Introduction

This document sets out the admission arrangements of Castle Hill St Philip's CofE Primary School. For the purposes of this policy, the Governing Body is the admission authority.

Process

Applications for admission to the school should be made using the Local Authority Common Application Form by the national closing date of 15th January.

The Local Authority will inform parents of the offer of a place on behalf of the Governing Body on the national offer date 16th April or the next working day.

Where the school receives more application than places available, the following oversubscription criteria will be applied once places have first been allocated to pupils who have an education health and care plan which names the school:

Oversubscription Criteria

1. Looked After Children and Previously Looked After Children.

A "Looked After Child" (LAC) is a child who is (a) in the care of a local authority, or (b) being provided with accommodation by a local authority in the exercise of their social services functions (see the definition in Section 22(1) of the Children Act 1989) at the time of making an application to a school.

A "Previously Looked After Child" (PLAC) is a child who was looked after but ceased to be so because they were adopted or became subject to a child arrangements order or special guardianship order immediately following having been looked after.

An "Internationally Adopted Previously Looked After Child (IAPLAC) is a child who appears (to the admission authority) to have been in state care outside of England and ceased to be in state care as a result of being adopted.

2. Siblings of pupils attending the school at the time of admission.

'Sibling' means a natural brother or sister, a half brother or sister, a legally adopted brother or sister or half-brother or sister, a step brother or sister, or other child living in the same household who, in any of these cases, will be living with them at the same address at the date of their entry to the school.

3. Regular attendance at public worship in any Church of England church.

Attendance will be established by information provided on the Supplementary Information Form completed by a member of the clergy or other designated church officer. For the purposes of these admission arrangements 'regular' means attendance at least eight times in the twelve months immediately prior to the date of application.

4. Attendance at public worship in any other Christian church.

For the purposes of these admission arrangements 'other Christian church' means a church which is Designated under the Ecumenical Relations Measure 2018, nationally by the Archbishops of Canterbury and York, or locally by the diocesan bishop, or which is a member of Churches Together in England, or affiliated to the Evangelical Alliance or a Partner Church of Affinity. A parent or parents wishing to apply against this criterion must complete a Supplementary Application Form. Attendance at public worship will be established by information provided on the Supplementary Information Form, including verification by the relevant Minister/Faith Leader or their designated officer. For the purposes of these admission arrangements 'regular' means attendance at least eight times in the twelve months immediately prior to the date of application.


5. Baptism at any Christian church

Baptism at any Christian church means a church which is Designated under the Ecumenical Relations Measure 2018, nationally by the Archbishops of Canterbury and York, or locally by the diocesan bishop, or which is a member of Churches Together in England, or affiliated to the Evangelical Alliance or a Partner Church of Affinity.

A parent or parents wishing to apply against this criterion must complete a Supplementary Application Form and provide evidence of Baptism ie original Baptism certificate or re-issued Baptism certificate at the time of application.

6. Children of staff

Children of all staff will be considered where the parent has a permanent contract of employment. Their normal base of work must be at Hereford Road, Hindley, Wigan, Lancashire, WN2 4DH and their employment contract must have been in place for two or more years at the time of the closing date for application for admission.

7. Distance from school

Proximity to the school with those living closest to the school having priority calculated by: Children living closest to the school measured by a straight-line distance from the home address to the main entrance using the Local Authority measuring system.

When considering your child's application, we will use the permanent home address we have for you at the closing date for applications.

If parents are separated and the child spends time at each parents' address, the address which will be used for admission to schools is the address where the child sleeps the majority of the school nights (Sunday to Thursday) during the week in term time. Where there is a dispute or equal nights are slept, parent will be asked to provide proof of the address registered with the child's GP.

Parents/carers are invited to attend an Open Day or Evening held in October or November every year. You are welcome to make an appointment to visit the school at any other time by contacting the school office.

There will be a meeting for all new parents/carers in the Summer Term, which will be followed by a series of welcome sessions within the Reception class.

The school will write to all parents/carers with the details in due course.

Team Around the Child

Special Educational Needs & Disabilities

We are a school that embraces inclusivity. Our aim is to ensure all children at Castle Hill achieve, thrive, prosper and have the opportunity to reach their potential. The school caters for children with special educational needs and disabilities (SEND) and we have a dedicated SEND Co-Ordinator, Mrs Wallace. Provision is made according to the Special Educational Needs and Disabilities Code of Practice.

All children are considered special at this school and we aim to ensure that all children are able to benefit from the best possible education whatever their ability. This includes gifted and talented children, as well as children with special educational needs or disabilities. The children are encouraged to develop their skills and talents and to be proud of their achievements.

Pastoral Care

Close links between school and home are fostered and staff are always available should any problems arise.

The staff work as a team and all staff take responsibility for the care and welfare of all children from Reception to Year 6. Children are able to approach any member of staff, including the Headteacher, should they have any problems or concerns.

Safeguarding/Child Protection

Parents/carers should be aware that the school will take any reasonable action to ensure the safety of its pupils. In cases where the school has reason to be concerned that a child may be suffering ill-treatment, neglect or other forms of abuse, staff have a duty to follow Local Authority Child Protection Procedures and inform the Social Services department of their concerns.

In our school the Designated Safeguarding Lead is Mrs Wendy Hilton, Headteacher, and our deputy Designated Safeguarding Lead is Catherine Cloake, Pastoral Manger.







Early Years Overview

The school has a maximum annual intake of 30 children into Reception.
Children are taught in 7 single age year groups from Reception to Year 6.



The Early Years & Foundation Stage have a well structured and safe outdoor environment with easy access from the classroom

We aim to make every child's introduction to school as happy and useful as possible. All children are encouraged to do their best and staff strive to ensure that children are given the best possible education. We are proud of the children's achievements in all aspects of school life, their work is valued and we are keen to make sure all children achieve their full potential.

Pupils in key stage 1 and children in the Reception class respond positively to learning phonics, which they thoroughly enjoy. The School aims to provide a broad, balanced and enriched curriculum, which is exciting, challenging and relevant to the needs of all the children in school, whatever their ability. This incorporates delivery of the National Curriculum with high priority given to English, Maths, Science and Computing.

Several subjects are taught through a creative curriculum or topic approach and each topic is carefully planned. For example, over a period of a year, children experience a variety of topics covering all subjects in the National Curriculum.









Curriculum



Emphasis is placed on the early acquisition of basic skills in Speaking and Listening, Reading, Writing, Mathematics and Computing. A wide variety of activities and experiences are provided for the children.

Educational visits out of school, interesting visitors to school and other high impact events are arranged throughout the year since children say they learn well from these experiences.









Curriculum



Subjects covered include History, Geography, Science, Design & Technology, Art, Music, Computing, R.E. and P.E. Children are confident from an early age in the use of the latest technology and, with parental permission and under close staff supervision, they use the internet as a resource to extend their learning. Personal, Social and Health Education is taught in all age groups and children are encouraged to be good citizens.



During Maths & English lessons, children are taught as a whole class and in small groups. Teachers are keen to encourage children to work co-operatively in groups and also to become independent learners and to work conscientiously on their own.

Home & School Partnership



We aim to develop strong and supportive relationships with all parents/carers and involve parents/carers in their child's education and the wider life of the school.



New Reception parents/carers attend 'INSPIRE' sessions with their children, which are visits to Reception Class. This enables children to become more familiar with their new classroom and teachers, and parents can receive more information about how they can support their children at school.



Parents/carers are very welcome to come into school to help in a variety of ways - many parents/carers support us by working alongside teachers in the classrooms, accompanying trips, assisting with games or sharing their ideas, talents and expertise. We are very grateful for all the help and support we receive.









Home & School Partnership

All new parents/carers are welcome to join the Parent, Teachers and Friends Association who work hard to raise funds to provide extra resources for the school. Recently they have been raising money in order to make significant improvements to play facilities in the school grounds and to purchase outdoor equipment.



- We ensure teachers and leaders are accessible to parents/carers through an open door policy and take any concerns seriously
- We share with parents/carers, good news about achievements and improvements
- We run workshops for parents/carers when appropriate
- We provide regular reports to parents/carers, written and verbal

Catherine Cloake, Pastoral Manager, is available to provide advice to parents and support with a range of issues from behaviour at home, health concerns, Special Educational Needs guidance, etc.









Attendance & Punctuality

Regular school attendance and punctuality helps the children settle in school and not miss out on vital learning and social experiences. Good levels of attendance and punctuality are essential if children are to maximise their educational opportunities.

It is the responsibility of parents/carers to ensure their child's good attendance. The senior leadership team monitor attendance and will make contact with parents should concerns arise.

Children need to be in school everyday unless ill or there are exceptional circumstances. Doors open at 8.45am to help ease congestion around school and to provide time for children to eat breakfast which is provided free of charge to all children, every day.

If your child is ill, you must call the school office to let them know. Appointments eg dentists, doctors etc, whenever possible, should be made out of school hours.

In accordance with Department for Education legislation, we are not allowed to authorise holidays in term time.

On rare occasions children may need to be absent, e.g. to attend a funeral or wedding. A request for permission for Leave of Absence in school time must be made to the Headteacher prior to the leave being taken and authorisation obtained in all cases.







Homework & PHSE

Homework

Every child is expected to take home a reading book every day. Children are encouraged to read and to enjoy reading and special home/school planners are provided to monitor the children's reading and to keep records of books read. Teachers hope that parents/carers will spend time helping their child to appreciate the enjoyment of reading.


The school has a Home Learning Policy and each class has home learning tasks set by the class teacher.



Relationships & Sex Education

Relationships education is now compulsory in all primary schools. Our curriculum is available on our website. The School's Science and Personal, Social and Health Education curriculum which includes Relationships Education, ensures that general relationships education is dealt with in such a manner as to encourage moral consideration and the value of family life.

In Year 5 and Year 6 parents/carers are advised of the content of more specific Relationships Education lessons covering personal hygiene and growth and development, and are given the opportunity to withdraw their child should they wish to do so.









Religious Education



Religious Education is taught according to the Liverpool Diocesan Syllabus and, as would be expected in a Church of England School, is broadly Christian based. Children also learn about other World Faiths. Collective worship takes place daily in the form of whole school worship.

Visits to All Saints' Church are arranged throughout the year and children and staff use the church as a resource for their studies in other areas of the curriculum

All children are encouraged to participate in R.E. lessons but arrangements can be made for children whose parents/carers do not wish them to be involved in collective worship. Since this is a Church of England School it is only a minority of children to which this will apply and the Governors consider that each child should give full support to the religious and social life of the school.

Children in Year 6 are offered confirmation classes and have the option to be confirmed if they wish.

By providing a well-balanced curriculum in a secure and happy environment, the school aims to give each child the opportunity to acquire knowledge, skills, attitudes and moral and spiritual values to enable them to become valuable and happy members of the community. The school's links with All Saints Church and our sister school All Saints Primary are close and mutually beneficial.









Sports Provision



We aim to provide a variety of sporting activities to enable children to lead a healthy lifestyle, to keep fit enjoyment in sporting and find activities. Through sport we also aim to improve self-esteem, develop selfdiscipline and develop the ability to co-operate with others as they function as part of a team, fostering team spirit and understanding how it feels to win and lose.



Physical Education lessons, including dance, gymnastics, games and swimming are taught as part of the National Curriculum. Children in Year 4 have swimming lessons that take place at the local swimming pool. Children are also given the opportunity to play a variety of sports outside normal school hours and we arrange a variety of after school sports clubs. In the summer term, we endeavour to hold our sports day, weather dependent, where we encourage parents to come along and cheer the children on.



The school has close links with Wigan Warriors Rugby League Club, and Wigan Athletic Football Club. The children benefit from expert coaching from these clubs at various times during the year.







Extra Curricular Activities & Kids Club

Extra Curricular Activities



A range of activities are offered throughout the school year. These include a variety of sporting clubs for example football, dance/cheerleading, multi skills, high fives, hand ball, cricket and rugby.

We also offer over the year various other clubs according to the interests of the children.

We currently offer a selection of music lessons through Wigan Music Service from Year 3.



Castle Hill Kids Club



Castle Hill Kids Club manage our before and after school and holiday care and is available to all pupils who attend the school. It has been OFSTED approved and is very successful. Parents/carers praise the staff for their professionalism and their caring, enthusiastic approach. The children are very relaxed and enjoy themselves very much. There are various activities available including homework club, dance, sports, craft, outdoor play and games.

School Meals

All children are offered breakfast every day at the start of the day free of charge. All children are encouraged to eat fruit and Key Stage 1 children receive a free piece of fruit every day. The school promotes healthy life styles and children are given many opportunities to exercise and to take part in sport.



Free School Meals



All children in Reception, Year 1 and Year 2 are automatically entitled to a free school meal every day. Parents/carers are asked to order their child's lunch via our online ordering system Evolve. If you think your child is entitled to benefits related free school meals, please still apply as this triggers the allocation of Pupil Premium Grant. This is funding allocated to the school for each child who is entitled to free school meals and forms a large part of our budget.

Nationally, the children in Y6 during 2024-2025 did not complete end of KS1 assessments due to disruptions brought about by the Covid pandemic and therefore there is no progress data available for this cohort in 2025.









Behaviour Policy

Behaviour is excellent at Castle Hill St Philip's. Teachers expect high standards of behaviour so that all children are free to learn without disruption. We encourage an ethos of good manners, self-discipline, respect for each other and pleasant and positive attitudes through a system of praise and rewards. High priority is given to developing positive self image and esteem and children's achievements and contributions are valued and celebrated.



We expect all children and adults to follow these rules.

There are consequences in place for the occasions when children break our school rules or display challenging behaviour. Our approach is to praise in public and reprimand in private. Parents are kept informed of any serious difficulties as they arise via Arbor, the schools information messaging service.

The school has an Anti-Bullying Policy and any reported incidents of bullying are taken very seriously. Castle Hill St Philip's has a zero tolerance approach to bullying. The Headteacher and Senior Leadership Team are always available to ensure that problems are sorted out immediately according to the school policy.







General Information

Governors

Like all schools, a Board of Governors oversee life at Castle Hill St Philip's CE Primary School. They have a wide range of responsibilities and work with the Headteacher and staff to:

- Agree aims and values of the school
- Make decisions on the school budget and approve School Improvement Plans and Policies
- Ensure National Curriculum is taught
- · Monitor and review school's progress
- Ensure all individual needs are met including special needs
- Be involved in staff recruitment

The matter will then be addressed in accordance with the Local Authority policy which has been adopted by the Governing Body.

School uniform plays a valuable role in contributing to the ethos and identity of our school. High standards in learning are reflected in high standards of appearance and this embraces our school rule: Be ready!

Uniform Expectations

Our policy on school uniform is based on the notion that school uniform supports effective teaching and learning since it:

- Promotes a sense of pride in the school in line with our ethos
- Creates a sense of community and belonging towards the school
- Supports positive behaviour and discipline
- Is practical and smart
- Identifies the children with the school and encourages identity with the school
- Protects children from social pressures to dress in a particular way
- Makes children feel equal to their peers in terms of appearance and helps nurture cohesion between different groups of children
- Ensures children of all races and backgrounds feel welcome
- Is regarded as suitable wear for school and good value for money by most parents/carers
- Is designed with health and safety in mind.

Uniform Policy

Footwear

Children need to wear safe and comfortable footwear in school. Trainers are appropriate for sport but are not in keeping with the smart appearance of a school uniform. We require all children to wear black shoes as stated in the uniform list with the exception of during PE or games lessons.











Hair

Hair styles should be appropriate for school. This means:

- All children, girls and boys, are requested to tie hair up where it is long enough to do so.
- Hair must be tied up in PE for health and safety reasons.
- For swimming children with long hair need to wear a swimming cap or tie hair up.
- Hair accessories such as bobbles, head bands, clips etc should be plain and in keeping with the school colours.
- Hair gel, hair colours or braids are not permitted in school.
- Hair should be neat and tidy and worn with no extremes of style/colour.

Non regulation hairstyles are not part of school uniform and should not be worn. These include patterns cut into the hair, hair that is long in parts and very short elsewhere, hair that has been spiked up and dyed hair, either wholly or partly, in a non-natural hair colour

If parents/carer are unsure about whether a style would be appropriate they should first check with a member of staff prior to making any changes. Parents of children with inappropriate styles which do not adhere to this policy will be asked to collect their child from school to get the style rectified.

Jewellery

On health and safety grounds we do not allow children to wear jewellery in our school. The exceptions to this rule are plain, simple earring studs in pierced ears and watches. We ask parents/carers wishing children to have pierced ears, to get piercing done right at the start of the summer holidays so that earrings can be removed for PE lessons from the start of the new school year. Where this is not possible we ask the children to either remove these objects during PE and games or cover them with plasters to prevent them from causing injury.
