Section 4 – The Age-friendly University

We are very fortunate to have a university located in our area and doubly fortunate that Ulster University at Coleraine has embraced the development of strong links with its community as part of its strategic plan. UU is committed to enhancing the lives of older members of the community through innovative educational programmes, research and civic engagement. The term "Age Friendly University" is the name of a global group of universities which share the same vision and it includes UU and Dublin City University.





The primary aims of the AFU group are:

- To encourage the participation of older adults in all the core activities of the university, including educational and research programmes.
- To promote intergenerational learning to facilitate the reciprocal sharing of expertise between learners of all ages.
- To ensure that the university's research agenda is informed by the needs of an ageing society and to promote public discourse on how higher education can better respond to the varied interests and needs of older adults.
- To enhance access for older adults to the university's range of health and wellness programmes and its arts and cultural activities.

Principles of the u3a Movement

The u3a Movement is non-religious and non-political and has three main principles:

The Third Age Principle

- •Membership of a U3A is open to all in their third age, which is defined not by a particular age but by a period in life in which full time employment has ceased.
- •Members promote the values of lifelong learning and the positive attributes of belonging to a U3A.
- •Members should do all they can to ensure that people wanting to join a U3A can do so.

The Self-help Learning Principle

- •Members form interest groups covering as wide a range of topics and activities as they desire; by the members, for the members.
- •No qualifications are sought or offered. Learning is for its own sake, with enjoyment being the prime motive, not qualifications or awards.
- •There is no distinction between the learners and the teachers; they are all U3A members.



The Mutual Aid Principle

- •Each U3A is a mutual aid organisation, operationally independent but a member of The Third Age Trust, which requires adherence to the guiding principles of the U3A movement.
- •No payments are made to members for services rendered to any U3A.
- •Each U3A is self-funded with membership subscriptions and costs kept as low as possible.


The Third Age Trust

The Third Age Trust is the national representative body for The University of The Third Age movement in the UK providing a wide range of support services to existing U3As. In addition it helps to develop new U3As and to raise the profile and increase awareness of the movement throughout the UK.

The Third Age Trust looks after all the u3as in the UK, providing educational and administrative support. The Trust is overseen by a Board of Directors, to which any u3a member may be elected.

Each year the Trust holds an Annual General Meeting which is attended by members; issues affecting the whole movement are discussed and voted on as well as any Board elections taking place. As part of the Annual General Meeting, the Trust creates and publishes a report and accounts.

Causeway u3a is part of this wider u3a movement, which started in France in 1972 and was adapted for the UK in 1981. Within the whole of the UK, there are, at the time of writing, 1057 u3as with over 450,000 members. While each group is autonomous, u3as are registered with the Third Age Trust, the national representative body.



u3a in Northern Ireland

There are 26 u3as in Northern Ireland, with approximately 8,000 members. The newest is Ards Peninsula, which held its first meeting in May 2019 and has over 100 members. Members of the NI Regional Executive Committee (NIREC) are selected from the local u3as and meet regularly. Stuart Pollard and Brendan Mullan, members of Causeway u3a, are members of NIREC. NIREC organises Spring and Autumn Regional Meetings as well as several training events to which all u3as are invited. NIREC also organises several inter u3a events such as a summer school, choir song fest, bridge congress and quiz. There is cooperation with similar groups in the Republic, with members of both groups accepting invitation to events of mutual interest.

A safe and supportive u3a

Health and Safety

As mature adults, it is the duty of every member to exercise responsibility and to take reasonable care of their own health and safety and that of other members (HSW Act 1974 Sec 7).

Causeway u3a will endeavour to provide a safe environment for our activities by:-

- · Using suitable premises for meetings and events;
- Ensuring that any equipment provided is safe and that the user is trained
- Making members aware of the evacuation procedures in the event of a fire or other emergency situation.
- Providing first aid training for members on an on-going basis.
- Ensuring that personal baggage, cables etc are tidied away and spillages are cleared immediately to avoid slips and trips.

Group leaders or persons leading an outdoor activity have additional responsibilities and have had additional training.

Causeway u3a Policies

Policies that govern our actions are found <u>here</u> on our website.

Actions and Reports

- In the case of medical emergencies or personal injuries, the first action is to get the necessary medical support: First Aid and/or the ambulance.
- Group Leaders need to keep details of the ambulance service phone numbers and the post code of the venue or location.
- All accidents, injuries and illness at u3a meetings or events should be reported immediately to a member of the Committee.

When to Call 999

You should call 999 in the event that emergency medical assistance is required in a life-threatening situation following a serious accident, injury or illness. This includes, but is not limited to:

- Loss of consciousness
- Major blood loss
- Chest pains
- Difficulty breathing
- Severe burns/scalds

- Fitting/concussion
- Severe allergic reactions
- Choking
- Drowning

Causeway u3a Support Network

This is the sub-group of Causeway u3a which aims to provide practical support for u3a members, or those wishing to become members, who have difficulty attending events and/or participating in the activities due to health problems, transport arrangements or caring commitments.



Examples of support that our Support Network can offer

- Signposting local community and voluntary groups which can assist.
- Ensuring that, wherever possible, the venues we use are accessible for disabled members.
- Permitting the attendance of an accompanying friend or carer who need not be a u3a member.
- Considering the individual visual and hearing needs of the members.

Advice when talking to people with hearing difficulties

- Make sure you have gained their attention before you start speaking
- Face the person and maintain eye contact
- Speak clearly, but not loudly or very softly
- Don't mumble, don't cover your mouth
- If you are making a presentation, always face the audience when you are speaking; do not turn away to look at slides or a white board.

Notice of the AGM

Our fortnightly newsletters and news of which we have short notice go out in email format. We also publish these items on our website.

However, we are trying to cut down on paperwork!

Therefore, we encourage members to help us communicate via the web and email wherever possible. Electronic communications are more rapid and cheaper than sending paper through the post. They also minimise the work that volunteer members need to do in printing, sorting, putting into envelopes and posting information that could be sent electronically

If you do not use the internet contact our Support Network Group and they may be able to organise an email "buddy" for you.

<u>Causeway u3a Facebook page</u> is used mainly for social networking, and also for announcing events.








