THE LESSON seated Wisdom 3:1-9

The souls of the righteous are in the hand of God, and no torment will ever touch them. In the eyes of the foolish they seemed to have died, and their departure was thought to be a disaster, and their going from us to be their destruction; but they are at peace. For though in the sight of others they were punished, their hope is full of immortality. Having been disciplined a little, they will receive great good, because God tested them and found them worthy of himself; like gold in the furnace he tried them, and like a sacrificial burnt offering he accepted them. In the time of their visitation they will shine forth, and will run like sparks through the stubble. They will govern nations and rule over peoples, and the Lord will reign over them forever. Those who trust in him will understand truth, and the faithful will abide with him in love, because grace and mercy are upon his holy ones, and he watches over his elect.


THE EPISTLE 1 Thessalonians 4:13-18

We do not want you to be uninformed, brothers and sisters, about those who have died, so that you may not grieve as others do who have no hope. For since we believe that Jesus died and rose again, even so, through Jesus, God will bring with him those who have died. For this we declare to you by the word of the Lord, that we who are alive, who are left until the coming of the Lord, will by no means precede those who have died. For the Lord himself, with a cry of command, with the archangel's call and with the sound of God's trumpet, will descend from heaven, and the dead in Christ will rise first. Then we who are alive, who are left, will be caught up in the clouds together with them to meet the Lord in the air; and so we will be with the Lord forever. 


John 5:24-27





The Celebrant continues

By his victory you comfort us with the hope of eternal life, and you assure us that neither death nor life, nor things present nor things to come, can separate us from your love in Christ Jesus our Lord.

We give you thanks that on the night before he died, Jesus took bread. After giving thanks to you, he broke it, and gave it to his disciples, saying, "Take, eat. This is my body, given for you." In the same way he took the cup, saying, "This cup is the new covenant sealed in my blood, Do this in remembrance of me."

Grant that our lives may proclaim the mystery of faith:

Christ has died, Christ is risen, Christ will come again.

Gracious God, pour out your Holy Spirit upon us, and upon these your gifts of bread and wine, that the bread we break and the cup we bless may be the communion of the body and blood of Christ. By your Spirit make us one with Christ, and one with all who share this feast, until we feast together in the joy of your eternal kingdom.



THE COMMENDATION

The Celebrant censes the Altar of Remembrance, with the names of the departed, while the Choir sings

In paradisum deducant angeli: in tuo adventu suscipiant te martyres, et perducant te in civitatem sanctam Jerusalem. Chorus angelorum te suscipiat, et cum Lazaro quondam paupere, aeternam habeas requiem.

Setting: Requiem in D Minor Op. 48 – Gabriel Fauré (1845 - 1924)

May the angels lead you into paradise: may the martyrs receive you as you arrive, and bring you into the holy city of Jerusalem. May the choir of angels receive you, and with Lazarus, once a beggar, may you have eternal rest.

The Celebrant concludes

Rest eternal grant to them, O Lord;

And let light perpetual shine upon them.

May their souls, and the souls of all the departed through the mercy of God, rest in peace.

Amen.

And the blessing of Almighty God: Father, Son, and Holy Spirit, be upon you now and remain with you forever.

Amen.
