Dear Citizens of Mount Vernon,

I am honored to present the 2023 Annual Report for the Mount Vernon Police Department. This report is our opportunity to provide you with a snapshot of the activities of our agency. This report also provides you with an up-to-date report on crime, collisions, and community projects for the MVPD.

As with many agencies across our region and across the country, we have continued to search for qualified individuals to fill our ranks. We acknowledge that we must compete against larger agencies in our region for quality applicants. However, I will assure you that we will not lower our standards just to fill a position. The responsibilities and role of being a Mount Vernon Police Officer is far too important for us to "settle" for just anyone. Thankfully, we have been able to hire two new officers in 2023 to help fill vacancies. We are optimistic about filling our final open position this year.

Even though our agency has been understaffed, our officers have continued to perform to the highest level. Our calls for service are up 33%, our number of individuals arrested is up 28%, and our drug arrests are up over 150% (over 2022). With all of this being said, our Part 1 crimes (which are considered serious crimes by the FBI) is down 21%. This fact is a credit to our officers being pro-active and utilizing technology to affect crime. I am extremely proud of the effort and results they have produced in 2023.

Our agency continues to invest in new technology to assist officers with their jobs. Our agency has invested thousands of dollars utilizing the Flock Camera System to help officers track down criminal offenders. These cameras have resulted in the recovery of a stolen vehicle, multiple drug cases as well as a dozen arrests. Our officers have also started to utilize other programs, such as Live911, to reduce response times to critical incidents.

Finally, we cannot do any of this without the support of the Mount Vernon community. We pride ourselves on the relationships we have developed with the citizens of Mount Vernon. For this reason, we continue to participate in numerous community projects, activities, meetings, and trainings throughout the year. Without you and your support, we could not be what we are today. Thank you, Mount Vernon, for your many cards, phone calls, visits to our police department, and the support you give our officers. I assure you our officers are very appreciative of your kind gestures.

We pray for God's grace and mercy for everyone who lives or visits our fine city.

## 2023 GOAL RESPONSE

### **Goal 1: Hiring and Recruiting**

Objective: Continue recruiting/hiring until fully staffed

- Strategies:
- · Attend Job/Career Fairs
- · Propose New Hiring Incentives to the BPW/Common Council
- · Advertise job openings online and over the radio

2023 Response: Our agency attended multiple Career Fairs and community events to spread the word about our agency looking for new officers. We utilized social media and hiring sites to help with these hiring campaigns. Fortunately, we were able to hire (2) new officers in 2023.

#### **Goal 2: Expand Knowledge of Officers**

Objective: Research/Send officers to additional training Strategies:

- · Poll/Survey officers for career objectives
- · Research potential internal and external training opportunities
- · Utilize training organizations to host training in Mount Vernon

2023 Response: Our agency attended multiple training courses from Indianapolis, to Louisville and even far southern Kentucky. Our agency increased the number of training hours as well as the topics that were covered.

#### Goal 3: Utilize advanced technology to enhance safety of citizens

Objective: Give officers and detectives more tools to help prevent / solve violent crimes

### Strategies:

- · Expand the use of the Mobile Data Computers for easier use
- Implement mapping program for one click access to information
- · Facilitate the exchange of information among shifts

2023 Response: Our agency utilized programs such as Live911 to assist with call response. Our agency also invested in the Flock Camera System and updated the computers in (4) of our patrol vehicles.

## 2023 GOAL RESPONSE

### Goal 4: Highlight accomplishments

Objective: Increase the number of media releases about our agency Strategies:

- Release media information on a timely basis about incidents/arrests
- Increase the number of meetings with the public
- Continue the use of social media to release information to the public

2023 Response: We have increased the number of news media and social media releases for our agency. We have attempted to keep the public informed about events of public interest that have occurred within the City of Mount Vernon.

## Goal 5: Begin examining large scale projects

Objective: Explore different projects that would be beneficial to MVPD Strategies:

- Explore the possibilities of a firearms simulator to reduce costs and liability
- Explore the potential impact of a K-9 program
- Explore different methods of funding for projects such as grants to fund projects such as a new SRO vehicle/wrap

2023 Response: Our agency has began to research different programs/projects, costs, and policies needed to begin the implementation of a K-9 program.

#### Goal 6: Analyze Crime/Traffic Data

Objective: Analyze crime and traffic data for proper deployment of resources Strategies:

- Analyze crime rates in our city to determine if crimes are connected
- Analyze traffic collision data to determine the common causes of the accidents
- Deploy resources to areas shown to have higher crime/traffic problems

2023 Response: Our agency utilizes the Aeries system to analyze the date, time, and locations of traffic collisions. This review of incidents will help the new supervisors deploy resources to needed areas.



Mount Vernon (IN) PD Officers Awarded Lifesaving Medals at April 5, 2023 Common Council Meeting

On 03/29/2023, at approximately 1247 hours, Posey County Central Dispatch was advised of an active fire at the Landing (a senior living facility) located at 111 East Water Street, Mount Vernon.

A resident had called and advised there was a fire in her 2<sup>nd</sup> floor apartment. The resident advised she was unable to get the fire out and was unable to get out of her apartment. Officer Anthony Stallings and Officer Darrin Lemberg, responded to the scene prior to being dispatched to assist.

Without regard to his own safety, Officer Stallings immediately retrieved his fire extinguisher and ran to the 2<sup>nd</sup> floor apartment. With dark black smoke pouring out of the apartment, Officer Stallings secured the apartment resident into a chair and was able to get her outside to the waiting medics where she received medical treatment for her burns. Officer Stallings and Officer Lemberg re-entered the building and continued to help evacuate the apartment building to get all residents out

Without the quick response of Officer Stallings and Officer Lemberg to get the resident out of the building, there may have been a loss of human life.

On 04/05/2023, Chief Andy Rush presented Officer Anthony Stallings and Officer Darrin Lemberg with the Mount Vernon Police Department "Lifesaving Medal" for their heroic actions.



On October 9, 2023, Deputy Schmidt with the Posey County Sheriff's Office responded to an unknown accident at the intersection of SR 62 and Ford Road (which is 5 miles outside of Mount Vernon city limits) where a vehicle had run off the road. Posey Dispatch had even attempted to get help from the Indiana State Police but they did not have any units available.

Officer Austin Davis with the Mount Vernon Police Department was working overtime on a highway safety grant when he overheard Deputy Schmidt advise dispatch he was performing CPR on an adult male who was not breathing and did not have a pulse. Without hesitation, Officer Davis, along with multiple MVPD units, responded to the scene to help Deputy Schmidt. When Officer Davis arrived on scene, he immediately took over performing CPR on the individual. This allowed Deputy Schmidt to retrieve his AED (which Schmidt ended up using). Both worked on the individual until Marrs Township Fire personnel arrived and placed a LUCAS CPR device on the male (which took over compressions). Sergeant Brauser (of the Mount Vernon Police Department) was advised by Posey County EMS personnel that they had regained a pulse on the male and that he was going to be transported to a nearby hospital.

Without the quick actions of Deputy Schmidt and Officer Davis, the male would not have survived. On November 1, 2023, Officer Davis was awarded the MVPD Lifesaving Medal for his actions.

Mount Vernon (IN) PD Officer Awarded Lifesaving Award at May 4, 2023 Common Council Meeting

On 04/14/2023 at approximately 1532 hours, Officer Levi Hoehn was dispatched to a residence in Mount Vernon in reference to a possible drug overdose. Upon arrival, Officer Hoehn found a 17-year old juvenile male lying face down with no visible sign of breathing. Officer Hoehn immediately began to revive the juvenile. Officer Hoehn was able to help the juvenile begin breathing but he was still not alert. Officer Hoehn administered a dose of Narcan and provided care until the Posey County Medics could arrive on scene. The medics were able to continue car for the individual who was revived. Without the quick action of Officer Hoehn as well as the available supply of Narcan, the juvenile could have easily lost his life. Because of his actions, Officer Levi Hoehn was presented with the Lifesaving Award.

The Mount Vernon Police Department would like to acknowledge the great partnership with the Posey County Health Department. The Health Department has been able to provide the Narcan to each of our officers. This life saving drug is a great tool for our officers to provide care for individuals suffering from the harmful effects of potential overdoses as well as themselves if need be.



## ANIMAL CONTROL REPORT

The Mount Vernon Animal Control position is a combination of our city's animal control duties as well as our city Code Enforcement position. This position is responsible for picking up stray dogs, transporting them to the kennel, investigating animal cruelty cases, locating owners, and responding to citizen animal complaints. Because this is a dual position, this job also investigates abandoned vehicle complaints, improperly posted signs, as well as tall weed violations throughout Mount Vernon.

## WHATS NEW?



#### **FLOCK CAMERA SYSTEM**

The Flock Camera System is a license plate reading tool used by law enforcement agencies across the nation to assist them in solving crimes. The tool reads the license plate as a vehicle passes and compares it to a national list of stolen vehicles, AMBER alert notifications, missing person databases as well as wanted, dangerous persons database. Currently, our agency has three cameras in the Mount Vernon area.



## **LIVE 911**

Live911 is a computer program implemented in mid 2023 that helps officers respond to calls quicker with more information. As a 911 call comes in, the officer is simultaneously notified on their screen and can hear the call LIVE as it's being processed by dispatch. This eliminates minutes that are lost in the case of an emergency.





## **Computers**

Our agency continues to invest in new, faster technology for our officers. We began phasing in new Dell Rugged computers in the patrol vehicles. These computers are built to withstand vibration, constant use as well as temperature fluctuations that occur in our working environment.
