Senior Division Scholarship Award

2025 Scholarship Topic:

How important is mental health and resilience to a person entering U.S. military service?

Eligible youth as defined in Section 3-2, in 12th grade or other higher advance degree (completed), will submit an essay of 1500-2000 words/video presentation to the Vice President of Chapter One. The Scholarship Committee at each General Membership Meeting will select a topic for the following year.



Entries or original work in essay or letter format or video presentation must follow established criteria. Applicant's name should not appear on the essay. All applicants must complete and submit AGH Form 6-2, Scholarship Application with the entry.

The following award winner will be selected from the Senior Division submissions only.

- -The Colonel Edmund C. Morrisey Memorial Scholarship award.
- -The CMSgt Paul H. Lankford Memorial Scholarship award.
- -The USAA Senior Division Scholarship award.

All applicants must complete and submit AGH Form 6-2 and an original essay of **1500-2000** words, double spaced on a topic selected by the Scholarship Committee.

In lieu of a written essay, applicants may submit a video with the following guidelines:

• **Senior Division:** Video length should be 10-12 minutes.

Further details, including presentation format, attire guidelines, and the scoring matrix, will be provided soon. Stay tuned for updates! Applications will be electronically submitted to the Vice President of Chapter One by 30 June of each year.

MSgt Bennie S. Frick Memorial Scholarship

MSgt Bennie Frick was a member of Chapter 7 and was serving as the Region 4 Director when she passed. In honor of MSgt Bennie S. Frick, the award of this scholarship will be based on demonstrated leadership in home, school, church, and community activities; demonstrated financial need to begin or continue a program of study; and educational and life goals.

Chapter 7, the Tarheel Chapter, Charlote, NC manages the Bennie Frick Scholarship funds and will continue to fund the scholarship each year.

Applicants for the MSgt Bennie S. Frick Memorial Education Award must be a dependent son or daughter of a NCOAGA member in good standing. Application and full instructions can be found in AGH Form 6-4. Entries or original work in essay, poem, or letter format will be double-spaced and be in <u>Word document format</u>. Applicant's name should not appear on the essay.

In lieu of a written essay, applicants may submit a video with the following guidelines:

Video length should be 10-12 minutes.

Betty Fearn Scholarship

Awarded to an active NCOAGA member, this scholarship supports those showing exceptional leadership and commitment to career and academic goals.

Betty Fearn Scholarship is established for an active member of Chapter One. The member applicant will write a talking paper on themselves to include leadership, extent of and/or potential accomplishments in; civilian, military, and academic achievements. The applicant will write a goals statement which will cover, as a minimum, the next year, to include academic or educational goals; career (civilian and/or military) goals.

Attachments to the talking paper and goals statement will be one or more of the following:

- A current progress report from CCAF or a copy of the CCAF Degree
- A current transcript from an institution of higher learning such as a technical school, college, or university
- A letter of acceptance/enrollment from an institute of higher learning (such as mentioned above).

The above information will be submitted with a cover sheet to include the applicant's name, rank, unit, region, chapter number and the unit home addresses.

Entries or original work in essay, poem, or letter format will be double-spaced and be in <u>Word document format</u>. Applicant's name should not appear on the essay.

In lieu of a written essay, applicants may submit a video with the following guidelines:

Video length should be 10-12 minutes.

Junior Division Scholarship Award

2025 Scholarship Topic:

What would attract 17–24-year-olds to join the US military service?

Eligible dependents in 10th grade - 11th grade (years completed).

Entries or original work in essay, poem, or letter format will be double-spaced and be in <u>Word document format</u>. Applicant's name should not appear on the essay.

All applicants must complete and submit AGH Form 6-2 and an original essay of 750-1000 words on a topic selected by the Scholarship Committee.

In lieu of a written essay, applicants may submit a video with the following guidelines:

Junior Division: Video length should be 8 - 10 minutes.



A word from the "old girl" who grew up with the NCOAGA! I'm retired now but let me tell you how I got started and still stay involved. When I got into the NCANG I was 34 years old. This was an exciting time in my career, Chapter 7 was so active in the community. We worked the lunch buddy program with unprivileged children in a local school. The "Angel Tree" at Christmas, usually with 150 to 200 children's name on the tree and we collected the gifts and delivered them with the local police department. We also provided a Christmas party for senior citizens and veterans. Our chapter also encouraged scholarship participation, and at that time the essays had to be HAND written. We would have a group of local members check spelling, grammar, and if they were poorly written, we would send them back to the applicants to work on. If they did not make the suggested changes, etc. we let them submit as written. We never provided a second edit, it was up to the applicants.

I served in several officer positions in Chapter 7 before retiring in 2006. I was involved with the NCOAGA for many years and continue to be involved since my retirement. My QUESTION to all our local units/chapters is: Are we mentoring our young airmen to be involved and to bring our Airmen into our Association? There are so many opportunities not only in the community but also to encourage our Airmen in their careers. PME was really pushed when I was coming up through the ranks, and I'm not sure we are getting the message out to our Airmen of the importance of PME, and also the advantage of attending in-residence when available. It is a real growth opportunity and also gives you an opportunity to meet others from other units and parts of our great country. The NCOAGA is currently more retired members than uniformed Airmen! I know times have changed and priorities have changed but please consider bringing more Airmen into our Association.

From the Parliamentarian...

Fellow Graduates -

Just about thirty years ago, on May 8, 1995, I found myself driving to work at Base Aerienne 125 Istres, France. While stopped at a light, I noticed the crossing street sign "Rue 8 Mai" – which I thought was an odd coincidence, not realizing its significance until I arrived at work and recalled that May the 8th is V.E. (Victory in Europe) Day. All of France would surely be celebrating the 50th anniversary of the end of World War II.

As it happened, our KC-135R tanker aircrew was assigned alert duty, which meant that so long as we carried pagers and could be airborne within two hours' notice, we could roam the area. We set out for Istres, intent on lunch at "A Deux Toques" where I planned to order my favorite dessert, a pear tart with chocolate sauce. While coming out of the restaurant, we saw a large crowd forming in front of the city hall and heard a band playing a lively march. The dignified mayor, complete with his office's sash wrapped across his chest, appeared on the balcony and commenced what was surely a patriotic speech, though I didn't understand a word. The French audience, clapping wildly, included dozens of old men in berets and rumpled suits festooned from shoulder to rib cage with ribbons and medals.

I felt both moved and bemused as I watched and wondered how many decorated war heroes could there be when France surrendered to Germany some six weeks after the Blitz-krieg invasion? I recalled that during my boyhood in 1950's post-war Germany, nearly every French adult claimed to have been in the Resistance; now with a half-century of hindsight, historians suggest the Resistance hardly existed and most French citizens were forced to collaborate. I read somewhere that the famous Coco Chanel lived in style at the Excelsior Hotel in Paris, courtesy of a German high official boyfriend who installed her there for the duration of the war. About ten years ago, I met an elderly woman from Beaune, France, who married an American soldier and became a Nebraska farm wife. During World War II, she and her sister worked as canteen cooks for the occupying German army; their brother had died of starvation and this job meant the two girls would not suffer a similar fate. When the U.S. Army liberated their village, the two girls began cooking in the same canteen for the Americans. Though Simone spoke no English and her American suitor spoke no French, they fell in love and made a happy marriage in rural Nebraska.

The point is that the French vividly remember the defeat of Nazi Germany. The celebration of their liberation was marked by a solemn parade of these old veterans, weighed down with medals and memories, marching from the Istres City Hall to a cemetery on the outskirts of town. Our aircrew joined in and marched alongside.

It's 80 years on. Those old soldiers are gone, the old woman who had cooked for the Germans is gone, but I remember them and I salute them.

As Parliamentarian, I should mention that of course, I remain available to answer any procedural or parliamentary questions; feel free to send a text or email. (I can also answer questions about my favorite French food, but that's not official.)


