What is Farmers for Soil Health?

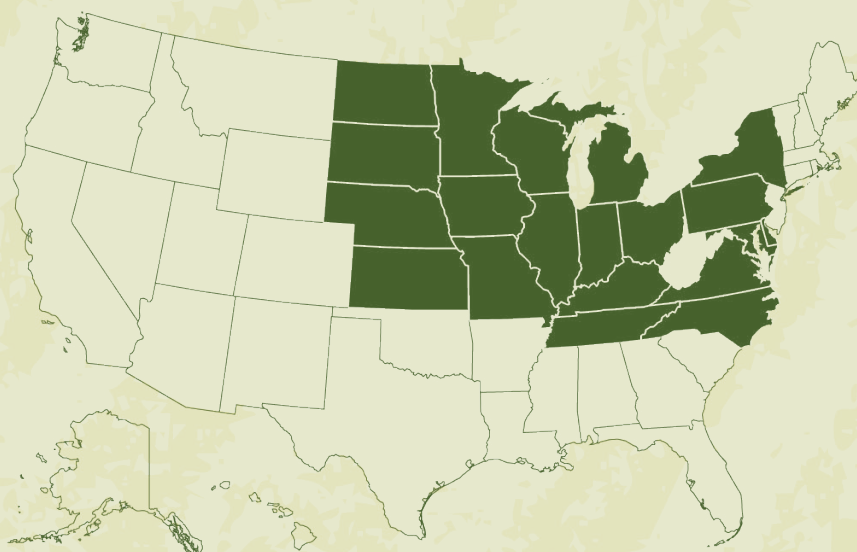
Farmers for Soil Health is a farmer-led, 20-state program designed to help producers improve soil health while strengthening their bottom line. Created by farmers for farmers, the program promotes proven practices, like cover crops, that support healthier soil, improved water quality and long-term farm productivity.

The program is a collaboration between the Soy Checkoff, Pork Checkoff and the National Corn Growers Association and is supported by a \$95 million USDA Advancing Markets for Producers (AMP) grant, which helps expand education, enrollment and technical assistance across participating states.

Farmers for Soil Health provides both financial and technical assistance to aid in cover crop adoption. Participants receive \$35 per acre, per year, for planting cover crops on up to 2,000 acres for the duration of the program, regardless of their cover crop history. Farmers also gain access to local technical advisors who provide research-based, on-the-ground guidance to support successful implementation in their fields.

While practices like cover crops require an initial investment, research shows they can begin delivering returns within three to five years. By helping offset upfront costs and offering hands-on support, Farmers for Soil Health aims to accelerate cover crop adoption across acres of corn and soybean farmland, benefiting both farm profitability and the environment.
