Head duck files toxic mold lawsuit

EUGENE - University of Oregon basketball coach Ernie Kent has filed a lawsuit against a homebuilder and two contractors alleging that faulty workmanship in his home led to an infestation of health-damaging toxic mold.

Kent and his wife, Dianna, are seeking \$5 million from general contractor Lynn Development Corp. and McLaughlin Plastering Inc.

The lawsuit, filed Feb. 28 in Lane County Circuit Court, also names Michael Miller, a plumber who worked for Lynn, as a defendant.

The Kents bought the home in west Eugene in June 1997 for \$365,000. The house had been completed about a year earlier and had been vacant since its completion, the lawsuit said.

The Kents claim that the house become rife with at least nine types of toxic mold, causing family members to develop health problems ranging from joint pain to constant fatigue.

The Kents and their three children moved out of the home in December. They now rent a home in Eugene.
