in his time that the leaders of the faith murdered him less than a year after he began his public ministry (according to Matthew, Mark and Luke, three years according to the gospel of John). Eleven of the twelve apostles were murdered when they spread these theme, as was St. Paul, whose missionary work resulted in the government of his time extinguishing his life as well.

Words can build up and words can destroy. If people wish me to focus on this theme, then we focus on Jesus' words as cited in Mt 23: 27ff., words which the leaders of the First Century Church took very badly, most likely inspiring them to kill the Son of God sooner rather than later...

"Woe to you, scribes and Pharisees, you hypocrites. You are like whitewashed tombs, which appear beautiful on the outside, but inside are full of dead men's bones and every kind of filth. Even so, on the outside you appear righteous, but inside you are filled with hypocrisy and evildoing."

For this reason and more, I choose to remain positive and, regardless how the message is received, to continue loving and serving the community as we do. Over the last six years, we have invested hundreds of hours recording and producing Novena and Mass videos that are watched by over five hundred fifty subscribers on YouTube. Our local Food Pantry has become the beneficiary of hundreds (if not thousands) of boxes filled with resources for the needy. We have welcomed those rejected by others to receive sacraments that have brought hope to so many that felt they were lost.

In the end, this is all we can do - to love others, regardless of whether they love us (Mt 5: 44). This is the gospel message.

When Life Is on Empty

s he stood in line in front of me, the back of his T-shirt read, "Pain is weakness leaving the body." Though unsaid, it implied that the parting pain would be replaced by newfound strength. Yet, the more I thought about it, I wondered if that is always the case. Some pain simply leaves one empty, like the grief that comes with the death of one's child. That emptiness never leaves, it is never replaced. So too, the pain of living with mental illness, as it seems to isolate one from many of life's joys and satisfactions. Or, eventually, the aging process in all of us, as it slips in and steals the treasures of life, one by one. Pain is not always weakness leaving the body. Sometimes, it is the pain of an alien spirit settling in for the long haul.

If St. Paul's assertion that Jesus came and "emptied himself...coming in human likeness...even [to] death on a cross," then those times that seem to empty us of all we would hold dear are the times when we slowly take on the image of Jesus in our own lives. It is at such times when we are most powerless but also when God's spirit shines through our broken and wounded lives, if only because we become totally dependent upon God. It is Saint Teresa of Kolkata who is said to have once remarked that even God cannot fill what is already full.

Reflect-

What emptying am I experiencing? Can I accept it as becoming more like Jesus?



Dear Padre,

A Protestant friend tells me that Jesus died to take the punishment for our sins. That doesn't seem accurate to me. What does the Church teach about the meaning of Jesus' death on the cross?

Jesus understood his mission to be sacrificing his own life "as a ransom for many" (Matthew 20:28). His fidelity to that mission was even at the cost of death. However, saying Jesus' death was payment for our sins doesn't mean that a vengeful God was appeared by the slaughter of his own innocent son. Rather, we are redeemed because of the mutual love between Father and Son, as well as the love Christ had for us all when he offered his life. "It is love 'to the end' (see John



13:1) that confers on Christ's sacrifice its value as redemption and reparation, as atonement and satisfaction" (Catechism of the Catholic Church, 616). It is in this sense that Jesus' death was a payment—not one to be exacted—but a unique sacrifice "that completes and surpasses all other sacrifices," when "the Father handed his Son over to sinners in order to reconcile us with himself," and the Son of God freely and lovingly offered his human life to his Father "in reparation for our disobedience" (CCC 614). Christ "bore our sins in his body upon the cross.... By his wounds you have been healed" (1 Peter 2:24). Viewed in light of the resurrection, Christ's death has meaning in eternal life's triumph over sin.




A WORD FROM POPE LEO XIV



REMEMBER Your Church

In Your Will or Estate Plan

MAKE A DIFFERENCE

Your gifts to your St. Patrick's / St. Anne's Church support ministries that change lives and share the love of with a world in need.

With a little planning, a gift to the church through one's will or estate plan can be a meaningful testament to one's faith, an inspiration to family and friends and a force for life-changing ministry in the world.

UNRESTRICTED GIFTS

Ministry is ever-changing. Your church must respond to emerging needs, directing funds where needed most. Unrestricted gifts afford your church maximum flexibility in using funds to achieve its charitable missions. If you wish to allow use of your donation for purposes as needed, then the following language may be incorporated in a will or trust document:

(Describe a particular asset, a specific amount or a percentage of the estate)

to the (Parish Name, followed by current address) for its charitable taxexempt purposes, without restriction. If (Parish Name) does not exist at the time of distribution, then to (Another Organization) for its charitable taxexempt purposes, without restriction.

RESTRICTED GIFTS

You may want your gift used for a particular purpose such as children's ministries or music programs at your church. Or, you may want the church to invest the gift and only use the income.

Many churches and charities have already created endowment funds for specific purposes. Contact the church prior to finalizing gift plans to determine the names and purposes of existing funds, or to discuss creating your own special fund.

FOR A GENERAL RESTRICTION, THE FOLLOWING MAY BE USED:

Why Go to a Parish Picnic???

Too often church is about sitting and looking straight ahead and hardly talking to anyone else. Ok, hopefully, there is always good interchange / conversation with God. The church can't be any stronger than... its strength is a function of the overlap of our relationships with God and with one another — the two directions of the cross, vertical AND horizontal, sort of tilted to make a multiplication sign. Or a social application of "Loving God with all your heart and mind and soul; and loving your neighbor as yourself." Come and meet someone new. Or learn something new about someone you have known for a long time.

There will be games to play that work for all ages and for all physical abilities. For some of you, that's really exciting: when was the last time you ran a three-legged race or had a water ballon throwing contest? For others, games like that sound like a return to the misery of the playground during grade school, or the lowest rung of hell! If you are not the gaming type, isn't a picnic really about sitting around under the shade of a tree (or also — in our case, in the Lemon Hill pavilion,) — and shooting the breeze?

We need you there! Each of us has a role to play in this community. (And in life, but that's a bigger topic.) Both of those are truths I wish we could keep every before our eyes — we'd never dare miss a chance. Paul talks about the church as being the body of Christ with its many parts. And how they need to work together and coordinate. And we all know, sometimes, if there is is something in your eye, you really need your hand and its fingers to help get that something out. I believe that each of us is to be a blessing to others that no one else could be. If you aren't there, there might be someone left without what they would have received if you were....

Not all of us have big, summer Family Reunions. Or maybe some of us have them — but we really don't want to go! Let the church picnic substitute for some other place you either cannot or do not want to be.... And we plan to finish up about 3.30 pm, plenty of time to go home and watch the Bears play football..

Parishioner Kyle Volek and Parishioners from Los Chepes Restaurant are doing the cooking for us, and (a) they are good cooks, and (b) they needs a lot of affirmation of their cooking. Be sure to thank them; but even better will be to say, "Oh, Kyle, I have NEVER, EVER had a hamburger / hotdog that was so DELICIOUS!" There will be lots of other good food to eat.

This is the second year we have held a picnic and it had been decades since we had them before that. We hold worship every Sunday and Holidays once a year, or about ever six weeks (if you think about it?). Potluck Picnics only happen once in a blue moon. How many people do not even know (could not know!) who the parishioners are who pray with us in church? Think how much our community has changed in — all the people who have come and gone. We need to take every opportunity to be about getting to know each other and building relation-
