
Visit Macon offers customized exploring through Rock Candy Tours, most of which depart from the downtown visitor center. Options include the Free

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

#### SPONINGER OTIS REDDING CENTER FOR THE ARTS

The legendary singer Otis Redding always understood the value of education—especially music education to enrich one's life and community. Even before he died tragically at age 26, Redding was using his fame and fortune to fund scholarships for young students. And more than half a century since his passing, the foundation was started by Zelma Redding, his widow, using his name to continue that work through the Otis Redding Center for the Arts in his hometown of Macon.

"We want to give kids a state-of-the-art facility, and more importantly, a safe space, to explore music and the arts," says Justin Andrews, the center's development director and Redding's grandson. "Every kid doesn't sing or play an instrument—but everyone has a talent for artistic expression. We want to give them an outlet."

Opening this year, The Otis Redding Center for the Arts will be a multipurpose facility with lab space for private lessons, rehearsals, workshops, and studying theory in music, dance, and performing arts. There are also world-class studios where budding young artists can not only record their works, but they can also learn production and engineering on cutting-edge software and equipment.

The Center will be an extension and new home of

the programming the Otis Redding Foundation has been leading since 2007. For instance, Camp Dream is a week-long event that introduces young children, ages 5 to 11, to music, visual arts, and dance as forms of self-expression. Meanwhile, Otis Music Camp is a two-week retreat for older students ages 12 to 18, designed to empower them as musicians. This includes working with them on songwriting and exposing them to the music business, teaching them to navigate an ever-changing industry as well as imparting invaluable skills that will serve them in

any field. "We want them to take it deeper," says Andrews. "Our kids understand writing music, production, mixing, and mastering, but they also learn about licensing and copyright and financial literacy."

The Center won't just be for kids. There will also be interactive exhibits and kiosks where visitors

can learn about Georgia music history and, of course, Otis Redding history. A 250-seat outdoor amphitheater in front of the building will be open to the public and provide an epicenter of music for downtown Macon. But even these things are partially meant to draw artists to the area so they might instill their wisdom, experience, and inspiration to the children. "We want to reach as many children as we possibly can," says Andrews. "We

want to enrich their lives on a daily basis."



#### **ALLMAN BROTHERS PILGRIMAGE**

There are few acts in rock history who were as down-to-earth as the Allman Brothers Band—so grounded that fans can essentially retrace their history in Macon. Start at the **Big House museum**, a Tudor-style home where bassist Berry Oakley, his family, and Duane and Gregg Allman lived when the band first came to Georgia in 1970. Now a museum, the home features guitars, clothing, posters, trophies, other band memorabilia, and a recreation of Duane's bedroom.

Then head down to **H&H Restaurant**, the band's frequent source for soul food (try the fried chicken and collards). Visit the final resting places of Duane, Gregg, and Oakley in **Rose Hill Cemetery**, where hardcore Allman enthusiasts seek out the statue of 12-year-old Martha Ellis, which inspired their song "Little Martha," and the grave of Elizabeth Reed Napier, inspiration for their classic song, "In Memory of Elizabeth Reed."


#### CAPRICORN RECORDS

Known as the birthplace of Southern Rock, the significance of Capricorn stretches back to Soul, when none other than Otis Redding was a partial owner of the building. His partners Phil Walden and Jerry Wexler eventually built the studio, which captured and fostered the seminal sounds of the Allman Brothers Band and a wide array of artists from Percy Sledge to the Charlie Daniels Band. Today, the museum features a self-guided tour of letters, photos, interviews, and artwork, and more impressively, a digital record bin with sample tracks from Capricorn's vast discography.

#### TRAILS/TOURS

Macon is an easy town to get around on your own. And if you are into the self-guided tour, you can download the free **Tour Macon app** from Google Play or Apple to follow at your own pace. But if you'd still prefer a guide, there are also plenty of great tours you can book. For instance, **Rock Candy Tours powered by Visit Macon** offers customized experiences based on your interest, including music. Their **Free Birds & Night Owls Walking Tour** features stops at all the city's music heritage sites, and the **Rock & Soul Riding Tour** is a broader tour on wheels. You can also see performances by the hottest acts currently touring,





like The Black Crowes, Jason Aldean, and Koe Wetzel, by grabbing tickets at **Atrium Health Amphitheater**, the area's newest outdoor music venue.

#### MERCER SYMPHONY ORCHESTRA

The Robert McDuffie Center for Strings at Mercer's Townsend School of Music is renowned for producing world-class musicians. Four times a year, these students join forces with the Atlanta Symphony Orchestra and celebrity guests to perform at Macon's Piedmont Grand Opera House. Come hear these prodigies pluck and bow through Brahms, Beethoven, Coplan, and Haydn—as well as some contemporary surprises (including hip-hop). These quarterly concerts sell out fast; the venue also hosts a season of nationally touring Broadway shows.

#### MACON MUSIC REVUE

As wonderful as the library of recorded Macon music is, there's nothing like hearing it live. Unfortunately, many of our greatest artists are no longer with us or performing. But the next best thing is the **Macon Music Review**, a group of local musicians that breathes life into the city's ultimate playlist. Every Wednesday night at **Grant's Lounge**, this Preservation Hall-style collective (including two graduates of the Otis Redding Center for Arts) plays the hits and deep cuts from Macon mainstays like Little Richard, Otis Redding, and the Allman Brothers Band, along with covers from other bands with connections to the city, like R.E.M.

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A short trip from downtown, the city's natural attractions are packed with serene adventures and ancient wonders

#### SPOTLIGHT OCMULGEE MOUNDS

A visit to Ocmulgee Mounds National Historical Park, situated within easy biking distance of downtown Macon, is a revelatory, educational, and culturally enriching experience in an ancient setting. But in terms of tourism and international recognition, all indications are the park is just getting started.

Once home to the largest archeological dig America's ever seen, the prehistoric American Indian site with deep ties to today's Muscogee (Creek) Nation has counted 17,000 years\* of continuous human habitation. Handmade earthworks tower up to nine stories, with a wider base than the Great Pyramids of Giza. A vast collection of more than 2,000 artifacts and other objects dating back from 12,000 BCE are at the visitor center's museum. And there are about eight miles of hiking and biking trails.

Now, after a century of trying, Georgia's first national park has never been closer to fruition. A Congressional bill with bipartisan, bicameral support is set to establish the historically protected, 2,800-acre Ocmulgee Mounds memorial site and surrounding areas as the 64th National Park and Preserve in the U.S. This designation will elevate the Macon attraction among the likes of Yellowstone, Yosemite, Grand Canyon, Joshua Tree, and Great Smoky Mountains national parks.

According to Tracie Revis, director of advocacy for the Ocmulgee National Park and Preserve Initiative (ONPPI), a conservationist group that has spearheaded the designation effort, this status is an opportunity for the country to acknowledge a tumultuous history and begin to heal a large-standing inequality for all the peoples represented in the history of the land. Annual attendance is expected to

swell from an average of 250,000 visitors to roughly 1.4 million, with an additional \$33 million in annual revenue for the Macon area—potentially an economic game-changer.

"People travel from all over the world to see ancient civilizations," says Revis, a Muscogee (Creek) Nation citizen. "That's what we had here. We had the infrastructure of the roads, the commerce, and we traded with settlers for hundreds of years before removal. There's a lot here that goes into the history and founding of this country."

To help accommodate crowds, the national park would increase to more than four times its current

size by incorporating Bond Swamp National Wildlife Refuge into its planned 35,000-acre boundaries. The swamp is eight miles away, so ONPPI and its partners have been acquiring acreage in between to form a contiguous, protected park that would be woven with hiking and biking trails and other attractions. "Bond Swamp canfeel as thick and wet and diverse as a Central American jungle," says Seth Clark, ONPPI's executive director and Macon's mayor pro-tem. "It's just very deep down there. It's awesome."

#### **AMERSON RIVER PARK**

Craving an outdoor experience that's a little more manicured? Amerson River Park, a multifaceted and beautiful city park situated three miles northwest of downtown, is about the size of Atlanta's marquee greenspace, Piedmont Park, but with three access points to the Ocmulgee River for adventurous types. There's plenty of fun to be had on land, too.

Beyond the park's grand stone entrance, visitors will find lush meadows, an expansive playground, and more than four miles of paved and mulched trails through woods and around park loops, some of them with lovely river views. Five distinctive pavilions are available to rent (from \$100 for a few hours, up to \$1,000 for full-day access to larger spaces) along with picnic areas under the trees, while The Overlook perched above the Ocmulgee is considered the park's scenic centerpiece. Collectively, it's a grade A (and award-winning) destination for reconnecting with nature—and getting those steps in.

#### **OCMULGEE RIVER**

The Ocmulgee's waters are the recreational lifeblood of Macon. The river's relaxed pace is especially family-friendly and kind to beginners, whether they choose canoes, kayaks, or their own flotation devices. Options with outfitter Ocmulgee River Expeditions, a

popular choice, range from \$25 (a bus drop-off with no gear provided) to multiday excursions. There's even a two-hour nighttime adventure called the Full Moon Float, during which boats are bedecked with glow sticks.

"We don't have the shoals or whitewater that downtown Columbus does," notes Seth Clark, "but we have a nice, calmer lazy river paddle. Paddling the river is huge." Several landings for getting on and off the river are dotted throughout the city, with wildlife ranging from wild hogs and deer to osprey and even bald eagles frequently spotted. Yes, there are signs warning of alligators, but according to the aforementioned outfitters, not a single one has been spotted on their trips between Lake Jackson's dam and Macon's Spring Street Bridge.

#### NATIONAL WILDLIFE REFUGES: BOND SWAMP & PIEDMONT

Both Bond Swamp and Piedmont are part of nearly 560 National Wildlife Refuges across the country, but they offer wildly different attractions and terrain on opposite sides of Macon.

Established in 1989 to protect Ocmulgee River floodplain wetlands and adjacent upland habitats, the Bond Swamp National Wildlife Refuge is a year-round fishing and hunting paradise with three miles of public hiking trails. Expect about 8,600 acres of pure wilderness around this blackwater swamp, with old-growth tupelo and cypress trees, Spanish moss, alligators, and incredible biodiversity that includes

endangered and threatened species.

Twenty-five minutes north of downtown on the same river, Piedmont National Wildlife Refuge is much larger (35,000 acres) and part of the hillier, more granite-heavy Middle Georgia ecosystem with loblolly pines and hardwoods. Highlights include 50 miles of gravel roads through a variety of habitats that are open to public vehicles most of the year, and seven miles of hiking trails for every skill level. Find maps for navigating it all at the refuge's visitors' center.

#### **LAKE TOBESOFKEE**

Situated just beyond Macon's city limits, due west of downtown, picturesque Lake Tobesofkee provides outdoor recreation every month of the year, whether that means sailing, camping, fishing, swimming, waterskiing, or just hanging out at one of three parks with white-sand beaches. Spread across almost 1,800 acres, with 35 miles of shoreline and three campsites (at Claystone, Arrowhead, and Sandy Beach parks), the lake is a perennial hit with the bass fishing community in particular.

One unique attraction is in the pipeline for an area called the Duck Ponds at Lake Tobesofkee's northernmost coves and tributary; that's where Macon officials will soon build a glamping retreat for visitors on city-owned land. "It's all off the grid, with treehouses, and there won't be sewer lines or anything," says Clark. "We're developing that, with a bunch of cool mazes. It's really integrated into the landscape, and it's just very pretty."








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

#### SPOTLIGHT SOUL SIGHTS TOUR

Hop aboard Macon's "Soul Sights" van tour to get a fast overview of one of the South's best preserved historic cities, founded in 1823. Departing from the Visitor's Center, you'll first pass Terminal Station, the c. 1916 railroad hub designed by Alfred T. Fellheimer, an architect who also helped design New York's Grand Central Station. Next up is the century-old Douglass Theater, an African American-founded venue which hosted jazz and blues stars like Otis Redding, Bessie Smith, James Brown, Ma Rainey, and Little Richard. However, the third stop is by far the tour's oldest architectural wonder—the Ocmulgee Mounds. Native Americans built these earthen structures as ceremonial, meeting, and burial places beginning around 900 CE. The landmark represents more than 12,000 years of human habitation and is set to be designated Georgia's first National Park.

The 60-minute tour then winds back downtown, where you'll view a city thoughtfully designed to be green and walkable from the very beginning. Its strategic location on the Ocmulgee River and then as a railroad hub made Macon a commercial center in the 19th century. Wealthy manufacturing, agricultural, and transportation families settled here and built grand homes, churches, and public buildings. Local flooding kept General Sherman's troops at a distance during his fiery march, leaving the town relatively intact. And, fortunately, visionary 20th-century Maconites recognized their architectural heritage

and organized to preserve it.

The tour route passes some of Macon's 70 or so historic homes, such as the iconic McCaw-Massee House, a turn-of-the-century Beaux-Arts beauty often called the "Crisco House" because its original owner, manufacturer Wallace E. McCaw, invented the popular shortening. He supposedly chose the exterior's pale-yellow brick because it was the color of cottonseed oil, his product's original key ingredient. A later owner, William Jordan Massee Sr., is said to have inspired the iconic character "Big Daddy" in the Pulitzer Prize-winning Cat on a Hot Tin Roof, written by family friend and frequent visitor Tennessee Williams.

Macon's sophisticated citizenry built equally impressive public buildings. Mercer University's campus is downtown, with its many historic buildings next to **Tattnall Square Park**, one of the oldest urban parks in the nation. The city's **Grand Opera House** started life as the Academy of Music in the 1800s. Looking more like a church than a theater, the first building even had a stained-glass rose window. It was replaced in 1904 with a state-of-the-art theater, which originally had the largest stage in the South (a production of Ben Hur included chariot races with live horses!). The sprawling Macon City Auditorium, built in 1925, was also designed to impress, wrapped in a grand Doric-style colonnade like a Greek temple. It's hard to know which came first in Macon—the spectacular stages or the amazing performers.



## Houses of Worship

The structures belonging to Macon's faith community are varied and historic

#### CHRIST EPISCOPAL CHURCH

While the church is proudly celebrating its bicentennial this year, the current Gothic structure was built in 1852. Noted poet Sidney Lanier was married in the church.

#### MULBERRY STREET United Methodist Church

A staple on its corner of Macon since 1826, the church was devastated by fire in 1965. Miraculously, the stained glass windows survived and one of the first female architects in Georgia, Ellamae Ellis League, designed the renovated interior sanctuary.

#### ST. JOSEPH CATHOLIC CHURCH

This Romanesque, Neo-Gothic church, dedicated in 1903, has twin cross-topped spires that rise majestically above Macon's skyline.

## WASHINGTON AVENUE PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH

Founded in 1838, this is believed to be the oldest African American Presbyterian Church in Georgia. The current brick structure was completed in 1904.

#### TEMPLE BETH ISRAEL

This congregation traces its roots to 1859. The current temple, dedicated in 1902, has grand columns, stained-glass windows, and a stained-glass dome.

#### FIRST PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH

This church was founded in 1826, just three years after the city of Macon itself. Its 183-foot spire has soared above downtown since 1858.

#### FIRST BAPTIST CHURCH OF MACON

Established by African Americans in 1826, the church served both Black and white members for its first eight years but was then deeded to its founding congregation. The current Gothic-style building was dedicated in 1887.


## Performance Halls

Macon's music venues are nearly as historic as its roster of legendary performers. The towering **Piedmont Grand Opera House** was an acoustically and technically innovative theater when it was built in 1904, hosting international stars like Russian ballerina Anna Pavlova and folk humorist Will Rogers. Live music gave way to cinema by the 1930s, and the building barely escaped demolition in the '60s. Fortunately, with visionary support from Mercer University and the city, it has survived and thrived. The c. 1928 Ritz Theatre, once a movie palace, has been preserved and is now home to **Theatre Macon**, a community group founded in 1986. The c. 1916

Capitol Theatre, also formerly a movie house, is now a vibrant modern venue used solely for musical performances. Grandest of all is the c. 1925 Macon City Auditorium. Its copper dome is reportedly the largest in the world, and it is surrounded on three sides by a Doric limestone colonnade. The Southeast's oldest continuously running community theater with the same name is Macon Little Theatre, which launched in 1934. And, finally, the c.1921 Douglass Theatre—once featured in the Green Book, a historic guidebook for African American tourists—still hosts a variety of events, from films to children's performances.



#### ARCHITECTURE + DESIGN



### Historic Homes

Macon is home to more than 6.000 historic buildings. including more than 70 spectacular homes. View private residences such as the McCaw-Massee, an elaborate Beaux-Arts home built in 1901 for Wallace E. McCaw, the manufacturer who invented Crisco. Or admire the Carmichael House, a Greek Revival home built in the late 1840s that is laid out in the shape of a cross. A few of the grandest houses are now museums. The Cannonball House, another Greek Revival built in 1853, was damaged by a Union cannonball during the Civil War. But perhaps the most iconic is the Hay House, completed in 1859. This Italian Renaissance Revival mansion features elegant interiors, grand ballrooms, and period furnishings with cutting-edge 19th-century conveniences like hot and cold running water, central heat, gas lighting, and a speaker-tube system. Both the Carmichael House and the Hay House are National Landmarks.



Macon's varied landmarks include more than 6,000 historic buildings and 70 remarkably preserved homes.

## Higher Education

Macon is home to 15 districts on the National Register of Historic Places. Academic buildings belonging to both Mercer University and Wesleyan College are among the highlights.

The **R. Kirby Godsey Administration Building**, a grand Victorian Gothic building designed by Chicago architect Gurdon P. Randall and completed in 1874, was the first structure on Mercer's Macon campus.


**Willingham Hall**, built in 1890, was the second building on Mercer University's campus. The Gothic Revival facility served as the chapel and still hosts convocation.

**Woodruff House**, which has 18 columns and was designed to look like a Greek temple, was built in 1836. (During the Civil War, it briefly served as headquarters for the U.S. Army. The homeowners stored their private belongings in a closet, which the troops left untouched.) It is now owned by Mercer and used for special events.

The **Bell House** is a Victorian-style home built by Nathan Beall in 1855. Eighteen Corinthian-style columns were added in 1900. It is now home to the renowned Robert McDuffie Center for Strings, part of Mercer's Townsend School of Music.

**Mercer Law School** is located on Coleman Hill overlooking downtown, in a grand brick structure built in the 1950s and modeled after Independence Hall in Philadelphia, where the Declaration of Independence was signed.

Chartered as the Georgia Female College in 1836, Wesleyan College was the world's first college to grant degrees to women. In 1928 it moved to its present campus, where the Wesleyan College Historic District now includes approximately 30 buildings, most of them of the Georgian Revival style.



A splendid mansion which can truly be called "The Palace of the South." Completed in 1859, the Johnston-Felton-Hay House, a National Historic Landmark is considered one of the of the most outstanding examples of Italian Renaissance Revival architecture in the country. Plan your visit to explore the history, architecture, and wonder of Hay House.

Hay House is open Wednesday thru Sunday from 10:00-3:00.

From meat-and-threes to gourmet restaurants, and craft beer to chic cocktails, Macon's dining scene does not disappoint BY CARLY COOPER

#### SPOTITION LONGLEAF DISTILLERY

With two Double Gold medals at the San Francisco World Spirits Competition this year, Longleaf is calling attention to Macon's cocktail culture. Launched in 2023, this quirky distillery has released more than 20 spirits and liqueurs—everything from the basics (vodka, gin, whiskey, bourbon) to Thistle, an herbal liqueur inspired by a creation in Alba, Italy. All are sold by the bottle, and monthly mixology classes are offered to teach patrons how to best utilize Longleaf products.

The distillery offers 45-minute complimentary tours on Saturday and Sunday afternoons, during which attendees go inside the production area to learn how the spirits are made. Afterward, all are invited for \$15 tastings—with an etched take-home glass included. The tastings feature five rotating, quarter-ounce pours. Prefer cocktails? The bar is open Wednesday through Sunday featuring drinks like Cucumber Collins, made with 57 percent ABV Navy gin, and False Fall, a mix of Heirloom whiskey,

Liqueur of Life, Crème de Cacao, angostura, and orange bitters. A selection of zero-proof beverages is available as well.

The bar menu includes seasonal small plates like smoked trout dip, hummus and focaccia, and a small charcuterie platter. Patrons can relax on soft seating, banquettes, or at the bar, and let the waitstaff do the rest. An 800-square-foot patio offers fresh air when weather allows.

Co-owner Will Robinson describes the space as "eccentric" and "granny chic." Expect pops of green and yellow with "garage sale art" adorning the walls. "I wanted something that didn't feel like an industrial space or warehouse," he explains.

Longleaf is the first stop on Macon's Kegs & Stills Trail, attracting many to its top-sellers like High Tea flavored vodka, which was developed for Longleaf's now-best-selling cocktail, the John Daly. As a bonus, a longleaf pine tree is planted with the sale of every bottle. longleaf distilling co.com

In 1984, Natalia del Brasso Orsini brought the Old-World fare she grew up with in Abruzzo, Italy, to Macon, creating a white-tablecloth restaurant that would go onto host countless birthdays, anniversaries, and engagements. Originally located on Riverside Drive, Natalia's moved to North Macon Street in 2010, a space with a more casual patio and two private dining rooms. Eight years later, Wes and Betsy Griffith of the Moonhanger Group (known for Dovetail, the Rookery, Woodward Hotel, and more) took over, preserving long-time favorites like veal scallopini and Dover sole fileted tableside, and adding butternut squash ravioli and seared scallops with avocado mousse. natalias.net

### Meat & Threes

#### **BEAR'S DEN**

A downtown staple for more than three decades, this favorite serves Southern home cookin' like no other. The lunch-only spot offers so many choices, it's best to come with a group to sample them all. The quintessential order here is meat-and-three with daily-changing options like fried chicken, meatloaf, smothered pork chops, and beef liver. Sides include stick-to-your ribs items including mac and cheese, fried okra, creamed corn, and squash casserole. the bears den macon.com

#### SPONDIGHT COURT DATE: PICKLEBALL & TENNIS

If you haven't heard about pickleball, you might be living under a soundproof rock. Macon has not only embraced the craze—it's taken the sport to a whole new level, literally. **Rhythm and Rally Sports and Events** is the world's largest indoor pickleball complex, spanning more than 150,000 square feet in what used to be a Belk department store at the revamped Macon Mall. This state-of-the-art facility offers 32 climate-controlled courts spread across two levels.

Whether you're a pickleball prodigy or still figuring out which end of the paddle to hold, Rhythm and Rally serves up everything from day-use lockers and showers to a pro shop where you can gear up and show off your pickleball swag. They even offer expert coaching. Since it opened in 2023, the complex has drawn players from around the nation for tournaments. With its passionate community and regular tournaments, it's easy to see why this facility is a beacon for pickleball enthusiasts across the Southeast.

Macon's pickleball scene isn't confined to the indoors, though. If you prefer fresh air with your volley, **Tattnall Square Park** offers a 28-court outdoor pickleball playground. You'll spot seasoned pros with laser-precise shots rubbing shoulders with newcomers still mastering the basics. And thanks to the park's ample court space, finding a game is rarely a challenge. You can easily join a casual game or test your skills against some local talent.

Beyond pickleball, Macon's tennis scene is thriving as well, thanks to two premier facilities: the **John Drew Smith Tennis Center** and the **Randy Stephens Tennis Center**. The John Drew Smith center features 24 lighted hard courts and is recognized as one of the top 25 public municipal facilities in the country by *Tennis* magazine and the USTA. It caters to everyone from beginners to pros with lessons, leagues, and tournaments. The Randy Stephens center offers another high-quality venue for both recreational play and competitive events. Whether you prefer a paddle or a racquet, Macon has a court for you.



#### **MACON ROCKS CLIMBING GYM**

It isn't just a clever name—Macon Rocks is a 6,000-square-foot climbing haven catering to all skill levels and styles, from beginners to seasoned cliff-hangers, with auto-belay, top-rope, lead climbing, and bouldering options. Their routes range from an easy 5.6 to a challenging 5.13, with bouldering problems from V0 to V10. Macon Rocks is also the only climbing gym in Georgia featuring a large number of auto-belay routes, perfect for both novices and experienced climbers who want to ascend without a partner. If you're looking to level up your skills or introduce the kids to the joys of defying gravity, they offer classes and youth programs. There's even a fitness area for anyone who prefers their workouts a little closer to the ground.

#### SPECTATOR SPORTS

Macon's sports scene offers a combination of baseball, hockey, and college football for fans to cheer on local teams year-round. The **Macon Bacon** brings summer fun to the ballpark from late May through early August with their baseball games at historic **Luther Williams Field**. For ice hockey fans, the Macon Mayhem heat things up from October to April at the Macon Coliseum. Each home game of this Southern Professional Hockey League team features a theme like Salute to Service, Hockey Fights Cancer, Star Wars, or Superhero Nights. College football enthusiasts can cheer on the Mercer Bears from August to November at Five Star Stadium, where Mercer University's team competes in the NCAA Division I Southern Conference. Each team's games offer a lively atmosphere, making Macon a fantastic spot to root for the home team.

#### GEORGIA SPORTS HALL OF FAME

As America's largest state sports museum, the Georgia Sports Hall of Fame offers an interactive journey through the state's athletic legacy, bringing history to life with engaging hands-on exhibits and prized memorabilia. Visitors can explore themed galleries showcasing Georgia's sporting greats, from gridiron heroes like Bill Stanfill to diamond stars like Hank Aaron. With a 14,000-square-foot exhibit space, a Hall of Fame corridor that honors more than 400 inductees, and 205-seat theater, the Georgia Sports Hall of Fame provides a winning experience for everyone.
