A few years ago, I experienced the best gift a priest can offer a person

of faith during the Christmas Season. I was thinking about this gift when I offered an anointing for a woman named Carol, who had left the faith a couple of years back but wanted to reconnect with God during her last moments on earth.

In 2023, Christmas fell on a Monday that year, a really difficult day for a country parish priest. On that particular weekend, I remember celebrating three Sunday Masses on the morning of December 24, followed by three Sunday Masses that evening (for those who can add, that amounts to *six* Masses on Sunday, December 24). After the three Masses I celebrated on Monday, December 25 (that would make *nine* Masses celebrated in two days), you had one tired priest at the Border Town Parishes!!!



After the noon Mass on December 25 of 2023, I was heading over to my family's house for Christmas Dinner, a difficult enterprise for a tired priest who drives badly! On the way to Plainfield, I received a call from the Cathedral of St. Raymond, the home parish in the diocese.

During that call, the deacon at the cathedral asked me a favor. It seems that on that particular Monday afternoon, all the bishops and priests from the city had finished their respective Masses and no one was available in the city to offer the Anointing of the Sick to a "level one" parishioner who actively was dying at the local Catholic hospital. Not knowing what to do, the deacon called the Catholic priest from Momence, IL. Does this make sense? How many parishes in the diocese are located between Joliet and Momence, IL?

When I received the call, I was somewhat flustered.

After nine Masses in two days, all I wanted to do was eat, sleep and SLEEP SOME MORE! I was in no condition to offer the Anointing of the Sick on that Monday Christmas afternoon in Joliet, IL

With that detour to Joliet, I started thinking to myself about the meaning of Christmas for an ordained Catholic priest and why God became incarnate in the first place. I thought to myself how inconvenient it was (and that certainly is not the proper word) to become incarnate and "to be born to die," as I often say. Why would God endure all of this for our sake? The Nativity Scene looks pretty but the message that underlies that scene literally is deadly serious.

I thought to myself, "What good am I as a priest if I do not model a very small sacrifice that parallels the infinitely more important one we view in that Nativity scene, all the way to the cross and beyond?" I felt embarrassed of myself for even wondering why I wouldn't want to go to the hospital for an anointing on Christmas Day.

So I went to the hospital that Christmas Day to anoint a woman in the end stages of life with her family surrounding her in that hospital bed. I spent time with the family, made sure we provided comfort in God's name during her time of need and then went to have dinner at my family's house, followed by a long winter's nap.

The next day when I awoke from my slumber, the daughter of this woman called. The woman died a half an hour after I anointed her.


I have to keep reminding myself why I am a priest... it is because of *you*. God has called me to serve you and to make sure you know we care. Please know this is the best gift I can offer in God's name this Christmas Season. You are all more than worth it. God Bless. – Fr. Pete

Close Enough!

t is the fourth Sunday of Advent. When Christmas is this close, one takes that final leap. Isaiah is centuries from Christmas, but he cannot wait! He sees the "sign" as clear as day: "the young woman, pregnant and about to bear a son" (Isaiah 7:14). And how about that Son! None other than "Emmanuel" himself—God-With-Us! Paul, too, is bursting at the seams! Inspired by what he calls "the obedience of faith" (Romans 5), he is excited to see the gospel thriving even among the Gentiles. For him, the "Spirit of holiness" is a gift offered to all—Christmas every day, you might say.

Speaking of "obedience of faith," Joseph is the perfect example. The word "obey" comes from the same root as "to hear," and Joseph has almost supernatural ears! Matthew, the former tax collector, tells "how the birth of Jesus Christ came about" in today's gospel reading like a bookkeeper—

the Holy Spirit in Column A, Joseph in Column B, with Mary in the middle. But when an angel whispers to Joseph at night, his dream comes true: "he took his wife into his home." Everything is set for Emmanuel!

Everything is set for Emmanuel!

So, the Bible is brimming with

from end to end. And when a virgin can conceive, are any of us exempt from "birthing" Jesus in our midst? Even when a "happy holiday" seems impossible in the midst of war or violence or poverty, when our ears hear only silence, let's sing Christmas carols every day!

Reflect

How am I at listening? Can I find new insights in old stories that I think I know so well?

Dear Padre,

I went to confession, and then, months later, my priest was removed for alcoholism and theft. Is my confession still worthy?

Your confession is not dependent on the worthiness or the unworthiness of the priest. Your confession is made to Jesus; the priest is a witness who pronounces the words of absolution that Jesus intended in the sacrament. "From the moment that a sacrament is celebrated in accordance with the intention of the Church, the power of Christ and his Spirit acts in and



through it, independently of the personal holiness of the minister" (Catechism of the Catholic Church, 1128).

The question of the efficacy of the sacrament and the unworthiness of the minister who performs the sacrament in the name of the Church is not new. During the time of persecution, in the early centuries of the Church, some people, including priests and bishops, avoided martyrdom by offering the required oblation to Caesar. Later, they repented and returned to the Christian community, a community that included the surviving family and friends of the men and women who were martyred. The question was asked, and with some animated energy, "How could these ministers who sinned to save their own lives now represent the Church?" The answer, arrived at with patience and discernment, is that the minister is only the representative of the sacrament, not the source of the sacrament. Jesus is faithful, even when his ministers have been unfaithful.

TRADICIONES DE NUESTRA FE

La tradición mexicana de las Posadas se acompaña de las tradicionales piñatas. Aunque hay piñatas de animales y caricaturas, la piñata original es una estrella con siete picos.

La piñata llegó al continente con los misioneros agustinos procedentes de España, mismos que la habían recibido de italianos; y estos, a su vez, la obtuvieron de Marco Polo quien conoció decoraciones de animales coloridos en China. El asociar la piñata con las Posadas viene de la cultura Nahuatl quienes celebraban a Huitzilopochtli (dios de la guerra) del 17 al 26 de diciembre. Estos ponían cazuelas de barro decoradas con listones y plumas sobre palos en el templo. Al romperlas, tesoros y alhajas caían a los pies de su dios.


Los misioneros mezclaron las dos costumbres para la catequesis. La estrella de siete picos representa al diablo y los 7 pecados capitales, mientras que la venda en los ojos es la fe en Cristo. El acto de pegarle a la piñata son nuestros esfuerzos cristianos a pesar de las desorientaciones que trae la vida. Romper la piñata es estar bañado con la gracia del Espíritu Santo y recibir los dones de Dios.
